

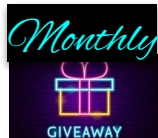

Winter Break Reading Challenge

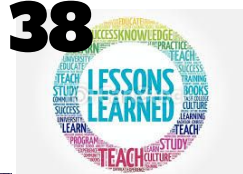

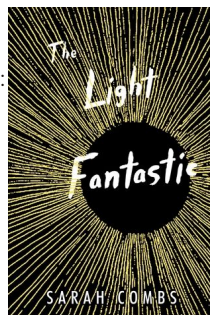
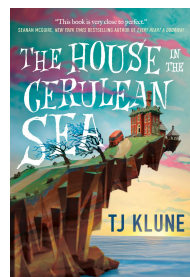
EPSILON BETA NEWS

Club members volunteered to read to several elementary schools this month. Jays read ten stories at six elementary schools and encouraged the importance of reading aloud. #jaysread



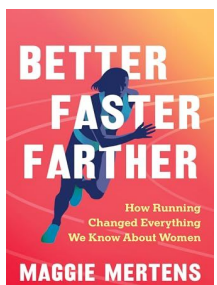
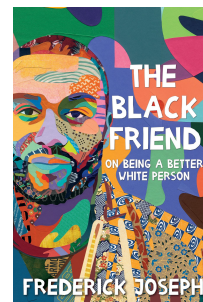
NEW BOOKS
