# ESCNIJ Aquatics and Fitness Center Offers it All



## UPDATES ON ESCNJ PARTNESHIPS AND PROGRAMS

The following is an update on ESCNJ's innovative and top-quality services/programs and meaningful partnerships as we explore new ways to serve our students and the community.

• **Behavior Support Team:** ESCNJ educators are adopting the use of Ukeru in their classrooms. Ukeru is a safe, comforting restrain-free approach to interaction. Ukeru includes durable and standardized blocking equipment that manages aggressive behaviors and makes staff feel more confident about protecting themselves and others when a student may engage in aggressive behavior.

Beyond just using blocking equipment, Ukeru represents a trauma-informed approach to intervention. This means providing strategies for students and staff to protect themselves from aggressive behavior and minimizing the use of restraint and seclusion.

The key features of a trauma-informed program are physical and emotional safety, trustworthiness, choice, collaboration, and empowerment. These features underscore Ukeru's compassionate approach to intervention, which focuses on why a particular student is struggling and how to teach them the necessary skills for empowerment.

Once the skills and behaviors are identified, it helps

to manage a trauma response in a new way and to build a relationship with the student using consistency and repetition.

The practice puts an emphasis on "Functionally Equivalent Replacement Behavior," which identifies skills and behaviors that can help individuals manage trauma responses in new ways. In the worst cases, Ukeru uses soft, cushiony materials to protect from aggression, not physical force.

These methods are already being implemented in many ESCNJ classrooms; additional certifications are expected in 2025.

Ukeru techniques supplement, but do not replace, Nonviolent Crisis Intervention (NCI) used in ESCNJ schools.

• **Parental Support:** ESCNJ hosted its first virtual parent workshop this October, focusing on transitioning to adult services. There will be several more events this year to assist parents and family members with the various services and programs available for children with disabilities.



## PARTNERING WITH MIDDLESEX COUNTY

• **Turning Point Academy:** The staff from Turning Point Academy, which provides educational services for students from Middlesex, Somerset, Monmouth, Mercer, Burlington, Cumberland and Gloucester counties, attended the New Jersey Juvenile Detention Association's annual conference Sept. 11-13 in Atlantic

City. A special congratulations to Ms. Jane Lee, who was awarded the *Education Person of the Year for New Jersey Detention Centers*. The conference hosted more than 500 people with juvenile justice leaders, teachers and officers from all 17 of New Jersey's juvenile justice centers.

## A GROWING PARTNERSHIP WITH MIDDLESEX COLLEGE

• **Dental Program:** ESCNJ has been working in collaboration with Middlesex College's Dental Hygiene Department since 2019. This collaboration has led to getting dental screenings and treatment for hundreds of ESCNJ students over the years. College students provided free dental screenings, home care instruction, cleanings, fluoride treatments and X-rays under the direction of faculty and dentists at ESCNJ campuses.

During the fall semester, the college students performed services to all ESCNJ students at the Professional Conference Center located on the Piscataway campus. The students are also planning to visit Center for Lifelong Learning in Parlin.



A big thank you to the South Plainfield Elks Club for its continued support of BBLC. The school received a generous donation of six iPads, which the students will use to increase their communication skills.




