Milestone Progress

Oct-Nov, '25

- **By Oct. 10:** Principals submitted interest in pursuing L5.
- Engaged with principals on 501(c)3 formation, communications, and planning.
- Campus teams began completing the TEA model application.

January '26

- **By Jan. 10:** Principals submitted the campus application to the district.
- **By Jan. 23:** District completed initial application scoring.
- **Jan. 30:** District conducted capacity interviews and provided feedback to partners.

February '26

By Feb 6: Partner updated application, if needed.

Milestone Progress

February '26

- **Feb. 12:** Board votes to authorize Supt. ability to explore and negotiate contract and apply for Texas benefits.
- **Beginning Feb. 13:** If approved, district shares draft contract, including draft menu of service. Partner begins review.

March '26

- **Mar. 19:** Board votes to approve performance contract.
- **By Mar. 31:** District submits the full Texas Benefits Application, which includes performance contracts, scoring, and policy to TEA.

April - June '26

- Schools engage in annual budget planning and complete operating Partner board training.
- **By May 29:** TEA will notify the district of benefits eligibility.
- District budget approved by Board no later **6/30**.

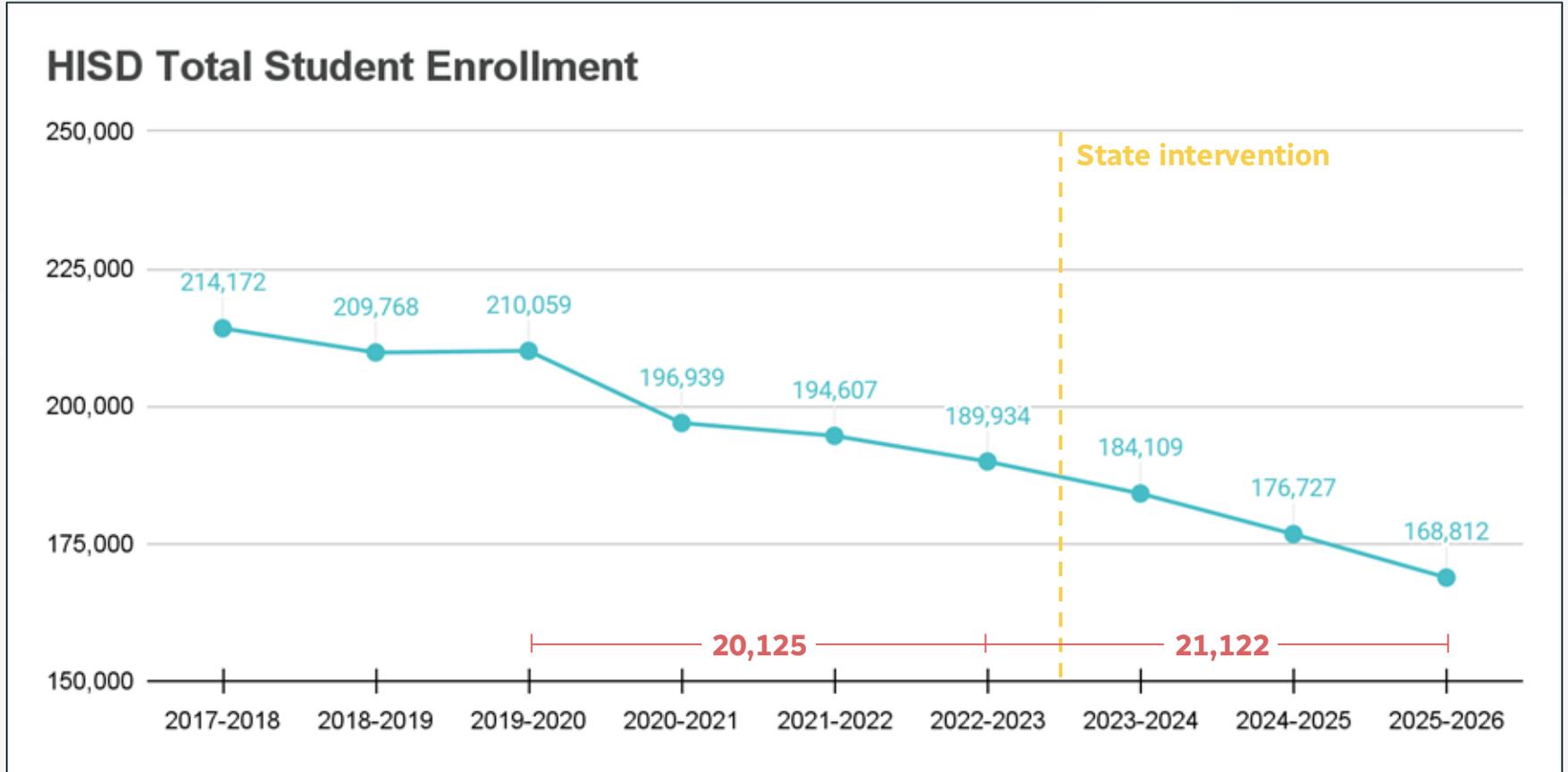

Need to take action to address the long-term sustainability of the district so we can continue to provide the best learning conditions possible to students

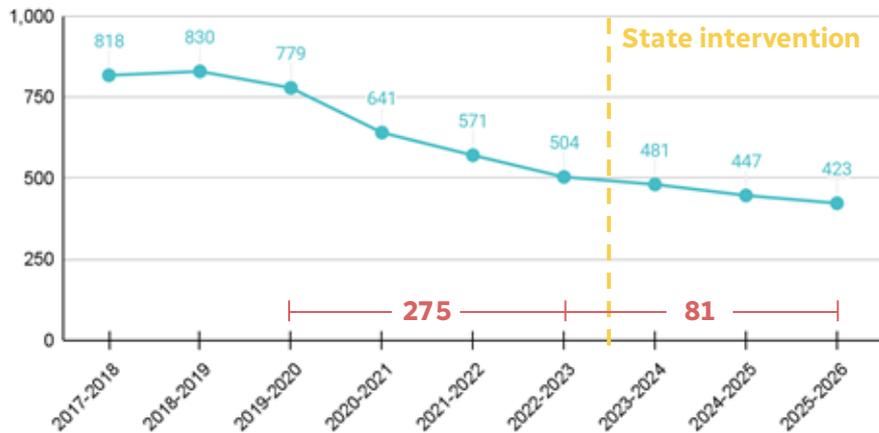

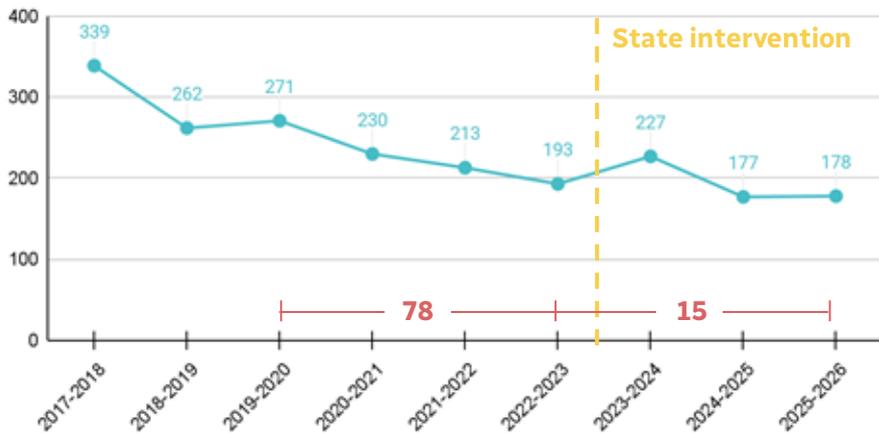
HISD Enrollment Has Been Declining Since Long Before the State Intervention



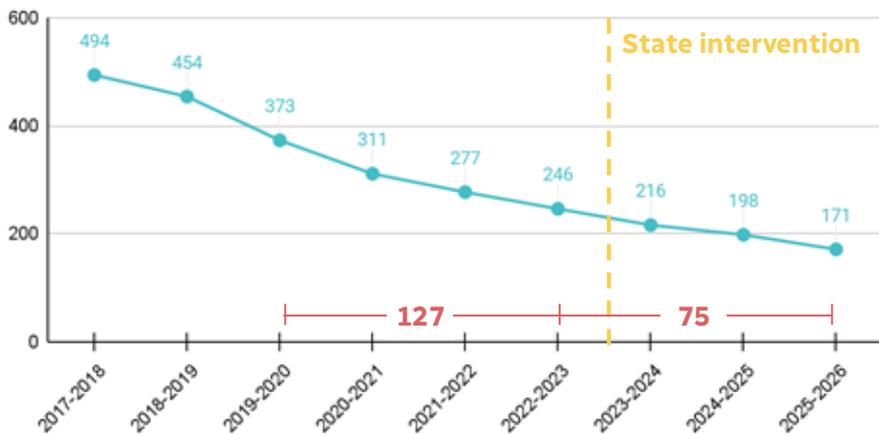
Hobby Elementary School Student Enrollment



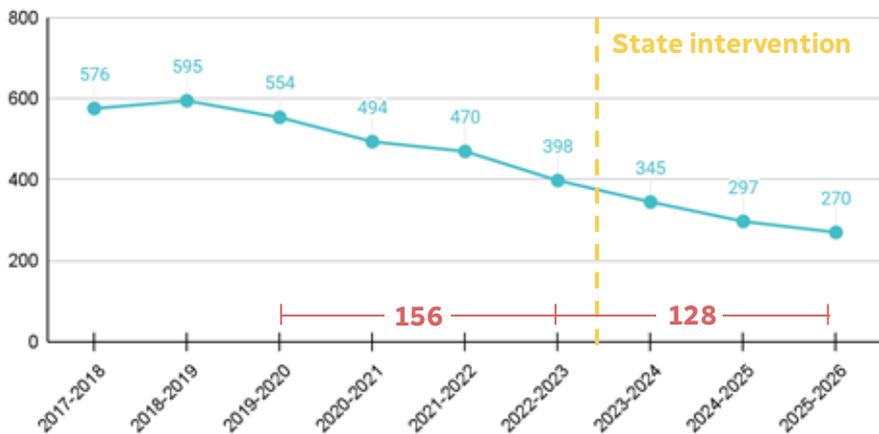
Briscoe Elementary School Student Enrollment

Aging, Under-Enrolled Facilities Negatively Impact Our Students



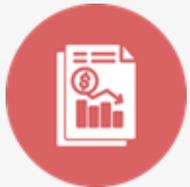
Low-quality facilities provide poor learning conditions.

According to facilities assessment data, **96 HISD school buildings have a Facility Condition Index (FCI) over 65% as of 2026**, indicating critical issues that would typically require a complete facility replacement to address.



Under-enrolled schools drain resources away from students.

This year, nearly **23% of HISD schools are operating below 50% of their total capacity**, limiting the resources for programs and staff to support student learning and experiences.



Replacing or renovating poor facilities is cost prohibitive.

The cost of rebuilding a **single elementary school** is estimated around **\$75 million**. The cost to fully renovate an elementary school is estimated around **\$40 million**.



Proposed School Closures

Closing Schools Is Difficult But Necessary for the Future of HISD

Building a **financially sustainable HISD with the resources to support our vision for student success** requires us to make the hard decision to **close campuses for the 26–27 school year.**

These decisions are grounded in the belief that **all students deserve access to top tier programming in a quality, safe, and viable facility.**

Guiding Principles & Key Considerations

- **Minimize disruption:** Prioritizing local reassignment options
- **Improved learning environments:** Moving students into safer, healthier, higher-quality facilities
- **Equity & access:** Aligning grade spans, student needs, and travel patterns
- **Academic continuity:** Sustaining programmatic fit

We Followed a Structured Approach to Determine Proposed Actions Based on a Variety of Factors

1. Data Analysis

Analyzed school data to identify campuses at the intersection of poor facility conditions (FCI), low enrollment, and low building space usage

2. Feasibility Check

For initial set of flagged campuses, assessed whether there are feasible school options nearby with better facilities and available space

3. Holistic Review

Finalized the list by reviewing key local context and qualitative factors, such as school programming and academic adequacy (capacity, learning environment, safety and security, technology)

Summary of Actions & Impact

School & Facility Impact

- **12 schools are closing** (11 physical facilities are being closed*)

Student Impact

- For students at **7 of the 11** closing buildings: the school will **close** and students will transition to an assigned nearby campus
- For students at **4 of the 11** closing buildings: the school and students will move to an assigned nearby campus as a distinct **co-location** with a shared facility

Programming Impact

- For closing schools: **unique program offerings will be carried over to the receiving campus**
- Gulfton Middle College at Liberty: program will close and be absorbed into Liberty HS*

Innovative Pilot: Future 2

- 2 campuses that were slated for closure will instead be repurposed into **Future 2 pilot schools**

Hobby ES		School and Grades 1-5 students will move to Lawson MS facility (co-location); Pre-K and Kinder students move to MLK ECC
Gulfton Middle College		Students will be absorbed into Liberty HS*

*Gulfton Middle College’s unique campus number will be closed and students will now attend Liberty HS. Both campuses are currently co-located at the HCC Gulfton Campus, which is a non-HISD facility.
