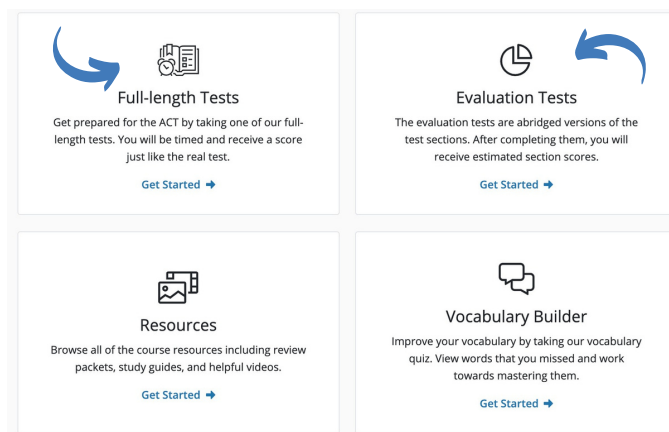

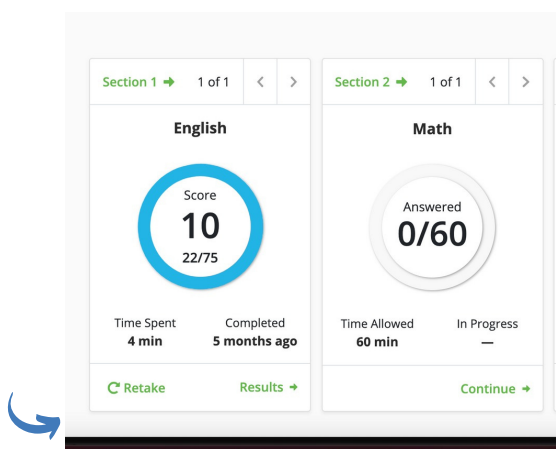


Exploring Methodize

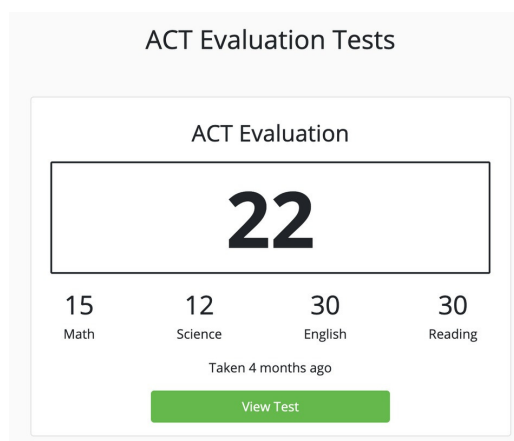
There are four other boxes on your Methodize home page, which you will find highly valuable. The box labelled **Full-Length Tests** houses two full-length ACT or SAT practice exams (depending on the course). These exams are structured exactly like the tests you will be taking on your official exam day. They are designed to help you understand what you can expect on the day you take your proctored exam. *Full-length practice tests are the best practice you can do for the ACT and SAT.*



After you have taken your exams, you will receive a predicted score, and have a chance to review all of your answers and to see explanations of the right answers as well as valuable strategy tips that will help you when you see similar questions on the real tests.



If you don't have the time to do a full-length test, or if you are just beginning your preparation and want a "baseline score", or if you can't decide whether you would rather take the ACT or SAT, you should use the **Evaluation Tests**. These are short, timed exams that allow you to identify your initial strengths and weaknesses so that you can focus on the areas you need to improve.

Assessing Your Progress In Methodize

With Methodize, it is simple to see where you stand and how far you have to go. When logging into your **Dashboard**, you can see that there is a large green percentage completion meter located at the top right on your screen.

Below your percentage tracker you will see clickable boxes labeled units, lessons and quizzes.

Units are organized with **Lessons** that cover various subjects, and every lesson has at least one multi-question **Quiz**. When you complete a lesson, you will see a green checkmark so that you will be able to see immediate feedback on your progress through the program. In order for a green check mark to appear, you will need to mark the lesson as read and answer all of your quiz questions.

Clicking on the lesson, listed in the units or lessons section will allow you to review it again for comprehension, or to simply refresh your memory on the strategies needed to successfully complete each lesson and quiz.

On top of any Methodize page, you will see a horizontal percentage bar, which shows you the total percentage of Methodize you have completed.

ACT and SAT Glossary

Accommodation	An adjustment in testing conditions to enable students with disabilities to take a standardized test. Examples: having the questions read out loud (for visually impaired students); use of a computer for the essay (dysgraphia), 50% or 100% extended time to complete the test (documented ADD/ADHD, executive function, working memory impairments). While the testing conditions for students taking the test with accommodations may be different, the test questions and scoring system are the same.
Answer Choices	On a multiple-choice question, there will be four answer options lettered A, B, C, and D (ACT Math questions have five answer choices). Only one of these will be correct. The incorrect answer choices may represent common errors and can be very tempting!
ACT.Inc.	ACT is both the name of a standardized test for high school students and the name of the
College Board	company that produces the test. ACT.Inc. publishes other tests, like WorkKeys, Pre-ACT, and ASPIRE.
Composite Score	The College Board is the name of the company that produces the SAT, the PSAT, and Advanced Placement tests. A composite score (in this case, for the ACT), is the (rounded) average of the scores on each individual section of the test. If a student scored a 32 on Reading, a 22 on Math, a 36 on English and a 13 on Science, the composite score would be 26.
National Merit Scholarship	A scholarship given out based on PSAT scores, outstanding academic achievements, leadership abilities and extracurricular activities. Qualifying scores vary by state.
No Guessing Penalty	On the ACT and SAT, you only earn points for the questions you answer correctly, and do not lose points for wrong answers. So go ahead and give your best answer to every question—there's no advantage to leaving them blank.
Percentile Rank	Percentile ranks provide a way for you to compare your scores to those of other students. Percentile ranks are reported based on the total group of test-takers in the US. The number can range from 1 to 99, and indicates the percentage of test-takers who achieved an equal or lower score than yours. For instance, a percentile rank of 86 means that 86 percent of test-takers achieved a score at or below your score. A percentile rank of 52 means that 52 percent of test-takers attained scores at or below your score.
Pre-ACT	The PreACT is mostly a practice version of the ACT, but it could help connect you with colleges and scholarships. The PreACT is typically taken in 9th or 10th grade and will help you predict your score on the ACT after an additional year of learning. Your performance on the
Proctor	PreACT will help you make a plan for reaching your goal ACT score. A proctor, also called a test room supervisor or a test center supervisor, is an adult in your test room to help make sure that the administration goes well. The proctor helps hand out and collect materials, check admission tickets, and make sure the room is quiet. The proctor also helps monitor test-takers to ensure no one has an unfair advantage. You may also see proctors helping test-takers at check-in or in the hallways during testing and breaks, to make sure that everyone gets where they need to go and that these areas are quiet.



ACT and SAT Glossary

PSAT

The PSAT/NMSQT is the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The PSAT is a great primer for the SAT, and even the ACT, but it's more than just a trial run. PSAT scores are used to identify National Merit Scholars and award merit scholarships. This test is structured exactly the same as the SAT, however it is shorter and is missing the hardest elements of the SAT. Most likely students would take this as 10th or 11th graders.

QAS

QAS is a service for the SAT. The acronym stands for "Question and Answer Service" and means that a copy of the test, the answers, and the scoring sheets are sent back to the test takers. This is only available for 3 test dates a year. If possible, students should try to make their first SAT be a QAS test, as it will help them review their scores more thoroughly.

Raw Score

Your raw score is simply the number of questions you got correct out of the total number of questions. If there are 40 questions on a test and you got 28 correct, your raw score is 28.

Scaled Score

Your raw score will be translated into a scaled score that takes into account things like the difficulty of the questions on this administration of the test versus another administration. When you take a standardized test, there are two types of scores you may see: the raw score (number of questions you got correct out of the overall number of questions) and the scaled score, which is the translation of your raw score into a different numerical format that takes into account the difficulty of the questions and the performance of your peers. Your scaled score will be 200-800 for each section.

Score Report

A breakdown of your score for each area of the ACT or SAT. You'll see your total score and then your section scores, percentiles, benchmarks, cross-test scores and subscores so you can evaluate your performance on your test. Besides helping you see how you did, the score report will also contextualize your score so that you know how you compare to all test-takers.

Student Produced Response

An SAT-only question type that simulates a more natural math test-taking experience by offering questions outside the multiple-choice format. Also known as "Grid-ins", on these questions you have to come up with your own response (they are NOT multiple-choice).

Subscore

Your score report will include a number of scores, including test scores (for the Math, Reading, and Writing and Language Tests), cross-test scores (like Analysis in Science, which is a skill covered across sections), and subscores (like Expression of Ideas, which is a skill tested within one section).

Superscore

Superscoring entails taking your highest score for each section of the test across all your test sittings and using the highest section scores to calculate your final score (SAT) or composite score (ACT). Generally colleges will do this automatically when you apply.

TIR

TIR is a service for the ACT. The acronym stands for Test Information Release, and means that a copy of the test, the answers and the scoring sheets are sent back to test takers. This is only available for 3 test dates a year. If possible, students should try to make their first ACT be a TIR test, as it will help them review their scores more thoroughly.
