### AP® Eligibility

Multiple criteria are used to determine student placement:

- A demonstrated interest in the subject
- Performance in prerequisite and/or comparable courses
- Standardized test scores in that area
- Work ethic
- Self-advocacy
- Anticipated overall schedule
- College plans and/or major
- Extracurricular commitments

### Additional AP® Notes

A student cannot take more than 5 AP classes in the 11th or 12th grades; rarely can a student take more than 2 AP classes in the 10th grade. Students do not report AP® scores until matriculation unless required for admission.

### Community Service

Students are required to engage in community service as responsible citizens in the community. Students may complete no more than 25% of the required hours on campus. The minimum required community service hours are:

## Signature Programs

### Writing Center

The Writing Center is a student-led, student-run organization that offers individualized tutoring, workshops, guest speakers, and special events to students in grades 6-12. The Episcopal Writing Fellows program is a leadership and service opportunity for sophomores, juniors, and seniors that focuses on brainstorming, editing, and peer tutoring. Writing Fellows are selected through a rigorous application process and volunteer a minimum of two hours per week throughout the school year.

### Senior Peer Leaders

Rising seniors are selected for their leadership, commitment to excellence, and visible demonstration of Respect, Reverence, and Responsibility to mentor incoming freshmen grappling with academic, social, and emotional challenges in their transition to Upper School. Peer leaders meet bi-weekly with their groups, lead activities on orientation and Shadow Day and assist chaperones with the Freshman Retreat.

### Chapel Talk

During the senior year, each student must write and present a Chapel Talk to the Middle and Upper School student body and faculty. Seniors are given the opportunity to reflect on their experiences, their moral and spiritual growth, and their development as students and citizens of the world.

### Entrepreneurial Studies

This four-year program prepares students for both social and business entrepreneurship through courses such as Civics, Economics, Design Thinking, and Communication. Partnering with hospitals, museums, businesses, and nonprofits, students apply their learning to real-world challenges while developing critical thinking, communication, and problem-solving skills. The program culminates in a Business Immersion course and Senior Capstone, where students design and launch ventures with lasting impact.

### Fine and Performing Arts Certificate of Distinction

The Certificate of Distinction in the Arts acknowledges graduating seniors who demonstrate a true emphasis through advanced studies, leadership skills, and commitment to the visual and performing arts. To be eligible for this distinction, the student must complete the following:

- A minimum of three credits in visual or performing arts, including one advanced class.
- Serve in leadership positions within the arts community.
- Participate in an internship/practicum within the arts community totaling at least fifteen hours.
- Actively participate in school-recognized visual and performing arts events, performances, or competitions.

## Athletics

Episcopal Collegiate School Athletics creates a strong and competitive program in balance with students' academics and other extracurricular activities. Our no-cut policy invites exploration and participation. More than 80% of Upper School students play at least one sport. More than 70% play multiple sports. Our sports offerings include:

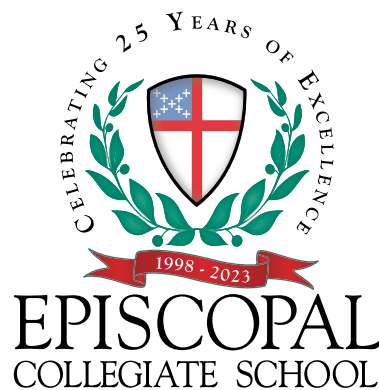
