## Criminal Justice 1 A-G 2025-2026

### COURSE DESCRIPTION

As a student in our public service program, you will receive an overview of the eligibility and training standards required for various professions within the criminal justice system and examine the roles of the three major institutions: law enforcement, courts, corrections, and the juvenile justice system. You will learn the history, purpose, and structure of the criminal justice system as well as the major issues facing criminal justice today. You will gain practical experience in the area of law enforcement communications, arrest and patrol strategies, fundamentals of report writing, victimology, and learn procedures regarding police and the Constitution. The curriculum for this course includes very important 21st century job skills, such as effective communication, critical thinking, creativity, and collaboration that have been identified as foundational to success at school and at work. Learn to earn an industry-recognized certification. The curriculum in the introductory course provides you with the knowledge and skills you will need to be successful in the Advanced Criminal Justice course. In addition, these criminal justice courses provide students with foundational knowledge and skills as a precursor to post-secondary opportunities that may include certifications such as those required by the Bureau of Security and Investigative Services (BSIS), California Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST), enrollment in a law enforcement academy, or an Associate Degree in Criminal Justice at a community college, or a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Law Enforcement Administration or Criminal Justice from a four-year college or university.

## A-G Approved Key Assignments

1.	<b>Courtroom Role Play:</b> Students will engage in a courtroom role play activity, all students will be assigned an individual role i.e., judge, bailiff, defense attorney, prosecutor, defendant(s), jury, witnesses, expert witness, and character witness. This activity will take place twice using two different court scenarios thus allowing students to engage in more than one role. All students will be provided a general synopsis of the court case after which students will have to analyze and research the specifications of the case and develop a one to two-page report on their role as it pertains to this case. Students will turn this paper in, it will be reviewed by the instructor and once they are approved for validity the role play of the court will begin. Individuals will be required to collaborate with necessary students for example, the prosecutor will work with expert witness, the defense attorney will collaborate with the defendant, the judge will work with the bailiff and jury all of which will reinforce the interconnectedness of each person within a court case. At the conclusion of the role play all students will evaluate and share out their questions, concerns, and suggestions as it pertains to the case and how it was enacted. Students will gain knowledge of the courtroom procedure process step by step. <i>Unit(s) 8</i>
2.	<b>Juvenile Infractions:</b> Students will be assigned to groups of 3-5 students, each individual student within the group will research (using scholarly journals, news articles, and other academic and non-fictional literary sources) a specific typical juvenile infraction (each student within the group will have a different infraction assigned to them). Students will use the information gathered from their research to develop a 3-4-page research paper informing, explaining, and describing the specific juvenile infraction as well as the consequences of the offense. Once the research has been conducted and the research paper has been complete each student within the group will present the information to the other students within their group. After each student has presented their information, the group will be tasked with developing a short 2- 3-minute public advisory video with a target audience of other juveniles. The focus of the video will be to bring awareness to the consequences associated to typical juvenile infractions. Students will further their analytical reading skills, expository writing, oral communication as well as engage in the use of technology for the purpose of communicating to others. <i>Unit(s) 9</i>
3.	<b>Penal Code Research:</b> Students will identify and research a current penal code. Students will use the research to write a paper with 3 components: describe the law, its history, and purpose; articulate why the law is or was important; and present proposed modifications to the law while justifying the purpose for the modifications. Students will then use the content of the paper to develop a multimedia presentation addressing all three components of the paper and present the information to the class. Students in the class will be required to pose questions and or present arguments against the presenting student's position. Students will gain an in depth understanding of penal code as well as how and why it is written while engaging in critical thinking skills demonstrating how current systems can be improved upon. <i>Unit(s) 10</i>
4.	<b>Professionalism and Ethics:</b> Students will research and analyze current events and court cases where the ethics of professionals in the criminal justice field have been questioned. Students will develop arguments both supporting and refuting the claim, that the given professional violated his or her ethical responsibility. These arguments will first be developed in a short essay wherein students reference the law to support their claim. After each argument has been developed, students will be placed in small groups where they will have to present their argument supporting the claim the criminal justice professional had violated the code of ethics. After which the groups will be reassigned and each student in the group will present their argument in opposition to the claim the criminal justice professional violated the code of ethics. Students will build upon their analytical and critical thinking skills through comparing and contrasting viewpoints of real-life situations. Students will first develop their argument through writing and then articulate it orally. <i>Unit(s) 11, 18</i>

5.	<b>Law Enforcement Notetaking and Report Writing:</b> Students will research how to write crime scene reports, students will apply their knowledge at a mock crime scene. Students will write a report for each of the crime scene investigations they conduct. The teacher will read a description of a crime scene, show a video or set up a mock scene on campus. Crime scene(s) would include the following: robbery, burglary, theft, vehicle theft, battery, and vandalism. The students will ask questions of witnesses, take pictures, notes and fill out a complete report detailing the event. After students have filled out the report other students will critique each other's reports, paying particular attention to detail and evaluation of data. Through this assignment students will apply what they have learned about report writing as well as evaluate other students understanding and application of the process. <i>Unit(s) 12,13</i>
6.	<b>Search and Seizure:</b> Students will be assigned mock scenarios wherein they will play the role of a law enforcement officer, students will assess the situation and demonstrating their knowledge of the prerequisites required before a search can be lawful. Specifically, students will identify if there is probable cause to search the suspect in question. After which the class will discuss each scenario and determine if the assigned student was correct in their determination or if they were wrong and why. Students will then be assigned to groups and tasked with developing a 1 - 3-minute video clip identifying when it is legal and when it is not legal to search a suspect. Through this assignment students will learn the basic principles of searching suspects, while further developing their analytical, oral communication, and technology skills. <i>Unit(s) 14</i>
