A Sound Budget for Our Students and Community

Dear Ellicottville Central School Community,

As we plan for the upcoming school year, I would like to share an overview of the proposed 2026–2027 school budget and what it means for our Ellicottville community.

The proposed budget totals **\$16,889,130**, which reflects an approximate **3.60% increase** from the current year. This increase is driven by rising operational expenses, including transportation, utilities, health insurance, contractual obligations, and the cost of maintaining the high-quality programs and opportunities our students deserve.

For this budget cycle, the district is proposing to exceed the tax cap by 1.5% in order to develop a fiscally sound budget that continues to meet the needs of our students. In addition, the district is projected to receive only a 1% increase in foundation aid, or approximately \$32,000. While every increase in aid is helpful, it is not sufficient to match the rising costs of operating our schools. As a result, local funding remains a critical component in maintaining the programs, services, and opportunities our students rely on every day.

Why Does Ellicottville Receive Less State Aid?

New York State uses a formula called *Foundation Aid* to determine how much funding each school district receives. This formula takes several factors into account:

- Property Wealth → Communities with higher property values typically receive less aid
- Student Need → Districts with greater needs receive more support
- Local Capacity → The community's ability to support schools locally

While many neighboring school districts receive between 60%–90% of their funding from New York State,

Ellicottville receives approximately 32%.

What does this mean for our community?

- Greater reliance on local taxpayers
- State aid increases have a smaller overall impact
- The district must be especially thoughtful and strategic in budgeting

Even with a lower share of state aid, Ellicottville continues to prioritize strong academics, student opportunities, and responsible financial planning for our community.

Throughout the budget development process, we carefully reviewed all areas of spending to ensure we are balancing fiscal responsibility with our commitment to students and families. Our priority remains clear: to preserve strong academic programs, extracurricular opportunities, and student supports that make Ellicottville a high-performing district.

By slightly exceeding the tax cap, we are able to:

- Maintain high-quality instructional programs
- Support student services and extracurricular activities
- Address increasing operational and transportation costs
- Continue providing a safe, supportive, and engaging learning environment

We understand the importance of being mindful of the impact on our taxpayers, and we remain committed to transparency and responsible financial planning. Every budget

decision has been made with great care and with the goal of sustaining the excellence of our school district while planning thoughtfully for the future.

We encourage all community members to stay informed and participate in the budget process:



New York State uses a formula called Foundation Aid to determine how much funding each school district receives. This formula considers:

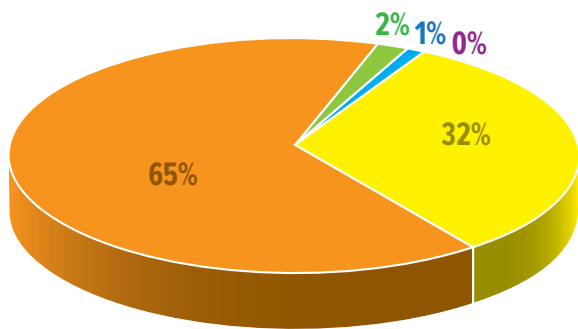
- 1. PROPERTY WEALTH**

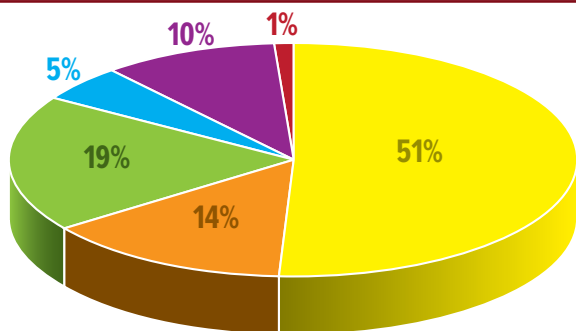

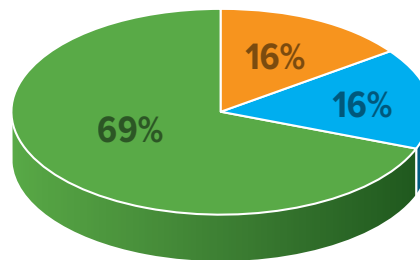
THREE PART BUDGET

Chapter 436 of the Laws of 1997 require public school boards of education to present the proposed budget in three parts. As a result, this presentation is organized around the following components; program, administrative, and capital:

Administrative Component: Includes expenses associated with the operation of the school board, superintendent's office, and business office. It also includes salaries and benefits for all certified administrators and supervisors who spend a majority of their time performing administrative duties, consulting costs not directly related to instructional programs, and all other activities that are administrative in nature

Capital Component: Includes debt service for all facilities financed by bonds and notes of the district; lease expenditures; costs resulting from judgements in tax certiorari proceedings; awards from court judgments; administrative orders and settled claims; cost of construction, acquisition, reconstruction, rehabilitation, and improvements of school buildings; all expenses associated with custodial and maintenance salaries; and benefits, service contracts, supplies, utilities, maintenance, and repair of school facilities.

Program Component: Includes salaries and benefits of teachers, teacher assistants and teacher aides, student supplies and services, extra-curricular activities, and all transportation operating expenses

2026-2027 CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECT: MINI-RENOVATION PROJECT

Ellicottville CSD seeks to maximize state aid in order to make the most of the district's tax dollars. Continuing a strategy from last year, a mini-renovation project is again being proposed this year that will include LED lighting improvements at the School. This mini-renovation project takes advantage of capital project aid from the state. If this work was not performed as part of a capital project, the district would incur the full cost of the work. By including the \$100,000 budget for this work in a mini-capital project within the proposed annual budget, the district will receive approximately \$65,000 in additional aid during the 2027-2028 school year. This is part of a long-range strategy in which the building aid returned in the following year will continue to fund additional mini-renovation projects as a regular part of the district's budget.

Transportation Reserve Fund

What is a transportation reserve fund?

A Transportation Reserve Fund is a savings account that school districts set aside specifically for purchasing vehicles for the district. When the district needs to replace or purchase a vehicle it can use money from this reserve rather than raising taxes or impacting classroom programs.

Think of it like a household saving for a car. Rather than taking on new debt

or making a large, sudden expense, the district uses funds it has already set aside responsibly.

Why establish a Transportation Reserve fund?

The rising cost and unpredictability of vehicle pricing has affected everyone, including our school district. Using a transportation reserve fund:

- Helps keep taxes stable by avoiding large one-time costs

- Protects student programs and services by not pulling money from instructional budgets
- Allows for planned, safe transportation upgrades for students

In this case, the reserve fund will be used to purchase a school van that supports student transportation needs in a cost-effective and responsible way.

The following propositions will be voted on May 19, 2026:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 - Basic Budget

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:
RESOLVED: That the Board of Education of the Ellicottville Central School District in the County of Cattaraugus, State of New York, BE AND IS HEREBY AUTHORIZED TO EXPEND THE SUM OF \$16,899,130 for the 2026-2027 school year budget. The Basic Budget will provide funds for all of the

educationally related services and the maintenance of our school building.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 - School Bus Lease

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:
RESOLVED: This proposition will authorize the Board of Education of the Ellicottville Central School District in the County of Cattaraugus, State of New York, to levy an

additional (not to exceed) \$66,000 to lease 2 (two) 66 passenger school buses for each of the next five years (five annual payments) commencing with the 2026-2027 school year.

PROPOSITION NO. 3- Renewal of the Transportation Reserve

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:
RESOLVED: This proposition will authorize the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Ellicottville Central School District, Cattaraugus County, New York (the "District") to renew the Transportation reserve fund (the "Fund") for the acquisition of various school buses, school bus-type vans/minivans, and similar vehicles (and related equipment) for use in the transportation program of the District, all pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law of the State of New York; that the Fund shall be known as the "Transportation Reserve Fund"; that the ultimate amount of the Fund shall be not greater than \$1,000,000.00 (plus interest earned thereon); that the probable term of the Fund shall be not longer than five (5) years; and that the

permissible sources from which the Board is authorized to appropriate monies to such Fund from time to time shall be (a) amounts applied thereto from budgetary appropriations of the District; (b) unappropriated fund balance of the District; (c) to the extent specifically directed by the Board, State aid received as reimbursement for transportation-related expenditures by the District (whether or not such expenditures were financed in whole or in part from the Fund); (d) proceeds from the sale of real or personal property owned by the District, if permitted by law and if directed by the Board; and (e) such other sources as the Board or the voters of the District may direct from time to time, all as may be permitted by law.

PROPOSITION NO. 4- Proposition to use funds from the Transportation Reserve

Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit:
RESOLVED: This proposition will authorize the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Ellicottville Central School District, Cattaraugus County, New York (the "District") to use funds from the Transportation reserve fund (the

"Fund") for the acquisition of various school buses, school bus-type vans/minivans, and similar vehicles (and related equipment) for use in the transportation program of the District, all pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law of the State of New York; not to exceed \$30,000

2026-2027 District School Budget Summary

Detailed Budget Statement

The Board of Education of this District will have prepared and completed a detailed statement in writing of the amount of money which will be required during the ensuing 2026-2027 fiscal year for school purposes, specifying the several purposes and the amount for each. The amount of each purpose estimated necessary for payments to boards of cooperative education services shall be set forth in full with no deduction of estimated state aid. The amount of state aid provided and its percentage relationship to the total expenditures shall also be shown. Such statement shall be completed at least seven days before the budget hearing at which it is to be presented and copies thereof shall be prepared and made available, upon request, to residents within the District during the period of seven days before the budget hearing and/or fourteen days immediately preceding the Annual District Vote, and may be obtained by any resident of the District in the Business Office or District Office during the hours of 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. prevailing time on or after May 4, 2026, exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, and in the Business Office.



Absentee Ballots

Applications for absentee ballots for the Annual District Vote may be applied for during school business hours (7:30 am – 4:00 pm) at the Office of the Clerk of the District beginning April 21, 2026, except for Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays. Complete applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. A list of all persons to whom absentee ballots have been issued will be available in the Office of the District Clerk on each of the five business days prior to the Annual District Vote (except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays), and such list will also be posted at the polling places for the Annual District Vote.



Early Mail Ballot

Early Mail ballots may be applied for at the Office of the District Clerk. Applications for early mail ballots may be accepted beginning April 21, 2026, through May 15, 2026, to receive the ballot by regular mail and no later than May 19, 2026, to have the ballot delivered in person. A list of all persons to whom early mail ballots shall have been issued will be available for inspection in the Office of the School District Clerk on each of the five (5) days prior to the day of the election (except Saturday and Sunday), and such list shall also be posted at the voting place during the election, and any qualified voter may challenge the acceptance of the early voter's ballot of any such person on such list, by making his challenge and the reasons therefor known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.

Budget Copies

Copies of the budget will be available for review in the District's Business Office and the Superintendent's Office after the May 19, 2026 vote. Office hours are Monday-Friday (8:00 am – 4:00 pm exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays and holidays).

SPEECH

Production of sounds to form words

- **Articulation** - production of sounds

- **Expressive Language** - ability to use words, sentences, gestures or written communication
- **Receptive Language** - ability to understand and process words, sentences, gestures or expressions
- **Pragmatic Language** - understanding social communication

SPEECH IMPROVEMENT

A flexible program that addresses minor speech needs. A sound inventory screener will be given by the SLP in Kindergarten making sure students are developing all age-expected sounds. If age-expected sounds are not present, a student will be referred. After parental consent is received services will begin.

INDIVIDUAL EDUCATIONAL PLAN (IEP)

A student with significant speech and/or language needs may also have or be referred for an IEP, which is a more in-depth process.

PARENT CONCERNS

Any parent/guardian with concerns regarding their child's speech and language development should contact their child's teacher.

WHAT IS AAC?
Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) is a tool that a person may use to facilitate language. AAC may include gestures, pictures, communication boards, sign language, or devices that speak aloud.
