Board President Cobb called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. There were five (5) people in attendance. Board Member Hogan was absent from the meeting.

PUBLIC COMMENT

At this time, the public may speak to the Governing Board on topics of concern with the public body's jurisdiction, even if the topic is not specifically included on the agenda. The public must state their full name for the record and will be allowed up to three minutes to address the Governing Board. No action will be taken as a result of public comments. The Board expects that citizens who address the board will present concerns regarding the activities in question rather than make personal attacks upon Board Members, District Personnel or other persons in attendance or absent. In addition, questions or comments on matters that are currently under legal review will not be accepted.

5. Public Comment.

Gloria Etter thanked the Governing Board for hiring her last August and shared that she has truly enjoyed driving the bus. She reported that Bus 100 is currently down due to the air conditioner going out, and Bus 102 is also out of service because of air conditioning issues. As a result, the District is running short on available buses.

Troy Heaton explained that the District has been experiencing difficulties getting warranty work completed and that he plans to make additional calls tomorrow to address the issue. He also noted that in a previous year, nearly the entire maintenance budget was spent in a single quarter due to bus repairs.

Ed Dickie reviewed the Student Activity balance, followed by the Food Service financial report and a budget update.

Board Member Johnson asked questions regarding the State Projects noted in the budget update. Each state project was explained.

Mr. Dickie then reviewed the maintenance report.

Mr. Heaton noted that toward the end of the fiscal year the District stops issuing purchase orders. Board Member Johnson asked whether the District must have a contract in place or if someone



the District knows could volunteer to complete work. Mr. Heaton explained that procurement law typically requires a bid process. Board Member Johnson clarified that she was referring to someone doing the work for free. Mr. Heaton responded that if the work is truly volunteered at no cost, that would be acceptable.

Mr. Heaton also explained that in Arizona there is a preferred vendor list through the state. If the District purchases through a vendor on that list, a bid is not required. However, if purchasing from a vendor such as Walmart, the District must obtain three bids. Board Member Johnson commented that when she looks at the list, she believes there may be people who would be willing to come and fix some items for free.

Mr. Dickie added that once the Board approves placing the buses up for auction, the District will proceed with the process.

Dr. Rob Robertson introduced himself and shared that he has been working with the District since the 2018–2019 school year in various capacities. He stated that he is thrilled to be back and has decided to make this community his home. He also mentioned that Darlene McCauley has been a long-time friend. Mr. Heaton noted that in Arizona, a principal is not required to hold an administrative certificate to serve in that role.

Board President Cobb shared that he had been asked to serve as a judge for the upcoming talent show but noted that three Governing Board members cannot serve as judges. He said he would ask someone from the fire department or the sheriff's office to serve as the other judge. Board Member Johnson volunteered to be a judge as well.

Board Secretary Hogan noted that the Teacher Appreciation Lunch will be held on May 7th. He added that he plans to begin preparations around 9:00 a.m. and welcomed anyone who would like to help. Mrs. Goessman said she could post an agenda to allow the Board to help.

Mr. Heaton reviewed the events calendar and noted that most of the month will be focused on student testing. He also mentioned that the auto body shop students will be attending an upcoming competition. Board Secretary Hogan added that there is a strong possibility that three students could receive full-ride scholarships. Mr. Heaton also shared that Spirit Week will be held within the next two weeks.

Mr. Heaton then reviewed the student testing data, beginning with the elementary school results from last year. He noted that English Language Arts (ELA) scores improved, while math scores have remained stagnant over the past two to three years. He explained that the current year's testing data will not be available until next year. Mr. Heaton had originally planned to have Dr. Rob work on a literacy grant, but the District did not qualify for the grant.

Mr. Heaton then reviewed the high school data. He noted that ELA scores have been gradually improving, while math scores dropped significantly last year. He stated that the District will be setting school-wide goals within the next month, with a primary focus on improving reading and writing.

Board Member Johnson asked what math programs are currently being used. Dr. Rob explained that the elementary school uses Into Math, which is literacy-based, and that some teachers feel the material can be above the students' level. Board Member Johnson asked whether there are any computer-based programs in use. Dr. Rob explained that MobyMax is used as a supplemental math program.

Board President Cobb emphasized the importance of maintaining a balanced focus across subject areas. Troy noted that when Karen first joined the Board, she expressed interest in implementing tutoring. The District was able to establish a tutoring program; however, he has had difficulty getting high school students to attend. Currently, most of the students participating in tutoring are in seventh and eighth grade.

Board Member Johnson suggested the possibility of implementing an online tutoring program and asked whether the Board could offer incentives if students show a certain level of academic improvement. Board President Cobb shared that parents had previously approached him requesting tutoring opportunities, but noted that if parents do not ensure their children attend, the District's options are limited. He emphasized that parents must be involved and encourage their



children to participate.

Board Member Johnson asked whether the elementary school is utilizing the tutoring program. Mr. Heaton responded that the District has funding to continue the program, but likely not through the very end of the school year. Board Secretary Sean added that staff are continually encouraging parents to become more involved, noting that students cannot succeed on their own without support at home.

Board Secretary Hogan shared that in Utah, parents had to sign up on a list to volunteer in their child's classroom, while at the District there is a need for more parent support. Board Member Karen noted that the socioeconomic factors in the community are also different.

Mr. Heaton stated that the District wants to continue building on the progress made in ELA and writing while implementing additional strategies to improve math performance. He noted that proficiency rates currently ranging from 16% to 22% are concerning, but he believes the District is moving in the right direction.

Board Secretary Hogan suggested that the District look at what other schools are doing to achieve higher proficiency levels. Board Member Wright asked what could be done to encourage more parent involvement. Board Secretary Hogan shared that the PTO recently asked for volunteers to help hide Easter eggs for an event, but he and one other father were the only ones who assisted. He noted that the PTO currently needs additional support and reminded everyone that the next PTO meeting will be held on the 28th at 3:00 p.m. in the library.

The Staff Retention Report for Littlefield Unified School District (2014–2025) was presented by Mrs. Goessman, who provided an overview of staff retention trends over an 11-year period. The data shows that retention remained relatively stable at about 75% from 2014 to 2019, peaked at 79% in 2020–2021, and then declined sharply to 62% in 2021–2022, likely due to pandemic-related challenges. Since that time, retention has begun to recover, reaching 73% in 2024–2025. Overall, the district is showing improvement following the pandemic downturn, with ongoing efforts focused on returning to and sustaining retention rates above 75%.

Board Member Fagnan stated that from May through July he will be attending meetings but will be out of the area.

Board Member Johnson provided Mr. Heaton with information regarding high school computer “whiz kids” and also shared details about a center supporting high school students, including suggestions for 9th grade and continued grant opportunities.

Board President Cobb reported that he and Mr. Fagnan completed a walkthrough of the body shop and prepared a findings report. Board Secretary Hogan noted they are in the process of obtaining a cabinet and added that if additional help is needed, they will reach out. He also stated he works with students for 45 minutes a day and that some of the existing mess was present when they began the program. Board Member Fagnan added that the splash station had a bench



placed in front of it, and did not function correctly.

Board President Cobb emphasized that the MSDS book must be maintained in hard copy form and cannot be kept solely on a computer, noting that it should be provided by the vendor when products are purchased. Board Member Johnson asked whether announcements are being made inviting support or donations. Board Secretary Hogan responded that they have already received substantial donations. Board Member Johnson suggested that additional outreach could increase community support. Board Secretary Hogan concluded he has personally invested approximately \$10,000–\$15,000 into the program.

Mrs. Goessman noted that she moved an employee from the Director salary schedule to the classified salary schedule after the employee chose to step down from the Transportation Director position.

Mrs. Goessman also reported that two employees are currently at the maximum level on the certified salary schedule. She explained that when an employee reaches the maximum lane, they receive only a 2% increase based on \$41,000, which amounts to approximately \$820, while teachers who have not reached the maximum receive a \$1,275 increase. Board Member Fagnan asked whether the 2% increase could be raised. Mr. Heaton responded that the 2% is tied to the cost-of-living increase. Mrs. Goessman noted that because this situation only affects two employees, the Board could choose to override the 2% for this year so that all teachers receive the \$1,275 increase. Mr. Heaton suggested that the Board consider bringing the certified salary schedule back for revisions.

Board Member Johnson made a motion to approve the salary schedules and to provide all teachers with a \$1,275 increase, including those who have reached the maximum step. The motion was seconded by Board Member Wright and passed unanimously.

Board Member Johnson made a motion to approve revising the school calendar to designate April 13 and May 14 as half days at the Elementary school for staff training, seconded by Board Member Fagnan. The motion passed unanimously.

24. Discussion regarding the Arizona State Land Trust and School Community Councils.

Board Member Johnson stated that she would like clarification on what the funds are and how they are distributed. Mr. Heaton explained that approximately twenty years ago the Department of Education sued the State of Arizona and won. Eventually, the state legislature agreed to settle and provide a minimal amount as a form of compensation. Board Member Johnson then read information explaining how land trust funds are distributed. Mr. Heaton added that schools are one of the beneficiaries of those funds.

Board Member Fagnan commented that when discussions about the override first began, he



believed there would be challenges with public support because much of the funding was not directly tied to students. He added that many people feel overtaxed and are reluctant to approve additional taxes, noting that only 4 people attended the meeting. Board Member Johnson asked how the district receives trust funds. Ed Dickie explained that when the county distributes the funds, it will appear in the district's financial reports. Mr. Heaton asked Ed Dickie to bring an example to the next meeting.

Board Member Johnson also distributed a document regarding school community councils. She stated that the district needs and wants community input, particularly from parents, though Board Secretary Hogan noted that it can be difficult to get participation. Board Member Johnson mentioned that some schools develop teacher and student success plans. Mr. Heaton noted that it sounded similar to the plans the district already completes each year.

Board Member Johnson added that safety committees in some schools review the safety plan annually and include local input. She asked how decisions, such as selecting bus stop locations, are made and mentioned that some schools even conduct non-active shooter safety drills. Board Secretary Hogan said that teachers typically secure students in their classrooms during drills. Board Member Johnson emphasized that parents should know where their children are being taken during emergencies.

Board President Cobb expressed concern that if a formal committee were created, Sheree would need to attend and take notes, adding to her already heavy workload. He suggested that Board Member Johnson could form a committee independently and present their findings to the board. Board Member Johnson asked if the committee could review the district's existing safety plan. Mr. Heaton responded that, for security reasons, only a limited number of people can be involved in reviewing the full plan. Board President Cobb added that certain safety matters, such as active shooter procedures, cannot be discussed publicly with community members. Mr. Heaton suggested that some individuals could potentially serve on the district's existing safety committee.

Board Member Johnson then asked if board members had ideas for other committees that might benefit the district. Board Member Wright suggested possibly forming a community group to find individuals willing to provide musical instruments at no cost. Board President Cobb mentioned that he will be hosting a vaccination clinic and invited Board Member Johnson to attend and speak with community members.

25. Suggestions for Future Board Meetings.

Board Secretary Hogan stated that he received a request for a full-time music teacher. He explained that the school could receive approximately \$68,000 worth of musical instruments at no cost if a music teacher were hired.

Mrs. Goessman noted that the district previously had a music teacher during the 2010–2011 school year when enrollment was approximately 550 students. She explained that as student enrollment declined, the position was eventually eliminated.
