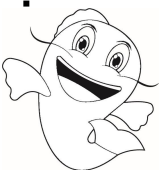
## Early Dismissal

# OUR LEARNING



*pre-k*

Our learning is under construction in Pre-K! We enjoyed learning about creativity, planning, and imagination during our last unit. We look forward to continuing to build foundational skills with our next unit: On The Move. Students are continuing to work hard to learn all the skills they need to be ready for Kindergarten.



*kindergarten*

Kindergarteners are rocking and rolling with their learning! In math, we are decomposing (breaking apart) and composing (putting together) numbers. That means that we will have students break a whole number (8) into 2 parts (4 and 4, 3 and 5, 2 and 6). We will also solve addition and subtraction word problems to 10. We are reading kindergarten sentences! When we get to a word that we don't know, we say each sound and blend them together to read the whole word. Our goal is to read the whole word without having to say each sound. Keep working. In time, your child will be able to read the whole word without decoding. Then, we go back and reread the whole sentence for understanding. Ask your child what they read about. Be sure to practice reading everyday.



# OUR LEARNING

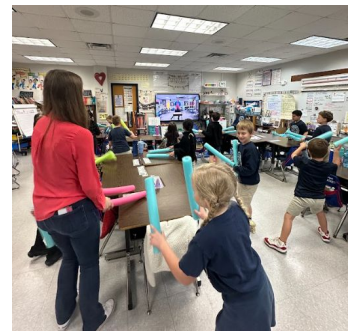


## first grade

In the month of February, our first graders are continuing to build their knowledge in all subjects. In Reading, we are learning to read and write one and two-syllable words with r-controlled vowels. We started a new reader, *The Green Fern Zoo*. This is our first non-fiction, decodable reader. Have your child discuss the story read in class with you. You can help by asking about the main topic of the story read in class. We began a Social Studies unit where we are discussing states, maps and continents. In math, we are learning about place value with tens and ones and will continue solving word problems within 20. Please continue to complete the nightly homework to support your child with the skills we are learning. Please continue to remind your child of the importance in showing CARES throughout our learning day!

## second grade

Because we “LOVE” reading, it’s a great time to warm your heart reading a good Valentine’s Day book with your child. Check out *The Day It Rained Hearts* by Felicia Bond or a nonfiction book *Saint Valentine* by Robert Sabuda. You can also check out some Mardi Gras themed books like *On Mardi Gras Day* by Fatima Shaik or *The Amazing Adventures of Mardi Gras Bead Dog* by Cornell P. Landry. In reading, second graders are using reading strategies to help them apply phonics, fluency, and comprehension skills. When readers read fluently, comprehension increases. When your child reads, the reading should sound like natural speech. Encourage them to practice reading carefully and with expression. Second graders will continue reading fiction. Have conversations with your child about the characters, setting, plot, and any connections. Your child is reading and listening to nonfiction. Students have learned about cycles in nature. Ask them questions facts learned and the cycles of day and night and seasons on Earth. Students have learned about maps and are learning geography of North America in social studies. Have fun discussing directions and road signs on your next drive. Adding and subtracting within 1000, is our focus in math. Ask your child to try applying one of the math strategies-Make a Ten and Take from Ten when completing math homework. Students can also study math facts within 20 with math games and various activities in our Google Classrooms. Working together, we’ll have a fabulous February of teaching and learning!

### Recognizing Reading Problems

Learning to read is a challenge for many kids, but most can become good readers if they get the right help. Parents have an important job in recognizing when a child is struggling and knowing how to find help.

#### What to look for:

Difficulty rhyming

Difficulty re-telling a story

Difficulty hearing individual sounds

Struggles to sound out most words

Difficulty following directions

Avoids reading aloud



#### What to do:

**Step 1: Meet with your child's teacher:** Gather examples of your child's work that reflects your concerns. Ask the teacher for his/her observations and discuss what can be done at school and at home. Stay in touch with the teacher to monitor your child's progress.

**Step 2: Meet with the principal and/or reading specialist:** If your child's performance does not improve, meet with other professionals in the building to see if there are classes, services, or other interventions available.

#### Qué hacer:

##### Paso 1: Reúnase con la maestra de su hijo

Busque ejemplos de los deberes de su hijo que expongan sus preocupaciones. Pídale a la maestra su opinión sobre el tema y discutan lo que se puede hacer, tanto en casa como en la escuela, para mejorar la situación. Manténgase en contacto con la maestra para estar al tanto del progreso de su hijo.

##### Paso 2: Reúnase con la directora o la especialista de lectura

Si no mejora el desempeño de su hijo, consulte a otros profesionales en la escuela para ver si hay clases especiales, o algún otro tipo de servicio o intervención, disponibles.

## February Is Heart Health Month

Take charge of your child's heart health by developing habits now that will reap benefits later in life. An effective way to do this is to make healthy living a priority for the whole family.

If a child sees that eating well and getting plenty of exercise is important to his mom, dad and other family members, he is much more likely to adopt a similar lifestyle as he gets older and eventually moves out of the house.

### How to raise a heart-healthy child:

#### 1. Keep moving

Exercise as a family; ride bikes, take a walk, go swimming or play games outside.

#### 2. Be positive

Make heart health fun by incorporating games into your family activities or walk to a park for a healthy picnic dinner. Celebrate successes to promote a positive sense of self-esteem.

#### 3. Limit screen time

Excessive screen time leads to a sedentary lifestyle and constant snacking, which increases the risk for obesity and cardiovascular disease. Limit TV, computer and phone time to two hours each day.

#### 4. Go to the grocery store together

Learn more about reading nutrition labels and make it fun for your child. Staples in your kitchen should be 100 percent whole wheat or grains, low-fat dairy products, poultry, fish and nuts.

#### 5. Keep healthy options on hand

When your child gets home from school, give him healthy snack options such as whole grain crackers and string cheese, hummus dip and vegetables, Greek yogurt with apple slices, nuts and dried fruit.

#### 6. Check salt intake

Avoid processed foods and keep salt shakers off the table.

#### 7. Be realistic

Set realistic goals and limits. Small steps and gradual changes can make a big difference in your child's health over time, so start small and build up.

# Universal Pre-K4 in St. Charles Parish

Beginning Fall 2026, every 4-year-old in St. Charles Parish can attend Pre-K4 at their neighborhood public school.

Why St. Charles Parish for Pre-K4:

- Builds literacy, math, and language skills early.
- Strengthens confidence and social-emotional growth.
- Creates a seamless start in your local school community.
- Gives families peace of mind and ongoing support.
- Funded and supported by the St. Charles Parish School Board.

## Expanded Pre-K3 Options

Pre-K3 eligibility and placements are based on age, residential area, and income.

For the 2026-2027 school year, more Pre-K3 classes are coming to:

- Carver Early Learning Center in Hahnville
- East Bank Head Start Center in Destrehan

## Apply for the 2026-2027 School Year

Applications for the 2026-2027 Prekindergarten Program open February 2, 2026.

Children must be 3 or 4 on or before September 30, 2026.

## Application Requirements

To process your child's application, you'll need to provide the following documents. Incomplete applications cannot be processed.



### Required Documents

- Child's original birth certificate
- Child's Medicaid/insurance card
- Child's Social Security card
- Child's immunization record with the state seal
- Official ID

*The address on the enrolling parent's or legal guardian's official ID is required to match the physical address of their St. Charles Parish proof of residency address.*

- Proof of Residency: **See section below.**
- Parent or guardian's income information: **See section below.**



### Additional Documents

*If Applicable:*

- Custody arrangement signed by a judge
- Verification of alimony or child support
- Verification of Social Security benefits
- Printed copy of family's SNAP benefits or TANF
- Current status as receipt of public assistance
- Copy of school transcript or verification of enrollment for parents in school

## Proof of Residency - Acceptable Documentation

- 2 different current utility bills in the parent or guardian's name

*\*Acceptable utility bills are: gas, water, or electric.*

OR

- 1 utility bill and a lease with the parent or guardian's name and the child's name listed.

*\*Disconnect notices will not be accepted.*

### NOTE:

If utility bills are not in your name or you reside with relatives or friends, **you will be required to apply for [Temporary Residency](#).**

You must apply for Temporary Residency with the Student Services Department beginning in June.

Pending placements will be dropped if Temporary Residency documentation is not submitted.

## Parent or Guardian Income Information - Acceptable Documentation

- 3 printed recent check stubs before the month of the application for each parent in the home

OR

- Employment verification letter stating employee's name, employment address, hours worked per week, hourly wage, and signed by the employer

## Nurse's Notes

### Top 10 Safety Tips for Kids at Mardi Gras

1. Safety tracking devises for your child – lots of options on the market that can easily be placed on a bracelet.
2. Place phone number on child's arm and on parade day pic of the child. – snap a pic with your phone of your child on the way. This can be a major help if showing to the police to help you find your child quickly.
3. Emergency change of clothes-just in case.
4. Bathroom/pull-up/person on route- never underestimate a child in need of a bathroom break. Some businesses along the route may offer a wristband for a small fee for unlimited bathroom use, or try to find a friend that lives on or near the route and coordinate ahead of time to be able to use their 'facilities'.
5. Noise-abating headphones for young children who may be sensitive to loud noises.
6. Snacks/drinks/water- seriously important to have these on hand, especially water.
7. First Aid Kit/Wipes/Sanitizer- There is nothing dirtier than beads off the ground. always make sure to wipe their hands after they handle beads.
8. Wagon— it just makes taking home your child- and all their loot-easier.
