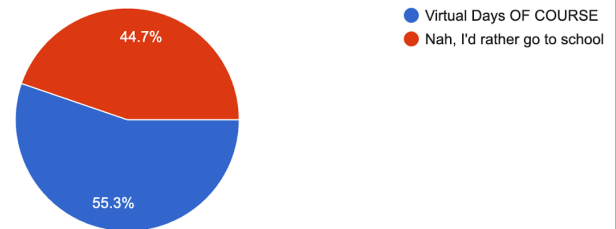

PR's Stock Market Club *Teaching Real-World Financial Skills*

Have you ever heard people talking about stocks, investing, or “the market” and wondered what it all means? PR’s Stock Market Club is helping students answer those questions while building financial skills that will last a lifetime.

The club meets once a month after school, and students discuss market trends and track real-world companies. Members participate in stock-market simulations, research publicly traded companies, study investing strategies, and track financial trends. The club promotes responsible money management, teamwork, analytical thinking, and communication skills. Activities include guest speakers, group competitions, and weekly market discussions.

Club sponsor Teacher Mrs. Kronk-Love said, “The Stock Market Club is a great way for students to learn about investing in the stock market through fun lessons and games at our meetings that are planned by our officers. We use a virtual stock exchange to trade in real time with the New York Stock Exchange (NYSE) prices. Students are given \$100,000 (of virtual money) to invest, and then we see who can make the most money in the fall and spring games.”

This year’s club officers are Brady Wilson, Brinda Kannan, Kara Wang, and Landon Russell. Officers lead discussions, guide activities, and bring in guest speakers annually to share professional insight.

“It helps people invest in the stock market and learn about the economy around the world,” said Kannan. “This club can come in handy with financial goals and understanding how the decisions they make today can impact the future.”

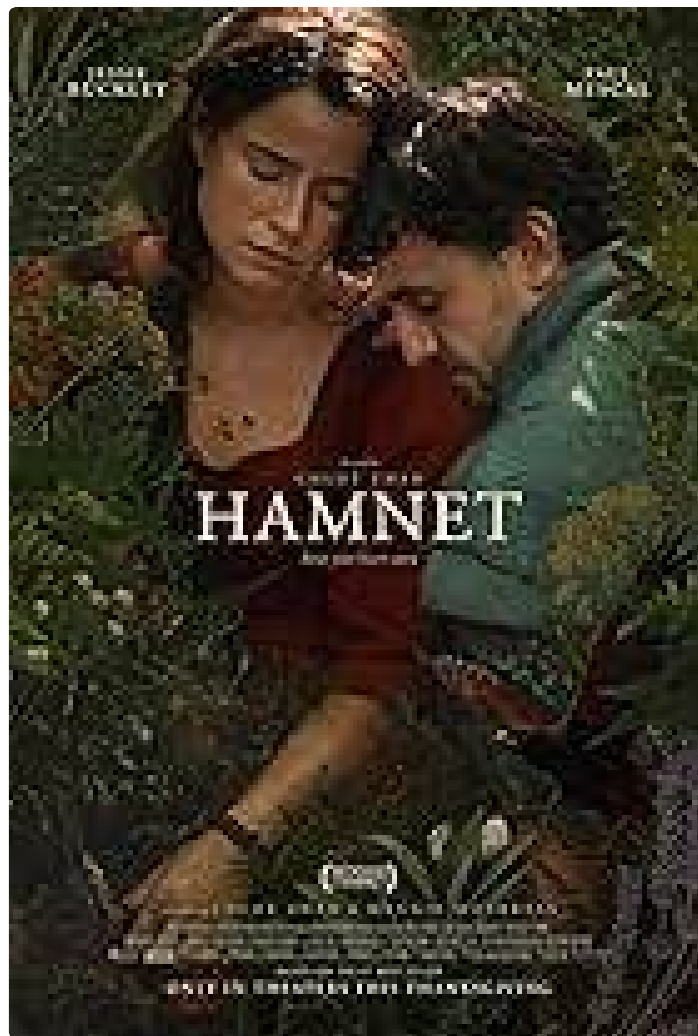
Shakespeare has troubles with his ideas and feels his plans are not good enough, which causes him to only sink further into his work in London far away from his family.

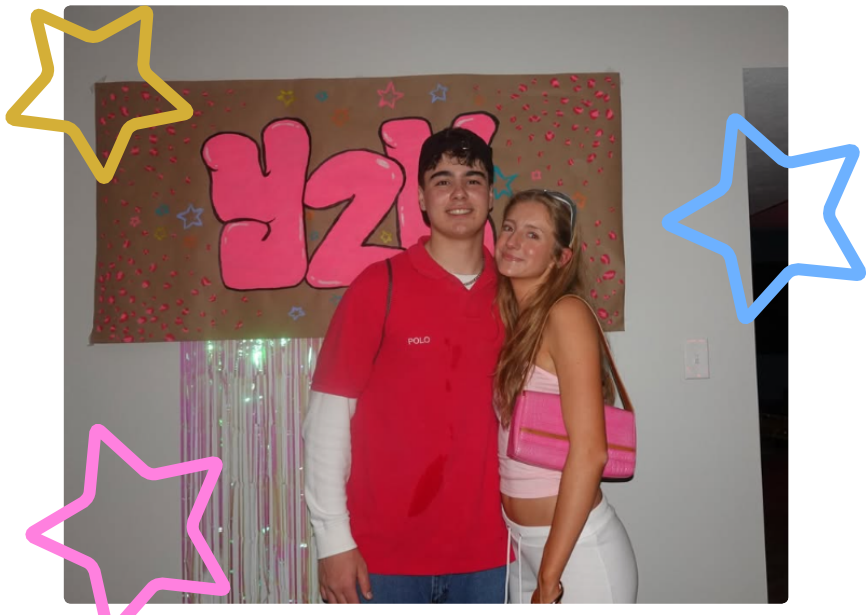
