Information

The Mastery of the Arts Program is designed for all Yuma Union High School District students who have a purposeful interest within the arts.

The program requires students to have a love of the arts, the spirit of community, a desire for deep learning and a passion to grow them all.

The intent is to bring local and extended community artists together with students to share their talent and expertise and, in turn, build community as well as **grow, enhance, and refine** a student's skill sets within the art disciplines.

The **Mastery of the Arts Program** offers specialty courses designed to be an extension of a student's high school arts experience. The courses are created for students interested in taking coursework beyond and in addition to their home high school's offerings.

"MAP has opened up many opportunities for me and I have learned many new life skills from this program," said a Cibola High School senior student, who is in their second year in the MAP program. "It has helped me decide what I want to do in life and has provided a stepping stone into doing just that. I love how inspiring all the community artists are for the students and how they are just ready and excited to share their skills with students who are eager to learn about their craft."


Students have both high artistic and academic expectations. **The Mastery of the Arts Program** classes are designed for students interested in seeking postsecondary education and opportunities. With this

understanding, courses are scheduled in the afternoons and evenings, and meet one day per week.

Course offerings may vary and rotate each school year but will remain in the areas of Theater, Music, Dance, and Visual and Media Arts. Students are encouraged to learn about and take coursework within all of the arts disciplines in order to become a well-rounded artist.

Students receive hands-on experience and learn about various pathways focused on the arts, including how pathways intersect with college, career, and community.





Yuma Union High School District #70 does not require students to pay for a required program of instruction. The opportunity to attend school, complete required course work, or earn required course credit during the regular school day is not contingent upon payment of any optional fee/material charge. However, students who choose to take any course that requires the use of expendable materials will be charged a fee to cover the cost of materials. The administration may waive the assessment of all or part of the fee upon request if it creates an economic hardship. Requests can be made to the administration during registration or throughout the school year.



EXCEPTIONAL *Student Services*

Individualized programs of instruction are developed for all qualified students with disabilities. Parents or other interested persons should contact a school counselor when they feel that a student may be in need of special services. **For more information, call 928-502-6780.**

Students With Individualized Education Plans or Section 504 Plans
Completion of graduation requirements for **special education** students who do not meet the required units of credit shall be determined on a case-by-case basis in accordance with the special education course of study and the individualized education program of the student. Graduation requirements established by the District Governing Board may be met by a student as defined in **A.R.S. 15-701.01** and **A.A. C. 47-2-302**.

Students with individualized education plans shall not be required to achieve passing scores on competency tests in order to graduate from high school unless the student is learning at a level appropriate for the student's grade level in a specific academic area or unless a passing score on a competency test is specifically required in a specific academic area by the student's individualized education plan team. These competency tests shall be administered to students in a manner prescribed in the student's individualized education plan and the school shall make specific and appropriate accommodations for students with individualized education plans.

As per **A.R.S. 15-731**, students with **section 504** plans shall not be required to achieve passing scores on competency tests in order to graduate from high school unless the student is learning at a level appropriate for the student's grade level in a specific academic area or unless a passing score on a competency test is specifically required in a specific academic area by the student's **section 504 plan** that is developed in consultation with the student's parents. These competency tests shall be administered to the student in a manner prescribed in the student's **section 504 plan** and the school shall make specific and appropriate accommodations for students with a **section 504 plan**.

A student with an individualized education plan or a **section 504 plan** who graduates from high school but who is not required to achieve a passing score on a competency test in order to graduate from high school shall receive the standard diploma issued by the school district.

Courses are designed for and restricted to those students who have been legally placed in special **education programs** and have an individualized education plan. These courses are made available through the **Special Education Department**. The courses titled "Fundamental" are sheltered courses in the required subject areas in which the curriculum studied is at the high school level of the Arizona Standards in the subject, but the techniques used to teach the curriculum are specific to special education teachers who have a stronger understanding of students' disabilities. Students who are willing and able to take on-level, regular education classes will be included in regular education whenever and wherever possible and desired.

Yuma Online Distance Academy

Yuma Online Distance Academy (YODA) is an online instructional program provided through the Yuma Union High School District. Courses are available for 9th through 12th grade high school students, and a student may earn a high school diploma through one of our traditional high schools (Cibola, Gila Ridge, Kofa, San Luis, Somerton, and Yuma High School) or at Vista High School upon successful completion.

WHAT IS DISTANCE LEARNING?

Distance learning is a state-of-the-art concept in education. Students are able to complete their high school coursework online, and their online instructors stay in regular contact with them to promote success. The curriculum is interactive, flexible, and rigorous. **YODA** courses are designed by certified teachers and are aligned to state and national standards.

COURSE INFORMATION

YODA is a partnership between YUHSD and Mesa Distance Learning Program. A certified teacher is the instructor for each **YODA** course. Students are able to work at their own pace, following a lesson checklist to guide them successfully in course completion.

YODA students experience a multitude of activities with a mixture of multimedia, videos, online quizzes, and downloadable assignments. Student progress may be monitored 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Each course contains **18 weeks of instruction**.

Courses have been developed by knowledgeable, qualified, certified instructors who understand the cognitive learning process and accommodate multiple learning strengths and needs.

PLEASE NOTE: Students seeking enrollment in **YODA** may only enroll via their home campus/the campus in which they live within attendance boundaries.

WHY DISTANCE LEARNING?

YODA welcomes students who may have stopped attending a traditional high school, and it also offers currently enrolled students the opportunity to take extra classes. **YODA** is a flexible and personalized way to earn a high school diploma, where students can work at their own pace and can learn from anywhere via online technology.

YODA students are **YUHSD** students and have the full support of their counselors at their home campus. They check in with their counselor every two weeks to ensure they are on track with their courses. They can also meet with their school social worker, attend college/intern representative visits, attend field trips, and can participate in clubs and athletics through their home campus.

"I prefer YODA because of the flexibility I have in my schedule," said a Yuma High School senior student, who takes classes via YODA. "I do not feel like I am living the same routine day after day and it alleviates the stresses of a regular school setting such as classroom noise and large classrooms since I enjoy working independently."

The course culminates in a 4,000-5,000 word academic paper, accompanied by a presentation and oral defense, with students documenting their progress and reflecting on their skill development throughout the process.
