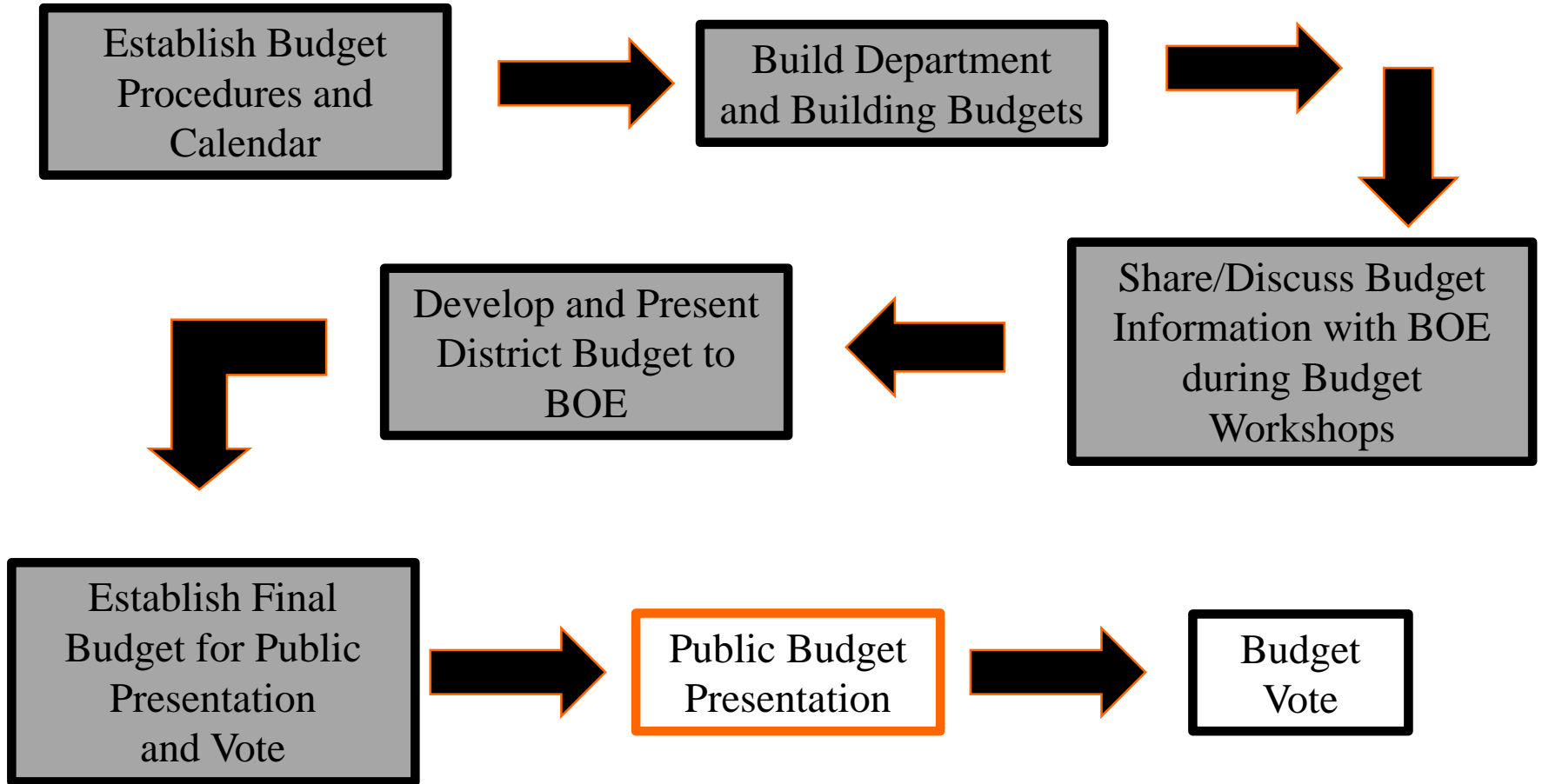

Budget Analysis Information

For 2025-2026 (Current School Year)

- Operating on only a 1.99% budget to budget annual increase
- Governor and Legislators provided 2.0% increase in our Foundation Aid
- Maintained a bare-minimum 1% increase to the Levy
- Allocated a projected \$637,607 of unrestricted fund balance

What's on the Horizon for 2026-2027?

- Operating expenses will continue to increase year over year
- Governor proposed 1% increase and Legislators proposed 2% increase in Foundation Aid for 2026-2027. 2% is better than 1% but it is still inadequate.
- Work to maintain the lowest possible Levy increase for our community (however, as the Governor and the Legislators continue to choose to allow schools to receive inadequate increases or cuts in Foundation Aid, this goal becomes less feasible.)
- **ADVOCATE for ADEQUATE SCHOOL FUNDING!**
- Responsibly determine the amount of unrestricted fund balance needed

Please Advocate a 5% Increase for "Save Harmless" Schools

Upstate New York schools rely heavily upon Foundation Aid as a main source of State Aid revenue. For many districts, the percentage of our budgets funded by State Aid is well over 50%, and Foundation Aid represents the lion's share. Foundation Aid is the most effective funding stream to ensure our school districts can maintain fiscally responsible operating budgets year to year while simultaneously working to ensure that our students receive the education and experiences that they deserve. Inadequate Foundation Aid is devastating to our students, our programs, our parents/community members, and our staff.

With current Tax Cap legislation, school districts are not allowed to go above the calculated tax cap without a supermajority vote. When community members hear that a district is "piercing the cap", even after providing adequate education on the reasons for doing so, it causes animosity and anger based on the current NYS Tax Cap narrative. Additionally, the current Tax Cap formula makes it possible to have a negative levy increase which would require a school district to "pierce the cap" with a super majority vote just to have a positive increase. If the goal is to keep schools from raising property taxes, NYS must do its part to ensure that we are equitably and adequately funded using Foundation Aid.

Adequate, Predictable Foundation Aid Increases Each Year are Vital

Example: **Current school operating budget of \$14,969,506**

A **4% increase** in this operating budget yields an **increase of \$598,780**

A **2% increase** in Foundation Aid = **\$106,558**

A **2% increase** to the district's **tax levy** yields **\$115,186**

- \$598,780 (4% increase in operating expenses)
\$115,186 (2% increase on the tax levy)
+ \$108,690 (2% increase in Foundation Aid)
\$374,904 deficit for the 26-27 school year

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- Schools are expected to do more now than ever before (School House Graphic).
- Increases in operating expenses from year to year continue to escalate and many increases like ERS, TRS, and Health Insurance are out of our control. Without adequate, predictable funding from NYS, school districts will continue to face gaps between revenue and expenses with zero options that will not harm our mission.
- Everyone agrees that our communities cannot handle and will not tolerate large tax levy increases.
- Foundation Aid is the only avenue many school districts have left to support operating cost increases year after year.

- Without reliable and predictable Foundation Aid increases each year, operating costs will continue to grow expenditure-revenue gaps that only staff and program cuts will be able to narrow and our districts do not have staff to cut. When staff are cut, programs, supports, and services are weakened or lost completely, causing a direct and damaging impact on our students. Everyone agrees that students have higher needs, and that schools are required to provide more services and supports now than ever before. We need viable, predictable Foundation Aid to accomplish this.
- A failure to adequately fund and support our school districts undermines any and all other programs and initiatives that our State government aims to fund and have succeed. A quality education is fundamental for a functional society. Every organization is important. Every Legislator is pulled in many different directions to support New York State and we know how challenging that can be. All of the different branches of the tree that legislators work to grow will be for naught if we kill the roots. The importance of education and the generations of students that we are charged with preparing to learn, grow, and become decent human beings; ready to work and contribute to society, requires adequate, reliable, predictable and equitable funding for NYS State schools.

Capital

The capital budget includes costs associated with operations and maintenance of buildings, upkeep of grounds, electricity, heat, oil, water, sewer and telephone services. Funds are also included here for the lease and purchase of buses, payment of debt for capital projects (principal and interest), refund of taxes, and insurance. The final piece of this budget is a transfer to capital for ongoing building improvements.

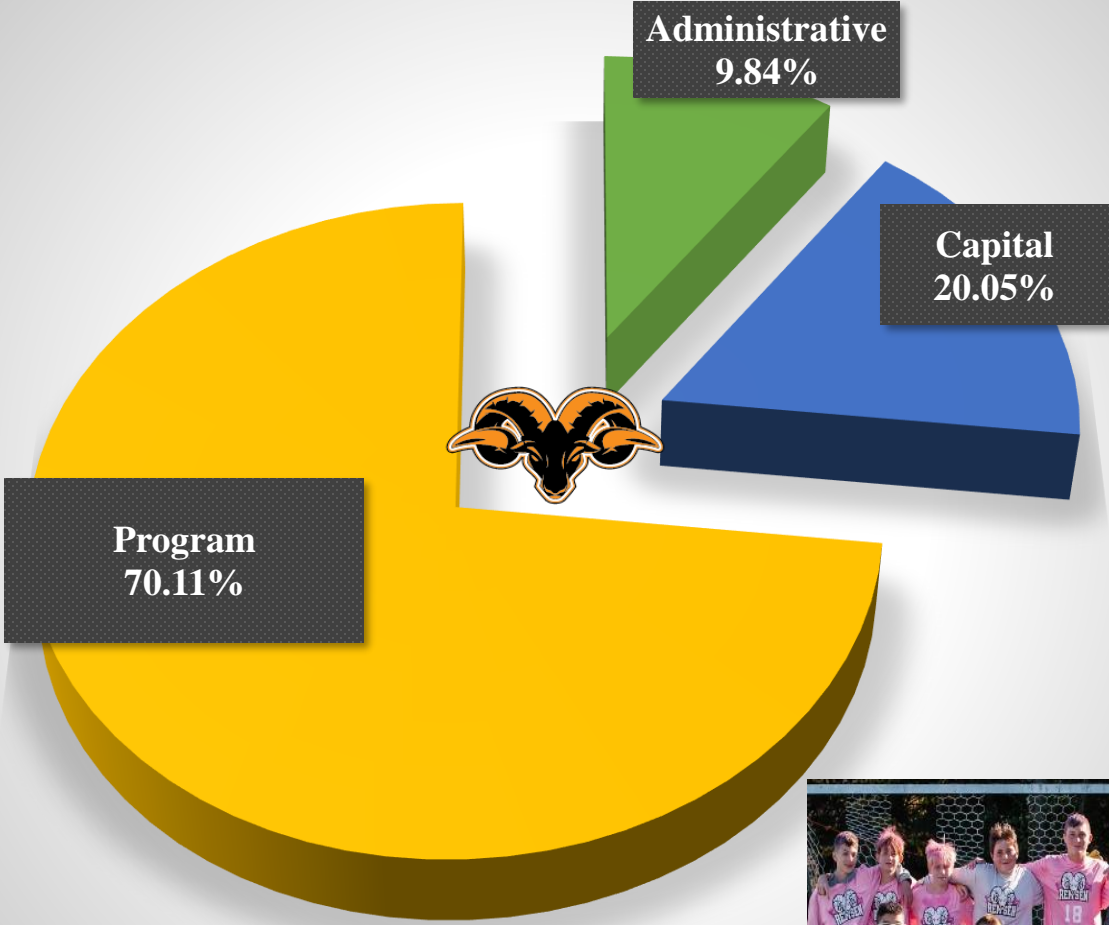

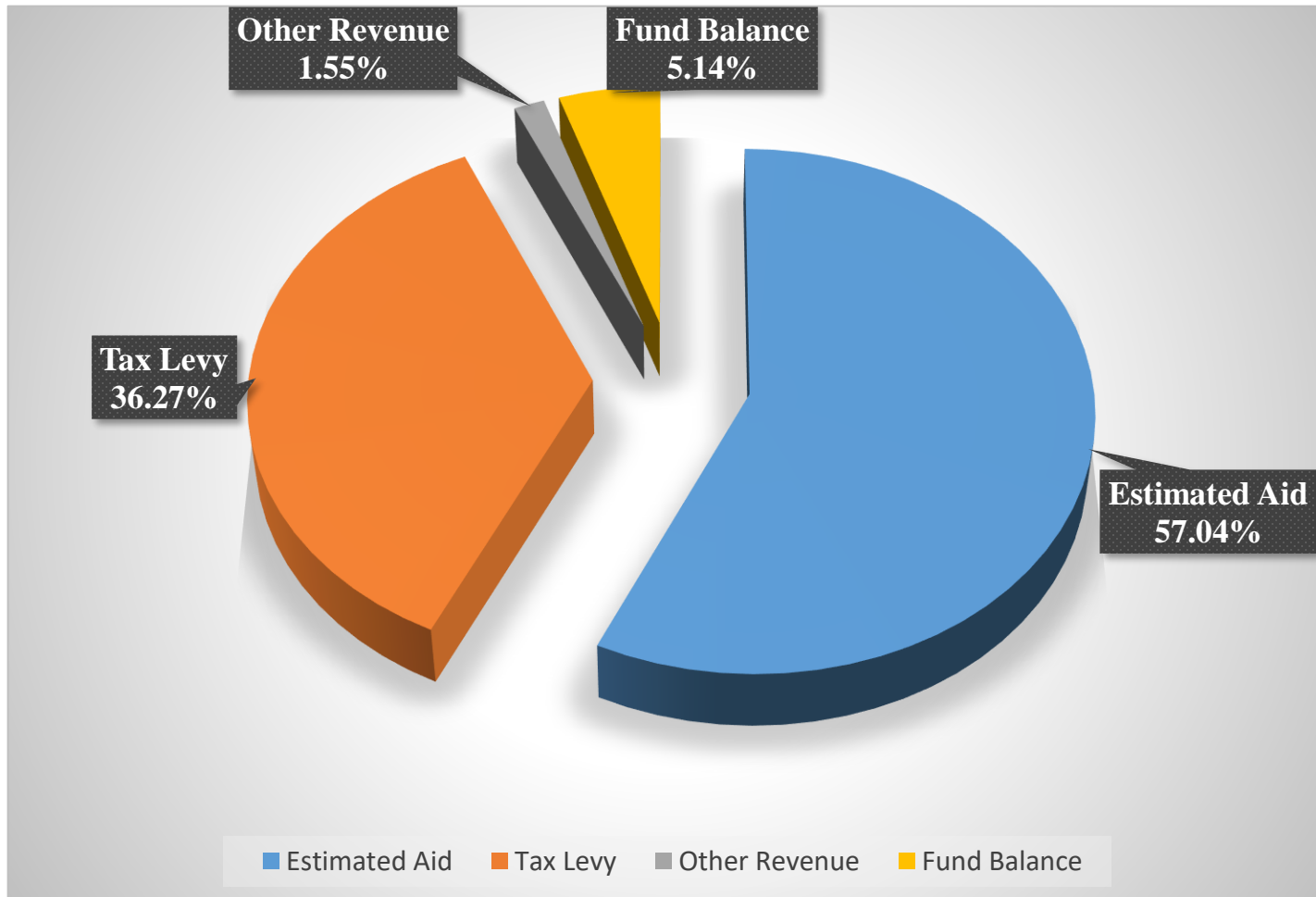

Large State Aid Increase and Large Operating Budget Increase Information
The Operating Budget indicates a sizeable increase as does the revenue reflected in Estimated Aid. This is due to the Capital Improvement Project Debt coming onboard along with the respective State Aid to pay for said debt.

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Why a small tax levy increase?

Even with a small increase in the tax levy (1.50%), the estimated gap between revenue and expenditures is still \$827,587.

A 1.50 % increase in Remsen's tax levy equates to \$86,389.

Operational costs, health insurance, and retirement contributions continue to increase.

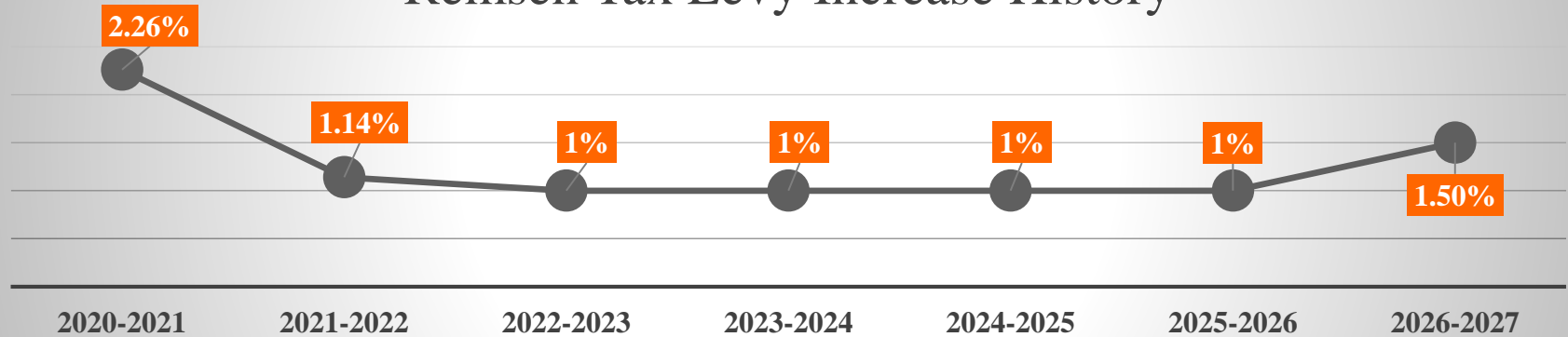

What did we do to help ensure that our 2026-2027 operating budget only increased slightly, in addition to Capital expenses, for next year?



- 1) Remaining fiscally responsible while working to ensure that all of our students receive a quality educational experience.
- 2) Integrate the use of fund balance to minimize the tax burden on the community.
- 3) Forward-thinking to maintain a responsible fund balance and build reserves.
- 4) Thoughtful planning as vacancies/retirements occur to optimize personnel and contain costs.

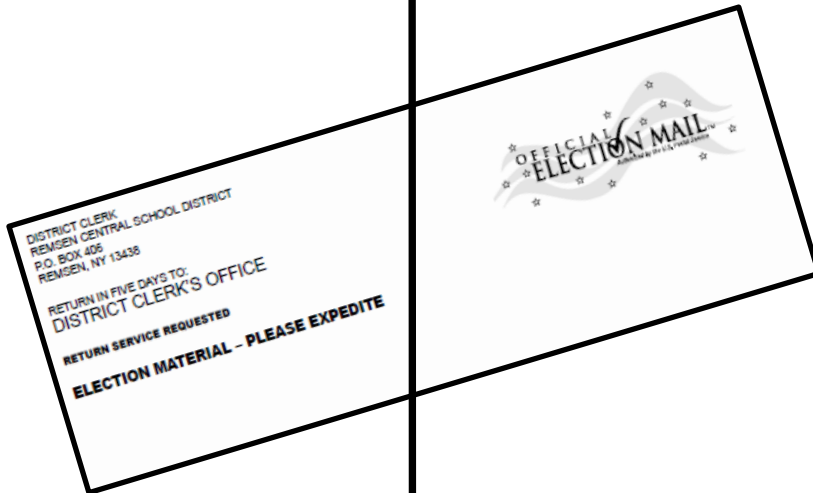

Residents who will not be in the area on May 19, or who are unable to vote in person, may apply for an absentee ballot at the Remsen Central School District Office. If the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the voter, the application must be submitted at least seven days prior to the vote. If the absentee ballot is to be picked up by the voter in person, applications will be accepted until May 18. Absentee ballots must be returned to the district clerk no later than 5:00 PM on May 19.

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Voter Qualifications



To Vote, You Must Be:

A citizen of the United States

At least 18 years old

A resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the date of the meeting when the vote is held

Qualified to register for or vote at an election in accordance with the provisions of section 5-106 of the Election Law
