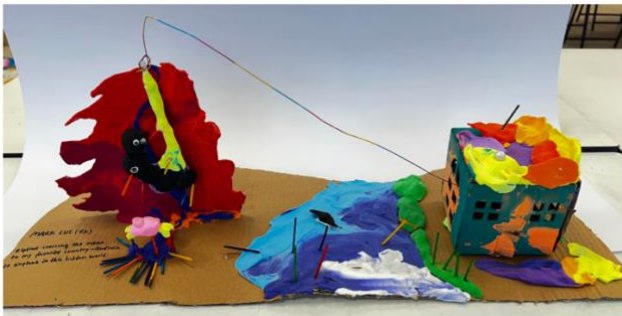

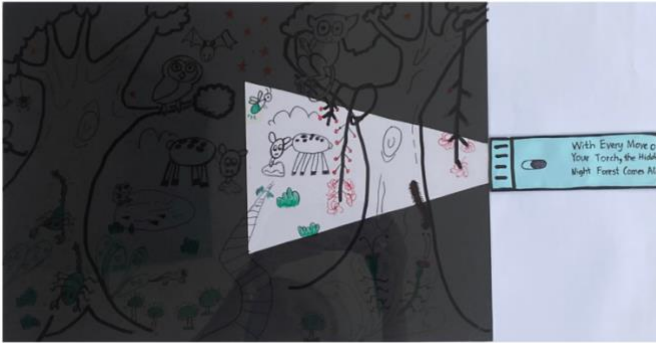

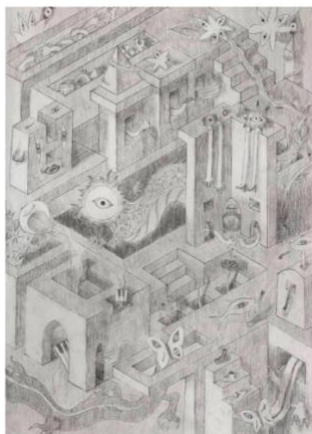

This acrylic painting (40x70cm canvas) represents the divide between poverty and wealth, where people who grow up in disadvantaged communities can only view the bright city lights as a "hidden world". The child represents a longing for different circumstances, as she looks into a part of the city that she cannot access.

I want viewers to empathise with the figure in my artwork, as they confront the reality of how so many cities are divided into different hierarchies of class. Those living in poverty never get to experience the wealth and promise of their city, whilst those that do will never experience the longing of those in poverty. I hope this artwork can encourage people to help those in need by reducing the hidden world of disadvantaged living.
