After graduating from Wood in 1970, Herb attended Dartmouth College. There he was co-captain of the football team, and graduated in 1974 with a degree in English Literature. Herb spent the next five years in sales, traveling around the country. He began working as a manager for a commercial diving company in Alaska. Herb used this time to travel and enjoy the beauty of Alaska until he decided to go graduate school. After graduating from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business in 1981 with his MBA in Business Administration, he worked as an institutional broker with First Boston. Eventually, he left his position with First Boston to run his own company that sold and serviced printing presses.

In 1998, Herb was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease. Since then, Herb has tirelessly worked in support of the Parkinson's community. He has been on the board of the Parkinson's Council of Philadelphia. Herb has also participated in numerous fundraising activities for the Council, including receiving the top fundraiser honor for Walk to Stamp Out Parkinson's for the past four years. Besides his work with the Parkinson's community, Herb was an assistant coach for the Moorestown freshman football team for four years, as well as a board member for the Moorestown Baseball Association. He is currently married to his wife Toni, and has three children: Amanda, Katie, and Jack.
