WHAT IS A TITLE I SCHOOL?

A "Title I School" is a term used in the United States to describe a school that receives financial assistance under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. (ESEA)

WHAT DOES TITLE I FUNDING SUPPORT?

- Supplemental Instruction: Title I funds can be used to provide additional support to students in core subjects. This support includes hiring extra staff, offering tutoring or providing specialised resources.
- Professional Development: Title I funds can be utilized by schools to enhance the training of teachers and staff, helping them better meet the needs of their students.
- Parent and Family Engagement: Title I encourages parental involvement in education through various programs and activities within the school community.
- Extended Learning Opportunities: Title I Schools have the option to use funds for extended school day/year program, like summer school, aimed at academic support and advancement.

QUICK FACTS ABOUT TITLE I

- Title I funding reaches over half of all public schools in the United States
- The majority of Title I funds are directed toward students in grades K-6.
- There are over 50,000 Title I schools across the country.
- Title I allocates more than \$15 billion annually to schools.
