What Is Model UN?

Model United Nations is an academic simulation of the United Nations where students play the role of delegates from different countries and attempt to solve real-world issues with the policies and perspectives of their assigned country.

For example, a student assigned the United Kingdom will solve global topics such as nuclear non-proliferation or climate change from the UK's perspective.

There is no central governing body for Model UN — any school can create a team and register for any conference – in person or virtual - they wish to attend.

Committees vote on solutions; top delegates earn awards for their performance

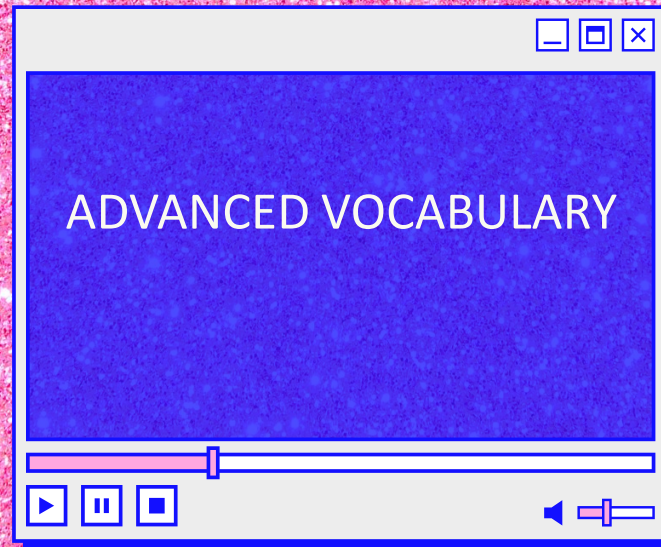
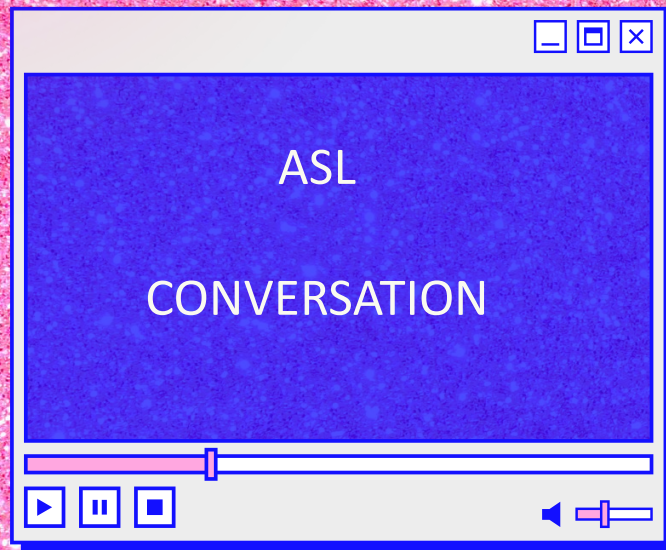

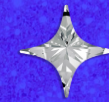
Deaf Identity Crayons - They got there

The labels are: DUMBOY, LIPREADER, DEAF & DUMB, HEARING-IMPAIRED, HANDICAPPED, DEAF-MUTE, ORALIST, PREAK, COOL, SEING, DEAF-BLIND, LATE-DEAFENED, DEAF-AMERICAN, HARD-OF-HEARING, SIGNER, and DEAF. 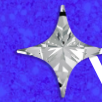

- Through our partnership with EF Tours, we hope to offer a trip to each class as freshmen that they will take during Spring Break of their Junior year.

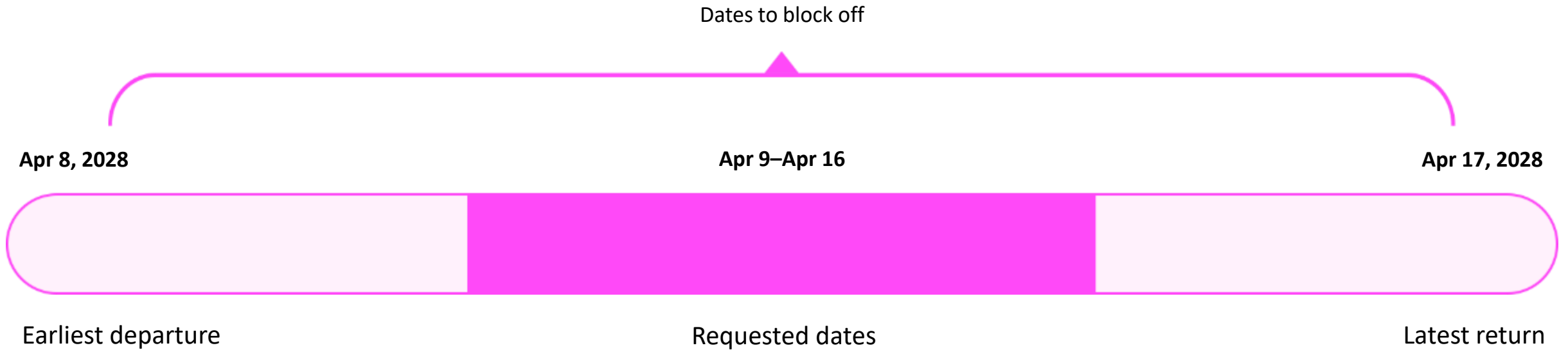


Italy 2028

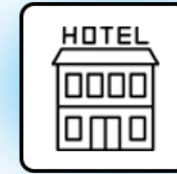

SUMMER SCHOOL DATES

- **High School: July 13 – August 20, 2026**
 - Monday through Thursday (21 days plus 2 regents exam dates, and a scoring day)
 - Regents Exams August 18 & 19, 2026
- **Middle School: July 13 – August 13, 2026**
 - Monday through Thursday (20 days total)
- **Elementary: July 13 – August 6, 2026**
 - Monday through Thursday (16 days total)

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PROGRAM

- In-person at the **Plattekill Elementary School**
- Transportation Provided
- Program hours: 9:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m., 4 days per week
- Math and ELA instruction with an emphasis on infusing Project Based/Authentic Learning into the program
- Supplemental reading instruction for identified students

MIDDLE SCHOOL PROGRAM

- All remote High Intensity Tutoring program in Math and ELA
- One-hour sessions, 4 days per week (per subject for English and math)
 - Small groups of 5 or less students for each session
 - Total of 5 weeks
 - Students may be enrolled in 1 hour/day math and/or 1 hour/day ELA depending on individual academic needs
 - Ex. Session 1: Monday-Thursday 8:00-9:00am
Session 2: Monday-Thursday 9:15-10:15am
Session 3: Monday-Thursday 10:30-11:30am

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

- All remote – 4 days per week
- Culminating projects for courses without a Regents Exam will continue to be encouraged
- Two Sessions offered daily
 - Ex.: Session 1-- 8:00-10:00am
Session 2– 10:15-12:15pm
- Courses offered based on enrollment
- Regents Exams: August 19th and 20th (in person)

REIMAGINING AFTER SCHOOL AIS 2026-2027

- Two Days per week for one hour after school (typically 3:30 to 4:30 but can be before school)
- Prioritize Project Based/Inquiry Based Learning
- Offer Clubs (e.g. Cooking Club, Chess Club) based on Teacher Proposals
- Offer Intramural Sports
- The focus is increased student engagement and student choice
- Alignment with Portrait of a Graduate Traits
