Members who placed top 10 individually at the CDE were; Willow Ronneburg (2nd in Food Science), Addyson Rice (3rd in Horse Evaluation), followed by Rylen Frericks in 4th and Aleah Bebo in 5th, and Grace Lemmer (5th in Ag Mechanics). The Horse Evaluation team including Addyson Rice, Rylen Frericks, Aleah Bebo, and Tia Esser placed

1st overall in Horse Evaluation, and the Food Science team consisting of Mady-sen Morrissette, Hannah Schlechter, Octavia Paulsen, and Willow Ronneberg placed 3rd.

On Tuesday, Mar. 10th, Redfield FFA traveled to Huron to participate in the Heartland Classic CDE contest. The Horse Evaluation team placed 1st overall which allowed them to qualify for state. The team consisted of Addyson Rice, Rylen Frericks, Aleah Bebo, and Tia Esser.

On Tuesday, Mar. 17th, Redfield FFA traveled to Mellette to participate in the Northwestern district qualifying CDE. To qualify for state, teams in every con-

test need to place top 2 in their district. The Nursery Landscapes team, consisting of Kendyl Siebrecht, Ella Rude-Peterson, Charli Jungwirth, and Layla Hardie placed 3rd. The Food Science team placed 3rd in the CDE, but 2nd place in the district, qualifying for State FFA.

This year, 4 wrestlers qualified for the High School State Tournament. Two seniors, Conner Zens and Maddon Odland, freshman Kasey Hermann, and 8th grader Jace Edgar. Chace Odland qualified as an alternate. This year’s state tournament was held in Sioux Falls, on February 26-28.

Jace Edgar, wrestling at 106, won his first match against I. Folk, with a final score of 17-0. Advancing to the quarterfinal match he won again against K. Sundberg, final score 11-3. Moving into Friday, Edgar was defeated by B. Walker, 4-6, in his semifinal match. Later Edgar lost against, L. Frederick 2-5. Continuing to the final day, Edgar wrestled his final match and won against W. Hosman from M/H-H, 8-1, and placed 5th

in the tournament.
