MEASURING STUDENT SUCCESS

The following article was written by Gilbert School Superintendent/Principal Robert F. Gazda and was printed earlier this year in the Gilbert Gazette, which is a newsletter for parents of Gilbert School students. With a growing interest in the role that test scores play in our society, we thought that you as alumni might be interested as well.

In part two of Measuring Student Success, which will appear in the Fall 2001 Yellow Jacket, we will present the findings of a group that has pulled together to define and expand upon this issue. We welcome your ideas and comments.

Over the past several years, schools have been baraged by a host of test results, which have been used to pit one school against another and which have attempted to be "THE" measure of student success.

This statement is not to downplay or erode the importance of these tests. Tests, such as the CAPT program at the high school level, have been the stimuli for positive change in how we educate our young people. Yet, there is a growing awareness on the part of many educators, including our Commissioner of Education, Ted Sergi, that the stress on measurement and accountability as reflected in tests is overshadowing other important and meaningful successes of our students.

A group of teachers, ad-

ministrators, board members, students and community residents are wrestling with this challenging and elusive issue of "student success." We think that our task of attempting to define "student success" is very difficult, but also very important. The definition and identification of the vast array of opportunities that we make available to students to experience "success" will then allow us to acknowledge and commend those "student successes."

The student who works hard to make an athletic team and diligently attends every practice, knowing that he is not likely to start or be the "star"—this student is a "SUCCESS." Music and artistic accomplishments, which cannot be measured by any test, have given

many students an inner satisfaction and sense of "SUCCESS." Even something such as the student who overcomes a less than ideal home situation to make it to school on a regular basis is a "SUCCESS."

Each of our students, your sons and daughters, is an individual. Daily, they face a multitude of problems and challenges that they must overcome in order to be "successful." Academics is one very important of these challenges, but let us not forget what else they have accomplished.

Anyone who has visited the Art Department or the Library at The Gilbert School has experienced first-hand the truly wonderful talent of some of our student artisans led by teachers Deborah Sacks and Peggy Steinway. The creativity of these students is showcased through sculpture using various materials, drawings, computer graphics design and other exciting media.

Ms. Sacks and Ms. Steinway were pleased to announce in January that four Gilbert

students received recognition from the Connecticut Scholastic Art Awards competition, sponsored by the Connecticut Art Education Association. Approximately 1,100 pieces were submitted from schools all over the state; only 400 were winners. All winners were honored at a ceremony at the Lincoln Theatre at the University of Hartford. Christina DiFabio's gold medal drawing, a self-portrait in charcoal, has gone on to a national competition, where, if the piece wins another gold medal, it will be displayed at a national exhibit to be shown at the Corcoran Gallery in Washington, DC, this summer.

The three senior winners have been working in Deborah Sacks' Portfolio Preparation class, where they spend an entire semester building professional portfo-

lios for application to art schools. Jonathan Sherman has taken drawing and advanced computer graphics classes at Gilbert and plans to continue art studies again next year as a senior. His work was a still life created using Adobe Illustrator, a computer graphics software program. Melissa's piece was a male portrait done in black and white pastel. ❖

CAREER CENTER OPENS

The first Career Center at The Gilbert School opened in November and houses the School-To-Career program. The Center, part of the Library/Media renovations, is a one-stop location for students interested in exploring career choices and educational requirements.

The Guidance Department and the School-To-Career office have joined forces to offer comprehensive services for all students at Gilbert. Beginning this year both offices will utilize *Choices*, *Career Aptitude Survey*, *Bridges* and *CX Online* software to provide a full range of resources for both students and parents in preparing for college and careers. The software will be available in the guidance office and the Career Center, as well as on a number of selected computers throughout the school. This joint effort will allow students and parents to explore careers, ca-

reer interests, colleges, apply online for acceptance and visit a daily career information magazine with *CX Online* (Career Exploration). Northwestern Connecticut Community College provided the *CX Online* to Gilbert, at no charge.

The STC program provides a wide range of offerings to assist students in developing a broad understanding of career information and hints on how to secure a meaningful position and be successful in their chosen career. All students are eligible to elect *Freshman Success*, *Career Academies in Business & Finance or Communications & Media*, listen to speakers on careers, do job shadows, participate in field trips, have a mentor from business or do an internship in their senior year.

As the program expands there is a great need for businesses or individuals to help with meaningful business and career experiences for our stu-

dents. We need *speakers* who would be willing to spend about one hour speaking to juniors and seniors about their careers; individuals willing to allow students to spend part of a day with them in the work place doing a *job shadow*; companies to provide *field trips*, and individuals willing to *mentor* a student interested in a particular career. We also need companies who are able to provide part-time employment for seniors doing an *internship* in a selected career area.

LOCAL ALUMNUS TEAMS UP WITH THE GILBERT SCHOOL FOR AWARD-WINNING PROGRAM

The Connecticut Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance has given its outstanding program award for the Year 2000 to Gilbert graduate Ruthann Bruno Horvay '68. Ruthann works for the Parent Resource Center in Winsted and with The Gilbert School Health and Physical Education Department.

The award-winning program, "Parenting Awareness," is taught by Horvay as part of the senior health curriculum at Gilbert. The unit was the brainchild of the parent educator as she sought to fulfill part of her job description regarding work-

ing with local schools.

The program is a perfect fit for the students at Gilbert. Their curriculum is based on acquiring knowledge, attitudes and behaviors that will insure a healthy lifestyle for them. In the senior classes, emphasis is placed on accessing help within the community for their own needs throughout the different phases of their lives. Mrs. Horvay provides insight into evolutionary parenting styles, developmental stages of children, relationships in marriage phases, temperamental styles, and birth order issues.

The goal of the unit is to empower the students to be-

come the best parents that they are capable of being when the time comes for them. A secondary objective is for the students to understand their own parents' motives and behaviors in raising them. The unit also teaches about the agencies available in the community to help in the parenting process.

Ruthann was presented with the award during the Annual Conference of Health Educators in November. ❖
