2.1 The Board recognized Keith Cotlage from Cajon HS who is the current CIF State champion in the triple jump.

2.2 The Board recognized Connor McAleer, Pacific HS swimmer, who won the CIF Southern Section State Championship and came in tenth at the State Championship in the 100 fly.

2.3 Student Board Members' Swearing In Ceremony

Seven of the eight elected Student Board Members for the 2025-2026 school year were sworn in. They were Perfect Akinyemi, Damian Delgado, Brisa Hernandez-Garcia, Aremy Martinez, Ivorion Jones, Valeria Cervantes, and Carlos Barrios. The last Student Board Member will be sworn in on August 5.

3. Public Comments

3.1 Receive Public Comments

Speaker: Larry Shackelford with Sixty One Golf which is part of the District's EXL program, gave an update. He reported that because of the Board's support of the afterschool golf program there is now a "golf community" in San Bernardino and this year was their first "District League Championship", with middle school students competing in this golf competition, held at Shandin Hills golf course, with Golden Valley Middle School winning the championship. Rodriguez Middle School placed second and Richardson PREP won the six hole on-course competition. Chavez Middle School had both the winner and runner up in the long drive competition. Mr. Shackelford also reported on a drive "Chip and Putt" competition that had many kids participating with four girls advancing to the subregional competition on August 9, 2025 in Oceanside. If they advance they will go to the regional competition in Hawaii. Mr. Shackelford showed off their championship trophy, saying just like the Stanley Cup and the British Open, this trophy will also be perpetual with all the future winning schools.

Speaker: David Krivanek, recently retired math teacher from San Bernardino County Schools remarked that by nature, golf is a game of hope and the San Bernardino communities can all use an opportunity and avenue to cultivate hope and in his approximate seven months with 61 Golf he has witnessed an abundance of hope. He thanked everyone for their support and allowing them to provide this opportunity of hope for these kids.

Speaker: Liliana Nieto, student, shared her experience with 61 Golf. Liliana said she was part of Golden Valley MS' championship. She has enjoyed her time with 61 Golf and has learned the sport, stating it is fun, good exercise, and it pushes her to do her best every time she goes. All the coaches have given her great advice, both in golf and life. Liliana hopes that they will get more funding and hopes that next year it will count as a real sport, as currently at Golden Valley it is only a club.

Speaker: Emed J. Lokat introduced himself as the new Field Representative to Robert Garcia Assemblymember for the 50th District. Mr. Lokat remarked he is the new point of contact for San Bernardino and he looks forward to engaging with the board to see what their office can do for them.

Speaker: Lorie AmDoll, a former District student and the wife of a current District employee, thanked the board, superintendent, and Cabinet for their commitment in supporting every single student in the District to have equitable access to a quality education while also supporting and trusting your educators and staff to deliver quality education in an inclusive and safe learning environment. Ms. AmDoll said that while not perfect, the District continues to grow and work together, actively listening to each other's views. You make sure District matters are professionally handled while keeping students a top priority. She went on to say that she appreciates their continued efforts and may the District, staff, and students continue to shine this coming school year.

Speaker: Windi Joseph, a mother, grandmother, gun violence survivor, and public health advocate, shared her eight-year fight for safer schools and stronger communities. She said she came to speak because children are being pushed out of classrooms and into courtrooms and said the school to prison pipeline is real and noted that Black students are 3.5 times more likely to be suspended, students with disabilities make up 13% of enrollment but 25% of arrests, and one suspension triples the chance of entering juvenile justice. After losing her son in a robbery involving teens with easy firearm access, she founded *Pray for the Prey 827* to advocate for prevention over punishment. She helped pass California Assembly Bill 28, signed in July 2024, along with Mom's Demand Action and Every Town Survivor Network, which funds school safety and violence prevention, mainly through the \$75 million annual California Violence Intervention and Prevention (CALVIP) grant program. She asked the board to adopt the following solutions: restorative justice instead of suspensions, mental health counselors, not more police; afterschool programs that give kids purpose; bias and trauma training for every educator, and a commitment to use AB28 funds to support these efforts. They have evidence-based solutions for the school to prison pipeline that can be incorporated into our advocacy policy proposals and future speeches. There is also an opportunity, through Every Town Survivor Network, the student fellowship program, that opened on July 14 through August 4, 2025, where they are accepting applications for volunteer advocacy programs designed for students between 18 - 26. They are there for students who have been personally impacted by gun violence, witnessed it, been threatened by it, survived it, or had someone taken by it. She also mentioned a fully-funded training weekend in Washington D.C. in October. Ms. Joseph said let's stop criminalizing trauma and start treating. Let's build a system that sees our children as worthy of investment, not incarceration.

Speaker: Christina Marquez, teacher, speaking about the 100 Mile Club, shared that in 2001, she took her first 5th grade class to Science Camp in the mountains. What stood out for her from that trip was that the students had difficulty doing the hikes. Every year since then she has had her students walk the site's fields to get them ready to go to Science Camp and this year she has three students, Arturo, Eric, and Joshua, who completed 100 miles and they became the 100 Mile Club. This was accomplished with her working with coach Clayton. Ms. Marquez said that she recently visited the campus and commented that at the end of last year there had been a sprinkler problem with water all over. On her recent visit she found that the grass was extremely dry because M&O could not fix the leaks or the sprinklers because they were under the road that goes right through the middle of their campus. She let the city know that there was this problem and they informed here it would be about October until the school could get their entire field back, but she was not sure in what condition. Ms. Marquez hopes to have the fields green again to continue the 100 Mile Club with her students.

7.1 Citizens' Oversight Committee 2024-2025 Annual Written Report **(A)** **(B)**

Per the Citizens' Oversight Committee (COC) bylaws, the Committee shall present to the Board of Education the 2024-2025 annual written report. Kevin Gilbreth, Chair of the Citizens Oversight Committee, gave a brief report.

In March 2004, the voters of San Bernardino approved the \$140 million Measure T Bond. In November 2012, voters approved the \$250 million Measure N Bond. On September 10, 2013, the Board of Education took action to combine the responsibilities of both bond oversights under the current COC. By law, performance and financial audits are to be performed annually and all bond expenditures are monitored by an independent COC to ensure that funds are spent as promised and specified.

Scott Braddock (sp), with the District's outside auditing firm, Eide Bailly, provided the financial and performance audit report for the District's building fund Measures T and N, as of June 30, 2024. He shared that the District was given an unmodified opinion on the financial statements, which meant there was nothing identified that resulted in a modification or a qualification of their opinion. In addition the auditor's report on internal control over financial reporting and non-compliance, and there were no deficiencies identified either in relation to an internal control or compliance and there were no findings reported. Regarding the performance audit, which consists of their firm selecting and testing expenditures charged to Fund 21, the Building Fund, to determine whether or not internal controls exist over those expenditures and whether they are compliant. They tested 13 transactions, totaling about 87% of Measure T's total expenditures; 41 transactions, totaling about 92% of Measure N's expenditures. The audit results shared that the District had properly accounted for the expenditures held in the Building Fund and that such expenditures were made for authorized bond projects. Mr. Braddock (sp) stated that from both an internal control standpoint and a compliance standpoint, there were no issues identified.

12. Reports/Comments

12.1 Board Members

The Board welcomed Mr. Juan Lopez who will be the interim assistant superintendent of Human Resources Division.

Mrs. Rosales-Medina asked to have a Policy Sub-Committee meeting regarding a parking policy and make some recommendations regarding how entities come into any District parking lots and what that looks like. The Board gave consensus for the PSC to review the policy. She also congratulated the students who graduated at the Superintendent's Summer Graduation, stating the ceremony was amazing. Mrs. Rosales-Medina also asked for an update on fall federal funding, saying that she knows the District is okay for the first year, but what would it potentially look like for the following years.

Mrs. Grande sent prayers to her friend and former teachers aide, Maria Madrano Lazar (sp), commenting that during COVID when teachers were forced to teach from home, she made Channel 11 News and shined a light on our District, by teaching from a pup tent because her home was taken over by her two children who were distance learning. Later she became a teacher and was recently at Martin Luther Middle School where she began the first Best Buddies program, along with Heather Lozano, and now the program is very successful. Mrs. Grande shared that Ms. Madrano Lazar's husband had recently passed away and she asked that she be in your thoughts and prayers.

Dr. Wyatt thanked Terry Cornick for being his coach and mentor with a program he was in. He asked for consensus to agendaize a discussion the SBVC 100th anniversary event to be held in March 2026, stating some of the Board had the privilege of attending their 95th anniversary. He believes SBVC is one of the oldest community colleges in our state and he is looking to support them on their anniversary, stating the District has an incredible partnership with them, our Dual Enrollment program amongst many others. He is not aware of the sponsorship levels but he feels this is going to be an exciting celebration. Dr. Wyatt also reported that several board members were at the Jayden Daniels celebration event on July 12 and gave a shoutout to MaryRone Goodwin and her team for coordinating the event and it went off without a hitch and it was a huge success, our M&O team did an amazing job, the San Bernardino City Police Department did a great job and he thanked Chief Goodman and Lieutenant Plummer, and thanked Jayden, remarking he was a very sincere, humble young man. Dr. Wyatt closed by saying he believes in this city and especially our school district, stating we are developing systems of excellence and with this board and the team we have, he believes anything is possible.

Mr. Santos agreed with Dr. Wyatt's comments and had no additional reports.

Mrs. Alexander, via teleconference, commented she was currently attending the California Association of Black School Educators Conference and shared Kimbre Sargent and Dr. Wil Greer were also in attendance and they put on a great presentation on funding and planning for equity and the information they provided related to what we are doing to support ETSA as it relates to the different programming. She said Kimbre went into the aspect of where the funding was coming from and also the sustainability of those fundings despite what we are dealing with from a federal funding perspective. They did a great job representing our District. With the uncertainty around the funding source from the federal level and it being frozen, she asked what our mitigation strategy is. Also, she asked if we have had any conversations with our vendors that provide resources to our community, particularly with food and security. She asked if we have checked in with our partnerships with Tzu Chi, food services and other companies that provide these types of resources to make sure they are okay from a funding source and it doesn't impact our resources to our community? Related to that, Mrs. Alexander, suggested from a mitigation standpoint, she recommended the District to go back, look at those suppliers we have approved \$250,000 and above, to see if they have social responsibility outreach. She stated maybe this is another way to assist us in our community related to food insecurities or some other resources in case we have to look back at our financial resources. Mrs. Alexander also referenced Linked Learning programs and wanted to know what these programs looked like in terms what students have already been assigned to the program and what is the capacity to make sure there is access to all the students per school. She said she realized the pathways might change by high school, but she would like to know what is the current inventory and what are we looking at in terms availability, so we are setting up every student for success at each one of those schools that have access to pathway programs. Last, Mrs. Alexander said the Jayden, JD5, was a great event and we appreciated him coming back and bringing the joy to the kids.

Mrs. Ceballos hoped everyone was having a good summer and she looks forward to the upcoming 2025-26 school year. She, too, commented on how awesome the Summer Graduation and gave a special shoutout to Brianda Aguilar from Sierra High School, who had reached out to her by email. Mrs. Ceballos said she was really behind and was looking into going to Adult School; however, she put in the extra effort and was able to graduate at the Summer Graduation, and she commented that our students and staff work hard and she thanked them for everything they do and continue to do. She remarked to keep doing what we are doing and the Board, the superintendent and everyone is committed to continue to shine and provide hope for our families. Mrs. Ceballos also acknowledged the Student Records and Enrollment departments for their work and suggested they be acknowledged at an upcoming Board meeting.

12.2 Superintendent and Staff

Mr. Arellano acknowledge and thanked the District's translators who are always at our Board meetings, to the School Police force for being here, and to Jim Cunningham, Accounting Services director, who normally leaves the meeting before his remarks, but he appreciated his staying this time. He also welcomed Mr. Juan Lopez, who is the Interim Human Resources assistant superintendent.
