

Henry “Razzo” Carroll



Henry "Razzo" Carroll was a standout soccer player who played as a forward in both the first and second American Soccer Leagues. He led the league in scoring in 1934. He also earned two caps, scoring one goal, with the U.S. national team in 1928. He was selected for the U.S. team at the 1928 Summer Olympics. The U.S. lost to Argentina in the first round. Carroll scored the second of the two U.S. goals. In 1929, Carroll signed with the Brooklyn Wanderers in the American Soccer League. However, he did not break into the first team until the 1930 fall season when he scored five goals in six games. He later moved to the Kearny Scots of the American Soccer League. In 1934, he tied Archie Stark as the ASL goal scoring leader.^[6] In 1939, he was listed with Brookhattan.^[7] He also played for the Philadelphia Americans, winning the 1942 ASL title with the Americans, and Brooklyn Hispano.
