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

Get involved, make good choices, and let your positive behavior pay off!


Don't forget to carry your card with you! Did you lose your card? No problem! Check in with Dr. Zupsic in the lobby at check-in every morning.



2026 Snow Storm Sends Students Remote

A major winter snowstorm swept through Beaver County this week, covering roads, neighborhoods, and school parking lots with heavy snow and ice. As a result, many school districts across the county made the decision to move to remote learning for the week to keep students and staff safe.

The storm began over the weekend and continued into the start of the week, bringing significant snowfall and dangerously cold temperatures. Plow crews worked throughout the county, but icy side streets and large snowdrifts made travel difficult, especially for school buses.

Because of these conditions, school administrators announced that classes would continue online rather than in person. Using remote learning days allowed students to stay on track academically while avoiding unsafe travel conditions.

As temperatures remain cold and snow removal continues, school officials will decide when it is safe to return to buildings. Until then, students are encouraged to stay engaged in their online classes and stay warm during the winter weather.
