### School Profile

Mary B. Lewis Elementary School is located in the northwestern region of Bloomington and serves students in grades transitional kindergarten through six following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2024-25 school year, 548 students were enrolled, including 18.1% receiving special education services, 24.1% qualifying for English learner support, 1.6% foster youth, 4.7% homeless youth, and 93.4% socioeconomically disadvantaged.

## Student Achievement California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) System includes the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (SBAC) for students in the general education population, and the California Alternate Assessments (CAAs) for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Only eligible students may participate in the administration of the CAAs. CAAs items are aligned with alternative achievement standards, which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). CAASPP results are a measure of how well students are mastering California's standards in English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics, and are given to grades three through eight and grade eleven. SBAC tests assess student performance in ELA/Literacy and mathematics utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks, and CAAs test items are aligned with alternative achievement standards which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the tables, no students met subgroup criteria. ## Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Mary B. Lewis Elementary School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade five. The physical fitness test (PFT) for students in California schools is the FITNESSGRAM. The main goal of the test is to help students in starting life-long habits of regular physical activity.

The FITNESSGRAM has six parts, though California currently requires five parts be completed annually, that show a level of fitness that offer a degree of defense against diseases that come from inactivity. ## School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Mary B. Lewis Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1954; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following campus repairs or improvements were completed:

#### 2024-25 Campus Improvements:

- Replacement of play structure
- Replacement of school signage
- New buddy benches on playground

#### 2025-26 Planned Campus Improvements:

- Installation of new floors and tables in cafeteria

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and two evening custodians are assigned to Mary B. Lewis Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Campus security
- Event setup/cleanup
- Cafeteria cleanup

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Event setup/cleanup

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

## School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Mary B. Lewis Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in December 2025.

## Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the principal, staff and noon aides are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas and the playground. During recess, staff monitor playground activity. Administrators and noon aides monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal and staff monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Mary B. Lewis Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

## Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Mary B. Lewis Elementary School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Mary B. Lewis Elementary School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Friday, December 05, 2025. Deficiencies noted in the school inspection survey were corrected immediately by the district's maintenance department. During fiscal year 2025-26, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use at the time of the inspection.

## Classroom Environment

### Discipline & Climate for Learning

Mary B. Lewis Elementary School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies align with approved Board policies and are designed to foster positive learning environments while minimizing classroom disruptions. The school implements progressive discipline and proactive classroom-based supports for students who experience difficulty following school expectations. When disciplinary intervention is necessary, school administrators address situations in a fair, firm, and consistent manner, taking into account the nature and context of each incident. The school also implements the Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) framework on a daily basis. Schools that have implemented PBIS report significant reductions in unwanted behaviors, including bullying and harassment. Mary B. Lewis Elementary's school wide behavior expectations emphasize being Safe, On Task, Accountable, and Respectful.

## Curriculum & Instruction

### Staff Development

All training and curriculum development activities at Mary B. Lewis Elementary School revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. During the 2024-25 school year, Mary B. Lewis Elementary School held staff development training devoted to:

- Data Analysis
- English Language Development (ELD)
- Function of Behavior Training

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Mary B. Lewis Elementary School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year on minimum days. Teachers meet in grade level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training sessions as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula.

### Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Mary B. Lewis Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education with the exception of the TK materials which are from the most recent local governing board adoption. The district follows the State Board of Education's eight-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Thursday, October 02, 2025, the Colton Joint Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 26-19 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2025-26 school

year, Colton Joint Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

### Professional Staff Counseling & Support Staff

Mary B. Lewis Elementary School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Mary B. Lewis Elementary School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

### Expenditures Per Student
