This reception celebrates the Indigenous histories and living cultures that continue to shape Tulsa and the surrounding region. Council Oak Park marks the ceremonial grounds established in 1836 by members of the Locv Pokv (Lochapoka) tribal town of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation after their forced removal from Alabama. At this site overlooking the Arkansas River, they placed ashes from their ceremonial fires, rekindled a new fire, and began to rebuild their community and tribal government in Indian Territory. The settlement came to be known as Talasi, or “Old Town,” from which Tulsa later took its name. Creek Council Oak Park is often referred to as Tulsa’s first City Hall, and the site remained a gathering place for ceremonies, feasts, and games well into the late nineteenth century. The evening will feature local Native performers, offering participants an opportunity to experience the artistry, resilience, and enduring cultural presence of Native communities in Tulsa.

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This keynote will highlight how cities can advance multilingual learner success through language access, cross-sector collaboration, and equitable cradle-to-career strategies. Krystal Reyes, Tulsa’s Deputy Mayor, oversees the City’s education, youth, and resilience initiatives and helped launch Tulsa’s first Office of Children, Youth, and Families. As Tulsa’s former Chief Resilience Officer, Reyes led major equity efforts, including the Resilient Tulsa Strategy, the citywide language access policy, the Financial Empowerment Center, and the New Tulsans Welcoming Plan, all aimed at strengthening support for immigrant, refugee, and multilingual communities. She also helped establish the Commission on Youth Mental Health and expanded initiatives to embed equity across city services.

NOLA Public Schools will share lessons from launching a district-wide, two-year high school newcomer program designed for acceleration, language development, and on-track graduation for over-age and under-credited students. San Antonio Independent School District and ImmSchools will highlight a district–CBO model that provides embedded legal guidance, Know-Your-Rights education, preparedness training, emergency assistance, and educator PD to strengthen trust and reduce disruptions. 8:30 am – 9:35 am **A DISTRICT-UNIVERSITY PARTNERSHIP FOR SCIENCE AND LANGUAGE INTEGRATION** **TULSA (NORTH/CENTRAL)**

This session highlights a collaborative initiative between Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools and New York University designed to integrate science and language development for multilingual learners and all students. Presenters will share how district and university partners mapped the “mirror image” between contemporary science standards and English language development frameworks to co-develop professional learning modules and instructional briefs focused on argument as both a science and engineering practice and a key language use. The session will emphasize a shift from teaching the “language of science” to facilitating “language for science,” where students engage in sense-making and evidence-based claims. Participants will learn how cross-departmental collaboration between science and ELD teams can support grade-level rigor, how pedagogical shifts toward language-in-use can strengthen instruction, and how early evidence suggests increased teacher confidence and stronger multilingual learner engagement. The session will also explore how districts can leverage external expertise to equip non-ELD teachers with tools to position multilingual learners as capable scientists and meaning-makers.

This session highlights how districts create unified instructional systems that elevate literacy and language development. Tulsa Public Schools will describe collaboration among ELA, SLA, and ELD teams to align Tier I practices across monolingual and dual-language settings through joint professional learning and a coherent arc of leadership supports. St. Paul Public Schools will share how positioning ESL teachers at the center of the writing block—via co-teaching structures, PLC cycles focused on the language of writing, and analysis of student work—has

produced measurable gains, including increases in grade-level writing outcomes. Participants will examine structures and routines that raise instructional quality at scale.

This session explores how multilingual learners’ home-language skills can serve as assets for literacy growth in English. Jennifer Chard will share metalinguistic processes and concrete examples of how reading skills transfer across languages. Denver Public Schools will discuss translanguaging and Spanish–English transfer lessons developed from analysis of proficiency and reading/comprehension data, showing how targeted routines honor students’ linguistic resources, avoid over-translation, and support access to rigorous content. Participants will consider practical moves that build on learners’ existing knowledge to strengthen comprehension, writing, and confidence.

This session explores equity-driven systems that align resources and services for students with intersecting needs. Jefferson County Public Schools will detail a three-year collaboration between Multilingual Learners and Special Education that streamlined referrals, harmonized enrollment and placement, and established guidance for integrated ELD and specially designed instruction, including co-teaching and coordinated progress monitoring. Hillsborough County Public Schools will share how the BRIDGE/PUENTE family workshop series, multilingual communication systems, and culturally responsive engagement reframed families as essential partners and contributed to historic milestones for ELs, including improvements in graduation outcomes. Presenters will also introduce a new Companion Playbook designed to support English learners with disabilities—dually identified students—in dual language immersion programs. Participants will explore systems-level, evidence-based strategies that promote

access to high-quality dual language immersion, including inclusive placement, instructional coherence, and strategic resourcing.
