### You will be assessed based on the following criteria:

- Depth of analysis and interpretation of the chosen theme in each chapter.
- Integration of textual evidence (quotes) to support your analysis.
- Clarity and coherence of writing in each journal entry.
- Engagement and critical thinking demonstrated in the reflection.

### Example Journal Entry

Chapter: 1

Theme: Power and Leadership

In Chapter 1 of *The Hunger Games*, the theme of power and leadership is evident through the Capitol's control over the districts and the fear it instills in the citizens. The annual event of the Hunger Games serves as a powerful reminder of the Capitol's dominance. Katniss explains, "Taking the kids from our districts, forcing them to kill one another while we watch—this is the Capitol's way of reminding us how totally we are at their mercy" (Collins 18). This quote illustrates how the Capitol uses the Hunger Games to assert its authority and suppress any thoughts of rebellion. Additionally, the contrast between the Capitol's opulence and District 12's poverty highlights the imbalance of power. Katniss reflects on the disparities, noting, "District 12. Where you can starve to death in safety" (Collins 6). This line emphasizes the neglect and exploitation faced by the districts under the Capitol's leadership. Through these examples, Collins communicates the theme of power and leadership by showcasing the Capitol's use of fear and deprivation to maintain control.

Reflection: This chapter sets the stage for understanding the oppressive nature of the Capitol's rule. The depiction of power and leadership through fear and control foreshadows the struggles that Katniss and other characters will face as they navigate the Games and their fight for survival. The stark contrast between the Capitol and District 12 also serves to highlight the inequalities and injustices that drive the narrative.
