# Sue Holcombe '87 Inducted Into CT Volleyball



Former Gilbert teammates and coaches joined Susan Holcombe '87 (far right) for her induction.

Susan Holcombe '87, a former standout athlete at The Gilbert School, was inducted into the Connecticut Women's Volleyball Hall of Fame at an awards ceremony Nov. 24, 2010, at the Aqua Turf Club in Southington.

Holcombe starred for three years on the Gilbert varsity team. All three of those teams won the Berkshire League championship, while her senior-year team went on to win the Class S state championship. That same year, Holcombe herself was team MVP.

Holcombe then went on to Clarion

University in Pennsylvania, where she led the Division II Golden Eagles to various championships and was elected captain during her final year before a season-ending injury terminated her collegiate career. Also at the Hall of Fame ceremony were several of Holcombe's Gilbert teammates, retired science teacher Craig Schroeder, current volleyball coach Cindy Fixer '78 and faculty member Mary Ellen Vaccari, Holcombe's former coach who herself was inducted into the same Hall of Fame last year.

"When you're in a Connecticut high

school in the 1980s and you are 5-foot-6 and  $\frac{3}{4}$  inches, you become a middle hitter," Holcombe said in her acceptance speech. "And when your coach is Mary Ellen Vaccari, you learn pretty quickly that you are going to work hard to learn the game and become the best at it. End of story. And you do it because Mary Ellen Vaccari tells you to."

After leaving Clarion, Holcombe went on to become an assistant coach at Division I Bucknell University. Holcombe has taught English at Farmington High School for the last nine years. She lives in Wethersfield with her partner and their two young children.

In the second round, the Jackets squared off against Hillhouse, the New Haven football juggernaut. They lost 42-14.

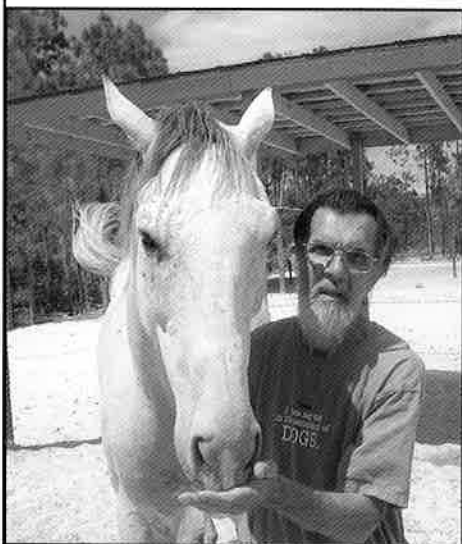
Coach Scott Salius and his players are to be congratulated on an outstanding season.

# Gilbert's Annual Fund: The 'Smart' Way To Give

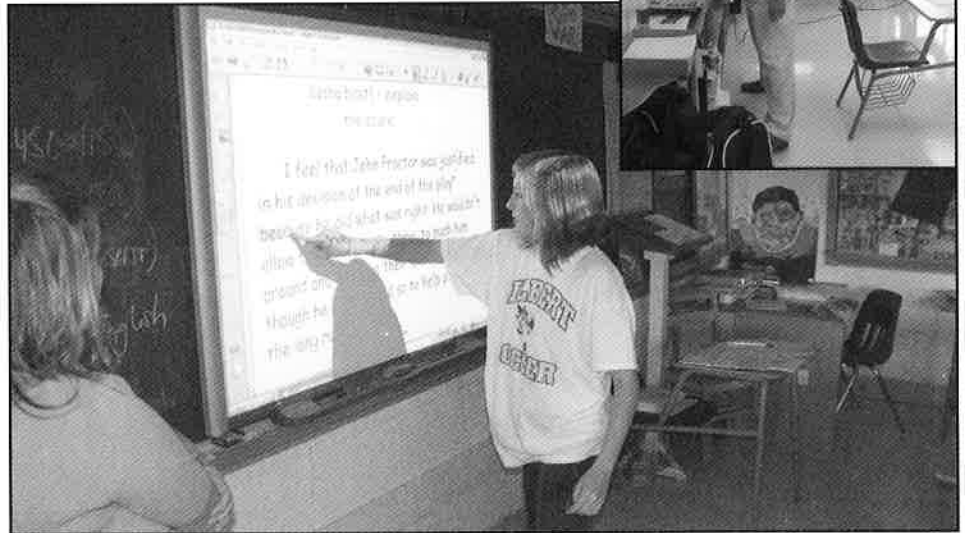
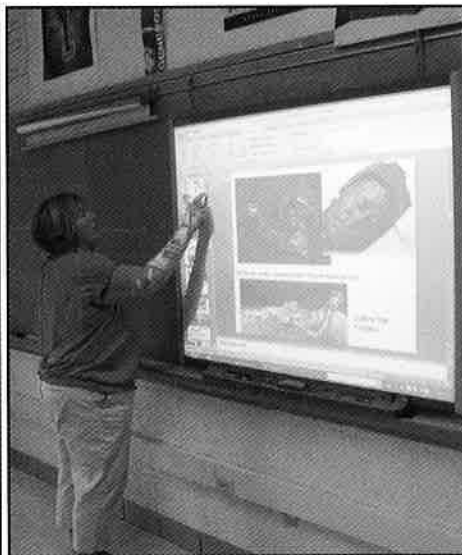
Dear Friend of The Gilbert School,

Spring in the lush Litchfield Hills is a glorious time indeed. It seems to bring out the best in all of us. For us at Gilbert, it is a time of renewal and rededication.

Nowhere is that sense of rebirth and determination more evident than in our classrooms, where faculty members practice their craft with an expertise honed from years of training and experience. ## Matt Werner '98 Goes Global

When I graduated from Gilbert in 1998, I never thought I would end up traveling to the Middle East. After attending Villanova University, however, my interest in international issues quickly evolved. I obtained my degree in economics, worked for three years with an international non-profit organization, and went to graduate school in London to study international relations.

My work with the Global Security Institute (GSI) in Philadelphia exposed me to a variety of issues concerning international security and foreign relations. In particular, GSI works with governments around the world on nuclear weapons disarmament. My time at GSI was incredibly interesting and challenging. I traveled to the United Nations, the U.S. Congress and to numerous governments throughout Europe where we conducted high-level work with heads of state, ambassadors and other officials.

After earning my master's degree from the London School of Economics in 2008, I re-entered the job market during the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. Though my timing was unfortunate, I found ample work as an emergency medical technician — a "hobby" of mine that began

when I enrolled in the EMT class with Mr. Brady at Gilbert in 1995. I elected to wait out the recession and find ways to further improve my skills in hopes of landing my next "dream job."

This past November, I decided to enroll in a 5-week Arabic language immersion program in Yemen. To most of my friends and family, this idea sounded a bit crazy considering the post-9/11 environment and the reported threats of terrorism in the region. Though Yemen is the poorest country in the Middle East, I found the people to be extremely warm towards me. Not only was my trip safe and enjoyable, but the experience turned out to be deeply educational on many levels.

The highlight of my trip was spending an afternoon at a public middle school inside Sana'a, the capital of Yemen. The visit gave me the chance to practice my Arabic and offered a glimpse into their education system. I talked with over 100 students about the US, my family, my job, and other topics. Like children anywhere else, they were excited about the beauty and opportunity of the U.S., they liked toys and candy, and they were fascinated by technology. Sadly, however, there were no computers in the entire school — not even for the administrators. The classrooms were crowded and in serious disrepair, there were weekly water shortages at the school, and most teachers and students lacked the basic necessities of education such as pencils, notebooks, and textbooks. It was eye-opening, to say the least.

What I will remember most from my journey to Yemen was the incredible kindness of the people. The experience was a stark reminder that more than half the planet lives on less than \$2 a day. Though financially impoverished, the Yemenis are not lacking in spirit or generosity. And although

terrorism is a growing concern in the country, it is overshadowed by far bigger domestic issues. There are serious problems in Yemen concerning corruption, access to drinking water, education, healthcare, and joblessness.

Every time I travel I am reminded of the importance of separating politics from the people of that country; often, the two could not be more different. The rhetoric of news organizations and politicians around the world hardly reveal the realities on the ground.

Right now I am hoping to land a position with the U.S. State Department or another organization working in the field of conflict resolution or humanitarian affairs. Though language skills are critical to landing a job in those fields, the life experience from having traveled to a place like Yemen will undoubtedly be invaluable in my career.

I am excited by the opportunities that lie ahead. If my graduation from Gilbert taught me one lesson, it is to plan to be surprised by what the future has in store for all of us.

## Gilbert Expands To Include 7th, 8th Grades

The Gilbert School Corporation and the town of Winchester Board of Education have reached an agreement to send the town's 7th- and 8th-graders to the Gilbert campus beginning in the fall of 2011.

The move, which had been under consideration for the past couple of years, will boost Gilbert's enrollment while reducing the tuition the school charges the town by an estimated \$3,656 per pupil, or a total of between \$561,000 and \$700,000 in savings to the town the first year, according to Gilbert Superintendent Dr. David Cressy.

"We finally have a plan where everyone benefits: Gilbert, the Winchester schools, the taxpayer and most importantly the students we serve. This decision has assured that Gilbert continues on a strong educational and financial footing for years to come."

As a result, there will be big changes on the Gilbert campus, most notably a 74 percent rise in enrollment, from 325 to 565 pupils. Gilbert faculty and staff are busy preparing for the dramatic change in the size of the student body. In addition, Gilbert expects to hire about eight teachers from Pearson

Middle School, where the town's 7th- and 8th-graders are currently housed.

In addition to the significant drop in per-pupil tuition and a well maintained facility for middle schoolers, taxpayers will see further savings because one of the town's three public school buildings is slated to close.

Details of the arrangement were still being negotiated at press time, but Gilbert officials are delighted and agree that this is a significant step in solidifying the school's independence and enrollment.

Adam Vaccari '08, a junior at the University of Connecticut, shot a four-under-par in October and then captured an individual playoff on the second hole to earn medalist honors in the New England Intercollegiate Golf Association championship at The Captain's Course in Brewster, Mass.

Vaccari defeated Kevin Josephson of Central Connecticut State University on the second playoff hole to capture the individual championship. Vaccari's 68 allowed him to come from five shots off the pace after day one.

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who, through significant personal or professional contributions or accomplishments during his/her lifetime, has distinguished him/herself within the history of the school, bringing honor and pride to all alumni and representing the traditions and the heritage of The Gilbert School. The Gilbert Heritage Award may be given posthumously.

### YOUNG ALUMNI ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who graduated from Gilbert within the past twenty years. The recipient will have achieved outstanding personal or professional success in the community, in business or in entrepreneurship. Through such accomplishments, he or she serves as a role model for younger individuals.

### DISTINGUISHED PROFESSIONAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who has demonstrated outstanding achievement in his or her professional life. The recipient will have brought distinction to him/herself and The Gilbert School through participation, commitment and leadership in a chosen profession. The length and quality of career accomplishments, a commitment to professional excellence and respect among professional colleagues is noteworthy.

### THE W.L. GILBERT AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY SERVICE

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School or to a member of our greater society (not limited to alumni nor to the Winsted area). The recipient will have displayed exceptional service to the betterment of life within his/her community or to humanity in general. This award is in honor of the significant humanitarian and philanthropic contributions made by William L. Gilbert, founder of The Gilbert School.

### OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT IN ATHLETICS AWARD

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who, through participation on a sports team while a student at Gilbert, exhibited outstanding character, sportsmanship and his or her own "personal best" skill level while contributing to the overall achievements of the team. The recipient's positive attitude and team approach was evident and respected not only within the competitive venue but also in the classroom and greater community. The recipient may also have distinguished himself or herself in the field of athletics after graduating from Gilbert. The recipient must be an alumnus of a class that graduated at least ten years prior to the year of the award.

The completed nomination form, along with all supporting documentation, must be submitted to the Office of Development and Alumni Relations no later than June 1, 2011. In order to be eligible for nomination, the nominee must be a graduate or former student of The Gilbert School unless otherwise stated in the description of the award. Current members of The W.L. Gilbert School Corporation and The W.L. Gilbert Trust Corporation are not eligible while in service to these boards.

The Gilbert School Alumni Advisory Council, representing all alumni of The Gilbert School, will review the nominations and present their recommendations to the Executive Committee of The W.L. Gilbert Trust Corporation for final confirmation. The Alumni Advisory Council reserves the right to include for consideration an ongoing list of potential nominees provided by The Gilbert School Alumni Office. Nominations will be accepted from alumni and friends of The Gilbert School at large.

- Fixed or variable income payments to you or designated beneficiaries.
- Capital gains tax savings if you donate appreciated assets.
