## 2025-26 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

### Instructional Materials (School Year 2025-2026)

Banning Unified School District held a Public Hearing on September 13, 2023, and determined that each school has sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, and science lab equipment under the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California. In the 2025-26 year, Nicolet passed its Williams Act visit. All students, including English Learners, are given their own Chromebook to access all materials for all classes in addition to individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. The chart displays textbooks in use during the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 school year.

### Science Lab Equipment

The school stocks an adequate supply of equipment for its students. Inventory includes, but is not limited to microscopes, slides, ring stands, clamps, support rings, utility clamps, test tubes, test tube holders and brushes, tongs, flasks, beakers, and Bunsen burners. Recent purchases have upgraded equipment to meet the needs of the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS).

### Additional Internet Access/Public Libraries

For additional research materials and Internet availability, students are encouraged to visit the public libraries located in the cities of Banning and Cabazon which contain numerous computer workstations. A new partnership with the Banning library in the second semester will afford all students library cards plus monthly Mobile Library at all grade level lunches. The site also has 3 free book carts for students to continuously explore new materials.

### Computer Resources

Each classroom at Nicolet Middle School contains at least one computer. The school has a 2:1 student-to-computer ratio in all classrooms. Every student has a Chromebook checked out to them for use at school and home. Each student is assigned a school Gmail account and has access to Gsuite and Google Classroom. Computer skills and concepts are integrated through the standard curriculum to prepare students for technological growth and opportunities. We offer 3 sections of coding that include iPads and shero robots. Lastly, the Nicolet Library is a main centralized study area that students may use before school, during lunch, and after school.

## School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Nicolet Middle School provides a safe, clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. Built in 1938, Nicolet Middle School is situated on 23.82 acres. The school buildings span 85,501 square feet, consisting of 29 permanent classrooms, 20 relocatable classrooms, a library, a cafeteria, a gym, a football stadium, and an auditorium. The facility strongly supports teaching and learning through its ample classroom and usable space.

### Maintenance and Repair

Safety concerns are the number one priority of Maintenance and Operations. District maintenance supervisors are proactive and conduct inspections at school sites continually. Repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed promptly. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and the highest priority is given to emergency repairs.

### Cleaning Process and Schedule

The district governing board has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the district. Nicolet Middle School has six full-time custodians on duty. A summary of these standards is available at the school office or at the district office. The site administration team works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

### Deferred Maintenance Budget

The district participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, designed to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically this includes roofing, plumbing, heating electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems.

## 2025-26 School Safety Plan

The safety of students and staff is a top priority at Nicolet Middle School and in the Banning Unified School District. Many people visit the campus to volunteer as chaperones on field trips, shadow their student, and participate in school event, and athletic events.

Parents and visitors are welcomed and required to check-in at the front desk of the administration building upon arrival and obtain a visitor's badge via the visitor's management system (VMS) called Verkada. Visitors are required to return to the school office upon departure to return their badges. During lunch, before, and after school, assigned staff to supervise students and school grounds, including the cafeteria and recreation areas, to ensure a safe and orderly campus environment. Should parents/guardians wish to shadow their student, they must give 24 hours' notice and sign a notice of understanding for visitor behavior expectations (no smoking, no taking pictures of students, not having a conference with the teacher during instruction, for example.)

The Comprehensive Safe School Plan was developed by site stakeholders to comply with Senate Bill 187 (SB 187) of 1997. The plan provides students and staff with means of ensuring a safe and orderly learning environment. Each school includes the following requirements of SB 187 within their safe school plans: current status of school crime; child abuse reporting procedures; disaster procedures, routine, and emergency; policies related to suspension and expulsion; notification to teachers; sexual harassment policy; provision of a school-wide dress code; safe ingress and egress of pupils, parents, and school employees; safe and orderly school environment; and school rules and procedures. Fire drills are conducted at least once per semester and intruder/lock-down drills and disaster preparedness drills are conducted annually. The plan is annually reviewed and recommendations and suggestions for updates are made. The plan itself is then subsequently updated as needed and reviewed and approved by the School Site Council. Safety procedures, including elements of the Safe School Plan, are reviewed with school and district staff in the fall, at the start of each school year. An updated copy of the plan is available for public review in the school administration office. School Site Council was made aware of and approved the CSSP at the December 2025 meeting.

## Fiscal Year 2024-25 Types of Services Funded

Alternative supports were offered to Nicolet Middle School students. All students at Nicolet Middle School receive instruction in the Common Core State Standards. During English Language Development, ELL students are grouped by instructional language level and provided with daily designated ELD instruction. Teachers regularly analyze state, local, and classroom assessment data to determine student needs and guide instruction. The SST process is used to identify and monitor students who are below grade level and provide Interventions that are agreed upon and implemented by the classroom teacher in collaboration with the student's family and support staff. After-school intervention programs are provided to assist students who are below grade level in the areas of reading and math.

Alternative Supports were provided to students through an after-school tutoring program and Saturday Academies offered throughout the school year. The school will be offering 8 Saturday Academies to offer students a chance to make up absences, and tardies, and get tutoring. Some teachers also offer tutoring before and/or after school. In addition, three district coaches, one ELA, one ELL, and one Math support each department. Intervention classes and programs are implemented to support struggling students in math and reading. The individualized intervention was also provided through the i-Ready online tutorial program that assisted teachers in helping students with learning gaps and deficits.

## Professional Development

Staff development within the district addresses the individual needs of teachers and broader school concerns through cooperative in-service programs. Staff development at the site level is centered around the teaching of the Common Core ELA and Math curriculum, our student information system Aeries, an intervention computer-based diagnostic program called i-Ready, AVID, Integrated ELD strategies, Irvine Math, Jane Schaffer, SEL, Trauma-Informed Care, Effective PLC meetings, Data-Driven PLCs, BARR, and Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS). The training also includes the Next Generation of Science Standards (NGSS) HIV/AIDS, Common Core in Social Studies at UC Irvine, AVID Summer Institute, and Growth Mindset. At the site level, professional development is done in group meetings held before school starts in the Fall and throughout the school year, as needed. Typically Professional Development meetings are scheduled for the first Wednesday of each month and during the Wednesday PD meetings, PLC meetings, departmental meetings, and site leadership meetings. Staff attend various training throughout the year as they become available.

The methods are:

At NMS, Professional Development is acquired through preparation before the school year begins, offered to teachers for extra duty pay beyond contract hours (Evenings and weekends), during school days with sub provided, and once a month on the SMART Wednesdays.
