2025-26 School Description and Mission Statement

Freedom Elementary School is located in the small, culturally rich agricultural community of Farmersville in California's San Joaquin Valley. As the district's only 4th–6th grade campus, Freedom serves 528 students, of whom 94.7% are Hispanic or Latino and 43.09% are English Learners. The school embraces its mission that all students learn at high levels and maintains a vision of cultivating lifelong learners in a safe, nurturing, and academically rigorous environment. Freedom proudly supports the district mission of preparing students to become productive citizens and innovative leaders of tomorrow, emphasizing strong partnerships between school, families, and the wider community.

Freedom provides a comprehensive instructional program designed to meet the diverse academic, social, and developmental needs of upper-elementary learners. Schoolwide initiatives include an MTSS framework for academic, behavioral, and social-emotional support; English Learner Development through Integrated and Designated ELD; tiered literacy and school-wide leveled interventions; and a PBIS system that promotes a positive school climate. The school also engages students in enrichment opportunities, college and career readiness lessons and activities, and after-school programs as funding allows. These programs reflect the school's commitment to preparing independent thinkers equipped with the skills needed for success in the 21st century.

Aligned with its School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA), Freedom's goals focus on increasing proficiency in reading and math, improving English Learner progress and reclassification rates, strengthening student engagement, and enhancing family involvement. Progress indicators such as CAASPP, local assessments, ELPAC, attendance data, and PBIS metrics are monitored regularly through data team cycles every 6–8 weeks, MTSS reviews, and quarterly SPSA evaluations. Through continuous improvement efforts, Freedom Elementary remains committed to delivering high-quality instruction and ensuring that every child reaches their fullest potential.

2025-26 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

The school district held a public hearing on August 26, 2025 and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, or science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. Textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted according to a cycle developed by the California Department of Education, making the textbooks used in the school the most current available. Materials approved for use by the State are reviewed by all teachers and a recommendation is made to the School Board by a selection committee composed of teachers and administrators. All recommended materials are available for parent examination at the district office prior to adoption.

2025-26 School Safety Plan

Safety of students and staff is a primary focus at Freedom Elementary. All classified and certificated staff reviewed the CSSP prior to the start of the school year during a site in-service day. The staff was provided with a red folder which included the description of all site monthly drills and a schedule for when the drills would occur. Certificated staff then reviewed the drill procedures with the students prior to the drills occurring. The Comprehensive School Safety Plan (CSSP) will be reviewed and updated on 01/15/26 (last update 1/15/25) by the School Site Council composed of parents, staff, and student representatives. The updated plan will go to the board for board approval in February 2026.

The school conducts its required monthly safety drills to remain in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials, Fire Drills, lockdowns, and state earthquake standards.

The School Site Safety Plan is updated annually in the fall of each school year. All revisions are communicated to both the classified and certificated staff.

The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. All drills including: fire, lockdown and disaster drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year. School administration works collaboratively with Farmersville Police Department and the Farmersville Fire Department to ensure smooth and effective drills. Students are supervised before school, break, lunch, and after school by certificated staff, classified staff, and administration.

Fiscal Year 2024-25 Types of Services Funded

Freedom Elementary School provides a wide range of programs and services supported through state, federal, and local funding to meet the academic, linguistic, social-emotional, and behavioral needs of all students. Federal programs such as Title I, II, III, IV, Migrant Education, ESSER, and IDEA help provide targeted academic interventions, English learner supports, technology access, and special education services. State funding, including LCFF Supplemental and Concentration funds, Child Development Programs, and the Community Schools Grant; further strengthen the school's efforts to deliver equitable, research-based learning opportunities.

Through Title I and LCFF supports, the school implements evidence-based instructional materials, MTSS interventions, and designated English Language Development time. Professional Learning Teams collaborate weekly, and staff benefit from ongoing professional development funded through Title II and district partnerships. Freedom Elementary also provides expanded technology resources, including 1:1 devices, and supplemental instructional tools to enhance student learning.

To support the whole child, the school invests in social-emotional learning, attendance initiatives, and positive behavior systems such as PBIS. Students and families benefit from counseling services, parent engagement opportunities, literacy

workshops. Parent Institute courses, and outreach programs funded through Title III and LCFF. Together, these resources ensure students have access to high-quality instruction, supportive services, and enriching school experiences.

Professional Development

Freedom Elementary School provides ongoing professional development to administrators, teachers, and classified staff through a combination of districtwide and site-based training. The district schedules three annual staff development days focused on curriculum, instructional strategies, and effective methodologies. This year's primary emphasis is on strengthening Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to enhance collaborative planning and instructional coherence across grade levels. The primary focus of site PD is integrated-ELD, a pilot was conducted for the 24-25 school year and this year the PD is school wide on academic language essential routines in all content areas to support academic language development.

To support this work, the school partners with Solution Tree, Medina and Associates, Kate Kinsella and Associates, and Tulare County Office of Education consultants to provide coaching and mentoring in literacy, English Language Development, mathematics, and PLC implementation. Staff also access virtual professional learning for programs such as Suite360 and Beyond SST to strengthen behavioral, academic, and support systems.

At the site level, the Academic Coach, Assistant Principal, and Principal deliver weekly professional development, classroom coaching, and model lessons. They actively participate in PLC meetings to reinforce high-quality instructional practices. Late-Start Mondays are dedicated to PLT collaboration, complemented by ongoing PLC-focused professional development in weekly staff meetings, ensuring consistent, embedded learning throughout the year.
