# What is a Dual Enrolled Student?

**A Dual Enrolled student is a  
UM-Flint college student**

who happens to still  
be in high school!

# Benefits of Dual Enrollment

- Earn college credit\* while attending
- Exposure to the rigor and pacing of college coursework
- Ease the transition from high school to college
- Reduce financial burden to families
- Provide an advantage when applying to highly-competitive universities

*\*Although UM-Flint credits are widely transferable, colleges and universities maintain their own credit transfer policies*

# Early College vs. DEEP

## Early College

- Must start Junior year
- Participate in program both Junior and Senior year
- Take additional 13th year at UM-Flint campus while still receiving tuition reduction/assistance
- Graduate from high school after 13th year with up to 60 college credits
- Still participate in all senior activities in 12th grade
- Option to opt out of 13th year during Fall of 12th grade

## Dual Enrollment Education Partnership (DEEP)

- Juniors and/or Seniors can participate
- No 13th Year

# Early College Example

3 year commitment (includes a 13th year and MUST start Junior year)

## Junior Year:

High School Classes +  
4 course DEEP Program at Clarkston High School

## Senior Year:

High School Classes +  
Different 4 course DEEP Program at Clarkston High School

## 13th Year:

Enroll in courses at UM-Flint (can be online)  
Courses options will be individualized and tailored towards students needs/wants  
Must take a math related course

# How to Earn a Bachelor's Degree

Minimum of 120 total credits required

1. General Education - (30 credits at UM-Flint) (will vary by institution)
  - a. English/Composition
  - b. Math
  - c. Humanities (+Fine Arts)
  - d. Social Sciences
  - e. Natural Sciences
2. Major courses - 45+ credits for Bachelor of Arts (BA), 70+ credits for Bachelor of Science (BS)
3. Minor (if desired) - 15 - 24 credits (typically required for BA, sometimes even 2!)
4. Electives - Other courses that do not fall under above areas

  - b. Additional paper Supplemental UM-Flint DEEP Application (return to high school counselor by deadline)
2. Wait for applications to be processed (approximately by May 1st)
3. Once admitted, create student account and attend orientation in June
