 Manzanita Elementary School is a Transitional Kindergarten through 5th Grade Dual Language Immersion Magnet located in Covina, proudly serving the surrounding communities of Irwindale and unincorporated Covina. As part of the Covina-Valley Unified School District, Manzanita offers a balanced, standards-based curriculum that promotes academic excellence and equity for every student. Our dedicated teachers provide instruction aligned to the California State Standards in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies, supported by enrichment programs such as physical education, music, and the arts. We also offer after-school care and enrichment through Kids Korner and ASES to support the needs of our families.

## 2025-26 School Description and Mission Statement

Manzanita is home to the District's Dual Immersion Spanish/English 90:10 program, which grows each year and gradually transitions to a 50:50 model in upper grades. The goal of this program is to develop bilingual, biliterate, and multicultural citizens who continue their language learning through secondary school and ultimately earn the California State Seal of Biliteracy. Our instructional focus, developed through collaborative professional learning communities, centers on reading closely, making inferences, and citing evidence across subjects. In mathematics, students are supported in justifying their reasoning and communicating their thinking with clarity in both languages.

## School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Manzanita Elementary School was built in 1961, with portable buildings added in 1968, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, and 1999. Facilities are situated on 10 acres and span nearly 43,000 square feet. They consist of permanent and portable classrooms, a cafeteria, administrative offices, restrooms, a Library/Media Center, and storage rooms. The school has been completely modernized, including restrooms, classrooms and office buildings. All classrooms are equipped with state-of-the-art equipment and wireless internet connections. All classrooms are equipped with Lightspeed technology allowing each teacher to use a microphone while teaching. The modernization was completed in April 2007. The facility strongly supports teaching and learning through its ample classrooms and playground space.

Partnerships with community organizations such as Covina Sunrise Rotary, the Assistance League, Covina and Irwindale Libraries, DD's Discounts, Horace Mann, and the San Dimas Sheriff's Department further enhance learning opportunities and student well-being. Family participation has contributed to successful initiatives such as the schoolwide garden program, library access during the summer, parent education workshops, and the 100-Mile Running Club.

Throughout the year, Manzanita hosts a variety of events designed to strengthen home-school connections and celebrate our dual language and multicultural community. Families actively engage in Back-to-School Night, Día de los Muertos Altar and Family Festival, Art Gallery Night, Student Showcases, and Parent Education Nights. Communication is ongoing through newsletters, phone messages, and digital platforms to keep families informed and involved. Parents are encouraged and celebrated for volunteering in classrooms and school activities. Their partnership and input help shape a vibrant, inclusive learning environment that supports the success and belonging of every student.

## 2025-26 School Safety Plan

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern at every school throughout the District. Each school complies with laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire and disaster drills are conducted regularly throughout the school year. Each school annually participates in the "Great California ShakeOut". The school's Safe School Plans are reviewed annually by a law enforcement officer. Our document is "fluid" and updates are completed as needed. For example, updates are completed if a school discipline policy is added or modified, changes are made to the campus map, additions and/or modifications are made to the telephone trees, etc. All visitors must check in at the school office, check in using our Raptor system and wear a visitor badge while on school grounds. During lunch, recesses, and before and after school, staff members supervise students and school grounds, including the cafeteria and playgrounds, to ensure a safe and orderly environment. The Comprehensive School Safety Plan was developed by administrators, other school staff members, and Los Angeles County Office of Education staff members. It is reviewed, approved, and evaluated by the School Site Council in cooperation with local law enforcement in order to comply with Senate Bill 187 of 1997. The plan provides students and staff a means to ensure a safe and orderly learning environment. Components of the Comprehensive School Safety Plan include the following: child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe ingress and egress from school, sexual harassment policy, and suspension and expulsion policies. The plan is reviewed annually with school staff. An updated copy is available to the public at the school and District Office.
