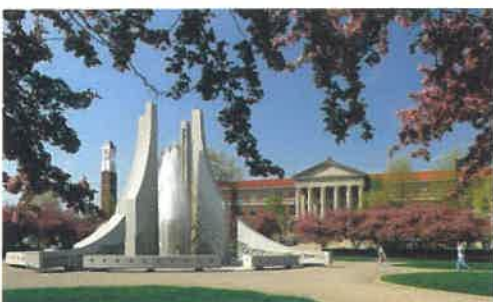


Purpose

The Purpose of the Hagan Scholarship is to provide each recipient with the opportunity to obtain a four-year college education and graduate debt-free. And, to provide each recipient with a practical understanding of important life skills not typically covered in the school curriculum.

Recipient Responsibilities

1. Must maintain a 3.25 CGPA and a four year or less graduation schedule.
2. Must earn fourteen credit hours each fall semester and thirty credit hours each academic year excluding summer school.
3. Graduate students must maintain a 3.50 CGPA and maintain their approved Graduation Schedule.

To be fair to all recipients we will not make exceptions to the Scholarship Criteria or to Deadlines.

Scholarship Particulars

1. The scholarship disbursement amount, up to \$7,500 each semester, will be determined by HSF by taking the Total Cost of Attendance including tuition, fees, room, board, books, supplies, personal and transportation costs; then deducting the total dollar amount of ALL scholarships, awards, grants, waivers, Federal and institution provided work study, and one-half of recipient's FAFSA SAI. Parents are not required to pay the SAI, it is used only to determine the disbursement amount.

2. The disbursement amount will be adjusted each semester to offset the expiration or loss of other scholarships, awards, grants, waivers, Federal or institution work-study, and changes in the recipient's FAFSA SAI.

3. The scholarship is renewable for up to seven additional consecutive semesters if the recipient fulfills the scholarship criteria and mandatory workshop responsibilities.

4. First year recipients will open a Personal Schwab Brokerage Account and receive \$2,000 prior to college enrollment to purchase essential items for college not covered by the scholarship such as a computer, printer, cell phone, clothing, bedding.

5. Second year recipients will be provided with an HSF Schwab Brokerage Account to manage until graduation. HSF funds managed by each recipient will be \$10,000 the second year, \$15,000 the third year, and \$20,000 the fourth year.

6. Third year recipients who achieve a 3.50 CGPA are eligible for an all-expense paid study and travel abroad experience worth up to \$8,000 or the funds can be used to study abroad for one semester.

7. Recipients must work 240 hours from January 1, until September 1, prior to the start of each academic year in college. Work must be regularly scheduled non-family employment performed under supervision for compensation.

8. Recipients graduating college while in the Hagan Scholarship Program can apply for a Hagan Graduate Scholarship, good for up to four additional consecutive semesters receiving up to \$7,500 each semester.

9. There is no application fee or processing fee.

How much is the Hagan Scholarship worth?

1. Undergraduate Scholarship: Up to \$60,000.
2. Graduate Scholarship: Up to \$30,000.

Other Benefits, Regardless of Financial Need:

1. Free Workshops to learn important life skills.
2. First Year: Personal Schwab Brokerage Account. \$2,000 to purchase essential items for college.
3. Second Year: \$10,000 HSF Schwab Account to manage.
4. Third Year: \$15,000 HSF Schwab Account to manage. Up to \$8,000 to Study/Travel abroad.
5. Fourth Year: \$20,000 HSF Schwab Account to manage.
6. After Graduation from college: Recipients will receive all gains in their managed HSF Schwab Accounts up to \$10,000, and a Graduation Package including a Certificate of Achievement. Walnut Plaques will be awarded to recipients for exceptional achievement.

Is this a need-based or merit-based scholarship?
BOTH. Applicants must authenticate genuine financial need in order to attend college. Recipients are selected based upon academic ability, personal goals, and achievements in and out of school.

Why do you have mandatory workshops?
To help recipients obtain a practical understanding of important life skills not typically covered in the school curriculum.

Why are recipients required to work?
The Grantor worked during high school and college and believes each recipient will personally benefit by contributing to the cost of his or her education.
