The West Bend Schools are an important part of the communities they serve. Students learn from an early age that there are a variety of ways that they can give back to the community and the 2022-2023 school year was no different. During the 2022-2023 school year, both extra-curricular clubs and schools or individual classrooms dedicated time and money to community service

Charity Week: The 19th Annual Charity Week at East and West High Schools raised \$51,500 for charity in one week. This is the highest dollar amount ever collected in a single year since the inception of Charity Week in 2004. Silverbrook Clubs

The Silverbrook Kkids Club, a service club that is sponsored by the Kiwanis Early Risers, helped the Early Risers and the local veterans group place flags at the graveside of fallen soldiers for Memorial Day, which helped to remind them that Memorial Day is more than just a day off school.

The Silverbrook Wildlife Club held a drive for items to assist Wanakia Wildlife Rehabilitation. The students encouraged their classmates and staff to donate needed items and the Silverbrook classes that donated the most won an incentive prize. The club chose Wanakia because it helped an injured owl that two Silverbrook teachers rescued.

Phoebe, Liv, Avery, and Nadia worked with Mrs. Drover to coordinate a t-shirt drive that ultimately collected 871 t-shirts from Silverbrook staff and students. These t-shirts will be sewn into bags by cutting off the sleeves to make handles and sewing the bottom hems of the shirts together. They are then used around the West Bend community in places like the food pantry where recipients are bringing them back each time they visit, rather than using a plastic option.

High Scores Too

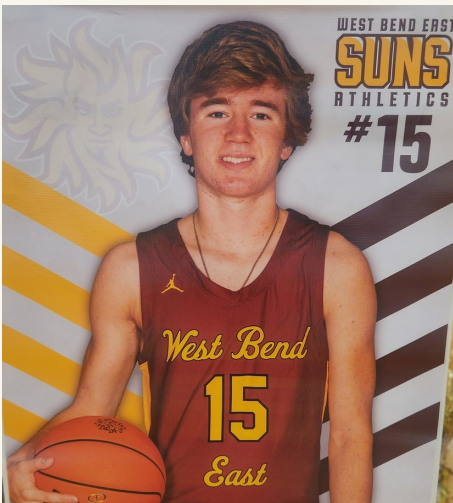
Achievements



The United States Marine Corps and the American Volleyball Coaches Association announced that the East and West Volleyball Teams earned the USMC/AVCA Team Academic Award for 2022-2023.

The award, initiated in the 1992-93 academic year, honors volleyball teams that maintain a year-long grade-point average of at least 3.3 on a 4.0 scale.

The East Volleyball Team's GPA was 3.68 and the West Volleyball Team achieved a 3.61 GPA.

College and Career Preparation

At the annual West Bend High Schools Scholarship event on May 1, nearly 150 West Bend East and West High Schools seniors received help to follow their dreams in the form of local scholarships. In total, \$900,200 in local scholarships for post-secondary education at four-year and two-year colleges, universities, and technical schools was awarded to 148 students. The local COLUMNS organization awarded numerous scholarships of its own and it also administers a large number of awards sponsored by individuals, families, and organizations in the community. Other community and school club or program scholarships were also awarded.

East and West High Schools offer additional opportunities to earn post-secondary credits while still in high school, as well as apprenticeships that will provide a paycheck and career skills and information. Earn College Credits in High School



There is no doubt the cost of college tuition is significant. Students at West Bend East and West High Schools have the option to save thousands on tuition through several programs.

Advanced Placement courses: Advanced Placement (AP) courses allow high school students to take college-level courses, taught by West Bend High Schools staff, while in high school. Students must take an exam (cost is \$98) at the end of the school year and will generally be awarded college credits with a exam score of 3 or higher (out of 5). Individual colleges and universities determine the specific number of college credits awarded. All students at East and West are eligible to take AP classes. West Bend East and West offer 24 AP classes.

Dual Enrollment--Transcribed Credit from MPTC: The Career Prep Program through Moraine Park Technical College provides opportunities for transition to postsecondary education or into the workforce while in high school. Certain courses at the high schools are transcribed, meaning students can take the course in high school and earn credit toward high school graduation and for Moraine Park Technical College (credit earned may be transferred to another Wisconsin Technical College and four-year university). Students do not pay a fee for the credits earned including textbooks or tuition. West Bend East and West offer 29 courses for transcribed credit.



WB EAST & WEST: A WEALTH OF OPPORTUNITIES

Get a Head Start on an Education Degree

Whether it's a preschool class or 12th-grade students in advanced chemistry, the field of education has a wide variety of jobs. High school students can get into the field quicker and more economically by taking some introductory classes while enrolled in West Bend East or West High Schools.

Dual Enrollment--PIE: The Partnership in Education program through UW-Whitewater allows high school students to earn college credit while in high school through classes offered online and taught by UW-Whitewater staff.

Dual Enrollment--CAPP: The UW Oshkosh Cooperative Academic Partnership Program allows high school students to earn college credit while in high school and classes are taught by a certified high school teacher.

Dual Enrollment--Transcribed Credit
The Career Prep Program through Moraine Park Technical College provides opportunities for transition to postsecondary education or into the workforce. Its classes are for an Early Education career pathway.

College and Career Preparation

A youth apprenticeship that integrates school-based and work-based learning is a helpful way for West Bend East and West High Schools students to not only earn credit, but also learn about employability and occupational skills. Recent East graduate Stephanie Hayd worked at Kohler Credit Union in West Bend about 15 hours each week through the youth apprenticeship program after learning more about the program through the East and West College and Career Center. She is thankful for all she has learned, "I have gained and refined so many skills while working at Kohler Credit Union. My attention to detail has been greatly enhanced along with my skills when it comes to counting money. Additionally, I have developed social skills that will surely serve me well throughout any of my future endeavors."

Earn a Wage and Experience

WBE **WEST BEND EAST SPARTANS**

Sometimes, on-the-job is the best way to learn a skill or trade and settle into a career. East and West High Schools students can get this type of experience before high school graduation.

Cooperative Education Program (Co-Op Program): The Co-Op Program offers seniors in high school a course of study that combines learning in school with learning on-the-job. During the co-op program, students attend classes at the high schools for a portion of the day. The remainder of the day is spent in the work environment where students learn job specific technical and employability skills. Students are paid for time working on the job, working an average of 15 hours per week (180 total hours for the year). In addition to high school credit, a state certificate of proficiency in the field of employment may be earned.

Youth Apprenticeship (YA): Juniors and seniors are eligible for a **Youth Apprenticeship** that is a one- or two-year program. The program integrates school-based and work-based learning to instruct students in employability and occupational skills defined by Wisconsin Industries. Local programs provide training based on statewide youth apprenticeship curriculum guidelines. Students are simultaneously enrolled in academic classes to meet high school graduation requirements, two youth apprenticeship related courses, and are employed by a participating employer under the supervision of a skilled mentor. YA programs are available in a wide variety of fields and upon successful completion of the program students receive a high school diploma and technical college credit, and a state certificate of occupational proficiency.

Prepare for a Career in Health Care

WBE **WEST BEND EAST SPARTANS**

The many careers available in health care provide much for West Bend East and West High Schools students to examine. While in high school, students can review some areas of interest and possibly earn college credits along the way.

The Science Department offers a variety of transcribed credit health sciences courses.

Cultures of Healthcare: Through activities, guest speakers, field trips, presentations, and research, this course will focus on skills and knowledge to promote success in any biomedical or healthcare field. Students will examine and practice professionalism, interpersonal and written communication skills, confidentiality, and ethics, as they relate to customer service in healthcare.

Medical Terminology: This course reads the health career student for the verbiage needed to be successful in higher level coursework and eventually the health care field. Students will learn to spell and pronounce and the meaning of medical terminology associated with the human body systems.

Certified Nursing Assistant: This course prepares students for employment as nursing assistants. During this course, students will be required to demonstrate the following skills under the supervision of a licensed nurse: communication, basic nursing assistant and personal care skills, attention to client rights, and care of clients with dementia. (Students must be admitted in the MPTC Nursing Assistant program, be 16 years old, completed a health information form and criminal background check to register for this class.)

As you may know, the West Bend School District serves approximately 5,800 students in 4K through grade 12. We are now undertaking a comprehensive assessment of our facilities and campuses, which consists of more than 1,208,800 square feet across 14 sites, totaling 201 acres. This facilities assessment is an important part of our district's continuous improvement planning process. In June 2023, the district selected Eppstein Uhen Architects (EUA) after a competitive proposal interview process to complete the facilities assessment and work closely with the district and its stakeholders to develop a long-range facilities plan.

Throughout the remainder of the 2023 summer and into the fall, EUA's architects and engineers will be objectively assessing the conditions inside and outside our facilities. They will be reviewing the plumbing, electrical, mechanical, and other critical systems that help run our buildings. EUA will assess the capacity and utilization of our schools and their current sites. Their professional team will also meet with staff and students to help evaluate how effectively our educational environments support our current and future educational, co-curricular, and athletic programs.

Once complete, the facilities assessment will serve as a detailed planning report that provides a valuable foundation of information on all 14 of our buildings and sites. This data will then support the district's prioritization of facility needs and improvements necessary to provide high quality learning environments while developing fiscally responsible, cost-effective, long-range facilities solutions.

District leaders look forward to sharing the results of our facilities assessment later this fall and gathering staff and community input as we begin to consider long-range solutions to address identified needs. We are committed to ongoing communication and transparency so stay tuned for more information coming in the fall of 2023 on our facilities planning process.
