Why Prop One?

We have needs.

Based on our facilities needs assessment, we have infrastructure, safety and activities facilities needs. We also need to continue the work started with the successful passage of Prop N in 2020.

Through our survey this fall, we heard our community say we need to address infrastructure issues such as heating and cooling and roofs and continue to upgrade safety.

We manage our money well.

Through strong financial management — including refinancing existing bond series to reduce long term interest costs (approx. \$2.7 million) — the district has increased its bonding capacity, allowing for Prop One with no increase to the tax rate.

\$38 Million Bond. Zero Tax Increase.

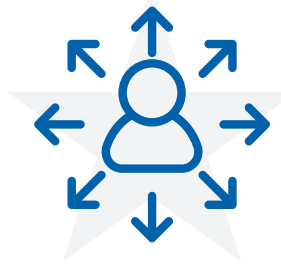
On Jan. 20, the Harrisonville Schools Board of Education approved a zero-tax-rate-increase bond to be placed on the April 7 ballot. If approved, Prop One will provide \$38 million in funding to address safety & security, student opportunity, and infrastructure needs.

Three Priority Areas:



Safety & Security

TAX IMPACT:

There will be zero tax rate increase with Prop One.



Safety

A new pick-up/drop-off loop at Harrisonville Elementary School will help alleviate traffic congestion in the neighborhood. Cars dropping off or picking up students can be housed on school property rather than in the city streets. This will also minimize car and school bus traffic interaction.

All doors in the district will be rekeyed and inside hollow-core doors will be replaced. Additionally, the fire system will be upgraded at the high school.



Infrastructure

Prop One will complete re-roofing of district buildings which began in 2020 with Prop N. Most of ECC and CCC will be updated and the remaining roofs on HES, McEowen, HMS, and HHS will be done.

Prop One will also continue the heating and cooling updates which began with Prop N with replacement of RTUs at McEowen, HES, and HHS; a chiller at HES; a chiller and boiler at HMS, and new HVAC in the CCC EMT program.

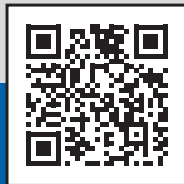
Prop One will also include an addition of four classrooms, plus restrooms, along with a parking lot at McEowen Elementary School. With the move to 3rd-5th grade building, future increases in enrollment will stretch the capacity of McEowen.

Student Opportunities



Performing Arts Center: Upgrades to the HHS Performing Arts Center will include new seats, new curtain, and renovations to lobby and restroom areas. There have been no updates to the facility since it was built in 1999.



Multi-use Facility: A new multi-use facility at HHS will provide practice space for activities who currently have no designated space or inadequate space including our growing girls' wrestling team, cheer & dance. The facility could provide indoor practice space for band, baseball, softball, & soccer, as well as room for staff professional development meetings and community events.

New Tennis Courts & Baseball/Softball

Renovation: Onsite tennis courts will improve safety by eliminating travel to practice/home meets for our growing tennis teams. Six courts will allow us to host tournaments. The current courts at the park are costly to maintain to competition level.

Baseball and softball will use one turf facility with adjustable fencing and bases. The facility will include a press box, concessions/restrooms building, bleachers, and fencing for tennis/softball/baseball complex.
