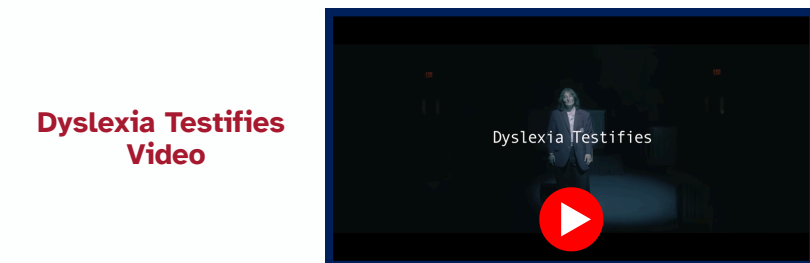

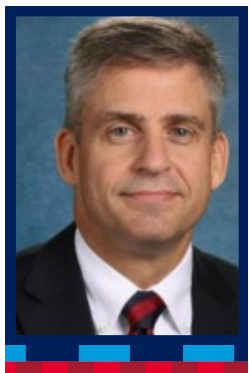

As I reflect on the close of this remarkable 99th year of The Gow School, I'm filled with gratitude for the growth, resilience, and joy that defined our campus community. This year brought meaningful progress across academics, literacy, and personal development thanks to the dedication of our students, families, faculty, and staff.

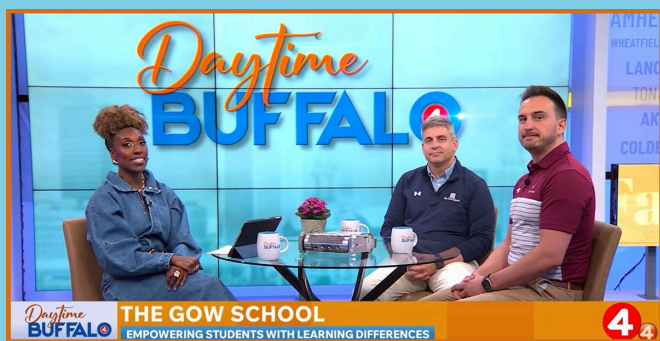
This year also brought several transformative academically focused initiatives. The Orton Study Commons underwent thoughtful renovation and reimagining, while Howard Hall opened this spring, providing inviting academic spaces for focused work and reflective reading. Our new Saturday academic experiences were an overwhelming success, offering opportunities for academic enrichment, community engagement, and exposure to career pathways.

Our new winter academic schedule introduced intentional pacing and individualized support, enabling students to engage deeply with challenging material while maintaining balance and well-being. This restructuring resulted in stronger retention of concepts, improved classroom participation, and renewed motivation. We also launched our new postgraduate program in partnership with Villa Maria College, providing a bridge-year focused on literacy development, executive function supports, and college-readiness experiences. Early outcomes already demonstrate increased self-efficacy and clearer pathways to post-secondary success.

Most notably, this year highlighted exceptional growth in our students' academic and literacy skills. Across reading, decoding, and language comprehension, students approached texts with greater confidence and curiosity. These outcomes reflect the power of a community that believes in every learner and supports them with high expectations and unwavering encouragement.

Looking ahead to summer, I encourage our students to continue reading and practicing their Reconstructive Language phonics and roots cards. A few pages a day, a few minutes of targeted phonics work, and continued curiosity will help sustain and accelerate growth as we return in the fall.

With gratitude for a highly successful year and excitement for what comes next, I want to thank everyone who helped make this year so bright. I am inspired by our students' resilience, uplifted by their progress, and grateful for a community that continually champions learning, growth, and one another. Go Ravens!

# Ben Parker '95

For many students, finding the right school can change the course of their lives. For Ben Parker '95, that journey led him to The Gow School, a place that challenged him, supported him, and ultimately helped shape the resilience and independence that would guide both his personal life and professional success. What began as a hesitant transition during high school became the foundation for a career spent pursuing excellence in the competitive world of golf course management.

Before arriving at Gow, Ben attended public School through 9<sup>th</sup> grade. Like many families searching for the right educational fit, his mother was determined to find a program that supported his needs through high school. Ben first entered Gow through the school's summer program, where Ben tested the waters before making a full commitment. Ben championed his family to try one more year at public high school which he did, but it was very clear at the end he needed Gow to continue high school. Ben arrived for his 10<sup>th</sup> Grade year at Gow, ready for a fresh start.

Looking back, he laughs remembering what that transition felt like.

"Walking into Gow felt like what most people experience their first year of college," he shared. "It was a big adjustment, but it taught me independence."

Ben seemed to have a knack at advocating for himself. Passionate about playing hockey, he was allowed to leave campus to practice and compete with a team in Orchard Park. That balance of accountability, structure, and trust became a defining part of his Gow experience.

Sports played a major role in Ben's life during his years at Gow. In addition to hockey, he played lacrosse under coach Dan Kelley and fondly remembers the camaraderie of ski club trips, packing up the trailer and heading to the slopes with classmates and faculty. Yet beyond athletics, it was the relationships he built that left the deepest impact. Teachers and mentors including Dan Kelley, Adam Steinberg, Tom Giallanza, and Dale Hazen became important influences during a critical time in his life. Ben credits Gow with teaching him far more than academics. He learned time management, how to navigate difficult situations, and perhaps most importantly, how to rely on himself.

"Even though I hated study hall and being proctored at the time," he admitted, "I realized later that the structure and study habits were exactly what I needed."

One lesson in particular stayed with him long after graduation.

"I learned that when I fall on my face, at least I can get back up on my own."

After leaving Gow, Ben pursued a lifelong passion for golf. Having worked at golf courses throughout his teenage years, he knew he wanted to build a career in the industry. He attended Southern Illinois University, one of the few schools at the time offering a bachelor's degree in Golf Course Turf Management.



Determined to work at premier golf courses, Ben began building his career across the country. His early stops included Sahalee in Seattle, WA, before moving to the renowned Valhalla Golf Club in Louisville, KY, where he served as Assistant Superintendent for when the course hosted the 2000 PGA Championship.

Still, Ben had his sights set on returning to the East Coast — another goal he pursued with the persistence Gow had helped instill in him. Eventually, opportunity came calling from a family on Long Island developing a private/personal golf course and estate. Ben accepted the role and has now spent the past 20 years overseeing operations there, building both a career and a life he is proud of.

Today, Ben lives in Old Westbury, NY with his wife Margaret and their two children. His daughter is preparing to attend the College of Charleston, while his son is a freshman in high school. And while he may no longer lace up his own skates regularly, hockey remains central to his life as he now coaches his son's hockey team. Outside of work, he enjoys spending time on the water boating with his family.

For Ben, Gow was more than a school — it was the foundation that helped him discover resilience, confidence, and purpose.

His advice to today's young Gow students reflects the same determination that shaped his own story:

"Stay with it. Give it a chance. It will pay off in the end. You will be a better person when you leave Gow. I started kicking and screaming, but here I am now, living my dream."
