

Intro to Classical World: Empires and Ideologies

ENDURING UNDERSTANDINGS

Students will understand that...

- knowledge of culture drives meaningful communication.
- language and communication are at the heart of the human experience.
- the perspectives, practices and products of a people define their culture.
- culture and language are interrelated and influence how people behave.
- culture and language evolve and are influenced by people, time and place.
- analyzing texts for structure, purpose, and viewpoint allows a reader to gain insight and strengthen understanding.
- world language learning offers opportunities to uncover big ideas in and about other disciplines.

ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS

- Is democracy always the best way to govern?
- Is philosophy still relevant today?
- How should we judge the values of the past?
- How does knowledge of the past change the way we see the future?

Acquisition

Students will know...

- *basic grammatical terms, including parts of speech.*
- *that Socrates argued for free thinking in a traditionalist society.*
- *that the accusers of Socrates had political motivations.*
- *that philosophy, art, science, drama and medicine were greatly influenced by Greek thinkers and writers.*
- *that Greek culture greatly impacted Roman*

Students will be skilled at...

- identifying some common products and practices of cultures:
 - identifying some common products related to home and community life of other cultures and their own.
 - identifying some common practices related to home and community life of other cultures and their own
- identifying some basic cultural beliefs and values:
