Attach all activities to the back of this BINGO card and turn it in to your ELA teacher on the first full week of school. Your ELA teacher will give further instructions at that time.

Choose one character to write a poem about. The poem needs to be at least 10 lines long.	Identify an example of foreshadowing in the book. Explain what it is foreshadowing and why it is important.	Identify the elements of a story. Be sure to include, setting, rising action, climax, falling action, and resolution.	In a paragraph, explain, how the title connects to the story. In addition, what do you think the title should be and why?	In a paragraph, explain if you would or would not recommend the book and explain why.
