




Club Spotlight: First Lego League By: Anika Vaswani and Vanya Jamoriya

The season for First Lego League (FLL) might be over, but for this year's teams, it ended on a high note. After 9 weeks of building, coding, and late - night brainstorms, their competition took place on November 23 in Somerville High School.

At UMS, there are two after-school robotics teams, the Roboclaws and the Montgomery Thundercats. While both teams had different robots and different styles, both teams proudly represented the school and were recognized for their team spirit.


First Lego League is an international STEM program where students between 9-14 learn to think like engineers. There are two parts to the competition. First, teams research real world problems and create an innovative solution. They also build and program a robot on a themed challenge board. This year's FLL theme focused on archaeology, and teams focused on problems such as excavating safely and protecting fragile artifacts.



Both teams developed their own unique strategies for completing their robot missions, and it came with its own challenges. One team member, Aliya Sharma said "Since we all had different ideas, we all compromised on a design for the robot in the end."

The innovation project pushed students to think past the robot. They had to understand how archaeologists work, what problems they face, and how modern technology can help archeologists. Team members reflected on the season in different ways. Sharma also shared "We all have good chemistry and share ideas in a healthy way. Being a part of my team at the competition was a fun experience."

The competition day was a combination of all of their efforts. Teams had to present their innovation project and answer questions from judges. At the same time, their robot had to perform in intense two minute and thirty second matches, where every second was counted and the goal was to score as many points as possible. Teams had to stay on their feet, staying calm when the robot did not work as expected, or their code needed last - minute adjustments. The atmosphere was filled with energy, cheers and a friendly sense of competition, as all the teams there showed exactly what they learned over the season.



The Thundercats had been awarded the Motivate Award, which recognizes teams for enthusiasm, positivity, and team spirit throughout the season. This award shows how they supported each other, encouraged other teams, and stayed positive when challenges came up. It reflects the heart of FLL, being able to work together and lift others up along the way.

As the season ended, the Roboclaws and Thundercats walked away with more than just a trophy. They built skills, confidence and friendships that will last way beyond this year's challenge. Both teams proved that with creativity and teamwork, students can achieve great things, on and off the robotics field.


Book Review: *Inheritance Games*



Tiramisu

Tiramisu is a traditional Italian dessert that is well known for its rich flavor and delicate texture. Traditionally served cold, tiramisu is a no-bake dessert that's simple to prepare yet elegant enough to be served at formal settings or special occasions.

This dessert is built from layers of coffee-soaked ladyfingers and a fluffy mascarpone cream made with eggs and sugar, then finished with a dusting of cocoa powder. While tiramisu may look fancy, it's surprisingly easy to make at home with just a few ingredients and no oven required. With some patience while it chills and sets, you'll have a dessert that tastes like it came straight from an Italian café.

Below is a classic tiramisu recipe from Broma Bakery that's easy to follow and perfect for both beginner and experienced bakers!

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 package lady fingers
- 4 eggs, separated
- 1 cup sugar, divided
- 16 oz. mascarpone, cold from the fridge (use cream cheese as a substitute)
- 1 cup strong coffee
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- Cocoa powder, for dusting (2-3 tbsp.)

Peppermint Mocha Cookies

Peppermint mocha cookies are made with only a few simple ingredients and the recipe combines festive favorites including candy canes, white chocolate, and more! This festive treat is often made and eaten around the holiday season, especially during the winter time. Consider making these across winter break—it will be a good use of your time!

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 cup (8 Tbsp; 113g) unsalted butter, softened to room temperature
- 1/2 cup (100g) granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup (100g) packed light or dark brown sugar
- 1 large egg, at room temperature
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon peppermint extract
- 1 cup (125g) all-purpose flour (spooned & leveled)
- 1/2 cup + 2 Tablespoons (51g) unsweetened natural cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoons espresso powder or 1 Tablespoon instant coffee granules
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup (180g) mini or regular size semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 8 ounces white chocolate, coarsely chopped
- 3 large candy canes, crushed

Peppermint Mocha Cookies Recipe Steps:

1. In a large bowl, beat the butter, granulated sugar, and brown sugar together on medium high speed until fluffy and light in color, about 2-3 minutes.
2. Add the egg, vanilla extract, and peppermint extract, and then beat on high speed until combined. Scrape down the sides and bottom of the bowl as needed.
3. In a separate bowl, whisk the flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, espresso powder, and salt together until combined. With the mixer running on low speed, slowly pour into the wet ingredients. Beat on low until combined and then beat in the chocolate chips. The cookie dough will be thick and very sticky.
4. Cover dough tightly and chill in the refrigerator for at least 3 hours and up to 3 days. Chilling is mandatory for this sticky cookie dough.
5. Remove cookie dough from the refrigerator and allow it to sit at room temperature for 10 minutes. If the cookie dough chilled longer than 3 hours, let it sit at room temperature for about 20 minutes. This makes the chilled cookie dough easier to scoop and roll.
6. Preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Line large baking sheets with parchment paper or silicone baking mats. Set aside. Scoop and roll dough, 1.5 Tablespoons of dough each, into balls. Arrange 2-3 inches apart on the baking sheets. Bake the cookies for 11-12 minutes or until the edges appear set and the centers still look soft.
7. Cool cookies for 5 minutes on the baking sheet, and then transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely. The cookies will slightly deflate as they cool.
8. Melt the chopped white chocolate in a double boiler or use the microwave. For the microwave, place the white chocolate in a medium heat-proof bowl. Melt in 15 second increments, stirring after each increment until completely melted and smooth.
9. Dip each completely cooled cookie halfway into the white chocolate and place onto a parchment or silicone baking mat-lined baking sheet. Sprinkle crushed candy canes on top of the chocolate. Repeat with the rest of the cooled cookies. Place the baking sheet into the refrigerator to help the chocolate set for about one hour.
10. Now you can enjoy your delicious peppermint mocha cookies! :)




