# Message from The Principal

Dear Parents and Carers,

As we reach the end of the Spring Term, I would like to take a moment to reflect on what has been a busy and successful term.

Firstly, I would like to congratulate all of our students for their continued hard work, resilience and positive attitude to learning. A particular mention must go to our Year 11 students, who have recently completed their second round of mock examinations. They have approached this important milestone with maturity and determination, and we are very proud of the effort they have shown as they prepare for their final examinations this summer.

Beyond the classroom, students have enjoyed a wide range of enriching opportunities. Highlights this term include visits to Dover Castle and participation in the University of Sussex Maths Workshop, both of which provided valuable learning experiences outside of school. Our STEM programme has also gone from strength to strength, with students engaging in a variety of exciting engineering activities.

We have also seen excellent participation in wider curriculum events, including the Year 10 Business Networking event, which gave students a real insight into the world of work. In sport, our students have represented the school with great pride in the KS4 rugby match, Cross-Country championships, and football and netball tournaments. Their teamwork, commitment and sportsmanship have been exemplary - well done and thank you!

While the Trust re-brokering process continues, we have remained firmly focused on improving the school environment for our students. We are pleased to share that refurbishment of the T Block toilets and PE changing rooms is currently underway. Over the Easter break, work will begin on transforming the library into a full-sized ICT suite alongside a newly modernised and comfortable library space. In addition, funding has been secured to develop a new Dance/Drama studio and a DT Graphics suite over the summer holidays - these developments will make a significant difference to our children's learning.

We will also shortly be introducing an ANPR parking system for the school car park. As you know, the car park is intended for staff and visitors only; however, a number of vehicles with no connection to the school have been regularly using the site. This has led to damage and, regrettably, occasions where staff supervising the area have experienced verbal abuse, which is completely unacceptable. Signage will be appearing soon, and I will write to you again with further details once the system is fully installed.

On a related note, while we always aim to work closely with parents and carers to resolve any concerns, we have seen an increase in a small number of communications that have caused upset to staff. We are committed to maintaining positive and respectful relationships within our community, and we kindly ask that all communication reflects this. I have attached a copy of our Parent and Visitor Code of Conduct for your reference.

Finally, I would like to thank all parents and carers for your ongoing support. We greatly appreciate the many positive messages we receive, and they mean a great deal to our staff. Please do remember to visit our Facebook page, where you can see a wide range of fantastic work and achievements from across the school.

## STEM morning at Southway

This term, our new STEM Leaders visited Southway Junior school to deliver an exciting STEM morning, inspiring younger pupils through a range of hands-on activities.

Pupils took part in a boat-building challenge, testing how many marbles their designs could hold before sinking, and explored chromatography through a fun "chromatography trolls" activity, separating colours using water.

They also investigated fingerprints using graphite and bioviewers, experimented with static electricity, and even built their own simple batteries to power an LED.

Our students were excellent STEM leaders, supporting the younger pupils with enthusiasm and confidence throughout the morning.

## Dover Castle

At the beginning of the month, we had the pleasure of taking our excellent Year 7 students to Dover Castle. The setting is both significant and truly breath taking. As we approached Dover, the sight of the castle standing proudly above the town and overlooking the English Channel left a lasting impression on everyone. We were fortunate to enjoy excellent weather on both days, which made the experience even more memorable.



During the visit, students explored one of the oldest churches in England and engaged with the siege exhibition, learning about King John's defence of the castle during the conflict with the barons before he was forced to agree to Magna Carta. The expert insights from staff members brought the history of the site to life, and it was clear that students were both engaged and curious throughout. I find that each visit offers something new. This time, I was particularly fascinated to learn that much of the graffiti in the Keep was carved by French prisoners of war in the 1700s, who used nails taken from the floorboards to etch their marks. In response, new floorboards were later installed using timber from decommissioned battleships, a detail that captured the imagination.



Our Year 7 students were a credit to the school. Their behaviour was excellent, and they approached the day with enthusiasm and maturity, making the trip a genuine pleasure to run. It has been a highlight of my year for two years running and my sincere thanks go to all the staff who supported the trip.

On Tuesday 24th March, a group of Year 11 students from The Burgess Hill Academy had the exciting opportunity to visit the University of Sussex for a full day of mathematics enrichment and university experience.

The day began with students travelling independently to the campus after morning registration, arriving ready to engage with a range of carefully planned sessions delivered by university staff. From the outset, students demonstrated excellent maturity and enthusiasm, representing the school with pride.



Throughout the day, students took part in a series of interactive workshops designed to stretch their mathematical thinking beyond the GCSE curriculum. These sessions introduced students to more advanced concepts, problem-solving strategies, and real-world applications of mathematics, helping to broaden their understanding of where maths can take them in the future.

One of the highlights of the day was the opportunity to experience learning in a university environment. ## Careers



The focus this term was on National Careers Week which took place during week commencing 2nd March. We started the week with a fantastic assembly to our Year 7 students from Sarah Crush of Thakeham Homes looking at all the careers involved in building homes from the planning and site purchase, all the way through to the sales and marketing teams – plus all the trades in between. Great to see such engagement and enthusiasm in answering the questions!

In tutorial, students in all year groups thought about their skills and hobbies and how these might translate into a future career. Staff displayed door plaques showing previous jobs and skills learnt in these jobs.

The main focus of the week however, was to help Year 10 students prepare for their upcoming work experience week in May. We had 38 business volunteers from a huge variety of industry sectors come into the academy to attend networking sessions with every Year 10 student. Whilst students were incredibly nervous on arrival in the hall at the start of their allocated session, it was fantastic to see them grow in confidence as they mastered the skills of communication. Students had some great interactions with the employers and a few students were even brave enough to enquire about work experience placements! Our Year 10 GCSE Engineering students had an inspiring session at the Gatwick STEM Centre with Tomorrow's Engineering. Firstly, an engineer from the team in America gave a presentation via Teams about the processes involved in creating an electric car. Students were then supplied with kits and in teams of 4, designed and built their own prototype electric car. Great teamwork and problem-solving skills were shown as students endeavoured to create a working prototype. A great example of careers in the curriculum!

We were also delighted to welcome Vicki from the Apprenticeships team at East Sussex College Group to explain what an apprenticeship is, qualification arising from them and how to find vacancies in an informative Year 10 assembly.

On Monday 9th March, 10 of our Year 10 girls attended the Tomorrow's Women conference at Burgess Hill Girls as part of International Women's Day where they heard from 4 inspiring women in leadership. All four speakers spoke about the importance of the contacts that you make and emphasised that communication is an important skill.

A group of Year 10 students attended an Employability Skills workshop with BHAFC where they completed a series of team building activities aimed at increasing their understanding of communication, problem-solving and leadership. This was followed by a virtual session with volunteers from American Express where we heard about their career journeys and had the opportunity to ask questions about their job roles and qualifications.



Finally, we were delighted to welcome Adam Virgo, (Ex-professional footballer, Sky Sports and TNT Sports Presenter) from the Love Local Jobs Foundation to introduce the Dare to Dream programme to our Year 8 students. A fantastic presentation on self-belief and resilience, looking at how to approach set-backs and use failure to help you go on to achieve your goals. A truly inspiring message.

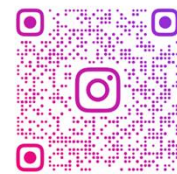

## Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme

The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme (<https://www.westsussex.gov.uk/education-children-and-families/support-for-families/holiday-activities-and-food-programme/>) provides children who are eligible for benefits related Free School Meals (FSM) access to a wide range of activities and free nutritious meals over the school holidays.

## Free School Meals (FSM)

### Is my child eligible?

Free school meals in all West Sussex maintained and free schools and academies are available to pupils in receipt of, or whose parents are in receipt of, one or more of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.
