GRADUATION SECURITY SCREENING
All guests will pass through the weapons detection system. To avoid delays and ensure a smooth and swift entrance, please review the following important information prior to attending.

PROHIBITED ITEMS
Weapons of any kind are not allowed. Below are examples of items that should not be brought to graduation ceremonies, as they commonly trigger the weapons detection system and cause delays.
⊗ Eyeglass cases
⊗ Vapes or e-cigarettes
⊗ Eyelash curlers
⊗ Purses
⊗ Noise makers

BAG POLICY
To help move attendees quickly through the weapons detection system, we strongly encourage guests not to bring bags.
✓ If a bag is necessary, it must be clear and no larger than 12" x 6" x 12"
✓ Only diaper bags and medical items for small children are permitted.
✓ Purses not allowed.

Guests with non-compliant bags or prohibited items must return them to their vehicles.

ARRIVAL AND ENTRY TIMES
Graduation ceremonies begin promptly at 7:00 p.m. Gates will open at 5:30 where spectators will enter through the weapons detection system.

Please pay an important note about the start time (7:00pm) and the time the gates open (5:30pm). Expect delays because of the weapons detection systems. It is recommended guests arrive early. Final Exams and SC EOC Exams

Final exams and South Carolina End-of-Course exams (English 2, Biology, US History, and Algebra 1) will take place May 20-May 26. EOCs are 20% of the course grade in English 2, Biology, Algebra 1, and US History and must be taken for a student to receive credit for the course. South Carolina Department of Education regulations no longer permit students to enter a testing room after directions have been read. Therefore, it is imperative that students arrive at their testing location on time or they will be unable to take the test. EOCs are also not timed so it is best not to make appointments on days students are testing.

SCDE asks schools to communicate with students and parents about the importance of test security. Students may not possess any cell phones, smart watches, smart glasses, or other device except for the school computer used during testing. Students have the responsibility to protect the confidentiality of the statewide assessments. All test materials are the property of the SCDE or the contractor, and theft of test materials or compromising the security or confidentiality of test materials through any means, such as copying, videoing, and sharing content, in any way,

is against the South Carolina code of laws. Specifically, no one may reproduce, copy, record, distribute, broadcast, or share any part of the material presented to them during a test session. No one may disseminate, in any form, material that is similar to the items on the test.

Students attempting to cheat on a state End-of-Course exam will be suspended from school and subject to state repercussions that may include failure of the course.

Graduation Practice: Thursday, May 28, 8:30 AM - noon, MANDATORY to participate in the graduation ceremony

- Please schedule college orientation, grad parties, etc. so that seniors can attend this practice in full.
- 8:30 AM, main gym to start; late students won't be admitted; DON'T schedule work or anything else before noon.
- Seniors submit check out sheets to their counselors as a ticket into practice
- Dress comfortably for the heat/bring water as we practice both inside and outside.
- Rain tickets are distributed at the end of practice (3 tickets per graduate for seating in main gym bleachers if we get inclement weather)
- Scheduling conflicts about grad practice go straight to Mr. Schidrich.

Graduation, Friday, May 29, HHIHS Stadium with no tickets needed unless we move inside because of weather:

- Because of the construction, parking will be tricky. Be prepared to arrive early and carpool if possible.
- Dress Code for Graduation:
 - Semi-Formal attire. Cap, gown, tassel, Seahawk stole required; honor cords from Awards Night. Acceptable attire includes a light colored dress, light colored shirt and tie with dress pants, dress shoes. Be careful with shoe choices because of the turf field. No flip flops, please.
 - *ONLY SCHOOL APPROVED HONOR CORDS AND STOLES, distributed at Senior Awards Night, may be worn*
 - Caps may be appropriately personalized and decorated.
- When? Graduates should arrive at the main gym by 5:30 pm for the 7:00 pm ceremony. No tickets necessary for an outdoor ceremony.
- Potential rain plans will be communicated via social media as they are finalized that day.
 - Seniors: LEAVE YOUR 3 RAIN TICKETS WITH YOUR GUESTS WHO MAY NEED THEM.
 - Guests: BRING YOUR 3 RAIN TICKETS REGARDLESS OF HOW THE WEATHER LOOKS JUST IN CASE.
- All obligations must be paid in order to participate in any graduation-related activities.
- If a student is suspended at the time of any event, they may not participate in that event.
- All school rules will apply throughout all events. Anyone under the influence of alcohol or drugs will not be allowed to participate and will face consequences.

Graduation Reminders

New Graduation Protocols:

- The weapons detection system will be in place at all school events, including at the gates to the stadium the evening of Graduation, so plan accordingly. Personal items that will alert the system include eyeglass cases, eyelash curlers, spray bottles, handheld gaming devices, and any other heavy metal item. *Please allow for extra time when entering the school or stadium.*
- BCSD and SCHSL have a strict clear bag policy inside all gymnasiums and stadiums. Approved bags are clear plastic, vinyl, or PVC, not exceeding 12" x 6" x 12", or one-gallon clear freezer bags. Small, non-clear clutch bags (4.5" x 6.5") are allowed as well as necessary medical/diaper bags after inspection.
- You are required to remain seated in the bleachers until all graduate's names have been read. We understand everyone is anxious and excited to see their graduate on the football field; however, those later in the alphabet can't hear their graduate's name being read when others are exiting the bleachers during the ceremony. You will be allowed to exit the bleachers after the students throw their caps.

- Students are required to wear the mandatory graduation regalia: cap with tassel, gown, and Seahawk hood as well any honor cords or stoles awarded and approved by HHIHS. Students are NOT allowed to wear any outside stoles or honor cords. Any personalization to the traditional and required graduation regalia should be limited to decorating the cap. Students are encouraged to decorate their graduation caps in any way they choose as long as it is school appropriate. This includes representing their home country, their future college/university, or a positive message.
- Please be reminded that balloons and noisemakers are not allowed inside the ceremony. These balloons obstruct other's view and the noisemakers prevent hearing students' names being read.

Special Needs for Graduation:

- Please be advised handicap parking is available in the stadium parking lot. There is a wheelchair accessible ramp leading into the bleachers. If the ceremony is inside, there is wheelchair space on the bottom level.

BCSD News Release: BCSD Launches “Groceries-to-Go” Summer Food Program

Beaufort, SC — Beaufort County School District* (BCSD), in partnership with The Nutrition Group, is offering Groceries-to-Go, a new free summer food program providing weekly grab-and-go breakfast and lunch meal kits for children.

The program runs June 11 through July 31 and is open to children ages 18 and under, as well as eligible individuals over 18 with disabilities who participate in qualifying programs during the school year.

Families may pick up weekly grocery kits on Thursdays from 4–6 p.m. or Fridays from noon–2 p.m. at designated locations in Bluffton and Beaufort. *(Pickups scheduled for June 19 and July 3 will move to the Wednesday prior from noon–2 p.m.)*

Parents or guardians must reserve a ticket for each child, each week and present the QR code received by email along with an ID at pickup.

From BCSD: MySchoolBucks

As a reminder, the Beaufort County School District will officially transition to MySchoolBucks on March 3. On that date, OSP (Online School Payments) will no longer be active. To ensure uninterrupted access to online payments and your school's online store, we ask that all families create their free MySchoolBucks account as soon as possible.

Get Started in 4 Easy Steps

1. Download the MySchoolBucks mobile app (available on iOS and Android) or visit www.myschoolbucks.com.
2. Create your free account.
3. Add a student to your account using the student's name, date of birth, and/or student ID number.
4. Browse your school's online store, add items to your cart, and check out securely.

Setting up your account now will allow you to seamlessly manage school-related payments when the system goes live on March 3.

Tutoring for the Spring 2026 semester

Math tutoring will be given by Mr. Willard every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 7:00am to 8:00am in Room B116. Students need to secure a pass from Mr. Willard the day before to enter the building.

If tutoring is needed in the other subjects or with other Math teachers, all teachers have office hours Monday through Thursday from 3:30pm to 4:00pm. Students should talk with their teachers about meeting them after school for additional assistance.

HHHS Online Tutoring Program

We have an online virtual Peer Tutoring program. Members of our school's honor societies programs provide virtual tutoring opportunities to our students who typically cannot stay after school or come before school. Students can use the QR code to make an appointment. There are also posters around the school with QR codes for making appointments.



Attendance Policy for the 2025-26 School Year

It is important for your student to come to school every day, come to school on time, and to be on time for all their classes. There is a positive correlation between being in school and student achievement. The SC State regulation for attendance (seat time) requires a student to be present for at least 120 hours in a semester class or 60 hours in a quarter class in order for a student to receive credit for a class. That is equal to 80 class days for a semester class and 40 for quarter class. In other words, a student may miss up to 10 days per semester class and 5 per quarter class. It is also important to remember that for each time is late (tardy) to a class, this is also a reduction in seat time. If a student does not meet the 120/60 hour seat requirement, they may receive an FA (Failure due to absences) for the course. Seat hours may be made up on Saturdays during the semester on scheduled make up days. For more on the attendance policy please go to:

Here is the automatic reply when a parent requests early dismissal for the student.

Thank you for submitting your early release request. No early dismissals 30 minutes prior to the end of the school day. For example: Half days, not after 12 pm and Regular days, not after 3 pm

Please read the early release procedures below as some of the process has been updated.

- 1.) We receive & approve the request. Requests must be submitted before noon each regular school day or 10:00am on half days.

- 2.) Please let the student know there is a dismissal request.
- 3.) The student should show the teacher their early release pass which will be used as a pass out of class and to the front desk.
- 4.) For the safety of our students, we require that any person who will be picking up a student during the school day come into the building and show their ID. The person who is picking up a student will only be permitted to take the student with them if they are listed in PowerSchool. If a student is driving themselves, they will be permitted to sign out and leave at the time listed on their early release note.
