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## **Construction continues to move forward by Jackson Yoho**

The construction on the new school building is steadily moving forward, bringing the students closer to a long anticipated improvement in learning space. The school, which will help all grades, is a major investment in modern classrooms, expanded facilities, and a bigger area for students and teachers.

Construction of the new Crestview Local School District school building remains on track, with students in grades 5-12 expected to move into the facility in January 2027, at the start of the second semester next school year.

Timothy Pancake, the middle school principal, says that the winter weather has had no effect on the builders. Although harsh conditions can typically slow construction, crews were able to get the building fully enclosed before the area's major January snowstorm.

"Normally, bad weather would affect a project like this," Pancake said. "But because the entire structure is under a roof, they're able to complete the majority of the work inside."

Construction continues regardless of the school calendar. Even when students are not in school, crews remain active on site.

"If you drive by on a Saturday or Sunday, you'll still see workers here," Pancake explained.

The school is being made through the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission, which oversees the state's role, while Hammond Construction of Canton serves as construction manager and hires subcontractors for the work.

Staffing levels vary by day, with roughly 100 to 300 workers on site depending on what phase of construction is underway.

The preschool and kindergarten wing is among the closest to being done, while down near the high school parts, it isn't as close to being finished.

"That area already has paint on the walls and classroom doors installed," Pancake said. "If you move toward the high school side, some sections aren't painted yet and doors may still be going in."

Plans for moving students into the new school are still being finished. Administrators say that moving will be key to ensuring a smooth transition into the new school.

"It's going to take a lot of teamwork and planning," the representative said. "Our goal is to make the move as seamless and smooth as possible for everyone involved."

As work continues across multiple sections of the building, district leaders remain focused not only on finishing construction but also on ensuring a smooth transition for students and staff. Pancake says the goal is simple: to open the doors for grades 5-12 in 2027 with minimal disruption and to provide a modern, welcoming environment ready for learning.

It is a 5.5 mile parade in Pasadena, California. As of 2026, this is the 137th time the Rose Bowl Parade has happened. It started in 1890 as a way to showcase the area's mild winter weather and blooming flowers to contrast with the snowy East Coast. The introduction of band directors marching and playing music was

introduced in 2022, created in memory of the band director from Pickerington, Ohio who passed away, and he loved service through music for other people, hence the music that is played at the parade. 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## **A history of our current building by Adelyn Hutmacher**

With the construction of the new Crestview school building going on, a brief history of our school and the district is only logical to say goodbye to the current building.

The district has had many students, staff, and parents walk through its doors throughout the years. Originally, Crestview Local was two different districts: Fairfield Consolidated School District and New Waterford School District. The two districts were made up of 17 different one-room schoolhouses, 10 for Fairfield and 7 for New Waterford. The two districts merged in 1961 and brought their one-room school houses together. But the district wasn't renamed to Crestview Local until the new high school opened two years later in 1963. At the time, the elementary was in an old New Waterford building and the middle school was in an old Fairfield building.

John Dilling was a superintendent working in the district; he started in 1998 and retired in 2016.

Dilling states, "Part of the reason that the construction of the current building was necessary was that the New Waterford and Fairfield buildings were multi-story and were not handicap accessible. They also both had asbestos and lead pipes."

The construction of the current buildings started in 1992 and ended in 1994. The high school and elementary school moved into the two current buildings and the middle school moved into the 1963 building. According to Dilling, the building underwent a number of repairs and changes such as a new roof, added air conditioning, new electrical wiring, new heaters, security cameras, more secure entrances, and new boilers. The Performing Arts Center, bus garage, and athletic facilities were added as well.

The middle school being in use during the building process was also a large issue: Dilling says, "I wasn't part of the construction process at Crestview for the buildings, but I would think building around the current middle school while it was still an active building and managing the schedule would be a challenge"

Despite the difficulty in communication, Dilling said there were meetings once every other week to keep up with updates on progress.

With the new building being built and our current building about to be torn down, it's important to remember the history of our schools and the district.
