Tusker Tidbits

During Mr. Kollarus's WIN (What I Need) classes this week, 8th graders worked on building a professional image in the enrichment session 'My First Job: How to Tie a Tie.' Students learned the steps of the Full Windsor, practicing how to create a clean, symmetrical knot with a polished "face." They focused on details like proper tie length and how a sharp, put-together look can signal confidence, authority, and attention to detail.

This session followed an earlier enrichment offering, 'Your First Job: Teen Employment Laws Scavenger Hunt,' where students learned how to obtain working papers, reviewed labor rules for 14-15-year-olds, and examined the 2026 minimum wage in Westchester County.
