Program Structure

The induction program is a two-year process that begins with a general, district-focused overview of practices that support student achievement. This program is provided to all new educational staff who will be employed by the district for a minimum of 45 days. Moving to a strategic and targeted model, the induction program then has four separate components working in tandem: elementary, secondary, special education, and student services. All induction programs are facilitated by staff developers, curriculum supervisors, administration, and instructional coaches who provide additional job-embedded, instructional coaching. During induction sessions, we provide training in several areas including lesson design, classroom management, classroom environment, technology integration, instructional best practices, and meeting the needs of all learners. Support for new district teachers includes staff development-led model lessons and specifically designed workshops and new teacher orientations. Inductees are provided with district-created resources, (CB at a Glance, Professional Development, Professional Practices, Professional Resources, Professional Readings) that are referenced throughout the year-long New Teacher Orientation induction sessions facilitated by curriculum supervisors, program specialists, curriculum coordinators, assistant superintendents, and staff developers.

Content Included

In-Person Meetings The new teacher induction program is systematically organized as 3 August days and 5 after school sessions that take place from September - March. The 3 August days are an introduction to the district and curriculum resources. The 5 after school sessions during the year give new teachers an opportunity to dig deeper into best instructional practices to support the academic and social needs of students. These sessions are facilitated by staff developers, program specialists, curriculum supervisors, curriculum coordinators and assistant superintendents. •New teachers are surveyed by the staff development department and curriculum supervisors re: needs/questions and staff development sessions are designed to fit those needs. Surveys are administered periodically throughout the year using Microsoft Forms. Results of surveys are kept by the staff development department in electronic and hard copy form. •All mentors regularly communicate with staff developers and program specialists to discuss how mentees are acclimating to the district expectations. There is ongoing support to mentors to share strategies and resources to help mentees succeed in Central Bucks. •Staff developers, curriculum supervisors, instructional coaches, and assistant superintendents review the induction process on a yearly basis to monitor, adjust, and evaluate the induction program.
