2.5 Resolution Recognizing November as National Native American Heritage Month

WHEREAS the month of November is a time to acknowledge and celebrate the rich and diverse cultures, traditions, histories and important contributions of the people who were the first inhabitants of what is now the United States; and

WHEREAS an effort by Dr. Arthur C. Parker, a Seneca Indian who was the director of the Museum of Arts and Science in Rochester, New York resulted in President Coolidge issuing a proclamation on September 28, 1915, that declared the second

Saturday of May as American Indian Day; and

WHEREAS in 1990 President George H. W. Bush signed into law a joint resolution designating November as National American Indian Heritage Month, also known as National Native American Heritage Month; and

WHEREAS Native Americans have overcome many obstacles to serve in the highest levels of government, including Charles Curtis, a descendent of the Kaw Nation on his mother's side, who was elected to the House of Representatives in 1892 and eventually became the 31st Vice President of the United States, making him the first person with acknowledged non-European ancestry to be elected to the Executive Branch; and

WHEREAS Native Americans are not a single nation, but include a variety of nations, diverse cultures, traditions, languages and distinct histories that make up part of the fabric of the United States of America, including the Yuhaaviatam of San Manuel Nation, who have made significant historical and modern contributions to our community.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District does hereby declare November 2025 as National Native American Heritage Month and honors the great current and past achievements and contributions of Native Americans, and encourages educational leaders to involve their schools in exploring the cultures and histories of the native peoples of this land and integrate those studies across the curriculum.

2.6 Resolution Recognizing National Diabetes Awareness Month and World Diabetes Day

WHEREAS November is National Diabetes Awareness Month and November 14 is World Diabetes Day; and

WHEREAS diabetes is a chronic, life-threatening medical condition, ranking as the eighth leading cause of death in the U.S. and the number one cause of kidney failure, lower-limb amputations and adult blindness; and

WHEREAS Type 1 diabetes, formerly known as juvenile diabetes, is an autoimmune hereditary condition with no known cure, most frequently affecting children and young people; and

WHEREAS Type 2 diabetes develops over many years and, while previously diagnosed primarily in adults, now accounts for more than 90% of all diagnosed cases of diabetes, including in children; and

WHEREAS Type 2 diabetes and its complications can often be delayed or prevented by adopting and maintaining healthy habits and getting blood sugar tested regularly.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Education of the San Bernardino City Unified School District recognizes November 2025 as National Diabetes Awareness Month and November 14 as World Diabetes Day, and encourages activities that are designed to educate employees, students, families and the community on ways to prevent diabetes and how to manage this serious health condition.

3. Public Comments

3.1 Receive Public Comments

Speaker: Ms. Marquez, teacher at Fairfax Elementary School, As a 5th grade teacher her students I have been involved recycling bottles and cans and donating the proceeds to the Humane Society. The Humane Society has also visited classrooms throughout the years presenting their humane education. Some of her students have also participated in their annual Critter Camp, where they see and learn about miniature ponies, llamas, several cats, and even some creepy, crawly creatures. Ms. Marquez said that because of her relationship with the Society throughout the years, she has now ventured into their relationship with the Ontario Reign hockey club. Ontario Reign recently began a student of the month program and she was approached to come up with a student. She shared she had a former student, Damian Martinez, who was in her 5th grade class last year and now in Miss Jaime Kellum's class and between them they nominated a student who's SBAC scores in math and language arts were "standard exceeded"; on the recent STAR test he is reading at the 8th and 9th grade level. They nominated him and he was honored at the recent Ontario Reign game. She brought this forward because San Bernardino does "shine". Damian came forward to share his award he received and Ms. Marquez said he also got to be in a luxury box at the stadium, and he got to be in the tunnel with the players. Ms. Marquez said she has worked hard in the community to let people know that yes, we can do it and we have positive impacts on people and it is important that SBCUSD had one of the first students recognized by the Ontario Reign and she was honored to have been his teacher.

Speaker: Mary D. Welch, a retired educator, who when she retired found she could write and since then she has written a

number of children's books both in English and Spanish and she shared several with the Board. The stories rhyme and are all original content and she said the joy of seeing a child read is unmistakable. She wanted to introduce these to the District for our TK, Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grade students.

Speakers: Tammy Martinez, director at SOAR Charter Academy school, came to update the Board on happenings at their campus. They had a production crew on campus as they are going to be featured in a segment of the "Balancing Act" which is a television talk show hosted by Montel Williams and the piece will be on positive impact in the community which will be aired in December. Rosie Dean, student at SOAR, spoke about their family fun night, held every October and she said they also host a Christmas play, which she is a main character, and they would like it if the Board could attend and they have gift bags that the students in their maker space made.

Speaker: Akoma Unity Center, Kendra Calvin, shared they would be presenting on their ADAPP (Akoma's Drug & Alcohol Prevention Program) program, which is designed to educate, empower, and equip young people with the tools they need to make positive life choices. It addresses not only substance use awareness but also mental and emotional well-being, because we know that true prevention starts with understanding the why behind our choices. A key part of the program is the teen mental health first aid. This certification was brought to Akoma with the partnership and vision of Ms. Calvin and Dr. Rose Ann Bomentre. Teen Mental Health First Aid responders is a nationally recognized course that gives teenagers the knowledge and confidence to recognize the signs of mental health or substance use challenges amongst their peers. Teens learn practical skills such as, how to start a supportive conversation, where to seek help, and how to break the stigma surrounding mental health. Through this program they become not only advocates for themselves, but within their community - creating a ripple effect of compassion and awareness within their homes, schools, and communities. Since February, they have trained 65 and reached over 100 scholars within SBCUSD and Rialto Unified School District. Students leave the program with more confidence, more understanding and more capable of supporting their families and friends in a time of need. ADAPP is about building stronger, healthier communities, starting with our youth. Four scholars shared their experiences with the program: Karina Brown, MCHS, on behalf of Zaquila Nolley (sp), recent graduate of Arroyo Valley High School; Abiyomee Nolley, at AVHS; Isabelle Harbor, MCHS; and Gabriela Ramos, ISHS, who asked the adults to keep fighting for them, to expand these programs, to listen and invest in them, and to continue to support them. Thanked Board member Alexander and President Ceballos for attending and helping to shape their scholars thought process regarding policy and advocacy; and thanked the District for creating wellness centers on many of the high school campuses.

7. Student Board Members

7.1 Reports/Comments

Brisa Hernandez Garcia reported on MCHS' students decorating of crowns and sunglasses for their Senior Sunrise event; they held a blood drive; and their cheerleaders had the opportunity to cheer at the San Bernardino Valley College football game. Reporting on San Gorgonio High School, she shared they had their football tryouts and the girls' flag football team is doing well. Reporting on Sierra High School she shared that their homecoming is coming up soon; they recently held an orchestra event and a community fitness fair where they gave out resources; and had their grand opening for their gym; they also announced an official partnership with Cajon High School to bring the Olive Branch Resource Center to their site and set up a booth at Cajon's Fall Fiesta where they gave out two racks of clothing for free. Ms. Garcia reported on the Superintendent's Leadership Advisory Council (SLAC) with a presentation by Kimbre Sargent, Categorical Programs, on the LCAP, explaining where and what funding goes to, asked for student input on services such as the AP and IB classes, AVID. A presentation was given by the Tzu Chi Foundation on adverse childhood experiences and the resources they have available, such as the community garden.

Damian Delgado shared that Project Lead the Way announced his demonstration and CTE teacher from Pacific High School, Angela Quinlan, named the National PLTW Biomedical Science Teacher of the Year, and he expressed how much Ms. Quinlan has helped him and stated she deserves recognition for everything she has sacrificed for her students. Mr. Quinlan reported on Pacific's football team will be at AB Miller High School and are hoping to continue their winning record, currently at 7 - 1; they are holding their Breast Cancer Awareness Walk on October 27th during lunch time; CTE students will be attending a micro-internship with Velocity Trucking on October 24th; seniors are hard at work doing their FAFSA paperwork and working on their college applications in their senior capstone course; and student clubs are getting ready for their Winter Family Festival. Reporting on Arroyo Valley High school, Mr. Delgado shared they have just celebrated a partnership with Ani-Vation Tech Academy and the University of Redlands, the first SBCUSD high school to offer this educational model that focuses on 21st century technology and the careers of the future; they held a VAPA festival and the trunk or treat on October 17th; upcoming with be their homecoming spirit week and homecoming will be on October 25th. Reporting on San Andreas High School, he shared they have just

celebrated their first quarter graduates and invited the student board members to their community job fair. Reporting on SLAC he said that within the student groups they discussed equity and the way we need to include everyone on campus during events that can improve campus culture, to support minorities, and treat all with kindness.

Perfect Akinyemi reported on San Bernardino High School's girls tennis team's senior night, where they won the league and are advancing; Western University Optometry will be on campus October 22 for a vision event providing free eye exams and eye glasses; last Friday was the Cardinal City's first multicultural community event; CSUSB is hosting a Direct Admit Day on November 4th for seniors and there is a special opportunity for those who have met the A-G requirements to be offered instant admission. Reporting on Indian Springs High School, Ms. Akinyemi said they had their first rally of the year; they had their Spirit Week display and they had their Pink-Out game on October 17th. Reporting on Cajon High School, she shared they were having their Fall Fiesta, which is a huge community event with games, booths and vendors; they are also hosting their Pink Ribbon Week, ending with their Pink-Out football game to spread awareness of breast cancer; their theatre department is hosting a "Night of Dead" play; interviews with their CTE teachers where they present their pathways. Ms. Akinyemi also reported on the SLAC meeting and shared they made posters on diversity and her group's poster was on the importance of showing love and appreciation to all cultures and to be open to everyone.

8. Administrative Reports/Presentations

8.1 Homeless/Foster Youth Presentation (A)

Dr. Sandra Rodriguez, Assistant Superintendent, Student Services and staff presented information on homeless and foster youth. They shared information on ATLAS (Access To Learning for All Students), including services and supports for students in foster care and homeless situations; removing barriers to accessing equitable education; ensuring education rights of students are adhered to, such as immediate enrollment, school of origin, partial credits, AB 167/216/1806, and full protections under state and federal law; they defined the definition of students in homeless situations, speaking on the McKinney-Vento Act that provides education rights and services to children and youth experiencing homelessness and shared that over 5,000 students were enrolled under the McKinney-Vento Act. They explained the definition of students in foster care, explaining that under state law, a student who qualifies is any child who has an open case through juvenile dependency court CA WIC 300 or 602, may include a child still living with a biological parent, and a child with a closed CA WIC 300 or 602 court case may still qualify for services based on educational laws and shared that 653 students were currently enrolled as foster youth. Many supports and services are available including school stability and transportation, access and referrals to District and community services/supports, such as the Salvation Army, tutoring and mentorship, and HEARTS/IGNITE/ELITE programs.

13.1 Board Members

Mrs. Alexander congratulated the city on their State of the City event and said it was a great opportunity to hear what was going on in the city; she attended the Arrowhead United Way's Magic of Motown event with the funds going to address hunger relief and for students in need at SBVC; she shared she attended her alma mater, UC Santa Barbara, where she was among other alumni speakers. She shared the upcoming San Bernardino Turkey Trot will be on November 22 and commented that they collaborated with the Assistance League and CalSAFE and last year they collected books for teenage mothers for the CalSAFE program and that will continue this year. She congratulated the Akoma students on their program and questioned how that ties in with our current program; and she asked about any policies around homelessness and support systems we provide.

Ms. Rosales-Medina questioned if there was an opportunity for the city to tour our school sites, like how Akoma did when they took a bus to all our schools and she acknowledged receiving an award from IE Prism, saying it was a District award.

Mr. Tillman reported he attended the cross country meet at Curtis Middle School that the EXL program put on and said it was a great event. All the middle schools were there and he thanked Principal Guerrero for hosting the meet. He reported that Richardson PREP won first place in both the boys and girls event. Mr. Tillman remarked it was great to see that many students there with parents and families there supporting their students. He said it was a great use of the afterschool program and to encourage students to do healthy activities. He commended Dr. Rodriguez on her staff for helping to make it happen.

Dr. Wyatt reported on the San Bernardino Police Department's 4th annual "Coptoberfest", a free, family-friendly event, safe for kids and commented that our student board members were also there and thanked Police Chief Goodman and his team for putting on the event. The Gangs and Drugs Taskforce Safety Summit was another fantastic event and he said thank you to the AVHS Hawk Army JROTC's color guard and Major Williams for presenting the colors. The 2nd annual pickle ball tournament was quite an event; the Highland Boxing Club, a local club in our community, opened their new ranch and facility for our youth to go to after school and on the weekends. The I am Gifted Foundation has been doing a lot of outreach to our students at our new Frances Grice facility.
