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## Outward Bound to Costa Rica

*OWL students to travel outside of the US for a service trip for the first time*

Outward Bound points have gotten more competitive than ever.

Every year, OWL students involved in Outward Bound Service Adventure (OBSA) spend the school year volunteering at events and fundraisers to raise money for trips they go on over the week

of interim. Every hour they spend volunteering and every \$10 they raise gets translated into points, and the students with the most points at the end of the year get the first choice on what trip they'd like to go on.

These trips are usually to partner Outward Bound camps, which are dedicated programs designed to get

students engaged in the natural world. For the past few years, OWL students have traveled to Northern Minnesota, Colorado, and Maine to do service projects and celebrate the fruits of their labor.

This year, students will get the option to travel to a camp in Costa Rica. "It's something that we've been interested in for a long time, knowing that

there were Outward Bound base camps in Latin America. The school that we work with in Maine purchased the base camp in Costa Rica a couple of years ago, and we have a really strong relationship with them, so they asked if we would be interested in going to Costa Rica to do a service trip there," explained OWL Spanish teacher and OBSA coordinator

Tim Leone-Getton.

"We haven't done an Outward Bound trip like that since California in 2023, which was kind of a big deal. The fact that they're bringing kids to Costa Rica is really awesome," said senior Margaret Moe.

This is the first time an OWL OBSA group will be traveling internationally, though there have been school

sponsored trips out of the country before, including to Costa Rica. International travel is a little more complicated, so the logistics for the trip need to be figured out sooner than usual. "We need to identify the group a little earlier so they can get passports for it," said Tim, "we'll be getting more information from the school

In most of the exams I take, there's an open question and I have to elaborate on

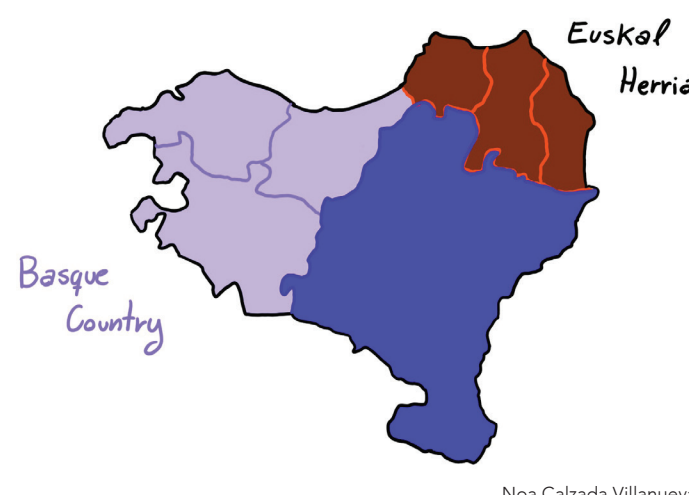
everything I've learned. Most of the time I know what I want to say but can't say it in Basque.

*The adjustment to high school means exposure to classic literature, which can be good and bad*

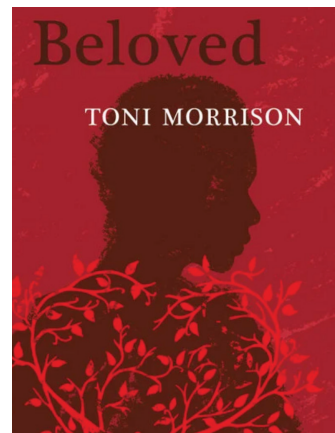

Classics are very well known, having been popular since they've been written. It is debated whether or not many books are considered classics, but some of the books that do fit into the classic category include *Pride and Prejudice*, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, and *1984*.

Classics can be difficult to read, with out-dated language and long sentences that might be hard to understand and follow. The goal of much classic literature is to challenge readers to think critically,

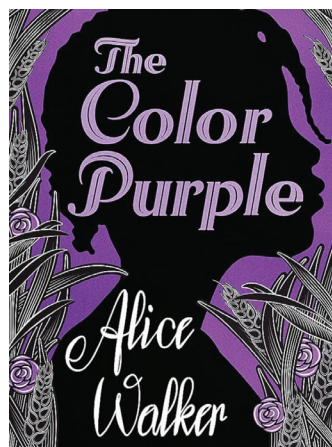

9th grade English. I had heard about the movie *The Color Purple*, so I was immediately interested to read the book.

*The Color Purple* is a classic book written by Alice Walker



in 1982 and has been adapted into a movie. It follows the journey of Celie, who is an African American woman in Georgia, from her abusive childhood home, to her abusive husband's house, and then to reconnecting with her sister and discovering herself. It's about a journey of a woman through some of the hardest things in life, but throughout it all she finds her own power, as well as financial and social independence in a time where that was not supported.

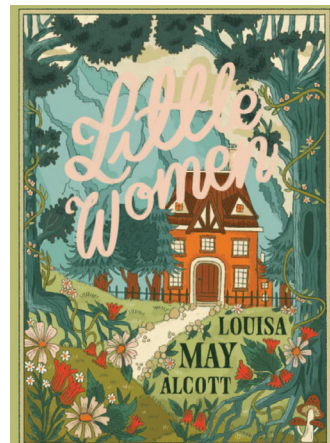
The book starts off with journal-like entries starting with "Dear God." Celie is living in her childhood home, already a mother of two, and getting secretly abused and raped by her step-father "Him." She is "forbidden" by Him to go to school. Her children are from her stepdad, as she was groomed and abused very young. She then gets married off to a man that is in love with another woman. This woman is named Shug Avery and she is a very beautiful singer who travels on tours. Celie's relationship with Shug evolves

over time, starting with an idolization of this powerful woman.

Throughout the book, her relationships with people and herself change. Celie and her husband become friends, her and Shug become 'lovers' before that was even a recognized thing between women. She also reconnects with her sister and her husband. Celie discovers self empowerment and self fulfillment, which took a long time and lots of healing.

I really liked the style of writing. It took some time to get used to the old grammar and unusual spelling with some words, but it felt more real. I could get into the book quicker as opposed to other books that do not go as deep into characters. I really enjoyed the different characters and how the author wrote them. They were easily told apart from each other, with their personalities and how they acted. The story in itself also felt very much like a real life story of someone's life.

I didn't particularly like the almost abrupt character development of Celie's husband, I felt that the author could have gone a little deeper. It didn't necessarily make sense and it felt kinda weird for that

# The history and future of neckties

*The fashion staple has a long history, but is it fading away?*

This article of clothing traces its history back three millennia ago, is a symbol of the American dream, has and will stand the test of time

I am talking about the necktie.

The Croats are generally credited with inventing the necktie, but according to Merriam Webster, it is "a narrow length of cloth worn about the neck and tied in front." By this definition, neckties were invented long before Croatia was founded.

Among these ancient neckties are neckscarves worn by the Terracotta

Army in China, neckscarves worn by Romans, and the knot of Isis found on Egyptian mummies. During the Renaissance, the cravat was used by the Croatian military, then the French. King Louis XIII of France (the inbred grotesquerie) favored the cravat over the ruff, a common accessory at the time. Cravat is likely a corruption of the word Croat.

It is not known whether bow ties or modern neckties came first, but they both likely derive from the cravat.

An early tie knot was the four in hand knot, which

is usually the first knot people learn. It is named after the four in hand club, which is after a type of carriage which has reins that are tied similarly to its namesake knot, according to [tiemart.com](http://tiemart.com).

There was also the Ediety knot, which was invented in the 1920s and popularized by the movie *The Matrix Reloaded*. The Trinity knot (referenced later in this feature) was based off of it.

Also invented in the 1920s was the clip-on tie. Now it tends to be used by people who don't know how to tie a tie, but they were initially created for safety reasons.

Then came a classic known as the Windsor knot. According to [Ties.com](http://Ties.com), the Windsor knot is among the "3 Knots Every Man Should Know" and is used by the UK Air Force. It was invented not by Duke Windsor, but by a tailor named Domenico Scappino in the 1930s. Windsor actually achieved his signature style by having custom made extra thick stitch on the four in hand knot.

The Trinity knot was invented in 2004 and resembles an Irish triquetra knot, according to Wikipedia. Unlike most knots, this knot

They meet during the Friday club time in Luke's room. Model United Nations is a fairly new club at OWL, founded in 2023-2024. David said "[to a student thinking about

joining] I would say that even if it looks challenging, it's not that intimidating, and a lot of people come in having no idea what to do, and they still have fun at the conferences. It's not super competitive. It's more about discussion and having fun."

OWL's club goes to an annual conference at Macalester College, and

collaborates with teams from Central, Highland, and many other schools. David said, "it's from all across Minnesota." At a Model UN conference you work in a committee group called a delegate. With other delegates from other schools you work to solve real world problems by passing laws.

Here is the broken down process of a MUN conference.

The student (and their partner if they have one) will research the country, topic, and committee that they were assigned to represent.

Next, delegates speak in front of the room about their opinions and intentions about the problem, according to what country they represent. This is similar to acting, because they must represent their country/committee's values, not their own.

Then, in a moderated caucus, they debate the problem. A moderated caucus is a debate session where delegates have a set amount of time to make a short speech

# Lego League teams start new season

## The competition involves programming robots, and a lot more

Three Lego League teams are working to compete in the 2026 regional competition on Saturday January 24 at Capitol Hill Magnet School.

This year’s challenge is “Unearthed,” an archeology-themed competition that consists of three parts: using a robot to complete tasks and earn points during the robot games, a research project about things that are underground, and a presentation to a panel of judges. Usually, there are three rounds of the robot games and teams are judged based on their highest score. The judges grade teams on the robot games, robot design, research projects, core values, and team spirit. Awards are given out for the robot, the project, core values, and the Champions Award. The Champions Award is given to teams that embody the full First Lego League challenge and perform well in each category.

Right now, each team is working on completing their robot missions and starting their research. The teams will rotate jobs so everyone gets coding experience and has a chance to help research their topic. Middle schoolers can join Lego League through flipside, and eighth graders can also join the robotics class

science teacher Sorcha Nix teaches to learn more about coding with lego robots.

The teams are led by Sorcha and math teacher Clara Raineri. Sorcha coaches one team and Clara coaches two. There can be up to twelve members per team.

We asked the coaches what makes a good Lego League team. Sorcha said “There needs to be kids with a variety of skills, it’s not just coding and engineering. There’s also a creative aspect like the script writing, skit, research, collaboration and all the core values.”

Clara said “They all

acknowledge that everyone else exists and are willing to work with each other. They are willing to know each other’s names and are interested in doing something as a team.”

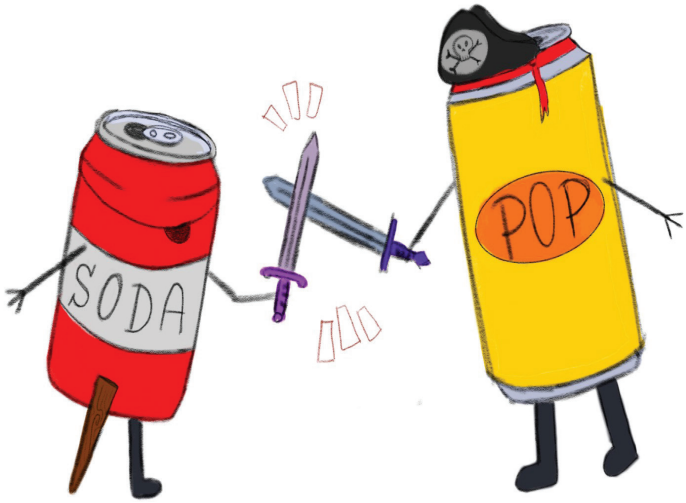
We also asked them what makes a good Lego League team member. Sorcha said “Someone who’s willing to collaborate with others, learn from their mistakes, and have fun.”

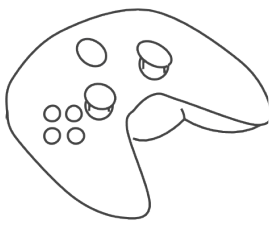
A little over 80% of people said that they heard soda more than pop, which I can definitely say is true.

To get a good contrasting opinion I asked some teachers too. Most of the teachers that I’ve asked have said that they say pop more than soda. I assume that this is a generational conflict.

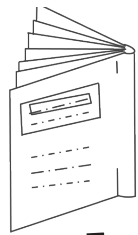

## Wicked: For Good is more than good

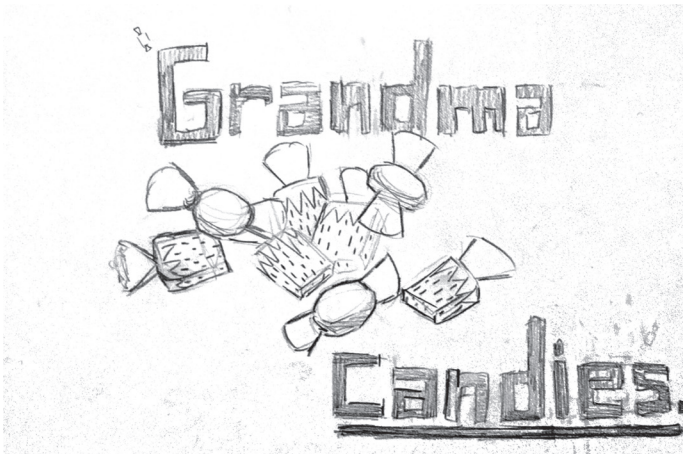

## Pokemon Legends is worth the price

*Legends replaces turn-based battles with real time combat*

Imagine this; you're living 1,000 years before most Pokémon media takes place, and suddenly, BOOM, something explodes into the sky. As you recuperate, a green snake Pokemon with a trainer on its back descends from above.

This is the story of how Mega Stones appeared in the world of Pokemon, coming from a meteor destroyed by Rayquaza and its trainer (which happens in one of the side parts of a game).

The latest Pokemon game, Pokemon Legends: ZA, released on October 16th, 2025, for the Nintendo Switch 2, bringing Mega Evolution back to the franchise for the first time in almost a decade, with many new mega evolutions, to some mostly forgotten about Pokemon.

Pokemon Legends: ZA takes place in Lumiose city, the capital of the Kalos Region, 3,000 years after the meteor rained Mega Stones on the land.

Instead of using turn based battles like any mainline Pokemon game that came before it, Pokemon Legends: ZA uses real time battles, with 5-20 second cooldowns instead of Power Points (PP), which opens up a variety of opportunities for the franchise in the future (note: I'm not saying I want them to completely remove the turn based battles, I just think that this could be great for the franchise).

As well as changing battles, there's also no longer gyms, but the ZA Royale, which functions as a gym battle, but slightly more complicated.

In addition to remaking the battles for this

game, my personal favorite part of the Pokemon franchise, shiny Pokemon/shiny hunting, has been changed too.

The way they changed shiny hunting (accidentally), was by changing the way spawns work. For example, when resetting spawns, shiny do not despawn, even if you unload them/leave the area. This in turn means you could theoretically AFK the spawns and have guaranteed shines, which you actually can do in one of the wild zones.

Though I think this game is great, many don't agree, with many complaints around the day one DLC release, as well as prices. Starting with the day one DLC, many don't appreciate this, thinking this just proves how “money hungry” Nintendo is.

Although this is a good argument, this has been happening in the game

specific character. However it did make sense with Celie's character development, so I could see what the author was trying to achieve.

I also didn't like the amount of letters between Celie and her sister Nettie. I thought that it was just going to be a side thing to give the readers more context and a bigger world picture, but it ended up being a very big chunk of the book. I found it confusing because it added tons of new characters and backstories that were hard to follow at times. I do understand the necessity of them, but I just think that it could have been a more of a side thing rather than seeping into and competing with the main plot.

When I started reading The Color Purple, I was definitely expecting a heavy book. I knew there were hard topics in it, but I wasn't prepared

for the scale of them. This book has very hard topics in it including rape and both sexual and physical abuse. And it was especially hard to read how normalized it was, to the point where Celie almost expected it. It was really disgusting to read how degrading it was to be a woman, especially because this is based on history.

However, I'm really grateful to have read it. I think that this book- especially with what is happening in the world right now- is very important for young adults and older teens to read. I think that it's a very powerful book and at this time in our lives when we're questioning the world and things around us, and when we're beginning to understand the world, it's very necessary to read. Not only to gain knowledge of the past and to understand the severity of it, but also to recognize how far we've come and that we can't backtrack.

We talked to Librarian Laura Orris for her opinion on the book. She said that while she hasn't read The Color Purple in a while, she remembers it being very difficult to read. "Just because something is really sad and difficult doesn't mean you shouldn't read it though. You should understand the difficulty, and have someone you can talk to and get support from while reading to get a broader perspective of what it means, and that's true for most, if not all, classics," Laura said.

Many people think there are a few different categories of classics for different ages. "You could argue that Grimm's fairytales are classics, and those might be appropriate in fourth or fifth grade, whereas Brave New World is not appropriate for that time," said English Teacher Alysha Lundquist.

Some people are debating whether or not young people

should read the classics for multiple reasons.

Here are some reasons why people think you shouldn't read classics:

In addition to being difficult to read, they might also have ideas that don't fit modern day society, and people think it would be better to read books that were written more recently.

There are also old classics that people think have been outdated. "I really think we should just let them go. I want to embrace modern classics that are more diverse, both with the authors and with the characters," said Laura.

English teacher Leo Bickelhaupt said, "A ninth grader asked me if they should read Beloved, and I said 'no way'. It's a powerful and amazing book, but the vocabulary, narrative structure, and content make it quite challenging. It's a good book for an AP lit book club --

or something you might want to read in college."

But people also think that classics are a good part of modern society.

Some argue that classics are such an important part of history and that the books have an element of timelessness, or they can't be outdated. While a lot of history can be learned through textbooks, we can't forget that it is also preserved through these stories. Through these books, students can experience life through the eyes of someone living in the past.

Other classics are just too good to let go. "The first classic I probably fell in love with was To Kill a Mockingbird. The story is really beautiful, the way that it's written from the 10 year old girl's point of view, that really made me understand that not all classic literature is difficult, that it can also be beautiful and relatable," said Alysha.

The ninth graders have a little bit of a different perspective. We talked to ninth graders Lauren Harris and Cooper Small and they said that people could start reading the classics at the end of elementary school and the start of middle school, but that it might be better to read them in high school because of how hard the literature is to understand.

They say that people should read the classics because it shows you a new perspective on the world, "I think that it's good, like, as we grow older and experience things in the world, to know about certain things, and I think that a lot of classic books really tell you how the world is and what you could experience. So I think as a young adult, it's good to read those things and know," said Lauren.

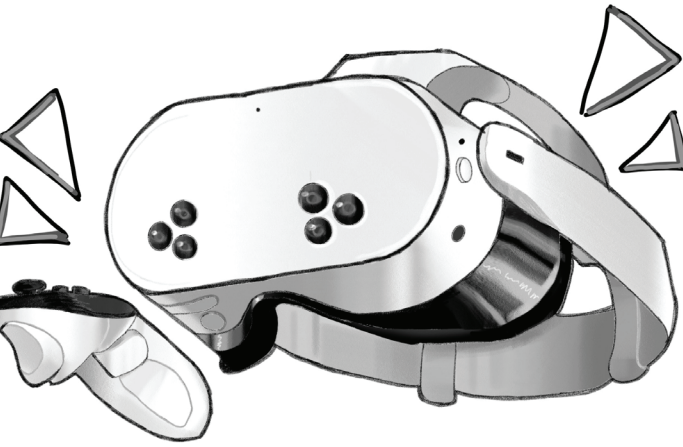

do activities in different worlds together, almost similar to something like the OASIS in Ready Player One.

Playstation has their own headset as well, the PSVR2, which again is in a similar position to the Quest, but requires a PS5 or PC to connect to. Valve, the company behind the biggest PC gaming storefront, Steam, has their own VR headsets as well. They are making the Valve Index, which is a high end (\$1000) headset from 2019 that connects to your computer. They have also announced an updated headset design, the Steam Frame, that will be coming out in early 2026. The price has not been confirmed yet, but it will be cheaper than the Index. It will be able to both connect to an external PC for game streaming, but will also have a built-in computer that will run SteamOS, Valve's operating system, as an alternative to Windows for gaming.

When talking about

gaming I think it is worth mentioning the amount of Android based VR games. These are phone apps that are able to provide you a VR like experience through an attachment that can strap your phone to your face, making a

makeshift VR headset. While this is obviously an inferior experience compared to a proper headset, it is much more accessible, especially if you see VR as a fun gimmick that you might just use once or

twice.

While for the most part I think most people wouldn't classify VR gaming as a failure, I don't think it has been the massive success these companies hoped it would be. VR headsets are more of

my limited experiences with it, I've found VR to be quite janky and difficult to use as well.

That being said VR has seen massive success in flight simulators. This is not super surprising as the main draw of VR is the immersion it can provide, and that is exactly what a lot of people playing flight simulators are looking for. As a result a lot of the high quality VR games end up being flight simulators, and other such games.

VR headsets have also been used in simulators outside of hobbyist circles, often being used for flight training simulations. The US Airforce started using headsets because it is cheaper, easier to maintain, smaller, and sometimes even more effective than a full size traditional flight simulator.

then the chair/moderator will choose who will respond to the last speaker. A moderated caucus is usually focused more on one small topic so that it accomplishes more than an overall debate.

Next there are unmoderated caucuses, where participants go around and speak freely to each other, without being timed, in an attempt to create alliances. In those alliances, called blocs, they will write draft resolutions for the topic/ problem in very specific legal wording.

Lastly the delegates vote for which resolution to pass. More than one resolution can pass if more than one is voted for.

There are different types of conference topics/problems. The most common one is called a general assembly where they cover topics like nuclear weapons, world health, human rights, and climate change. These topics are usually long term problems.

There is also another type of

topic called a crisis committee where the conference goes faster and is focused on a single problem that is from a past, or predicted future, crisis. Examples of these are the Cuban missile crisis, the fall of the Roman Empire, the predicted water wars of the future, or the first contact with aliens.

"International issues are generally intimidating," said David, "and I think people think they don't know enough, or don't have the ability to talk about these issues, but I think a lot of people underestimate their knowledge about the world. You have US government or current event classes, but a lot of that focuses around issues just in this country or in this state, and I think [Model UN] is a platform where students can talk about issues that are more on a global stage."

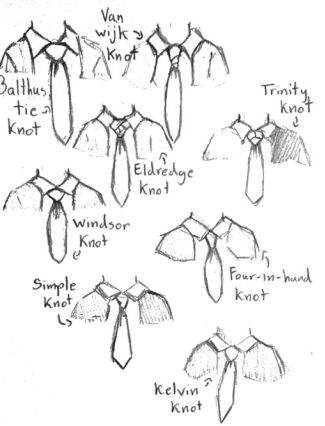

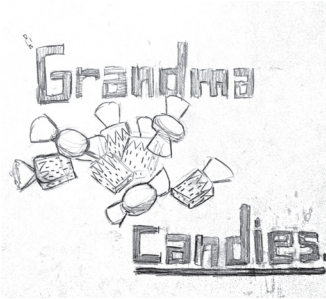
