On Thursday, January 22, the Pittsburgh Penguins wasted no time setting the tone against the Edmonton Oilers. Anthony Mantha opened the flood gates for the Penguins with a tipped in pass from Justin Brazeau only two minutes and twenty seconds into the game. Just 22 seconds later, Mantha got his second of the night on a breakaway to make it 2-0 Pens. Sidney Crosby added a third goal two minutes and 57 seconds into the game to complete a 37-second goal burst, the fastest three goals in Penguins history!

In the second period, Edmonton finally got on the board when Jake Walman scored a short-handed goal, cutting the deficit to 3-1. However, the Penguins blew that candle out very quickly. Rickard Rakell added a fourth goal to the board on a delayed penalty with a shot from the left side. Later in the period, Evgeni Malkin scored a backhand goal to make it 5-1 Penguins. Pittsburgh's strong puck movement and smart play put them above Edmonton all night long.

PRHS Musical: "Chicago" Underway:

This year's musical, "Chicago," marks a turn from "Mamma Mia!" "42nd Street," and "Elf." With its darker themes, "Chicago" is not the "average" musical the audience may expect. Instead, it adopts a sassy, scandalous tone and critiques fame and justice. Some cast members were interviewed by PR's journalism class on Thursday, January 22nd. These cast members included seniors Aubrey Myers, Emma Wallace, Elise Duckworth, Conor Barcaskey, Sienna Napolitano, Brendan Plowey, Sophia Priore, Colby Fuchs, as well as juniors Julia Jakovac and Loren Prisuta. Set in the 1920s, "Chicago" follows Roxie Hart, a woman driven by her desire for fame and public admiration, no matter the cost. For many cast members, their journey to the stage began years ago. Myers recalls being invited by PR

theater teacher Mrs. Bruno to participate as a "mini" in musicals back in fifth grade. Wallace followed in the footsteps of her older siblings, and Duckworth made the leap from volleyball to musical theater during "Mamma Mia!" during her sophomore year. Barcaskey said he was "forced" into his first musical in fifth grade, but quickly grew inspired by the older performers he admired.

Others found their way more unexpectedly. Napolitano, a former spring track athlete and former competitive dancer, joined on a whim, eager to "go back to her roots" and try something new.

Jakovac said she always had a passion for theater, sparked by elementary school musical tours that made the experience look exciting. Plowey began on the stage crew in his sophomore year before friends encouraged him to audition. Priore described herself as a "wild child" performer, and had long been told she belonged in musicals and eventually

realized it could become a true passion. Fuchs had been involved since fourth grade and, after a middle school hiatus due to scheduling, knew he would return during high school. As for Prisuta, she developed a love for musical theater at a very young age, with her first performance being at 5 years old.

Her passion for performing has taken her from local to national productions, and she is grateful to be a part of such an impressive show at the high school level.

The cast emphasized that musical theater is far more intense than many realize. Rehearsals run Monday through Thursday, with some Fridays added as opening night approaches.

Lead Roles Give a Sneak Peak Behind the Curtain

Tech week is from 3 to 8 pm, and with about 66 cast members (larger than last year), coordination is essential. Dance, especially with Fosse choreography, has been a major challenge.

One tap-heavy number, “We Both Reached for the Gun,” shows this difficulty. Napolitano added that performing on stage while singing is very different from a traditional dance class and that accountability is important, as one mistake can affect everyone.

Despite the pressure, the cast repeatedly described the group as a family. Myers called it exactly that, while Jakovac emphasized how supportive

the seniors are of one another, and how bittersweet it is knowing that this exact group will never perform together again.

“Welcoming new people is just as important as appreciating the people who are here now,” she said.

Prisuta added her thoughts as well, sharing that junior year really emphasizes the shift from follower to leader.

“I want to make it my goal to have a tight-knit, family bond as a cast and crew. It’s one thing to put on a good show, but when connections between the cast and crew are real and electric, it brings an energy to the performance that will be unmatched,” she said.

When asked about their favorite

musicals, some answers were *The Lion King* at the Benedum, *Hadestown*, *Hamilton*, *Aladdin* on Broadway, *Les Miserables*, *Wicked*, *Moulin Rouge*, and *The Outsiders*. Several cast members also named dream roles or shows they hope to perform in someday, from *Into the Woods* to *Hamilton* to *The Sound of Music*.

Looking ahead, many plan to continue pursuing theater in some way. Barcaskey hopes to audition for NYU’s acting program, with journalism as a backup. Prisuta is preparing to audition for musical theater programs at various universities. Duckworth applied to schools for both musical theater and political science. Priore and Plowey have auditioned at Duquesne, while Jakovac hopes to combine her love for theater with journalism and writing. Others plan to major in fields ranging from criminology and psychology to mechanical engineering, showing that musical theater can exist within a wide range of passions.

With its layered themes, *Chicago* has pushed the cast creatively and collaboratively. But as the performers agree, the result makes every long rehearsal worth it.

PR Clubs Collaborate to Host Polar Plunge *Fundraiser Plans to Raise \$10000 for Special Olympics*

Special Olympics is the world's largest

sports organization for children and adults with intellectual disabilities, providing year-round athletic training and over 100,000 competitions annually in 30+ Olympic-style sports. On February 27th, 2026, from 9:00-12:00 PM, at Accrisure Stadium, Special Olympics Pennsylvania will be hosting their annual Polar Plunge fundraiser, their largest event of the year, to raise \$100,000. For the third year in a row, Pine-Richland Best Buddies club, Unified Bocce, and JROTC members will be transported by bus from the high school to dive into freezing water in support of over 16,000 athletes with intellectual disabilities. This year, the team has a goal of raising an ambitious \$10,000. Should the goal be met, PR principal Dr. Hernandez and superintendent Dr. Miller will brave the waters for themselves.

“Known as ‘freezin’ for a reason,’ the Polar Plunge raises money for year-round sports training, health, and leadership programs,” Dr. Sipe, event coordinator, said. “The significance of Special

Olympics lies in empowering individuals with intellectual disabilities (ID) through a variety of sports, fostering inclusion, building confidence, and creating family support networks, ultimately transforming lives by providing opportunities for physical fitness, leadership, social connection, and challenging societal stigma, promoting acceptance for all abilities. It's a global movement promoting a world where everyone is welcomed, regardless of ability, through year-round training and competition.”

Leading this event are seniors Avery Stieg, Unified Bocce member, and Brody Kirik, Best Buddies Treasurer, alongside junior Gio Zottola, JROTC member. Each reached out to businesses to sponsor the event.

For Stieg, the event is a matter of personal support as her “younger sister has special needs, and I want to support as many people like her as possible.”

Regarding the event’s more widespread significance, Zottola said, “Each of our clubs has their very own specific area that they focus on on their own, but through the Polar Plunge, these very different things are there to support each other and to show that people care. It is important to show no one is alone; there will always be someone there to be your friend.”



My Most Anticipated Movies Coming Into 2026






Along with the activities of this celebration, there will be food provided by the council.
