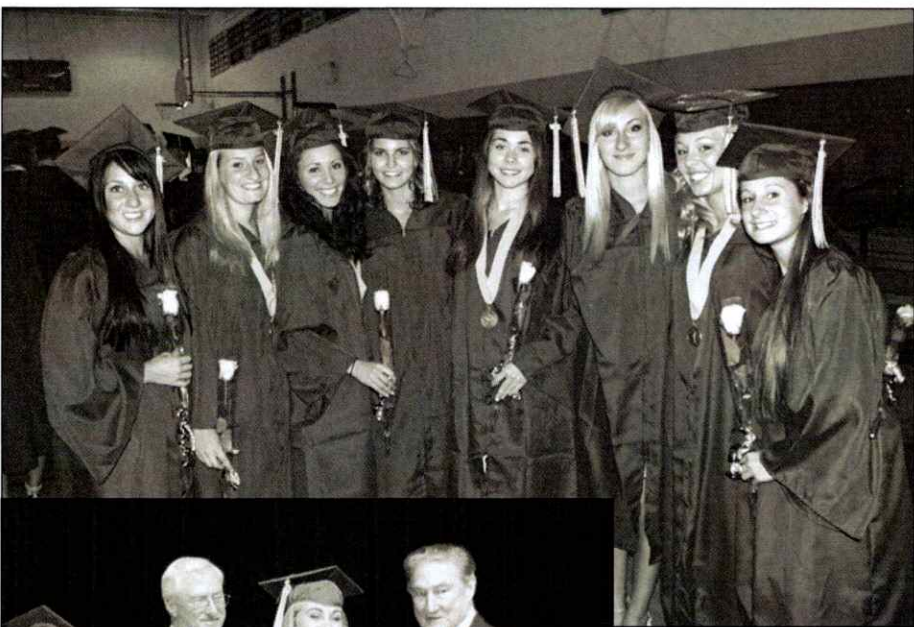
knowledge! Nhung has spent four summers at the Laurel Music Camp and is excited about returning to serve as a junior counselor in 2009.

genuine concern for the future of The Gilbert School. We hope all three come back to visit us often!

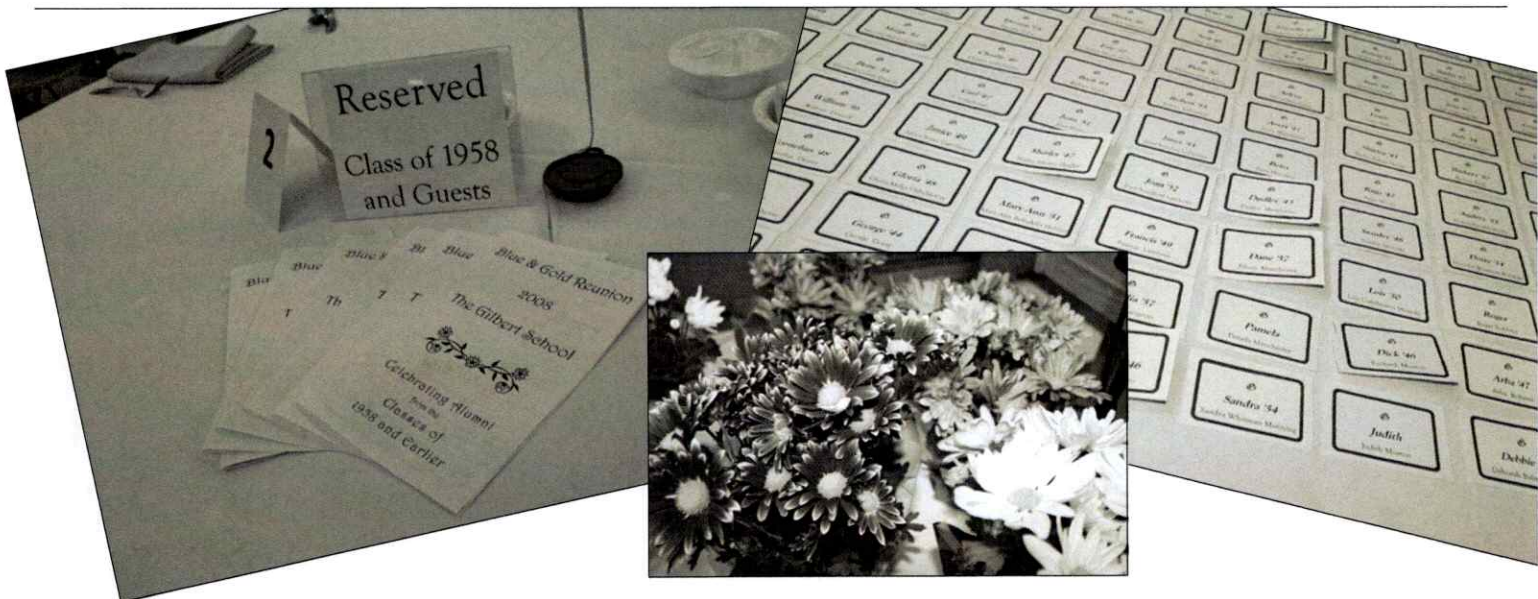

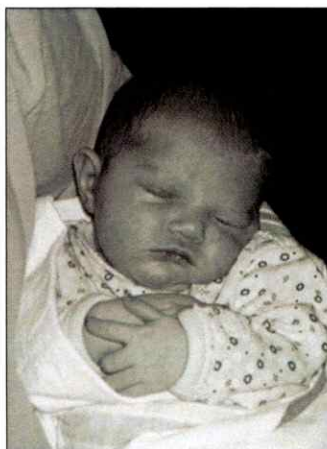

## IN THE SPOTLIGHT—

**C**ongratulations to Sue Roberts Rouleau, recipient of the 2008 William L. Gilbert Award for Outstanding Service. Sue was honored at Gilbert's *Celebration of Education* ceremonies held in June.

A 1964 graduate of The Gilbert School, Sue has never ventured far from the halls of the Blue and Gold. A lifelong resident of Winsted, she began her teaching career at Norfolk Center School but returned to Gilbert in 1969 where she spent the next 15 years as a teacher, advisor and coach. Before her children arrived at the school as students, she decided it was a good time to try something new and she joined the faculty at Simsbury (Connecticut) High School. There she taught Spanish for 18 years, developing her skills even further while experiencing education in the public sector. She was held in high regard as an "exceptional teacher and a passionate advocate for language instruction." In 2002, she returned to Gilbert and has been with her alma mater ever since.

Anyone who knows Sue knows that she is someone who gives much more than is expected of her; always wears a smile and always has a positive outlook.

Speaking of her return to Gilbert, she said, "I felt as though I were coming home. I knew I could make a difference with students whose primary language was not English and I hoped to be able to excite and motivate these students to pursue college studies." Sue is a force outside of the classroom as well, often joining with other faculty to take students to such places as Costa Rica, Peru, Argentina and the Galapagos Islands where they can learn about other cultures and experience different lifestyles.

In reflecting on her award, Sue speaks fondly of her days as a student at Gilbert and as a faculty member. "I love this school. I have wonderful colleagues and they are some of the most outstanding teachers I have ever known. There's a real sense of camaraderie and family here—and it is an honor to receive this award." Sue and her siblings were the first generation in her family to go to college and she credits much of her success to the foundation she received at Gilbert. She remembers Ma Sonier—and standing during the Hallelujah Chorus. "We learned to respect another's culture through its music. I believe I try to demonstrate that respect in the work I now do." 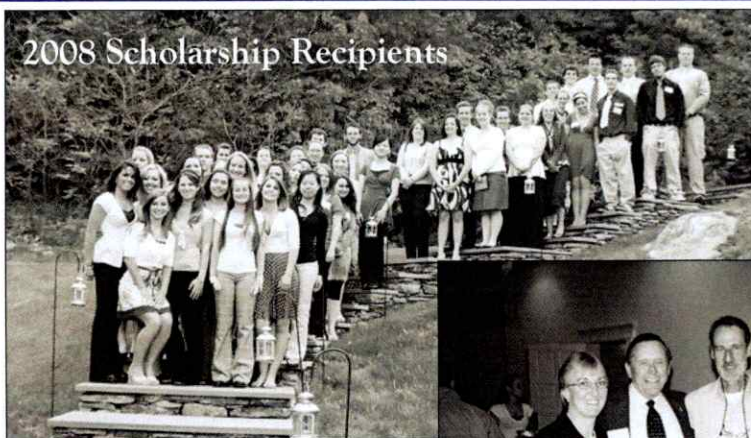
Miss Bailey—"...she could tell from a mile away if you were chewing gum and she could tell you what kind! I learned that rules were meant to be followed. Back then, I never thought I'd be back at The Gilbert School after college, but here I am—and it's the greatest feeling in the world to get up in the morning and really want to go to work. The more I teach, the more I love it. I can't imagine being anywhere else." Sue's dedication is evident in her classroom, where she posts the words of Kahlil Gibran: "Work is

love made visible." Thank you, Sue, for bringing your enthusiasm for learning to our students. ❖

▲ 2008 W.L. Gilbert Trust Corporation Scholarship recipients at the awards dinner in May held at Crystal Peak.



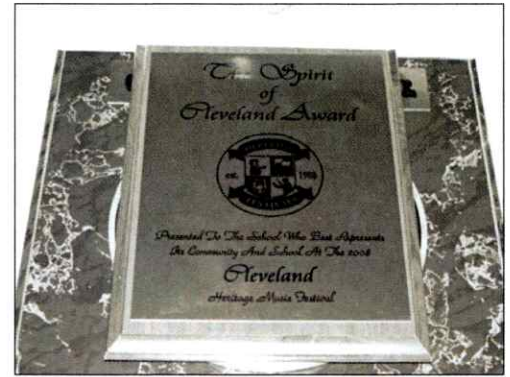

## GILBERT MUSIC STUDENTS BRING HOME THE 2008 SPIRIT OF CLEVELAND AWARD



Among the highlights of the trip was a visit to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.



The Gilbert School Band and Choir traveled to Cleveland, Ohio, during Memorial Day Weekend to perform at the 2008 Heritage Music Festival. The group returned with four awards, including The Spirit of Cleveland Award, "presented to the group which best represents its community and school" at the festival. Choral director Adam Atkins '90 and band director Scott Minnerly are proud of their students and the award, which recognizes responsibility, character and integrity. They were also honored with silver medals for Symphonic Band, Concert Choir and Jazz Band. ❖



The Gilbert School was presented with a plaque in gratitude for continuing service and support of our nation's veterans by the American Legion Post 43, Tuttle-Burns, Arthur Melycher, Commander. Gilbert students, faculty and staff observe Memorial Day and Veteran's Day with ceremonies each year.

The Gilbert School community observes Founder's Day each May with ceremonies that include the placement of a wreath in memory of William L. Gilbert at his gravesite in Winsted. This has been a tradition since the very early days of The Gilbert School.

In honor of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Law Day, The Gilbert School welcomed the Honorable Everett H. Madin, Jr., graduate of the Class of 1969, to address students, faculty and staff on *The Rule of Law*, this year's Law Day theme.

Judge Madin is assigned to the Superior Court for Juvenile Matters in Waterbury. He was appointed to the bench by Governor Rell and started his judicial career on April 26, 2007. After graduating from The Gilbert School, Judge Madin received his BA from Syracuse University and his *Juris Doctor* from the University of Connecticut School of Law.

Prior to his appointment as a Superior Court Judge, he was a trial attorney at RisCassi and Davis in Hartford where he specialized in medical malpractice, product liability, employment discrimination, personal injury and construction injury litigation.

The first Law Day was established in 1958 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower as a "day of national dedication to the principle of government under law."



## GILBERT 20/20: A VISION FOR THE 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY

In the early winter of 2007-2008, I recommended to the Gilbert School Corporation and the Gilbert Trust that we undertake a new long-range strategic plan for The Gilbert School. The concept was embraced immediately by both groups with the funding being provided by the Gilbert Trust. The purpose of this plan is to look forward to the year 2020, decide what the needs of the Gilbert graduate will be and then formulate a comprehensive plan to assure that this school meets and exceeds those needs.

**The world is changing.** We have become more and more interdependent and technologically connected than we

have ever been. The pace of change accelerates with every passing year. The challenge to our country and our community to produce highly productive citizens has never been greater. Gilbert must be prepared to meet these challenges with a strong educational program that is adapted to and reflective of twenty-first-century needs.

**The demands are changing.** The State of Connecticut is in the process of comprehensively reforming its high schools. The new learning expectations that will be mandated by the state will require that students graduate with far more skills than has ever previously been the case. A mandatory

graduation project, some kind of a major presentation reflecting the learning of four years of high school, will likely be required of all graduates. Competency in a language other than English is being considered. Final course examinations, similar to the New York State Regents Examination, are also being contemplated.

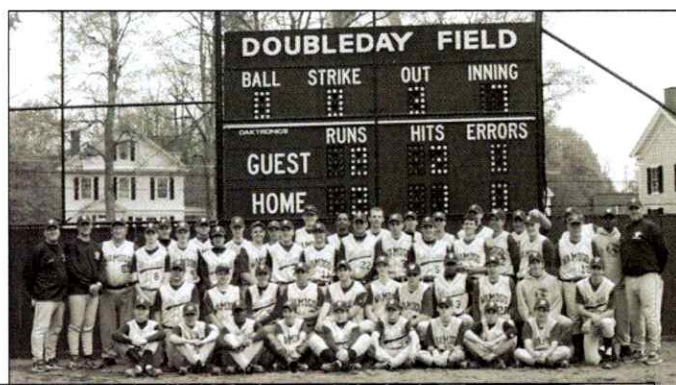
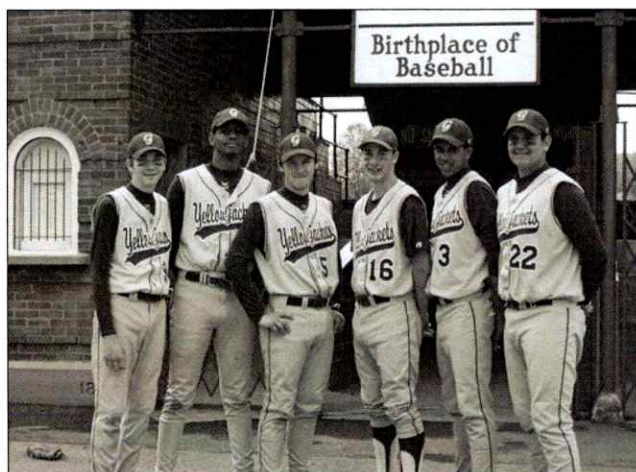
**Our population is changing.** Gilbert has never been as multilingual, multiethnic and multiracial as it now is. These students come to us frequently, presenting the school with greater challenges than previously experienced. With this diversity comes a wonderful cultural mix and a tremendous opportunity for our students who must become successful in a world which very much reflects our student body.

Gilbert 20/20 intends to develop a new vision for the school for the year 2020. Gilbert

20/20 is designed to develop a comprehensive plan to assure that the school is up to the challenges that we will surely face in the future. The 20/20 committee is made up of approximately 60% Gilbert staff and board members and 40% community representatives. These 20 people have committed a very significant amount of their time, perhaps 100 hours or more, during the 2008-2009 school year to complete a comprehensive strategic plan for the school. The plan's design will assure periodic review and accountability by the Board. The plan will provide very specific steps that the school will take in order to assure its future success and, more importantly, the success of the students we serve. ❖

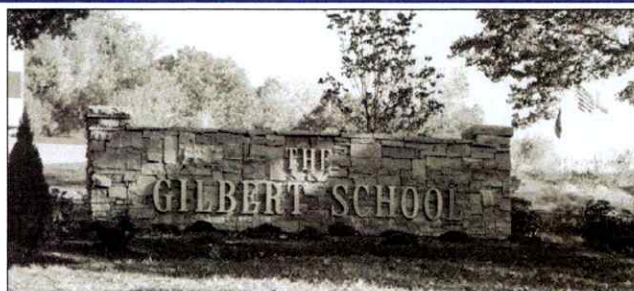
