

Executive Function at Gow: Skills That Last a Lifetime

For years, Gow has been a leader in equipping students with skills that extend far beyond the classroom, skills that support academic success and prepare them for life during and after their time at Gow. A cornerstone of this work is Executive Function (EF), a set of mental skills managed by the brain's frontal lobe that help students plan, focus, stay organized, manage emotions, and adapt to new situations. The three core EF skills, working memory, cognitive flexibility, and inhibitory control (self-control), are essential for achieving long-term success.



These skills are truly life-changing for our students. By strengthening Executive Function, we empower learners to become more organized, confident, and independent, qualities that set them up for long-term success. To support this growth, Gow has embedded EF instruction into daily student life. All students use planners and the Universal Binder system, which serve as practical tools for teaching and reinforcing EF strategies. These skills are supported in classrooms, reinforced by teachers and advisors, and strengthened through regular discussions and practical application.

Executive Function coaching is woven throughout the week. Students receive weekly EF tips, revisit them during advisor meetings, and begin each Monday by organizing backpacks, binders, and planners to ensure they are prepared for the week ahead. As students progress, this support becomes increasingly intentional. During their senior year, students participate in intensive Executive Function training designed to prepare them for college, where they will be expected to manage academic and personal responsibilities independently, without the built-in supports of Gow. Through this thoughtful and consistent approach, Gow continues to lead the way in helping students develop the skills they need to thrive—now and well beyond graduation.

Alumni Spotlight

Kengar Dongatron '15

“Don’t be afraid to take chances, don’t hold yourself back, and reach for what you really want. You may be surprised by what you find!”

When Kengar Dongatron, who changed his name after Gow to better align with his career endeavors, arrived at The Gow School as an 8th grader, he was already in the midst of change. Having transferred from Eagle Hill School, with a recommendation by Dr. Mark Griffin of Eagle Hill and Brad Rogers to his mother, Kengar was stepping into a new environment with an open mind and, as it turns out, an open future.

One of his earliest memories of Gow is both simple and powerful: getting on a plane with his mom and landing somewhere entirely new. That moment became an early symbol of what Gow would offer Kengar: growth, perspective, and the opportunity to see beyond what he had known before.

What stands out most to Kengar when he reflects on his time at Gow are the weekend activities and trips that expanded his worldview. From Buffalo excursions to international break trips, including a transformative journey to Honduras, Gow showed him that the world was far bigger than the tri-state area. These experiences sparked a curiosity about seeing, experiencing, and engaging with the world beyond familiar boundaries.

Equally impactful were the faculty members who helped shape who Kengar is today. He speaks often of Dan Kelley, who taught him to stand tall, to be comfortable with who he was, and to share that person confidently with others. Another formative influence was Dr. Kirk Rhodes, who gave Kengar a voice - quite literally - by helping him become the varsity basketball announcer for the Ravens. Through that opportunity, Kengar discovered a passion for commentary and communication, a skill that would later play an unexpected role in his future.

A member of the Class of 2015, Kengar went on to attend the Rochester Institute of Technology. After a rocky first semester pursuing communications with a focus on video game design, he regrouped with his advisor and found his path in Human-Centered Computing, a then-new program focused on making technology more accessible. An internship led to two temporary web development jobs with a startup company in New York City and an insurance company in Pennsylvania, launching his professional career.

During the stress and uncertainty of COVID, Kengar once again leaned on skills rooted at Gow. Drawing from his basketball announcing days, he began streaming on Twitch under the handle “Kengar_M_Dongatron,” combining video games with live commentary. Today, he continues to stream while working as a web developer in Rochester, NY, earning recognition in the local gaming community with awards such as Most Improved Fighter, Best Streamer in Rochester, and Funniest Stream Clip.

Kengar credits Gow as a driving force behind his journey. “Gow is tough,” he says, “but it’s the one place that allows you to take the driver’s wheel and shows you the path to reach your goals, and beyond.” At Gow, he learned who he truly was, dropped the façade, and developed independence, perseverance, and grit.

His advice to current students is simple but powerful: don’t be afraid to take chances, don’t hold yourself back, and reach for what you really want. You may be surprised by what you find!
