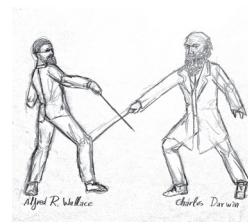

YouTube banned on school iPads

Students will have to search for a new way to be off task during their classes

In an effort to keep students on task, Bill Callahan, SPPS chief of operations officer, announced at the recent school board meeting on April 1st that YouTube will be permanently banned from school iPads starting April 30th.

YouTube, the most popular media hub, is being banned

mainly due to students' inability to effectively use the platform for school work, and not watch Minecraft videos or mukbangs. A district study shows that students doing work on their iPads spend around 60%-70% of their time on non-academic websites, like YouTube, during academic hours.

This is an issue that will

not only affect students, but teachers as well. Many teachers use Youtube for instructional purposes.

The Saint Paul School Board said in a formal statement, "YouTube is not an effective learning platform, and will be removed for the sake of teachers and students alike."

Reactions to this announcement have been

mixed.

"I won't be able to watch Minecraft- er, science videos on my iPad. Class is going to be so much worse," said 8th grader Willa Brandvik.

"This is a marvel. This will force my students to actually listen to my lectures, and do their work!" said English teacher Leo Bickelhaupt.

Knowing the student body,

they're going to find a work around. They might take advantage of integrated links in Schoology, or using the GUEST WiFi Network, which were concerns expressed at the same board meeting, though no solution was proposed.

Many teachers rely on YouTube to show academic videos, or to use as substitute teaching when absent. "I use

YouTube to play examples or ideas for experiments we can't do in house," said science teacher Rebecca Palmer.

Many people have different opinions about this topic, but at the end of the day, we're just going to have to see how it plays out on April 30th.

"It's definitely the dawn of a new era," said Principal Dave Gundale.

Due to uneven lunch lines, Principal Dave Gundale announced that the OWL cafeteria will be adopting a sit-down dining style similar to restaurants.

Instead of forming into two lines depending on a student's chosen food, students will proceed directly to sitting down at their lunch tables.

Each table will have QR codes for students to scan. They can enter their order on a Google form, including entree, milk option, and any salad bar items they like. There will even be a 'free response' section for students to make specific requests, and allergen boxes to ensure everyone's safety. Their completed tray will be delivered to their seat in 3-5 minutes, depending on the

business of the cafeteria.

"Our goal is to make lunch times more equal for everyone, and to bring an elevated dining experience to OWL," Principal Dave Gundale said when he announced the new program. It is also expected to decrease the amount of time students spend wandering around during lunches,

whiteboards, turning every book in the library spine-in, and rickrolling the school over the intercom every Wednesday.

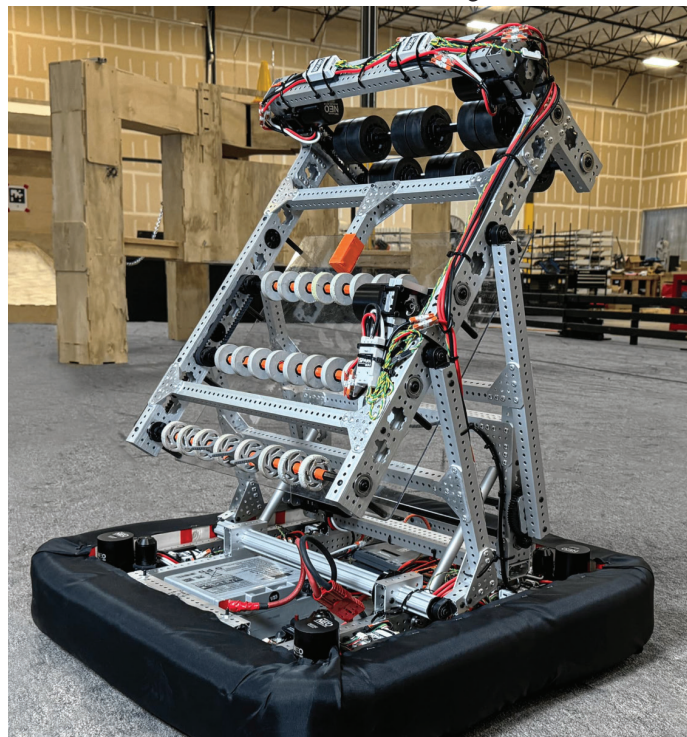
"We will not be stopping until our demands are met," said 11th grader Johnny Gorton, "either we get our gift cards and laser pointers, or we give the robot a

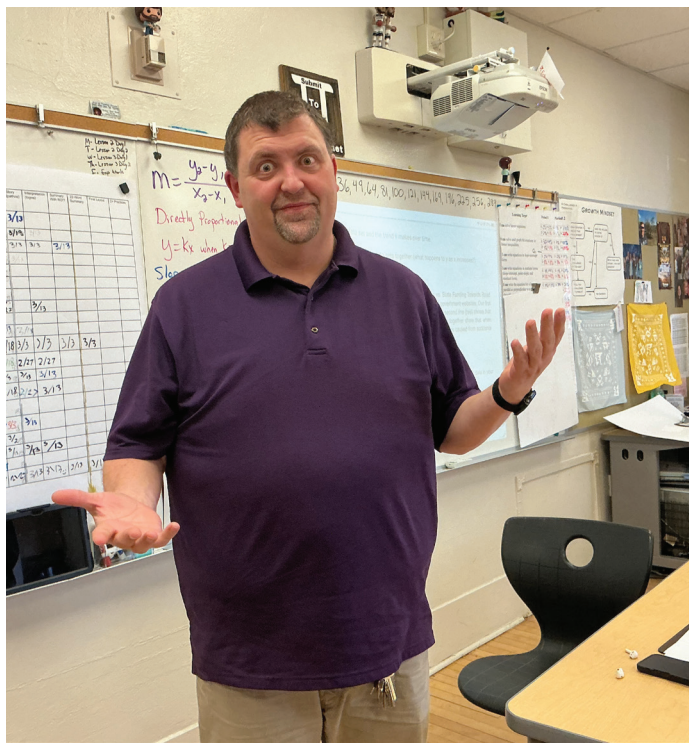
History Day is a competition across the country, accepting entries from students 6th-12th grade. Teachers are not allowed to write sections for their students, or compete in National History Day.

Smart pass will return to OWL

The controversial technology has been improved by AI

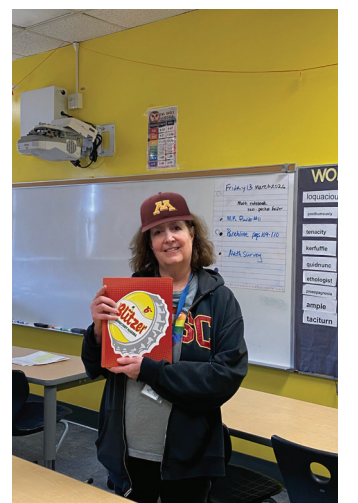
Whether Patti's allegiance will hold strong is still up in the air. “She could go either way, I guess. She's even said that she's considering

The change brought mixed responses from students and staff

Prompting mixed responses from students and teachers alike, the Saint Paul Public School District has decided that Humboldt High School and Open World Learning will be merging starting fall of 2026.

According to sources, in addition to the already-existent passage on the first floor of OWL, two new tunnels will be built on the first floor, to ensure efficient movement between buildings. Both schools currently have all the specialized rooms they need, like a gym, cafeteria and auditorium, so there will be double the amount of those rooms needed, but the school district doesn't seem all that concerned.

OWL gym and health

Not everyone is so enamored with the idea though. Spanish teacher Tim Leone-Getten disagreed with the decision, stating "OWL is so successful and unique because of its smaller size. Combining it with Humboldt will invalidate the community we've created here."

But the matter has been settled, and changes are set to be implemented regardless. For one, both schools already plan to extend passing time to ten minutes to accommodate the longer time it will take to move between the two buildings. Despite conflicting opinions, at press time, the integration is still set to happen.

Floods concern Saint Paul residents

Emergency actions are now ofishally underway to control flooding

Large-scale floods of the Mississippi River are endangering riverside life in Saint Paul. Purple Press reporters have been herring reports that rising waters are forcing people to abandon their homes in search of higher, drier, and betta ground. Roeboat teams have been deployed at the earliest opportunity to aid in evacuation efforts, and several other escapees have been pickereled up by helicodter. Residential plants and gardens have been turtley krilled, and offishes in the area have announced a return to a COVID style work from home format until the flooding subsides.

We've haddock season of extreme rainfall and snowfall, the likely cause of the flooding disaster. Warmer temperatures are now causing a lox of this snow to melt, the runoff flowing into the Mississippi, where (along with the rain) it causes exstream flooding. Krillions of gallons of water have entered the river this way, spurring the rising water level. What's moray, businesses known for shelling non-water-resistant goods like books have been encouraged to relocate their stock until water levels lower. The city government is putting together emergency actions to control flooding damages. Officials have gone on record stating that they have a "gilliant plan" to contain floodwaters. 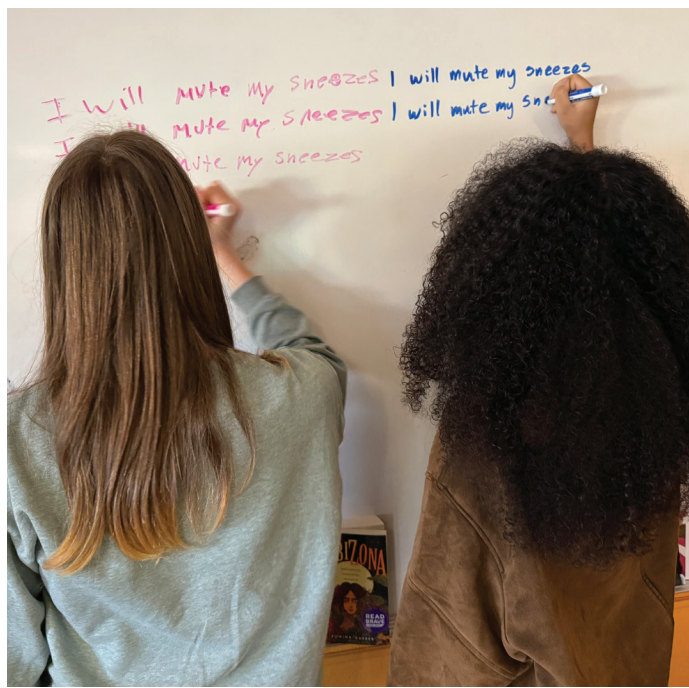

New law bans words in schools

In order to protect children in schools, the US Department of Education is completely banning reading, writing, and the written word on school grounds. Anything with words on it will no longer be allowed in any school, education building, or any public building that uses state or federal funding in all 50 states.

"The Department of Education and I believe that children should not be exposed to inappropriate content found in literature," said Secretary of Education Linda McMahon, "No child should ever have to be shown a hungry caterpillar that is a metaphor for capitalism. Reading is unsafe for children."

The law is coming into effect on April 1st,

2026. What this means for OWL is that the library will be closed, all ELA classes will not be discontinued, students will have to memorize all information and instruction because they can't write anything down, iPads will be taken back by the district because of the words on them that can be written and read, and phones will be put into bags and left at the office for the same reason. The Trump administration, after receiving criticism over this decision, started praising the President and refusing to answer any questions following the announcement.

Uniforms will be required at OWL

Starting in the 2026-2027 school year, everyone will dress the same

Principal Dave Gundale announced in the March 9th school-wide weekly email that starting in the 2026-2027 school year, Open World Learning is implementing a mandatory uniform policy. Many students have voiced their opinions and concerns over this decision, and Activism Club is currently organizing a protest in response.

"Several teachers have complained to me about not being able to keep their classrooms under control for years. In an effort to enforce a more professional environment, and improve our already strong sense of community at OWL, we will be enforcing a strict uniform policy starting next school

year. More details will come in the summer," said Dave in the weekly email, attached with pictures of what the uniforms will look like, black or khaki pants or skirt, and polos with the OWL logo on the breast pocket.

He mentioned in a brief paragraph that middle schoolers' polos will be blue and high schoolers' will be black. His reasoning for the separation is to establish to new high schoolers that they are held to different standards than they were in middle school.

Some students and teachers have displayed neutrality towards uniforms. "I mean, they don't look that bad," said sixth grader Trixie James. "If that's what it takes for me

to be able to teach, so be it," said Spanish teacher Abbie Currie.

But the majority of students and teachers have expressed displeasure with the announcement. "This is not OWL! OWL is all about how everyone can be themselves while still functioning as a community," said science teacher Megan Hall. Many students share Megan's sentiment. "If I wanted to be in a place where people told me what to wear, I would've moved to Russia!" said eighth grader Zelda James. "What next? Calling teachers Mr and Mrs? What about the they/thems!" said ninth grader Sam Sanchez.

The Gender and Sexuality Alliance also has concerns about the inclusivity

the uniforms will offer transgender and non-binary students. "School is one of the few places I can wear whatever I want without people interrogating me. I definitely think someone's clothing is an extension of their gender-expression," said eighth grader and GSA member Chester Treziok.

Activism Club is in the process of organizing a peaceful sit-in protest. Their plan is to only wear halloween costumes to school until Dave rescinds the uniform policy. Theater teacher Rebekah Rentzel has agreed to let protesters use any costumes not being used in the spring musical. Dave has refused to comment on the protest or his willingness to revoke the policy.

However, the PA announcement is only the first of a three-strike system imposed by the new SmartPass. 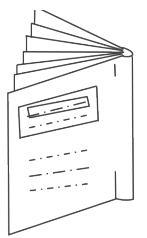

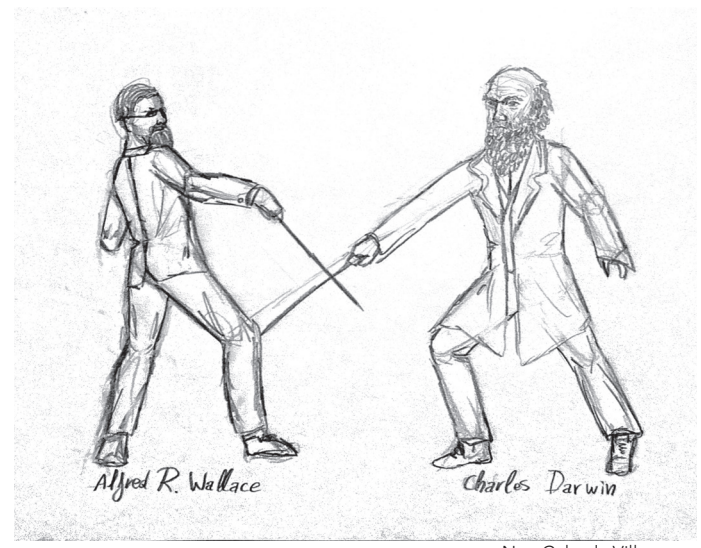

Each roll of the dice does something new. For example if you roll a four you will move up four spaces but if you roll a six you move up six spaces also rolling a five will move you five spaces instead.

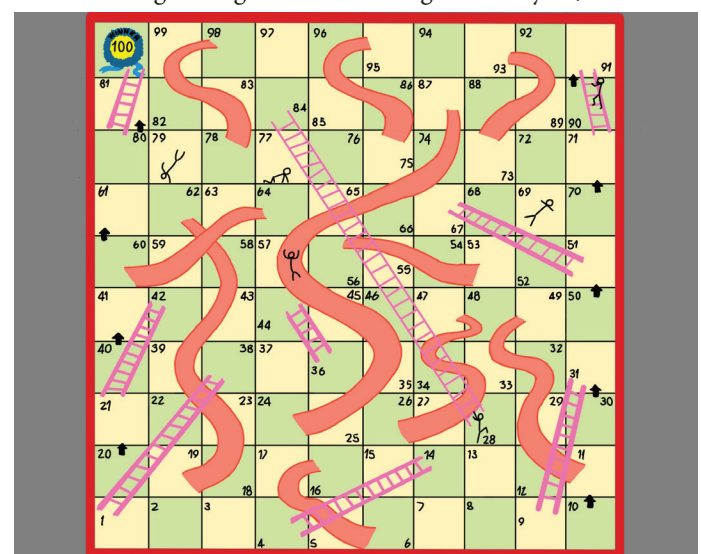
Even with all of these difficult things the game can
