How will the school involve parents and family members in the development of the parent and family engagement policy?

Parents will be included in the development and implementation of the policy in a clear, uniform format. Translations/translators will be provided as needed. The policy will be made available to the local community and stakeholders periodically to meet the changing needs of our school community. This meeting will be held in the Fall at the Title I Family Breakfast. Additional opportunities will be offered to review this policy at school-wide family engagement events throughout the year.

How will the school meet with parents and family members annually?

All Title I parents shall be invited and encouraged to attend an annual meeting to inform parents of their school's Title I program. The requirements of our District to receive Title I funding and the rights of parents to be involved will also be explained. Each fall, stakeholders will be invited to attend a Title I Family Breakfast. Additional opportunities will be offered to review this policy at school-wide family engagement events and/or parent meetings throughout the year.

When and where will the meetings be held?

All families will be invited to annual school-wide events including Meet the Teacher Night, Fall Parent Breakfast, Spring Family Literacy Night, Winter Parent/Teacher Conferences, and monthly PTO meetings all held at Conneaut Valley Elementary School.

How will the school involve parents and family members in school review and improvement of the Parent and Family Engagement program?

The school will actively involve parents and family members in the planning, review, and ongoing improvement of the Title I Parent and Family Engagement Program. This collaboration will take place through a variety of school-wide events and communication channels that encourage meaningful input. Parents and families will work in partnership with school staff to co-develop the Parent and Family

Engagement Plan and contribute to the design and enhancement of school programs. Opportunities for engagement may include Meet the Teacher, Parent/Teacher Conferences, Spring Family Literacy Night, PTO meetings, and other relevant school events. Input will be gathered and documented and then shared with appropriate stakeholders.

How will the school inform parents and family members about the Title I program?

The school will share information about the Title I program through distribution of the Conneaut Valley Elementary Student Handbook on the first day of school. Parents sign and return a slip acknowledging they have read and understand their right-to-know and Federal Programs/Title I. Title I handouts will be given out during Meet the Teacher Night, a presentation during the Fall Family Breakfast, and through accessibility on the individual school websites. Families will also continue to learn about Title I and its contributions during monthly PTO meetings and the spring Family Fun Night. The District Website has a Federal Programs/Title I section under which several parent resources are available.

How will the school explain the curriculum, State standards, and assessments?

The school will aid parents in understanding the State's academic content standards and student achievement standards, local academic assessments and how to monitor their students' progress and work with teachers to improve their student's achievement. This will be done through presentations at Meet the Teacher Night, Parent/Teacher Conferences, STAR Screening, Quarterly Report Cards, reviewing current PA Future Ready Index Scores, and sharing current curriculum tools used within the classroom. Parents will have access to descriptions and explanations of the curriculum in use at school, the forms of academic assessments used to measure student progress, and the achievement levels of the challenging state academic standards.

How will the school accommodate meeting requests?

If requested by parents, opportunities for meetings relating to the education of their children will be planned as soon as possible. Other school personnel may be included as needed (classroom teacher, principal, guidance counselor, nurse, Title I teacher, school psychologist, special area teachers, and instructional support teacher). Home visits may be conducted. The Guidance Counselor, Principal, and Instructional Support Staff will make home visits when deemed necessary.

If applicable, how will the school meet with parents and family members to develop and discuss

the Schoolwide Plan?

Parents, teachers, and stakeholders will be invited to develop the Schoolwide plan. If the school-wide plan is not satisfactory to Title I parents, they are able to submit comments on the plan when the school makes the plan available. The Schoolwide Plan will begin to be developed in the spring and finalized during the summer months with all stakeholders.

How will the school involve parents and family members in the development of the school-parent compact?

The school-parent compact will be jointly developed with parents. This compact outlines how the parents, entire staff, and students will share in the responsibility for improved student achievement. The school-parent compact will be presented to parents in the fall at the annual Parent Breakfast. Parents will have an opportunity to make suggestions and revisions will be made as needed.

What assistance will be provided to parents and family members to understand the academic standards, State and local academic assessments, and how to monitor their child's progress?

Parents will have reasonable access to staff and observations of the classroom activities. Parents will be invited to Meet the Teacher Night and Parent Grade Level meetings. At Meet the Teacher Night, the classroom teachers meet with the parents to discuss the expectations and learning outcomes expected for the school year. If there are special programs taking place in the school during parental events, information is posted in the foyer by the office. In addition, progress reports, parent conferences, parent contact logs, school calendars, daily classroom folders, assignment books, newsletters, Class DoJo, and text messages will be the way parents receive pertinent information.

How will the school provide training materials to parents and family members?

Training and materials will be provided to help parents at home and improve their child's achievement. At the Fall Parent Breakfast, the Title teachers complete a make and take activity. The Title teachers instruct the parents about specific skills and then provide the materials for parents to use at home to practice those skills. Also, at the Spring Family Fun Night, the teachers instruct the parents on various skills and provide materials for the parents to use at home with their children. We also invite various Community Members during our Family Fun Night, and they also provide useful information for parents. At the end of the school year, an annual Title I Parent Survey is sent home with all students in their take-home folders. The surveys are returned, and responses are tabulated. The information is shared with the staff to inform them of future academic workshops the parents would like to attend. This will help structure some of the Family Night teaching sessions.

How will the school use parents to train staff on how to work with parents as equal

partners?

To show how we value our parents, we welcome and encourage parents to communicate to our teachers how best to work with their children in consideration of their family dynamics. This most naturally occurs during parent-teacher conferences in a private setting wherein open dialogue can be shared. As the school year continues, this is an on-going conversation between teachers and parents. If greater needs arise, the guidance counselor, principal, and school psychologist can provide resources for academic and behavioral concerns. In addition, some parents, grandparents, and community members are available to offer their expertise in a specific area of instruction.

How will the school coordinate with other Federal, State and Local Programs including public preschool programs?

Pre-K is always invited to be a part of all Title I school-wide events that occur during the school year. This includes the Fall Meet the Teacher Night, the Fall Parent Title I Breakfast, assemblies, PTO meetings, and the Spring Family Fun Night. During the Kindergarten Orientation in mid- August, the Title I Reading teachers attend and speak about the benefits of the Title I Program. Many of the Pre-K students will be attending Kindergarten in the Fall and this is a positive introduction to the Title I Program.

How will the school ensure information is in a language parents can understand? This should include how documents are translated.

Our District uses ChatGPT and Google Translate to assist with document translation.

How will the school include parents and family members of English Learners?

Having parents/family members of English Learners is a rare occurrence in our attendance area. We have and will continue to meet the needs as they arise utilizing Building and District resources as well as contacts and resources from Intermediate Unit #5.
