



# Help is ready if needed

Local community and governmental agencies are ready with assistance to tornado victims, but so far little help has been requested.

LaPorte County Commission president Richard Knoll said the county commissioners do not plan to ask for federal disaster relief unless there is enough evidence to support the request.

"If enough evidence comes forth from tornado victims, we'll be more than happy to work with them," Knoll said.

Michigan City mayor Joseph LaRocco offered the use of city vehicles for county residents in clearing away debris but so far the city has received no such requests.

Sen. Vance Hartke visited LaRocco Saturday and then left to inspect tornado damage in DeMotte, Ind.

Cong. John Brademas said his office has received no requests for emergency help.

Jean Anderson, executive director of the LaPorte County Red Cross, said the LaPorte and Michigan City Red Cross offices have received numerous calls from persons volunteering clothing or temporary housing for tornado victims.

As of this morning, however, no one had contacted the Red Cross to ask for emergency help.

"We've gone out to try to locate people who need help and we haven't found anyone," Mrs. Anderson said. She asked persons who need help with clothing or temporary lodging to call the Red Cross office in Michigan City or LaPorte.

National headquarters of the Disabled American Veterans is offering assistance to DAV members whose homes were damaged by Friday's tornado, according to Maxine Morford, state community service chairman.

Mrs. Morford, 831 Henry St., asked that DAV members who sustained home damage call her at 879-0818. She said she would forward information to the appropriate officials.

Numerous other persons have pitched in to help their neighbors.

At the Jewel supermarket, co-workers of Ray Morris, 1365 N County Line Road, offered to help gather supplies and money for the Morris family, whose house was demolished. Mrs. Morris was seriously injured in the wreckage.

I need Do-Line's help again. In October 1975, I took my cassette tape recorder to Sears, at Marquette Mall, to have a new belt installed. I have called them several times and have made numerous trips to the store, but I always get the same answer — no recorder. Could you help in the matter? — R.G.

Do-Line discussed your problem with the service manager of Sears. Mr. Cutter is sorry for the delay, but says he was unaware of the matter until our call. He checked into it and advised us your recorder is more than five years old and the company which made it is no longer in business. The company which purchased Toyomata has been doing some servicing on the products, such as cleaning, adjusting and replacing parts which were interchangeable with their own line. The company returned your recorder and said they couldn't fix it. So Sears sent it to several other sources trying to get it repaired, which is the reason it has taken so long. Cutter said Sears has a definite policy in cases such as yours and one of the service people should have explained it to you. It is their policy to offer to make an adjustment toward the purchase of a new recorder when the item is unrepairable. He said he was going to contact you directly about this matter. He said his service department told him you had picked up the recorder, unrepaired, several days ago.

I am sending this problem to you in hopes I can get some help. Sometime around the first of October, The News-Dispatch came out with information about Bicentennial medals. You also gave an address and price list. I sent for two bronze medals, enclosing a \$7 check. The check was cashed but I have yet to receive the medals. Can you help? — E.H.

The chief of the Special Coinage and Medals division of the Treasury Department's Bureau of the Mint in San Francisco, has advised the processing of an order takes several months from the date of receipt until shipment is made. Your 1975 ARBA Bronze Commemorative Medal will be shipped to you as soon as the order can be filled.

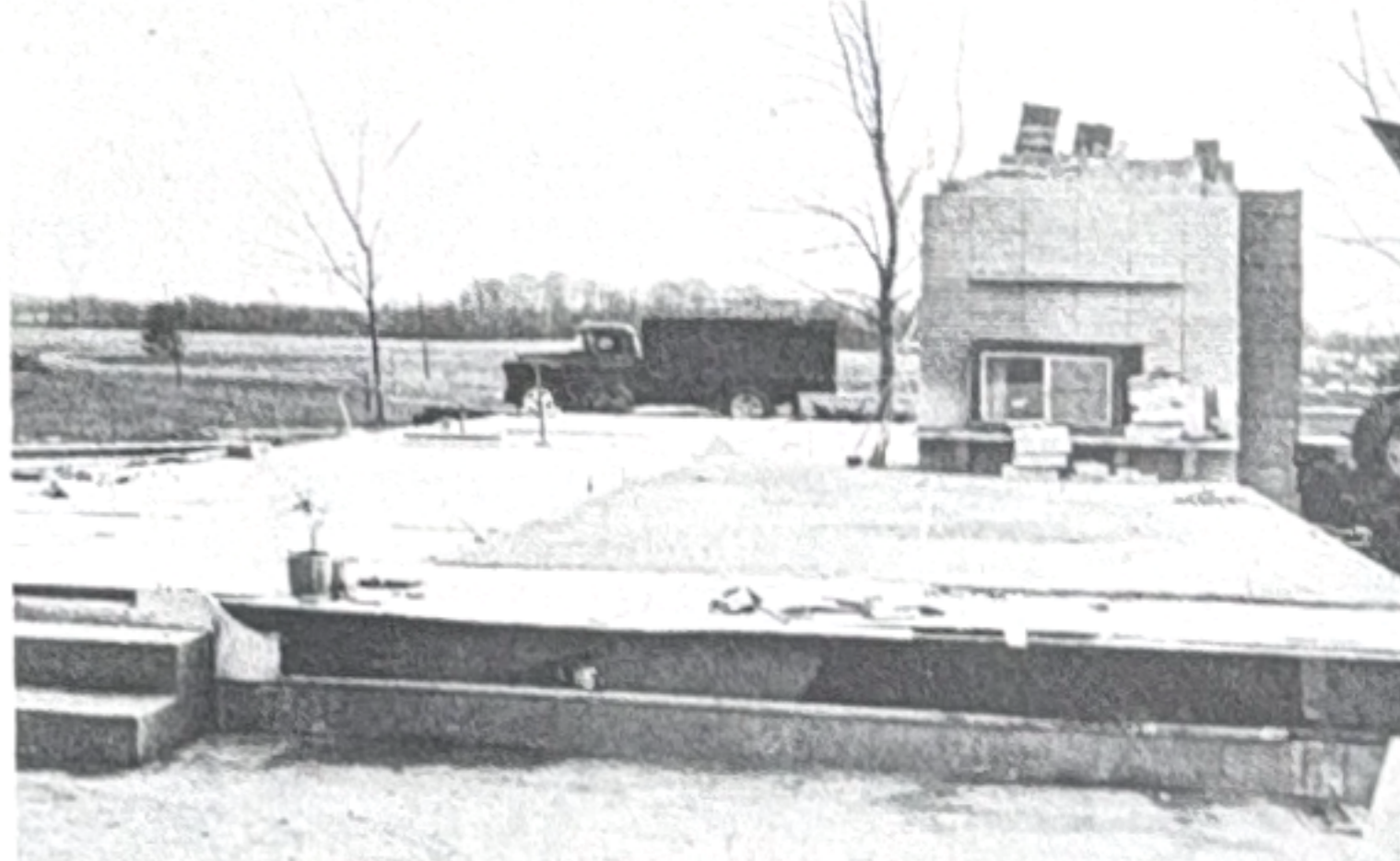

The group's next meeting will be April 8 at the home of Mrs. Harold Wolf.

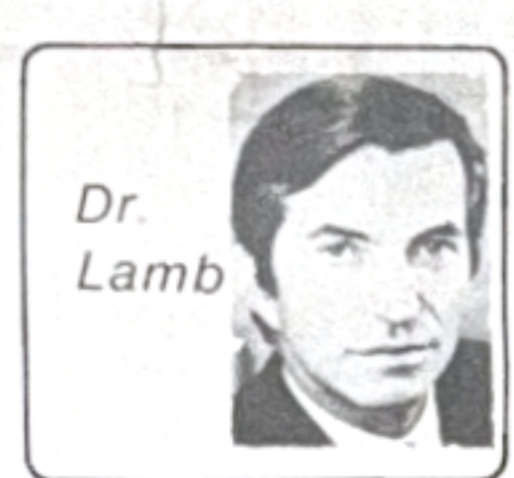
### To your good health

# High bilirubin count can indicate disease

**DEAR DR. LAMB** — In a recent column you stated that bile salts are made from cholesterol and increased elimination of bile salts leads to a decrease in cholesterol. My 21-year-old son has bilirubin "on the high side of normal." The doctor stated that the high bile level is apparently normal in my son. He is slim and athletic and regularly eats large amounts of meat, eggs, and other fatty foods. Is a high blood bile level ever normal? Could high cholesterol levels lead to the overproduction of bile? Is there a relation between the blood bile and his diet?

**DEAR READER** — Bilirubin is not bile salt, it is a bile pigment. The bile salts are substances in the bile produced by the liver that help to emulsify fats so that they can be absorbed. Bilirubin is a pigment that comes from hemoglobin in the red blood cells.

The adult human body manufactures about 3 million new red blood cells every second. These replace those that are destroyed. As red blood cells break, their iron-containing hemoglobin, which carries

oxygen and carbon dioxide, is released into the blood stream. The liver processes this. Through various bodily processes much of the pigment is recycled and used again, but a certain amount of it is eliminated in the bile. This is the major factor in causing bile to have its color and imparts the color to the undigested food residue in the digestive tract.

The bilirubin pigment can increase in the blood because of increased destruction of red blood cells or because of a slow response

of the liver to eliminate excess pigment through bile. If the bile ducts are obstructed so they can't drain then bilirubin in the blood will increase.

I have just described the three major results of jaundice, which is caused by increased bilirubin, increased destruction of red blood cells, disease of the liver cells or through disease of the gall bladder and bile ducts obstructing the drainage of bile and bilirubin pigment.

Some people may have a mild elevation of bilirubin without having any significant liver disease or other medical problems. I presume the elevation in your son's case was sufficiently mild and in the absence of any other evidence of disease the doctor has wisely decided that it is of no significance.

The mild elevation of bilirubin would not have anything to do with your son's cholesterol level or his diet.

Although it's unrelated, your son should change his eating habits and use lean meat, fish, poultry and avoid fatty foods. If he wants to keep his cholesterol intake down he should use a very limited amount of egg yolks. Most heart specialists believe that diet is a significant factor in producing fatty cholesterol deposits in the arteries that leads to heart disease. This process can begin early in life. Many of the young men examined after death in the Korean War were found to have significant fatty cholesterol deposits in their arteries despite the fact that these men had an average age of 22. The best time to start a program to prevent heart and vascular disease is early in life and then continue it.

A short slide presentation was given, followed by a question-and-answer period.

Wallace Ford, an ex-offender, helped discuss PACT. The group learned that PACT, four-years-old, has four paid staff members and four VISTA volunteers.

The purpose of PACT is to provide immediate living quarters for

ex-offenders until they can afford their own, to provide jobs for ex-offenders and to provide counseling for them.

In other business, the membership voted to purchase a Bicentennial flag. It will be donated to Beverly Shores and flown in front of the administration building.

The group selected Aug. 22 for their annual art fair. Committee members were appointed.

The group voted to purchase 10 card tables for community use in the Beverly Shores administration building.

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# City plan commission okays street vacation

Michigan City Elks Lodge 432 won the first round in the latest legal battle to vacate a portion of an alley to provide parking for a planned lodge home on South Franklin Street.

The city plan commission in a 7-0 vote with one abstention, recommended to the city board of works that the alley between Harrison and DeWolfe Streets be vacated.

The vacation of 150 feet of the alley is necessary for use of two vacant lots fronting on Stimpson Court to provide for 50 parking spaces for the lodge building. The building site is not large enough for the number of spaces required by city building regulations.

The commission heard arguments from Atty. Patrick Donoghue for the Elks. Atty. Donald Baugher, LaPorte, represented remonstrators.

The attorneys argued points of law based on state zoning regulations requiring a one-year delay before a rejected petition can be brought up again. The commission recessed for five minutes then returned to hear commission Atty. C.T. Kilowski recommend the hearing proceed. The petition had been turned down by the commission last October.

Donoghue argued the planned lodge building would be an asset to the neighborhood and the two lots for parking would be landscaped with no access from the lots to Stimpson Court.

He said use of the lots would not impede the growth of the city and easements would be granted to all adjacent property owners, the general public and the city for use of the alley. He said the Elks plan to pave the entire alley.

Baugher argued the paving would only increase a water drain-

age problem on Harrison Street and the parking problem would overflow onto Stimpson Court. He said the parking area would decrease the value of nearby property.

Paul Michaels of the Elks building committee told the commission Elks members visited property owners who signed a petition against the alley vacation and learned they had received misinformation about the Elks project. He said almost all of them signed a counter petition after receiving their names from the original remonstrance.

He said Jewel Food Store, A and P supermarket and a local physician's office in the proposed building area were contacted and agree-

ment was made to use portions of the three parking areas if necessary.

The Elks have agreed to return the alley to Michigan City if their special use request for the building is turned down and if there is no appeal or further legal action.

George White, another member of the lodge building committee, said city engineer Richard Frame assured the Elks would do everything possible to take care of the drainage problem.

Oral objection to the alley vacation came from Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wojasinski, 121 Stimpson Court.

Wojasinski said the neighborhood should remain residential and said two homes could be built on

the lots the Elks want for parking. He termed the plan "an encroachment" and said it was a violation of the Indiana Constitution.

"I have a \$40,000 house and I don't want a parking lot in front of it," he said.

Elks Secretary Norman Green replied to several points of criticism from the remonstrators.

He said regular lodge meetings draw only about 22 members, not 500, the full lodge membership, that the lodge pays \$1,000 a year in property taxes for the building site and files a gross income tax return.

Nate Winski, former Exalted Ruler of the Elks and a member of the executive board of Sinai Temple, said no one at the Temple ob-

jects to the new building. The Temple is one block from the Elks property.

Several property owners spoke in favor of the Elks project and received rounds of applause from Elks members.

Had the commission rejected the vacation recommendation, it would take a unanimous vote of the board of works to approve the request.

City engineer Frame abstained in the vote because he is on the board of works.

Wojasinski indicated he will attend the board hearing tonight to again object to the proposal and will carry his remonstrance further if the board approves the vacation.

The Elks had filed for a hearing in LaPorte Circuit Court when their request was rejected last October. However, the case eventually was withdrawn.

Commission president Richard Collins read ordinance portions that govern the duties of the plan commission and then announced the appointment of several committees to work on city improvement priorities and recommendations to be presented to the city council in June for the 1977 budget.

Committee areas include transportation, parks and recreation, utilities, special projects (U.S. 12 relocation and railroad relocation), finance and personnel, and land use and zoning.

Reciprocity concerts which have just been announced include The Jeffrey II Dance Attraction, New York Brass, Boris Goldovsky Opera Company, World of Gilbert and Sullivan, Four Freshmen, organist Ted Alan Worth, Heidelberg Chamber Orchestra, National Folk Ballet of Yugoslavia, and the Broadway Hit Parade with Dorothy Collins and Ronald Hogue.

Only persons with season memberships will be admitted to the performances. No tickets to individual performances will be available. Memberships must be purchased by Friday.

Memberships may be purchased at campaign headquarters located in Marquette Mall opposite Sears. Headquarters hours are from 6 to 8 this evening, from 1 to 4 and 6 to 8 p.m. tomorrow and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. on Friday the final day of the campaign. # Town court is discussed

PORTER, Ind. — The town board last night discussed whether a town court should be established.

Attorney Ray Kickbush introduced the topic to the town board. Since the justice of the peace courts have been abolished, many cases must be referred to the county court in Valparaiso, Kickbush said.

One negative factor in creating a town court is the initial cost. Kickbush said. Record books alone would cost \$400. Another deterrent is that state law will discontinue all town courts at the end of 1979.

Board member Don Cope objected to having so many cases sent to Valparaiso because of the extra transportation required. However, Marshal Len Smith said cases are arranged every Wednesday night, and police officers are not required to appear unless persons charged with violations plead not guilty. He also said all cases involving serious traffic violations, driving under the influence of alcoholic beverages, and state police citations are required to be processed in county court.

Smith said some counties have more than one court. He said it is his opinion another county court will be created in the near future to serve Porter County. The board tabled the matter for further study.

Town manager William Fisher was introduced. He gave a short speech, outlining his duties. Member Wendell Green read a pledge signed by Fisher that his work was not politically affiliated and would not exert influence on the board's actions.

Street commissioner Jack Cos introduced the problem of flood conditions. Several areas, particularly east of Waverly Road, near State Park Road and also at the intersection of Waverly and Oak Hill roads are major problems.

Cos said ditches through the state park were obstructed by branches and mud. He said park authorities apparently are not interested in cleaning those ditches, since the water would flow into the beach area.

Ditches and culverts that have been filled-in either purposely or by nature have created similar problems in other areas. President

Richard Kaufman instructed town engineer James Barrington to make a survey with him to determine what immediate action can be taken.

In other business, in response to an inquiry from Clayton Duvall, 440 Franklin St., about his offer to remove a tree on town property in front of his house, the board will check with the town's insurance company before authorizing the action. Duvall said the tree is uprooting the sidewalk.

The board rezoned the Lawson Lane property from commercial to multi-family housing. Cope dissented because the only structure now in the plot are single family units.

William Sievert reported a large tree outside the town police station is tearing up the driveway. He said it also is an obstruction.

The board members will inspect the problem Saturday and decide what to do. They also may remove another tree to provide more parking space in front of the police station. The board also will inspect roof problems then.

The board received a letter from the Northwest Indiana Regional Plan Commission regarding the solid waste disposal. According to statistics Westchester Twp. is now disposing 3,300 tons of this material annually. Projected figures estimate this will increase to 9,900 tons by 1980 and 19,800 tons by 1990.

Various short and long range plans were contained in literature included with the letter. The literature was given to Fisher for study.

In another matter, the board rejected a request from Westchester Library for additional lights at Hageman Library here because adequate funds are not available.

Marshal Smith reported there are inadequate number of pens for stray animals. He asked the board to appropriate money for more pens. It was suggested unused pens might be available on the sewage disposal property.

Bids were received for a fire truck chassis. They were taken under advisement for study. Bids came from RPM Sales & Service, Michigan City, at \$11,400 and from Summerfield GMC Truck Co., Gary, at \$10,828.62.

# Garage funds appropriated

VALPARAISO, Ind. — The Porter County council last night appropriated federal revenue sharing funds for a new county police maintenance garage.

The council appropriated \$63,254 for the garage and \$25,736 for equipment by a 5-2 vote. Councilman Jack Clem questioned the necessity of several pieces of equipment, but later voted for the appropriation as requested.

When asked why he supported the bill after questioning some of the expenditures, Clem said, "I just would have been beating my head against a brick wall. They wanted the full amount. So now they have it."

If the council had not accepted the original price for the garage equipment, the item would have had to be rebid. This would have

sulted in a higher price, since costs have increased since the original bid.

The council also appropriated \$10,000 for development of the uniform county-wide numbering system. The county surveyor will use the money to draw up and print plans. The post office will use the prints from the surveyor's office to assign house numbers.

In other business, the council appropriated \$33,914 to the welfare department and \$810 for the county health department.

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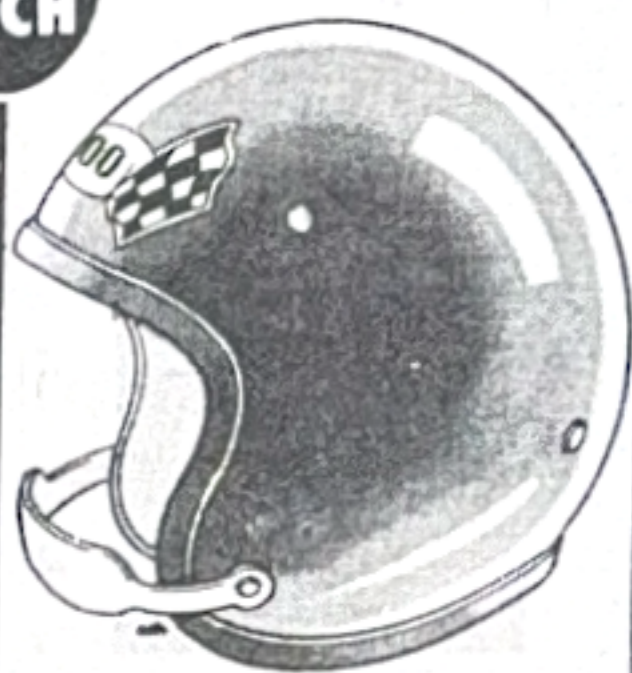
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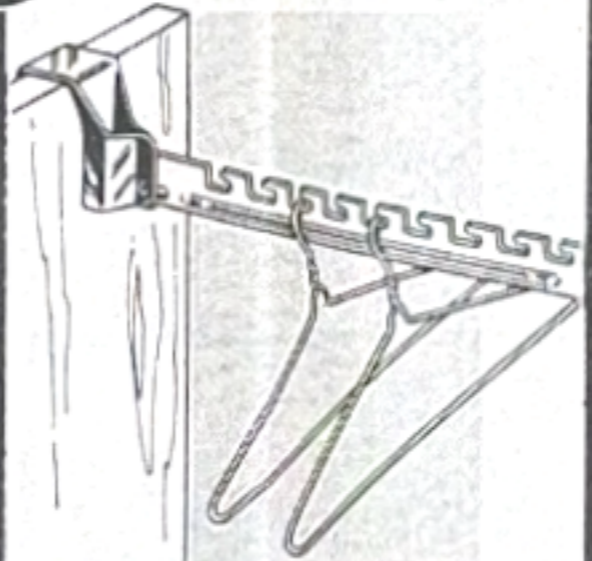
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Bob's Beat

The knock on the door at midnight was entirely predictable. It happens every four years.

I was seated before the TV, watching Stewart Granger track down the rogue elephant which had killed his friend, when the knocking came.

"That will be Cosgrove," I thought to myself as I went to the door. "He's got some questions about the New Hampshire primary."

"Hi," Cosgrove said as he removed his topcoat. "I've got some questions about the New Hampshire primary."

"I remember four years ago," I said, "when you were confused about the vote there. You didn't understand how Ed Muskie could get more votes, but George McGovern could be called the winner."

"Right. I still don't understand that—and considering what happened to the Democrats with McGovern heading the ticket, I think I wasn't the only one."

"But I'm just a little surprised that you've got questions this time. Jimmy Carter won the Democratic primary convincingly enough that they'll probably start calling him 'James' very soon. And the Ford-Reagan count is as close at this point as it can be. You know it's a close election when the networks won't project the winner."

"But what does it mean? Carter's certainly going to be called the frontrunner now. Is that good for him? Will it affect his smile? Can anything stop him, short of a Romney or Muskie-type faux pas?"

"Well, even though there are a lot of primaries to go and Carter's going to have to get more specific on the issues, his momentum poses problems for the other Democrats now in the race, for sure. George Wallace has to go against that momentum in a couple weeks in Florida. A sound defeat could eliminate Wallace—winnow him out, in the current vernacular—before he even gets started. As for the other Democrats, who a while back were counting on Carter to take care of Wallace in Florida, they may have second thoughts. Don't be surprised if some of them get intense in their criticisms of Carter—concluding now that their fortunes might better be served by a Wallace win, or at least a very close vote, in Florida."

"In other words, if Carter wins big over Wallace, the addition of a Southern state to his Midwest and New England successes could start a bandwagon effect."

"Right. None of the liberals in the pack seems to have caught fire up to now. If Bayh or Udall doesn't do so soon, the thing to watch for is a decision by Hubert Humphrey to drop his above-it-all stance and enter some primaries after all."

"There could be a Carter-Humphrey battle in the last couple months before the convention?"

"Correct. And if Hubert doesn't succeed, you can expect some really serious efforts by liberal Democrats to convince Kennedy to be a candidate."

"With the Ford-Reagan contest so close, what can be said about the Republican picture?"

"A couple things. First, you can almost bet that the gloves are going to come off on both sides. In Florida, in Illinois, and the other upcoming contests, the rhetoric will get more intense. Second, you're going to be swamped with explanation-interpretations of the New Hampshire vote by both sides. Ford's people will say he'd have won big had Nixon not gone to China. Reagan's people will insist his percentage of the vote was as significant as McGovern's in '72. Also, some observers will analyze the close split as meaning the voters aren't really turned on by either man. Hints along that line may come from John Connally down in Texas. But if Ford wins in New Hampshire and wins—or makes it very close—in Florida, the nomination almost surely will be his. And a Ford-Reagan ticket will may be in the offing."

"Isn't the kind of campaign you say is shaping up in Florida going to be damaging in the fall to Ford and Reagan—if either is the nominee...or both are?"

"Possibly. Most likely, though, it'll be more like Kennedy and Johnson in 1960 than like Rockefeller and Goldwater in '64. Same way on the Democratic side. Even now, and surely if he does well in Florida, it's a very good bet that even if one of the other Democrats eventually gets the nomination—and in spite of the things they are going to be saying about him in the next several weeks—Carter's going to be first choice for a running mate."

Cosgrove said he'd be back the night of the Florida primary. I never doubted it. —Bob Kaser

## Photos will go on licenses

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Most Indiana license branches won't be equipped to put photographs on drivers licenses until Oct. 1, according to a spokesman for the Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

The bill authorizing photographs on drivers licenses, which was signed by Gov. Otis R. Bowen Tuesday, goes into effect in the spring.

Since license branches won't have the capability to attach the photographs before October, drivers whose licenses expire before that date will have to go pictureless until 1980. The other option is to renew the license, wait until October, then pay \$6—\$1 more than before—for a license with a photograph.

Bowen also signed a bill which allows non-drivers to purchase identification cards issued by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles. The law, effective Oct. 1, is designed to make it simpler for non-drivers to cash checks.

Under other bills signed by the governor, municipal governments were authorized to set up mosquito control agencies and courts were permitted to turn over child support payments to welfare agencies providing assistance to the child and to assign a parent's wages to satisfy support orders.

Other bills signed by Bowen would:

—Permit anyone to request

treatment for drug abuse from any facility approved by the Department of Mental Health; effective on promulgation.

—Authorize the city of Gary to use economic development funds to finance outpatient medical centers, effective on promulgation.

—Authorize the Department of Natural Resources to accept and maintain the Ernie Pyle birthplace; effective on promulgation.

—Reduce from 20 to 5 per cent a railroad's share of costs for constructing highway grade separations; effective immediately.

—Authorize the Department of Natural Resources to receive and maintain the William S. Culbertson mansion; effective on promulgation.

—Authorize the city of Gary to establish a building authority to construct and operate a civic center; effective immediately.

—Make six-year terms for superior court judges uniform throughout the state; effective May 1.

—Increase from \$600 to \$2,500 the maximum annual compensation for hospital board members; effective on promulgation.

—Exclude certain limited effect construction projects from required approval by the Indiana Flood Control and Water Resources Commission; effective immediately.

## Students' rights topic of meeting

The rights of students in discipline cases were discussed at yesterday afternoon's YMCA public affairs luncheon by Mike Riley, Michigan City Area Schools administrative assistant.

Riley, an attorney, said a new law was just passed in Indiana which sets forth three rules when a discipline problem occurs:

— The student can discuss the problem with the principal.

— If the student denies the charges, he can get a summary of evidence.

— The student can give his side of the problem.

Riley said this has been the kind of rule followed here before but now it will be law.

He said if the problem involves an "immediate threat" to the school, the principal can postpone

the hearing until after the threat is over.

"This gives the principal leverage to handle the case properly," he added.

Since 1971, there has been a major turnaround in discipline procedures. Public Law 162 passed in Indiana at that time is a model for other states, Riley said.

He said the law gives school officials the authority to discipline, lists causes for expulsions (a period more than five days) and establishes discipline procedures.

After a principal gets a written report from the teacher, he notifies the student that expulsion is pending. The student can seek a hearing before Riley, at which time both sides present their cases and can call witnesses.

"This often results in compro-

mises," Riley said. "If the parents disagree with my findings, they can appeal to the school board. If the board agrees with me, the parents can appeal to the courts."

He noted the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled students must receive at least minimal due process for suspensions (removal from school for five days or less).

Riley was asked about students who have the right to an attorney but can't afford it. He replied the Legal Aid Society can help.

He also was asked about desegregation programs. Riley said there are four areas targeted by the federal government in Indiana and Michigan City is not among them.

Replying to a question about students who don't pay textbook rentals, he said they can't be suspended or expelled but can be sent home to get the money.

## Schools get educational kits

A program sponsored by the Michigan City Area Chamber of Commerce to help teach local high school students the basics of economics has been distributed to Elston, Marquette, and Rogers High Schools.

The program, "Economics for Young Americans," was produced and developed by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and consists of film strips, cassette recordings, and text materials.

"The purpose of the program is to get as many students as we can to understand the basics of how the free enterprise system works," said Ed Frank, chairman of the Chamber's Bicentennial committee.

## Indoor gardening

### Group plants for humidity

(Third of a Series)

By JANET TARA

Temperature and humidity are probably the two hardest conditions to control in the desert-like atmosphere of the average home.

While cacti and succulents thrive on these conditions, many ferns, flowering plants and orchids suffer from the low humidity common to modern housing.

Plants kept in offices have a harder battle because of the extremes in temperatures that occur at night and on the weekends when the heat or air conditioning is turned off.

Our grandparents grew full, bloom-laden geraniums in their cool kitchens but in the constant, even heat of today's homes, geraniums suffer and the lower leaves may drop.

The easiest, most popular way to raise the humidity in your home is to group plants together on a metal tray filled with pebbles. Keep the water level high enough to cover most of the pebbles but not high



enough to touch the pots.

A long spell of wet weather cut down on a plant's light, but it also temporarily raises the humidity and plants will look more lush.

Frequent misting helps offset dryness for smooth-leaved plants, but is not necessary and can be harmful to fuzzy varieties like gynura aurantiaca (purple velvet plant).

You can make your indoor gar-

dening easier by selecting plants that have the same general temperature and humidity requirements. 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# Doctor testifies for Patty

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Patricia Hearst was a confused young woman with "a variety of behaviors" and virtually no identity of her own in the weeks after her arrest, says a court-appointed psychiatrist.

Dr. L.J. West, a professor of psychiatry and an expert on prisoner of war torture, spent the entire day Tuesday on the witness stand at Miss Hearst's trial for bank robbery.

Asst. U.S. Atty. David Bancroft, who repeatedly questioned West's interpretations of Miss Hearst's mental state, planned to continue his cross-examination today.

During direct questioning by defense counsel F. Lee Bailey, West portrayed Miss Hearst as a "shattered" survivor of a 19-month ordeal in the terrorist underground.

West said Tuesday that Miss Hearst, who had been given the name "Tania" by her Symbionese Liberation Army captors after she proclaimed her allegiance to the terrorist band and took part in the bank robbery, became "Pearl" for much of her time in the underground.

Miss Hearst testified earlier that SLA member Emily Harris gave her the name "Pearl" after the May 17, 1974, shootout in which six SLA members died in Los Angeles.

West said the heiress had made a "remarkable improvement" in her condition in the past few months but still showed signs of anxiety and the fear for her life that characterized much of her own testimony.

West was one of three psychiatrists appointed by U.S. District Court Judge Oliver J. Carter last fall to help determine whether Miss Hearst was competent to stand trial. He spent a total of 23 hours examining the 22-year-old defendant and was called as a witness for the defense.

The other two experts who examined her on behalf of the court have not testified at the trial.

Bancroft attempted Tuesday to discredit West's sympathetic picture of Miss Hearst and elicited the fact the psychiatrist had written the Hearst family months before he ever met the defendant.

West defended his letter to Randolph and Catherine Hearst as "one parent to another," written sometime while Miss Hearst was sought as a fugitive.

"I think I expressed some sympathy and told them they should not despair of their daughter's condition because if she were ever returned to them alive she might be in a condition to be helped and possibly defended," he said.

West and the judge confirmed that the court was aware of the letter prior to West's appointment by Carter to the case.

# Worm causes elephantiasis

**DEAR DR. LAMB** — I have a problem for you to solve. What is elephantiasis and where does it originate? Is there any cure for it or any specialists? What type of doctor would I have to see for results? I need help badly.

**DEAR READER** — You have come up with a rare one in this country. The term elephantiasis refers to swelling and enlargement of the legs to resemble the legs of an elephant. Classically, the condition is caused by an infestation with a thread-like worm. The disease is also called filariasis. The tiny adult worm is from two to four inches long and tends to invade and block the lymphatics. The inguinal region around the hip and inner aspect of the thigh is commonly involved.

The worms cause inflammation and blockage of the lymphatic system. The blocked lymphatic channels leads to the marked swelling. In men, the lymphatics to the scrotum are often involved. The blockage causes progressive and enormous swelling of the scrotum. In fact, the scrotum may be so large that it hangs below the knees and is equally large in all diameters. Its size may be so huge that the man may have trouble with normal physical activity.

This disease is seen primarily in Africa, tropical coastal areas of Asia and in the northern countries of South America. The disease is spread by mosquitos, and man is the only known intermediate host.

At night the young smaller worms are in the blood stream. A mosquito bites the infected person and draws in the filariae and they remain in the mouth for a couple of weeks. When the mosquito bites the next victim it inoculates him with the microworm.

The lymphatics become inflamed from the invasion and the process begins. Initially the limb involved may be shiny and swollen, but eventually the skin becomes scaly and cracked and the skin is thickened.

The worms can be killed by various medicines and the enlarged scrotum can be surgically

removed. Incidentally, this can be done without damaging the testicles. Similar swollen enlarged tissues can be removed from the legs or even the breast when it is involved. There are medicines for prevention of infestation available to those traveling to areas where the disease is common.

The term elephantiasis has also been applied to any type of swelling

that causes marked enlargements similar to those I have mentioned. I suspect that must be the situation in your case.

What kind of doctor should you see? A good place to start would be with your family doctor. He can refer you to a specialist in internal medicine if you need that if he is not a specialist in that area himself. If you need surgery he can

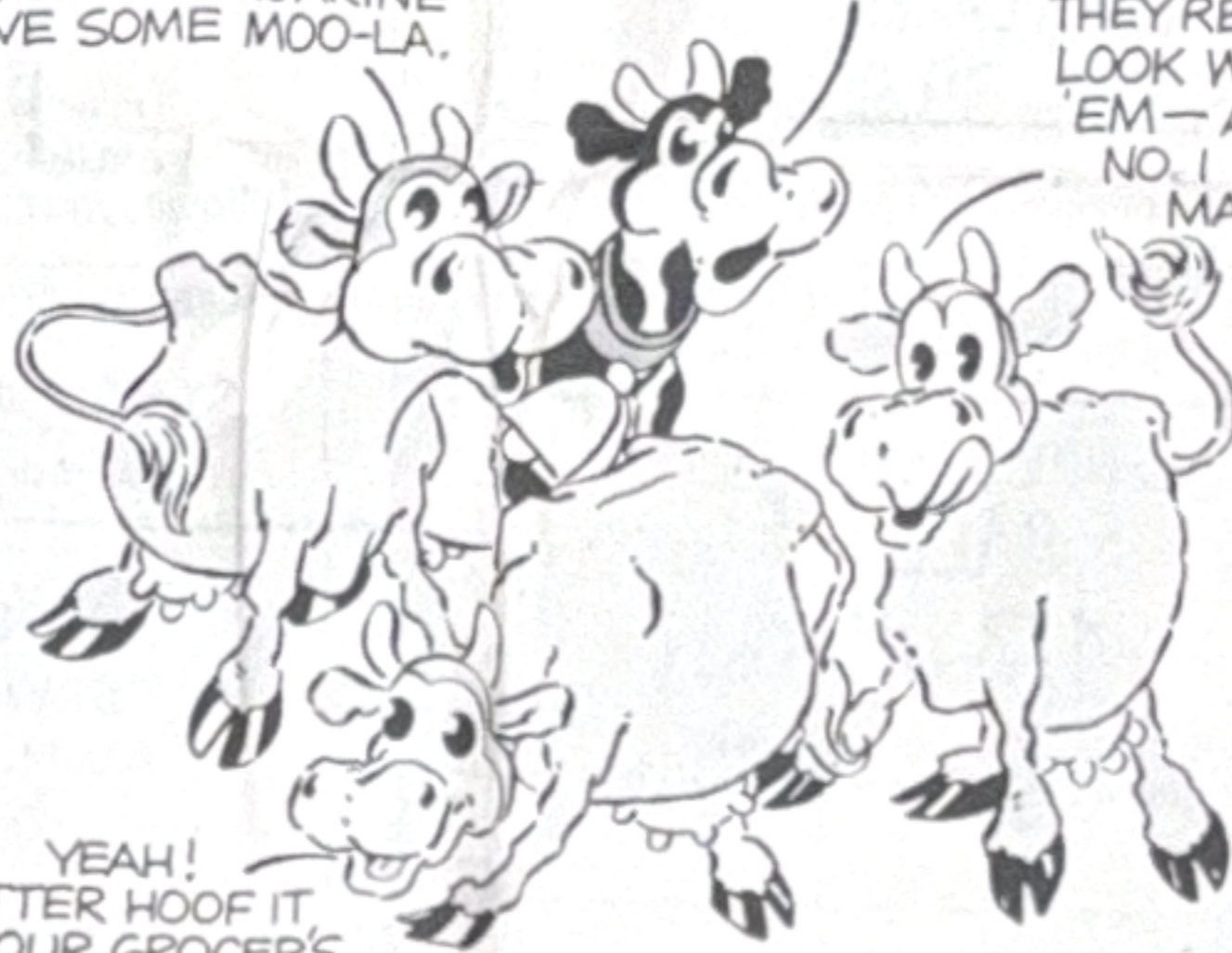

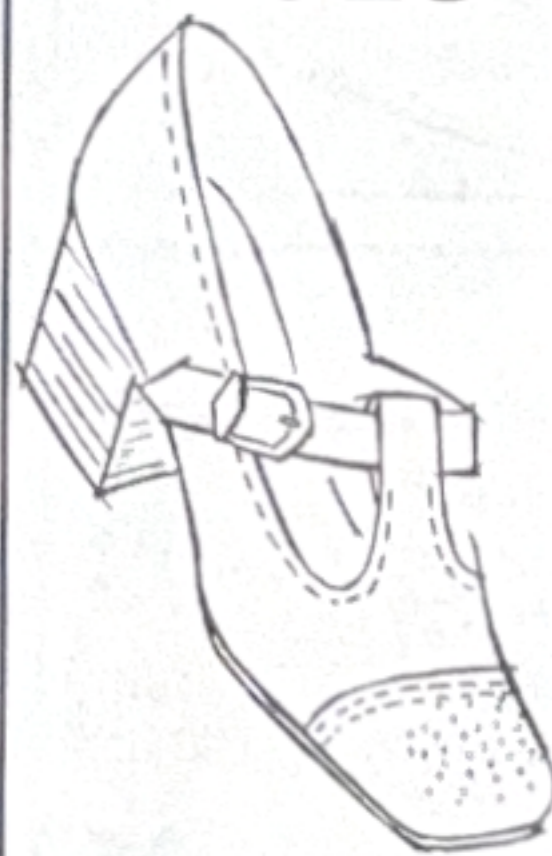



# The senior forum

**QUESTION** — It appears that Social Security has now joined the lawyers and probate courts in the game of making widows starve for six months after their husbands die. When my husband died I surrendered a claim for my own Social Security to apply for 100 per cent of his, which was higher. After six months of arguing with Social Security about this my first check arrived, and all the while my husband's estate was crawling through probate like a turtle, with his assets all hidden under the shell.—MRS. C.R.B.

**ANSWER** — A husband's death can indeed bring financial anxiety to a widow, but things aren't as bad as you picture them. Social Security usually takes three months for processing claims, but if all your records aren't up to par, with marriage, birth certificates and so on and if there are arguments, there can be long delays.

And in probate court, a lawyer can nearly always obtain money for a widow before the estate is settled. Again provided the records are straight. You must realize that in our peculiar times there are women who claim a man's estate or his Social Security when they can't prove they were married to him.

While most widows worry about money and bills as soon as a husband died, few respectable ones have to suffer. Creditors are tolerant, and most banks, after investigating the estate, will make loans to widows to tide them over a crisis.

Somebody back down the line, and probably the schools, did a great injustice to women by not teaching them money affairs.

## Hockey player will face assault charge

TORONTO (AP) — A National Hockey League referee gave Dan Maloney of the Detroit Red Wings a five-minute penalty last Nov. 5 when the big left wing slugger Toronto defenseman Brian Glennie. A Toronto judge and jury could wind up giving him five years.

For striking Glennie and knocking him to the ice during the Maple Leafs' 7-3 victory, the 25-

year-old Maloney will stand trial on a charge of assault causing bodily harm. Provincial Court Judge Aaron Brown ruled Tuesday.

A trial date will be set April 5, the day after the NHL regular season ends. Maloney, the fourth NHL player to face criminal prosecution for excessive roughness during a game, faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

Maloney was released in his own recognizance pending the trial. NHL President Clarence Campbell said from his Montreal office that the league would not intervene in the case.

In a preliminary hearing earlier this month, Maloney entered a plea of innocent to the charge, which had been filed the day after the game by Ontario Attorney General Roy McMurtry. Only a week

earlier, McMurtry had warned he would take steps to curb violence in hockey games.

In the game, Glennie checked Brian Hextall, then with Detroit. Maloney allegedly then hit Glennie in the face and knocked him to the ice, picked him up by the sweater and dropped him several times. Glennie, 29, was hospitalized for 12 hours with temporary amnesia and a slight concussion.

The reason is that if you take a new deck of cards, cut it as often as you wish, give it one absolutely perfect shuffle, cut it some more and then deal it out, you will produce this monstrosity.

If the dealer happens to hold the spade suit and he and his partner are using the grand slam force, the bidding is likely to proceed along the lines shown in the box.

Then, anything can happen with freak hands. We can imagine tens of thousands of bidding sequences. Some people may even stop short of a slam. Others will double their opponents somewhere along the way.

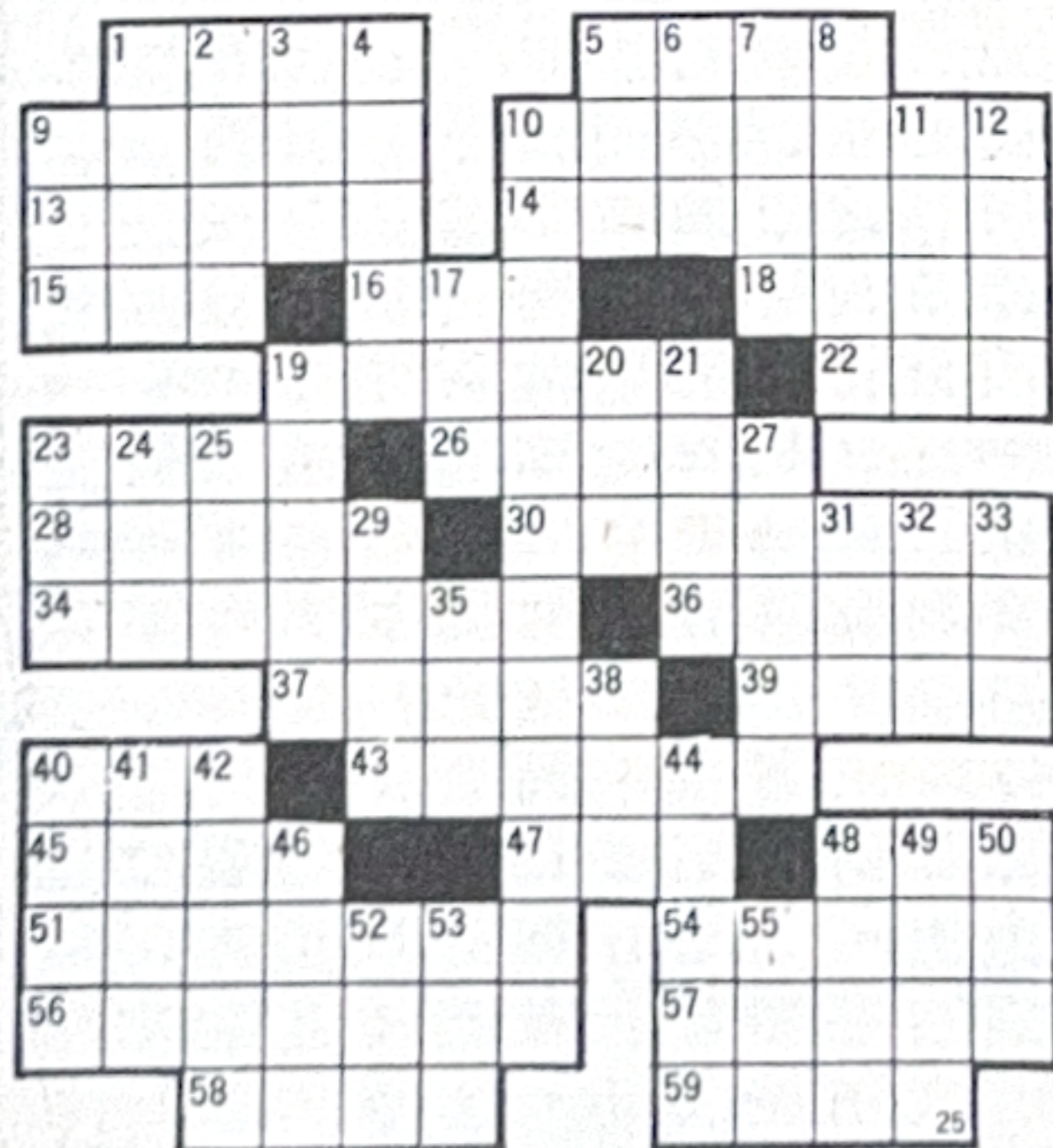
The one thing we can be certain of is that irrespective of who gets to bid first the side with the spades is likely to wind up playing the hand and if they get pushed into seven they are likely to be doubled.
