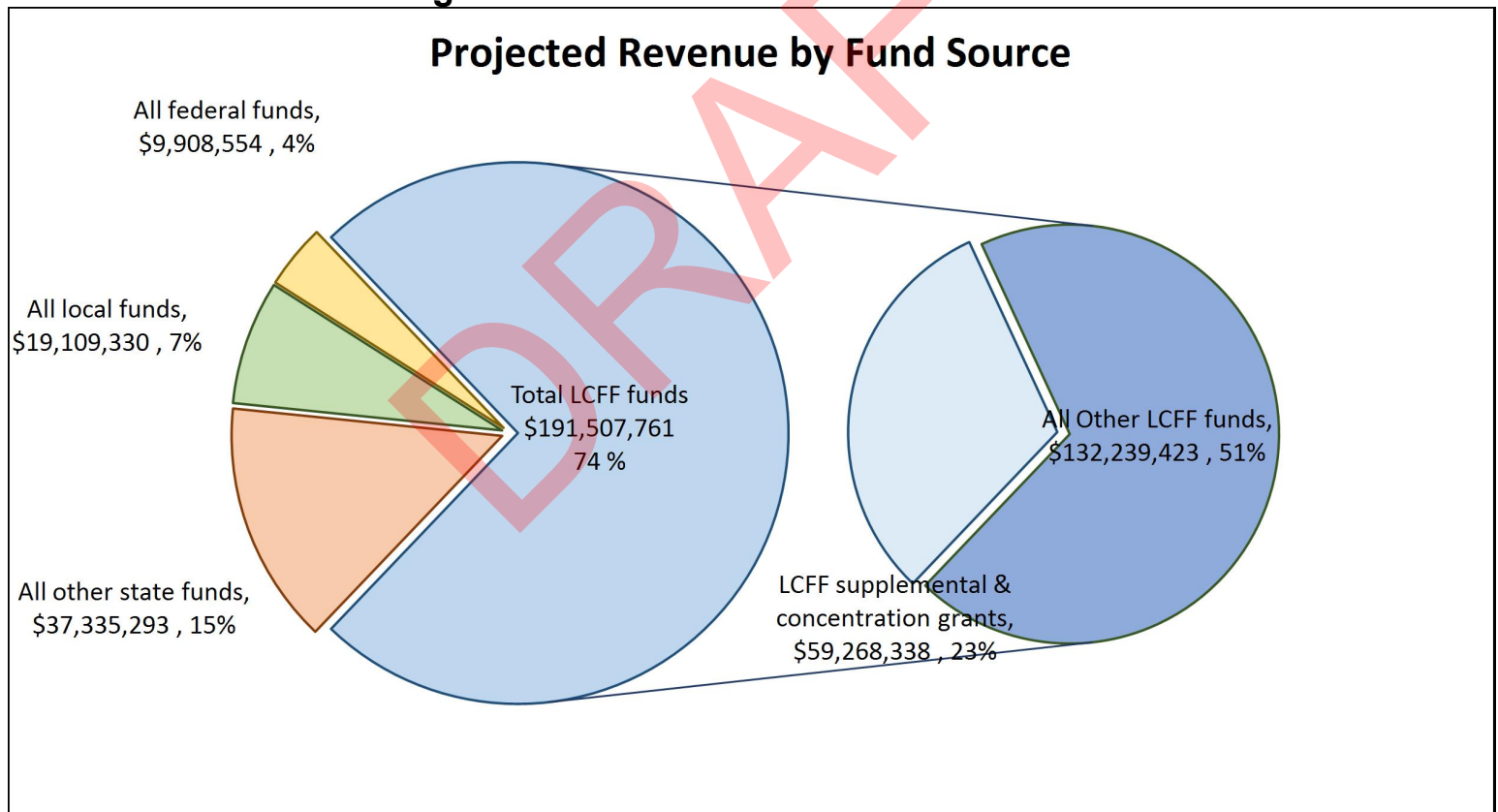

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

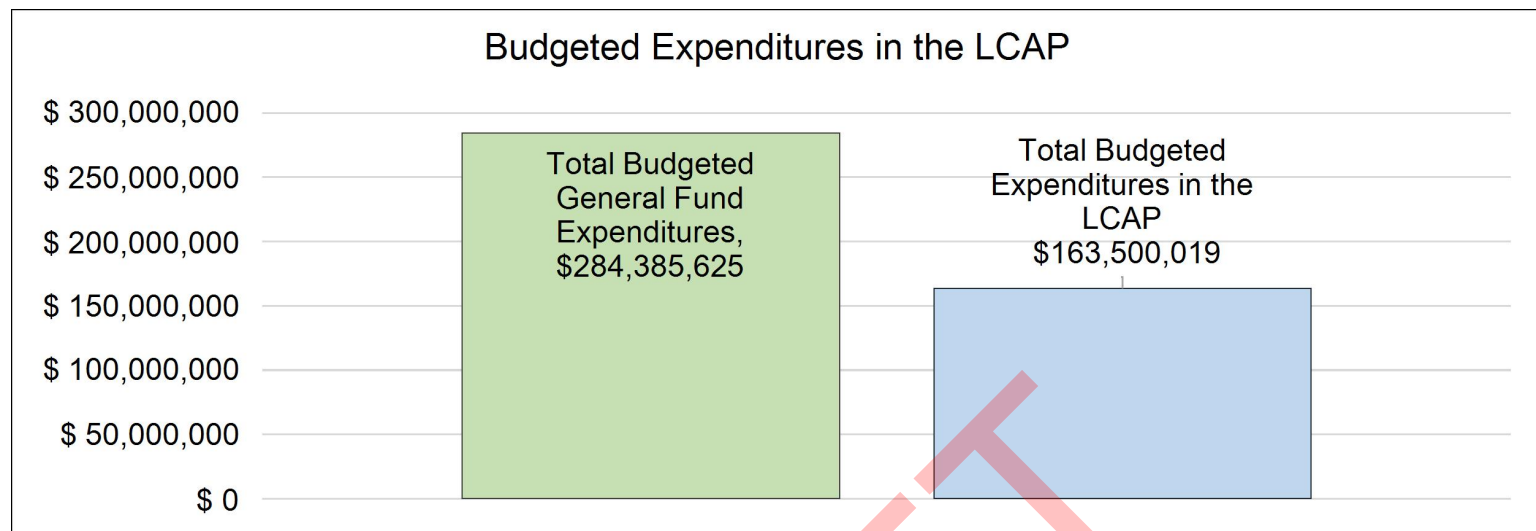


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Paramount Unified School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Paramount Unified School District is \$257,860,938, of which \$191,507,761 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$37,335,293 is other state funds, \$19,109,330 is local funds, and \$9,908,554 is federal funds. Of the \$191,507,761 in LCFF Funds, \$59,268,338 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

The text description of the above chart is as follows: Paramount Unified School District plans to spend \$284,385,625 for the 2026-27 school year. Of that amount, \$163,500,019 is tied to actions/services in the LCAP and \$120,885,606 is not included in the LCAP. The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP will be used for the following:

General Fund budget expenditures not included in the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) primarily consist of routine operational costs that support the overall functioning of the district. These include expenses such as utilities, facility maintenance, transportation, insurance, administrative overhead, salaries for staff who maintain school infrastructure and daily operations, and essential instructional materials such as textbooks. While these expenditures are critical to maintaining safe and effective school operations, they are not directly tied to the specific goals, actions, or services outlined in the LCAP.

The budget also covers costs associated with Special Education services, the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP), and programs funded through federal, state, and local grants. Additionally, Title I services—designed to support students in meeting academic standards—are funded outside of the LCAP and are outlined in each school's School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA). All expenditures are allocated and used in accordance with the guidelines and requirements of their respective funding sources.

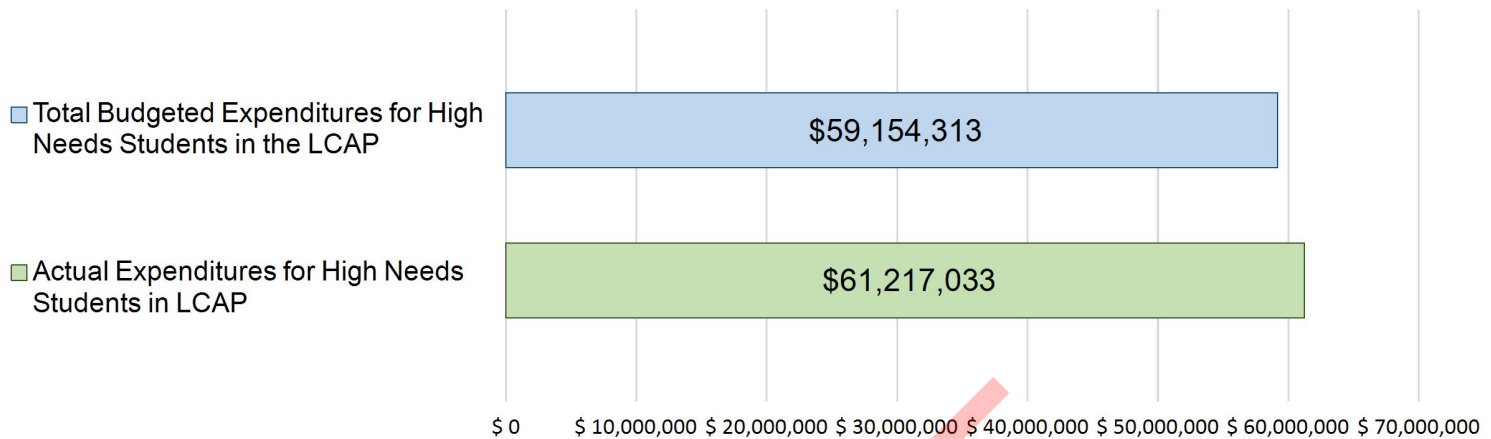
Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

Paramount Unified School District (PUSD) is a TK–12 public school district located in southeastern Los Angeles County, serving a richly diverse student population of approximately 11,250 students across 18 schools. The district encompasses ten elementary schools, one K–8 school, four middle schools, one comprehensive high school, a continuation high school, and a specialized STEM-focused high school

The district’s students reflect the vibrant cultural and linguistic diversity of the broader community. Demographically, the student body includes:

The Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) will carry unexpended funds into the 2026–2027 school year to continue addressing areas of need identified in the 2025 Dashboard and district needs assessment. Despite progress, Foster Youth, English Learners,

and Low-Income students continue to underperform in English Language Arts, Mathematics while Chronic Absenteeism remain as a post-COVID challenge.

To address these gaps, LREBG funds will support Goal 1, Action 1 to implement a comprehensive professional development plan to strengthen curriculum and instructional practices in mathematics. High-quality curricular resources coupled with high-quality professional development within a Multi-Tiered System of Support are needed to develop student competencies and deep mastery of content. (LREBG \$4.5 million)

LREBG funds will support Goal 1, Action 2 through targeted academic interventions to strengthen Tier II and Tier III instruction within a Multi-Tiered System of Support. Instructional Support Teachers will provide targeted instructional support during the school day to identified students. (LREBG \$2.8 million)

LREBG funds will also support Goal 2, Action 3, which implements a districtwide distributed leadership model. Instructional Leadership Teams (ILTs) have been established at each school site, composed of teachers, academic coaches, and principals. The ILTs focus on improving Tier I instructional practices for all students while coordinating Tier II and Tier III interventions to better support English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low-Income students, along with Special Education students and others requiring additional academic or behavioral support. This structure ensures that schools can provide both universal and targeted assistance to close opportunity gaps and improve student outcomes. (LREBG \$250,000)

Additionally, Goal 3, Action 2 and Action 4 will utilize LREBG resources to expand staff training in social-emotional learning development and attendance interventions, equipping educators with strategies to respond effectively to student needs. (LREBG \$2.0 million)

These actions are fully aligned with allowable uses of the LREBG and are designed to accelerate learning recovery while addressing long-standing equity gaps. Paramount USD will measure success through improved student achievement, higher graduation rates, stronger performance on the college/career readiness indicator, and reductions in chronic absenteeism and suspensions.

Reflections: Technical Assistance

Based on the 2025 California School Dashboard, the district has been identified for Differentiated Assistance due to the performance of two student groups: Foster Youth and Long-Term English Learners (LTELs). Identification is based on indicators in both Pupil Achievement and Pupil Engagement, signaling a need for targeted support, systemic reflection, and continuous improvement.

Foster Youth

Dashboard results for Foster Youth highlight significant areas of need across academic achievement and engagement. In English Language Arts, Foster Youth are performing 62.5 points below standard, maintaining performance with a slight increase of 1.7 points (Orange status; n=37). In Mathematics, performance is substantially lower at 133.6 points below standard, with a significant decline of 31.2 points (Red status; n=37). Additionally, Chronic Absenteeism remains a critical concern, with 28% of Foster Youth identified as chronically absent, maintaining a high rate despite a slight decrease of 0.3% (Red status; n=50).

In response, the district is actively engaged in a comprehensive needs assessment that includes a root cause analysis to better understand the systemic and student-level factors contributing to these outcomes. Concurrently, the district is conducting an evaluation of current supports and services for Foster Youth to determine their effectiveness. Findings from this review will guide the revision and strengthening of supports to address both academic achievement and engagement, ensuring alignment with identified needs.

Long-Term English Learners (LTELs)

Long-Term English Learners also demonstrate persistent challenges across multiple indicators. On the English Learner Progress Indicator, 40.9% of LTELs are making progress toward English proficiency, reflecting maintained performance (Orange status; n=729). In English Language Arts, students are performing 98.5 points below standard, showing improvement with an increase of 7.9 points (Orange status; n=425). In Mathematics, performance remains an area of concern at 180.4 points below standard, with a decline of 3.1 points (Red status; n=422).

Engagement indicators further underscore the need for targeted supports. Chronic Absenteeism among LTELs is 26.4%, increasing by 2.2% (Red status; n=349). Additionally, the Graduation Rate for LTELs is 87.9%, declining by 1.7% (Orange status; n=199). To address these outcomes, the district has initiated multiple strategies focused on improving both instructional quality and system responsiveness:

Integrated ELD Professional Learning: All teachers are receiving ongoing professional development and access to resources through an online platform to strengthen Integrated ELD practices, ensuring LTELs can effectively access and engage with grade-level content across subject areas.

Designated ELD Implementation: The district has adopted a new K–12 Designated ELD curriculum, providing a coherent and consistent instructional continuum. Professional development has been provided to support initial implementation, with continued training planned to sustain and deepen effective practices.

ELD Participation Audit: A comprehensive audit of student records is underway to identify students who have opted out of ELD services. The district will analyze reasons for opt-outs and determine appropriate next steps, which may include direct outreach and conferencing with students and families to better meet their needs.

MTSS Identification and Support: District teams are supporting schools in identifying both LTELs and students at risk of becoming LTELs. Through the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS), schools are working to assess individual student needs and implement targeted interventions to accelerate language development and academic progress.

County Collaboration

The district is working in close partnership with the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) to guide its Differentiated Assistance efforts. This collaboration includes ongoing meetings to analyze data, identify evidence-based strategies, and leverage county-level resources to support improvement efforts for both Foster Youth and LTELs.

Through a combination of data analysis, targeted professional learning, program evaluation, and collaborative support, the district is committed to addressing the identified areas of need for Foster Youth and Long-Term English Learners. These efforts are designed to

improve academic outcomes, increase student engagement, and ensure equitable access to high-quality instructional opportunities for all students.

Teachers	Teacher engagement began with the administration of districtwide surveys, which allowed educators to share insights based on their classroom experiences and professional expertise. These surveys provided both immediate feedback on LCAP-related actions and services and valuable longitudinal data used to identify trends, monitor progress, and guide strategic planning over time. To further support teacher involvement beyond surveys, each school aligned its Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) with the goals, priorities, and metrics outlined in the LCAP. This alignment process gave teachers additional opportunities to provide input and ensure that site-level plans accurately reflected district priorities and student needs. SPSA review meetings extended beyond the required School Site Council and English Learner Advisory Committee participation, offering a broader platform for teachers to engage in meaningful discussions about school and district initiatives. This approach promoted consistency across schools, improved the strategic use of resources, and reinforced alignment between site-based and districtwide planning. Teachers also contributed significantly through their participation in the Local Control Accountability Committee (LCAC). The LCAC includes a cross-section of educational partners such as the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendents, Board members, students, Directors from Educational Services, Business Services,

	and Pupil and Personnel Services, as well as certificated and classified bargaining unit representatives. The LCAC serves as an essential advisory body that reviews LCAP goals, actions, and services, analyzes both state and local performance data, and recommends strategies to strengthen educational partner engagement. Meetings were held on October 15, 2025; December 3, 2025; March 18, 2026; April 29, 2026; and May 27, 2026. These engagement strategies were intentionally designed to increase accessibility and promote broad participation. A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Educational partners across the Paramount Unified School District expressed broad support for the actions and services outlined in the 2024–2027 LCAP. Feedback gathered from parents, students, staff, and community members played a critical role in shaping the refinement of goals and actions for the 2026–2027 school year.

Parents and staff strongly valued the alignment between the Paramount Unified Strategic Plan Priorities, adopted LCAP goals, and adopted SPSA goals. They emphasized that this alignment ensures coherence across district initiatives, promotes efficient use of resources, and creates the conditions necessary for student success.

Feedback also highlighted the importance of supporting the academic needs of all students, those requiring additional services as well as those performing at or above grade level. This input directly informed the continued investment in:

Goal 1, Action 2: Provide Targeted Student Support

Goal 1, Action 3: Measure and Monitor Academic Progress

Goal 1, Action 5: Provide Academic Enrichment Opportunities for Students

Educational partners also emphasized the need for a safe and supportive learning environment that nurtures students' emotional and social well-being. In response, Goal 3—Cultivate a Nurturing and Emotionally Safe Environment to Strengthen Well-Being, Belonging, and a Sense of Safety was affirmed and strengthened to reflect this input.

Additionally, educational partners, particularly parents and staff, identified a continued need for high-quality, accessible parent education, strong school-home partnerships, and consistent, transparent communication. These priorities are addressed through Goal 4: Enhance Family and Community Engagement—which includes a comprehensive set of actions to build trust, collaboration, and shared responsibility for student success.

Buena Vista High School is identified as an Equity Multiplier school. Feedback supported the ongoing effort to improve attendance at Equity Multiplier school.

The LCAP continues to reflect Paramount USD's commitment to inclusive decision-making and ensures that the voices of educational partners are embedded in the district's planning and continuous improvement efforts.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Paramount Unified School District is dedicated to preparing all students for post-secondary success by fostering deeper learning and ensuring readiness for college, career, and life. This goal was developed in direct response to identified gaps in academic performance and the equitable access to high-quality educational opportunities. It aligns with the district's strategic vision to deliver rigorous, relevant, and student-centered instruction, empowering each student with the knowledge, skills, and competencies necessary to thrive in an ever-changing world.

A thorough analysis of both state and local performance data revealed that while some areas show improvement, challenges persist. Outcomes in English Language Arts and Mathematics remain below state standards, as evidenced by the 2024 California School Dashboard (ELA – Red; Math – Yellow). However, the district's graduation rate improved from Orange in 2023 to Green in 2024, indicating progress. Despite this achievement, there is a significant gap between the graduation rate (91.1%) and the College and Career Indicator, which stands at 47.1%. This discrepancy highlights the need for continued systemic improvements in instructional practices and academic support, particularly for historically underserved groups, including English learners, foster youth, African American students, students with disabilities, and those from low-income backgrounds.

In response to these findings, the district has prioritized the intentional integration of standards-aligned instruction, research-based practices, and the development of robust academic support systems across Tiers I, II, and III. These efforts aim to close achievement gaps and ensure equitable access to high-quality educational experiences for all students (State Priorities 1, 2, 4, 7, 8).

Additionally, Paramount USD recognizes the importance of professional development in enhancing instructional effectiveness, curriculum delivery, and technology integration. The district will continue to invest in a comprehensive professional development program that addresses Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) across academic, social-emotional, and college/career readiness areas for all staff, both certificated and classified. The district will also expand its 1:1 student device initiative, enhance classroom technology, and further develop programs such as Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), Advanced Placement (AP), Career Technical Education (CTE), Dual Enrollment, and the alignment of graduation requirements with A-G completion.

This goal reflects the district's unwavering commitment to continuous improvement, equity, and excellence, ensuring that all students graduate well-prepared to succeed in college, career, and beyond.

Overall, implementation of Goal 1 actions has progressed steadily, with all actions fully implemented as designed. In several cases, implementation has required intentional pacing or adjustment to ensure quality, coherence, and long-term sustainability. A key theme across actions is the district's strategic focus on strengthening Tier I core instruction as a prerequisite for effective Tier II and Tier III supports. As a result, some actions—particularly those related to targeted intervention, assessment systems, language development professional learning, and MTSS refinement—are in implementation phases while foundational structures continue to be built

Successes

The district has experienced notable successes in areas where systems and staffing were already in place or could be implemented districtwide.

The district successfully implemented several core actions that expanded student access to rigorous instruction, enrichment, and learning supports. Full implementation was achieved in areas such as academic enrichment opportunities (Action 1.5), 21st-century learning supports; including 1:1 technology and digital systems (Action 1.6), early learning initiatives through Transitional Kindergarten (Action 1.7), and multiple

college and career readiness programs (Action 1.4). These actions provided consistent, districtwide access and strengthened learning environments across grade spans.

Curriculum access and instructional infrastructure were strengthened through the implementation of a new K–12 ELA curriculum (Action 1.10), deployment of digital instructional tools (Action 1.6), and expansion of enrichment programs such as STEAM, visual and performing arts, CTE, and advanced coursework (Action 1.5) while beginning phased implementation in mathematics to ensure readiness and alignment (Action 1.10).

The district also made progress in establishing foundational systems, including a comprehensive MTSS resource guide (Action 1.2), instructional leadership structures aligned to a shared district vision (Action 1.1), and strengthened postsecondary partnerships to support college and career pathways (Action 1.4).

Challenges

Challenges encountered during implementation were primarily related to capacity building, system coherence, and alignment of data and practices across multiple sites.

Several actions were intentionally paced as the district focused on building capacity, coherence, and consistency before expanding Tier II and Tier III practices (Action 1.2). Newly established roles, such as academic coaches (Action 1.1) and evolving systems, like MTSS, assessment frameworks (Action 1.2 and 1.3), and English Learner supports (Action 1.8) required time for calibration, professional learning, and alignment across sites.

Implementation challenges included the need to refine data systems for assessment, intervention placement, and progress monitoring, particularly in math and MTSS (Actions 1.2 and 1.3). These system-level developments are still underway and limited the pace of targeted intervention expansion.

Staffing levels to maintain small class sizes exceeded enrollment needs in some instances, creating inefficiencies and prompting reassessment of how staffing resources can more directly support high-impact instructional strategies (Action 1.9).

Despite these challenges, the district intentionally used this year to strengthen structures, develop common frameworks, and prepare for deeper and more targeted implementation in subsequent years.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Throughout the 2025–2026 school year, Paramount Unified School District implemented all Action Items under Goal 1. The district has established a 10% threshold to expend the funds for each Action. While many expenditures aligned with the budget, some material differences were noted between Budgeted and Estimated Actual Expenditures due to the strategic utilization of one-time limited state and federal grants (e.g., A-G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Grant, MTSS Grant, Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary

Block Grant, and Proposition 28). These grant resources allowed the district to expand or enhance services beyond originally budgeted LCAP allocations.

Action 1.1 – Strengthen Curriculum and Instructional Practices

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

Action 1.2 – Provide Targeted Student Support

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

Action 1.3 – Measure and Monitor Academic Progress

Expenditures for this action slightly exceeded the budgeted amount due to additional work to expand a comprehensive student assessment system.

Action 1.4 – Promote College and Career Readiness at All Levels

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

Action 1.5 – Provide Academic Enrichment Opportunities for Students

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

Action 1.6 – Facilitate 21st Century Learning Strategies and Supports

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

Action 1.7 – Focus on Early Learning Initiatives

Expenditures for this action slightly exceeded the budgeted amount due to expanding the TK program at two elementary school sites.

Action 1.8 – Improve English Learner Outcomes

Expenditures for this action exceeded the budgeted amount due to the purchase of additional curricular resources to support designated and integrated English Learner Development (ELD).

Action 1.9 – Promote Personalized Learning and Differentiated Instruction

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

1.10 – Implementation of Academic Standards

Budgeted and actual expenditures were closely aligned for the current year.

The variances in expenditures across Action Items were primarily due to the strategic use of supplemental and one-time grants, which allowed the district to enhance or expand services without increasing reliance on LCAP core funds. While some actions exceeded budgeted amounts, these were covered by external funding sources, and in other cases, expenditures were reduced due to grant absorption. As these grants sunset, the district will need to reassess funding strategies to sustain key programs and services.

Contributing Actions

Action 1.1 Strengthen Curriculum and Instructional Practices was somewhat effective. Professional development efforts contributed to modest gains in student outcomes for English Learners and Low-Income students on the California Dashboard Math Academic Indicator. Specifically, English Learners improved by 8.2 points, Low-Income students by 8.1 points. Foster Youth demonstrated a decrease by 31.2 points (Metric #1.17). The improvements for English Learners and Low-Income students, while incremental, indicate a positive impact of enhanced instructional strategies. A closer look at Foster Youth is warranted and will be a focus for the next school year.

Action 1.2 Provide Targeted Student Support Interventions was somewhat effective. Targeted instructional interventions, including secondary-level intervention courses and universal access supports, yielded growth consistent with Action 1.1. Gains in the Math Academic Indicator were observed across English Learners (+8.2 points) and Low-Income students (+8.1 points). While gains were modest for these two student groups, they reflect the importance of continuing and refining targeted supports. Foster Youth demonstrated a decrease by 31.2 points (Metric #1.17). A closer look at Foster Youth is warranted and will be a focus for the next school year.

Action 1.3 Measure and Monitor Academic Progress was somewhat effective. A decline in key metrics indicates the need for more effective progress monitoring systems. The English Learner Reclassification Rate increased by 3.1% (Metric #1.11), CAASPP ELA Percent Met or Exceeded increased by 3.34% (Metric #1.13), CAASPP Math Percent Met or Exceeded increased by 2.55% (Metric #1.14), and California Science Test (CAST) Met or Exceeded increased by 3.69%. These trends indicate that current monitoring practices are beginning to inform timely instructional adjustments.

Action 1.4 Promote College and Career Readiness at All Levels was overall effective, showing strong growth in student preparedness for postsecondary pathways. Based on the California Dashboard College and Career Indicator (Metric #1.9), English Learners improved by 8.9% (2 year gain of 13.2%), Low-Income students by 8.4% (2 year gain of 14%), and Foster Youth a 2 year gain of 19.8% (due to no data from prior year). Additionally, the overall student population improved by 8.3% (2 year gain of 13.7%), indicating systemic progress across student groups.

Action 1.5 Provide Academic Enrichment Opportunities for Students was overall effective in expanding access to rigorous academic programs such as STEAM, AVID, AP, and Dual Enrollment. These opportunities contributed to increased percentages of students meeting College and Career Indicator (CCI): English Learners improved by 8.9% (2 year gain of 13.2%), Low-Income students by 8.4% (2 year gain of 14%), and Foster Youth showed a 2 year increase of 19.8% increase (due to no data from prior year) (Metric #1.9). Additionally, the overall student population improved by 8.3% (2 year gain of 13.2%) These results highlight the effectiveness of equity-driven enrichment programs.

Action 1.6 Facilitate 21st Century Learning Strategies and Supports was effective, particularly in supporting college and career readiness through A-G and CTE completion (Metric #1.5). Gains have been consistent for two years. English Learners completing both pathways increased from 7 to 19 to 31 students, and Low-Income students increased from 156 to 178 to 255 students, and Foster Youth from 2 to 3 students (no data from prior year). Additionally, the overall student population increased from 151 to 182 to 259 students. Data indicates that all student groups have exceeded the target for year 3 outcome. These results indicate systemic progress as well as the effectiveness of facilitating 21st Century learning strategies and supports.

Action 1.7 Focus on Early Learning Initiatives was minimally effective according to identified metrics. Although all kindergarteners improved by 1%, English Learner kindergarteners declined by 1% in i-Ready reading (Metric #1.22). Similarly, all kindergarteners improved by 1%, English Learner kindergarteners declined by 1% in i-Ready math (Metric #1.23). Additionally, Action 1.7 was not measurable for Foster Youth and Low-Income students due to the lack of disaggregated i-Ready data for these student groups. These results highlight the need to examine underlying root causes for the lack of consistent improvement, as well as to review and refine current metrics to ensure they are valid, reliable, and sufficiently robust to measure outcomes for this student population.

Action 1.8 Improve English Learner Outcomes was somewhat effective, with a 3.1% increase in Reclassification Rate (Metric #1.11) and 0.1% increase (maintained on the CA School Dashboard) in the English Learner Proficiency Indicator (Metric #1.12), which indicates mixed results and highlights the need for alignment between language development supports and reclassification criteria.

Action 1.9 Promote Personalized Learning and Differentiated Instruction was not effective according to metrics. English Learners decreased by 2.5%, Low-Income students by 0.6%, Foster Youth by 17.6% (over 2 years due to no data from prior year). Overall graduation rates decreased by 0.7% (Metric #1.1). Drop out rates for English Learners increased by 1.7%, Low-Income students by 0.1%, Foster Youth by 17.6% (over 2 years due to no data from prior year). Overall drop out rates increased by 0.2% (Metric #1.1). These results underscore the need to further evaluate this action.

Non-Contributing Action

1.10 – Implementation of Academic Standards

Action 1.10, Implementation of Academic Standards, was somewhat effective. Positive trends are evident in the number of students completing both A–G requirements and a CTE pathway (Metric #1.5) for two consecutive years. English Learners increased from 7 to 19 to 31 students, Low-Income students increased from 156 to 178 to 255 students, and Foster Youth increased from 2 to 3 students (no prior year comparison available). The overall student population completing both pathways also rose from 151 to 182 to 259 students. In addition, there were modest gains in student achievement, with the percentage of students meeting or exceeding proficiency on CAASPP increasing by 3.34% in ELA (Metric #1.13), 2.55% in mathematics (Metric #1.14), and 3.69% in science (Metric #1.15). While these improvements demonstrate progress toward standards alignment and increased access to rigorous pathways, continued implementation and monitoring are needed to sustain and accelerate outcomes across all student groups.

Collectively, the actions under Goal 1 are demonstrating emerging to strong effectiveness in advancing deeper learning and college, career, and life readiness, with variability depending on the maturity of implementation. Actions, such as enrichment programs, digital access, early learning initiatives, and college and career pathway supports—have shown clear effectiveness by expanding student access to rigorous, relevant, and engaging learning experiences across grade spans. These actions are contributing to improved alignment, increased opportunities, and stronger preparation for postsecondary pathways.

Other actions are showing growing or emerging effectiveness. Instructional leadership teams are increasingly aligned around a shared instructional vision, and early efforts to build coherent assessment systems and MTSS structures are improving consistency and shared understanding. While measurable impact is still developing, these actions have laid the groundwork for more responsive, data-informed instruction and intervention. Similarly, English Learner supports and language development initiatives are providing a foundational base, with stronger impact anticipated as professional learning expands and Tier II and Tier III practices become more consistent across sites.

Some actions have not yet demonstrated clear effectiveness in improving student outcomes. In particular, maintaining lower class sizes through increased staffing has not resulted in observable achievement gains, indicating the need to refine how staffing resources are leveraged to directly support instructional quality and targeted differentiation. This finding is informing future adjustments to ensure that resources are more closely aligned to strategies with demonstrated instructional impact.

Overall, the district is making meaningful progress toward Goal 1 by prioritizing coherence, access, and instructional quality. While several actions are still in developmental stages, the combined impact of fully implemented actions and strengthening foundational systems positions the district for increased effectiveness in subsequent years, particularly as assessment, MTSS, intervention, and professional learning systems become more fully realized.

Action 1.1 has been updated to reflect the continued support through the Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds ensuring that robust math instruction supports the complex skills students need to learn to succeed in the 21st century.

Metrics for Actions 1.5, 1.6, and 1.9 have been realigned to more effectively measure outcomes directly connected to the actions. Accordingly, Action 1.5 will no longer be measured using Metrics 1.1, 1.4, 1.7, 1.8, and 1.9. Metric 1.20 will remain and Metrics 1.13, 1.14, 1.15, 1.16, 1.17, 1.18, 1.19, 5.13, 5.14, 5.18, 5.19, 5.20, 5.21 will be added. These metrics directly align with student proficiency levels, thus providing a stronger connection to the success of enrichment opportunities.

Metrics 1.13, 1.14, 1.15, 1.16, 1.17, 1.18, 1.19, 5.13, 5.14, 5.18, 5.19, 5.20, 5.21 will also be added to Goal 1, Action 6 for the same reason.

Metrics 1.18, 1.19, 5.13, and 5.14 will be added to Goal 1, Action 9. These metrics directly measure ELA and math growth for English Learners.

Action 1.2: removed in the description from MTSS: academic, social-emotional/behavioral and college and career readiness.

All the actions (except 1.7 and 1.10) replaced "The Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services" to "educational services team."

Action 1.5: Language removed to indicate that there will be comprehensive enrichment during the school day to support broad course of study and elective offerings instead of "extended learning opportunities beyond the school day and year."

Action 1.6: added "Director of Technology" will be providing support, in Year 2 Outcome, Low Income has been changed to Socioeconomically Disadvantaged.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Paramount Unified School District stakeholders developed Goal 2 in response to both encouraging gains and persistent challenges reflected in the 2023 and 2024 California School Dashboard, local assessment data, and input from educational partners.

Key areas of progress include a graduation rate increase to 91.1% (green), improved College/Career Readiness status (green), a reduction in chronic absenteeism from 32.5% to 23.3%, and a decline in suspension rates to 2.9%. Several student groups—such as English Learners, African American, Homeless, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, and Asian students—demonstrated strong performance across multiple indicators. Additionally, Buena Vista High School and Gaines Elementary successfully exited ATSI status.

Despite these improvements, significant areas of concern remain. English Language Arts performance is currently at the orange performance level, and mathematics remains at the yellow level. Furthermore, although the graduation rate is high, only 47% of students meet College/Career Readiness benchmarks, indicating a misalignment that requires targeted attention. Also, there was a decline on the English Learner Progress monitor indicator from 53.7% in 2023 to 42.9% in 2024.

Through data analysis and engagement with educational partners, the district identified a clear need to improve instructional practices, strengthen its Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS), and refine interventions to ensure that academic programs effectively meet the diverse needs of all student groups. This aligns with State Priorities 1 and 2.

The district is committed to building staff capacity through high-quality professional development for teachers, counselors, administrators, and classified staff. These efforts include strengthening instructional leadership, deepening the implementation of MTSS, and enhancing recruitment and retention strategies. This focus supports progress in English Language Arts, mathematics, and college and career readiness outcomes, aligns with State Priorities 4, 5, and 8.

Paramount Unified School District has fully implemented all actions outlined under Goal 2. These efforts are focused on strengthening instructional practices, cultivating leadership capacity, and enhancing college and career readiness pathways. Each initiative is either actively in progress or fully operational. The district remains committed to an ongoing cycle of data analysis and reflection to ensure continuous improvement and alignment with student needs.

Successes:

Significant progress has been made toward achieving the objectives of Goal 2. A districtwide professional development infrastructure has been established, aligning with LCAP priorities and supported by both LCAP and supplemental funding sources. Key accomplishments include:

- Implementation of an ongoing professional development plan for certificated and classified personnel. Action 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3.
- Continued professional learning and expansion of the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to address academic, behavioral, and social-emotional needs, including the collaborative development of an MTSS Resource Guide and Handbook Action 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3.

- Continued professional development for the Culture and Climate teams to support social-emotional supports for students and promote staff collaboration and shared leadership. Action 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3.
- K–12 Curriculum Council to support instructional planning, including pacing guides, common assessments, and course development. Action 2.1 and 2.3.
- Continued professional learning for the Instructional Leadership Teams (ILTs) at each school to strengthen Tier I instruction and promote staff collaboration and shared leadership.
- Districtwide professional development days held in October 2025 and March 2026 for all staff. Action 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3.
- Ongoing training and support for Special Education staff to advance inclusive instructional practices. Action 2.2
- Full team of TK-12 Academic Coaches (General Education and Special Education) to provide embedded instructional support and facilitate collaborative teaching. Action 2.1 and 2.2.
- Regular site administrator coaching to support leadership development and ensure alignment between SPSA and LCAP goals. Action 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3.
- Continued investment in site-specific professional development aligned to instructional priorities such as AVID, Career Technical Education (CTE), and Dual Language programs. Action 2.2.

Challenges:

Despite full implementation, the district identified several areas requiring continued focus and refinement:

- Strengthening the alignment between classified staff professional development and student achievement outcomes. Action 2.2.
- Enhancing the capacity and utilization of Instructional Leadership Teams (ILTs) to support professional learning and site-based decision-making continues to be a challenge. Action 2.2, and 2.3.
- Ensuring MTSS structures are fully integrated and address the academic, behavioral, social-emotional, and college/career readiness needs of all students. Action 2.2.
- Expanding leadership development and instructional coaching for Assistant Principals and Deans to build a sustainable leadership pipeline. Action 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3.

The district is committed to refining systems and addressing the challenges identified. Through strategic use of data, collaborative engagement with educational partners, and intentional resource allocation, Paramount USD will continue to strengthen leadership capacity and instructional practices to ensure all students are prepared for success in college, career, and life.

Throughout the 2025-2026 school year, all Action Items under Goal 2 were actively implemented to support improved student outcomes and address achievement gaps. The district has established a 10% threshold to expend the funds for each Action. While many expenditures were consistent with initial budget projections, minimal material differences arose between Budgeted and Estimated Actual Expenditures due to the strategic leveraging of time-limited state and federal grants. These grants—including the A-G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant, MTSS Grant, Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant, and Proposition 28—enabled the district to expand or enhance services beyond what was originally funded through the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP). As a result of these strategic funding shifts, the estimated actual percentage of improved services for unduplicated pupils minimally differed from initial projections. The overall level of service was maintained or enhanced.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Contributing Actions:

Action 2.1 Identify and Implement Leadership Development Programs has been effective in strengthening instructional leadership and contributing to improved student outcomes, particularly for All Students and Low-Income students. Growth in CAASPP performance reflects this impact. In ELA (Metric #1.13), All Students improved from 39.19% to 40.04% to 43.38%, while Low-Income students increased from 38.38% to 39.41% to 42.91%. Similarly, in Math (Metric #1.14), All Students improved from 21.58% to 22.47% to 25.02%, and Low-Income students increased from 20.74% to 21.86% to 24.69%. These trends suggest that leadership development is contributing to systemwide instructional improvement and increased student achievement.

At the same time, Action 2.1 has been somewhat effective in ensuring equitable outcomes across all student groups. English Learner performance in ELA (Metric #1.13) showed minimal growth (11.56% to 11.47% to 12.03%), while Math (Metric #1.14) results fluctuated (8.17% to 9.05% to 8.71%). Foster Youth outcomes declined or were inconsistent across measures, including ELA (25.0% to 22.86% to 22.22%) and Math (2.78% to 17.14% to 14.81%). In Science (Metric #1.15), while All Students improved (17.61% to 19.16% to 22.85%) and Low-Income students improved (19.32% to 20.73% to 22.49%), English Learners declined (2.32% to 2.36% to 0.82%) and Foster Youth declined to 0% (8.77% to 9.62% to 0%). Overall, these trends indicate that leadership development has not yet consistently resulted in improved outcomes for targeted student subgroups.

Action 2.2 Design and Implement Holistic Training Programs has been effective in increasing staff knowledge and capacity to implement instructional strategies aligned to student needs. Survey data demonstrate strong perceived impact of professional learning. Ninety-two percent of participants (Metric #2.5) reported gaining new skills or knowledge, and ninety-four percent (Metric #2.6) reported that they could apply what they learned to their current role. These results indicate that professional development opportunities are relevant, meaningful, and aligned to staff responsibilities.

However, Action 2.2 has been somewhat effective in translating professional learning into consistent improvements in student outcomes. While staff report high levels of learning and applicability, the variability in outcomes across Metrics #1.13, #1.14, and #1.15—particularly for English Learners and Foster Youth—indicates that implementation in practice is inconsistent. This suggests a need to strengthen follow-up

coaching, progress monitoring, and accountability systems to ensure that professional learning results in measurable and equitable student achievement gains.

Action 2.3 Utilize a Distributed Leadership Model has been effective in establishing foundational leadership structures and conditions for collaboration across sites. Survey results (Metric #2.8) indicate that 76% of participants reported favorable perceptions of leadership and 68% reported favorable conditions for team effectiveness (task focus). These data suggest that distributed leadership structures are in place and are supporting organizational coherence and focus on instructional improvement.

At the same time, Action 2.3 has been somewhat effective in fostering consistent collaboration across teams. Survey data (Metric #2.7) indicate that only 51% of participants reported favorable perceptions of collaboration. This variability suggests that while leadership structures exist, their implementation and effectiveness differ across sites. Overall, these trends indicate a need to strengthen facilitation, clarify expectations, and build collective capacity to ensure distributed leadership consistently supports improved instructional practice and student outcomes.

These results indicate that targeted professional development, coaching, and the implementation of a distributed leadership model are beginning to positively affect academic outcomes for Foster Youth, Low-Income students, and English Learners. However, even with the noted improvements, achievement gaps remain, and continued focus is needed to improve academic, social-emotional/behavioral, and college and career readiness outcomes for English Learners.

Metrics 2.5 and 2.6 have been added to Action 2.1 to measure the effectiveness of professional development.

Action 2.2 will no longer be supported by the use of the Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG). Action 2.3 has been updated to reflect the continued use of LREBG funds to support professional development and coaching.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Analysis of student survey data and student attendance and engagement data has shown many students do not feel connected to the school community, particularly among students who are foster youth, experiencing homelessness, low-income, and/or African American/Black. Survey data from students, parents and teachers has highlighted a need related to school connectedness. Data on the 2024 California School Dashboard for Chronic Absenteeism rate is 23.3% (yellow) of PUSD students chronically absent from school. The 2024 Suspension Rate has improved to 2.9% (green) from 3.3% in 2023. The data indicates the need to focus on ensuring all schools have an emotionally safe environment. Education research predicts students are more likely to have poor attendance, increased behavior referrals, and low academic achievement when they lack school connectedness. (Priorities 5 & 6)

The science of learning and development identifies developmental relationships and safe, calm, and predictable environments as critical support for students to learn how to overcome stress so that they can self-regulate, focus, and learn. Utilizing actions targeted to address these needs will decrease the percentage of students who do not feel connected to the school community, decrease student discipline, and increase attendance. The actions in this goal are designed to improve overall culture, climate, and build relationships between staff and students.

Overall, the implementation of actions under Goal 3 have begun as planned. Each of the strategic actions—from strengthening instructional practices to expanding college and career readiness opportunities—has been initiated and is in progress or fully operational. The district remains committed to the continuous review of student achievement data to ensure that all actions are refined to effectively meet the diverse needs of all learners.

Status of Actions:

- 3.1 Enhance Physical Safety and Well-being - Fully Implemented
- 3.2 Promote Social-Emotional Development - Partially implemented
- 3.3 Implement Comprehensive Mental Health Support - Partially implemented
- 3.4 Improve Attendance and Reduce Chronic Absenteeism - Fully implemented

Successes

The district successfully implemented multiple systems and structures to enhance school safety and student well-being. Physical safety measures—including additional campus security personnel, surveillance systems, vape detectors, and a visitor and emergency management system—were implemented across sites, strengthening campus monitoring and response systems (Action 3.1)

Mental health supports were fully implemented through a comprehensive MTSS model, including certificated social workers, paraprofessionals, and specialized behavioral supports, ensuring access to Tier II and Tier III services (Actions 3.2 and 3.3).

Attendance improvement efforts were fully implemented, including the establishment of a districtwide Attendance Task Force, school-based attendance teams, and structured intervention systems across all three tiers. Regular data review cycles and cross-site collaboration strengthened consistency and accountability (Action 3.4).

Progress was also made in building a foundation for social-emotional learning through the development of a comprehensive counseling framework and the implementation of universal TK–12 social-emotional lessons, promoting consistency in Tier I supports (Actions 3.1, 3.2, and 3.3).

Challenges

While core structures are in place, development and refinement of Tier II and Tier III social-emotional supports remain ongoing. The counseling framework is still being built, and full implementation of a comprehensive social-emotional MTSS system has not yet been achieved (Actions 3.2 and 3.3).

Coordination and alignment across safety, mental health, and social-emotional systems require continued strengthening to ensure consistent delivery and integration of services across all sites (Actions 3.1, 3.2 and 3.3).

The effectiveness of some fully implemented systems, particularly in mental health and safety, would benefit from clearer outcome measures and data systems to evaluate impact on student well-being, behavior, and attendance trends over time (Actions 3.1, 3.2, 3.3, and 3.4).

The district remains committed to refining systems and addressing these implementation challenges. Paramount USD will continue leveraging data-informed practices, stakeholder collaboration, and strategic resource allocation to ensure that all students are prepared for success in college, career, and life.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

During the 2025-2026 school year, Paramount Unified School District fully implemented all Action Items under Goal 3, which is centered on enhancing school climate, physical and emotional well-being, and student connectedness, key factors in improving student outcomes and addressing persistent achievement gaps. The district has established a 10% threshold to expend the funds for each Action. While many expenditures aligned with budgeted amounts, some material differences were identified due to the strategic utilization of time-limited state and federal grant funding. Grants such as the A-G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant, MTSS Grant, Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant, and Proposition 28 provided the District with opportunities to supplement and expand services beyond the originally budgeted LCAP allocations. These shifts allowed for enhanced programming while preserving core LCFF funds. As a result of these strategic funding adjustments, the estimated actual percentage of improved services may differ slightly from the planned percentage. However, the District ensured that the overall level of service was maintained or improved and continues to review these variances to strengthen future planning and budgeting.

Action 3.1 – Enhance Physical Safety and Well-being

Estimated actual expenditures for this action were closely aligned with budgeted amounts, reflecting effective implementation and resource management.

Action 3.2 – Promote Social-Emotional Development

Estimated actual expenditures for this action were closely aligned with budgeted amounts, reflecting effective implementation and resource management.

Action 3.3 – Implement Comprehensive Mental Health Support

Expenditures for this action exceeded the budgeted amount due to expanding a comprehensive mental health program to support Low Income, FY, and EL students.

Action 3.4 – Improve Attendance and Reduce Chronic Absenteeism

Estimated actual expenditures for this action were closely aligned with budgeted amounts, reflecting effective implementation and resource management.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Goal 3 demonstrates overall progress in establishing safe, supportive, and inclusive learning environments across the district. Through the implementation of coordinated systems focused on physical safety, social-emotional learning, mental health supports, and attendance improvement, the district has strengthened foundational practices that promote student well-being and engagement. Evidence across multiple data sources, including California Healthy Kids Survey indicators and chronic absenteeism rates, reflects generally positive trends in students' perceptions of safety, connectedness, and support, alongside improved attendance outcomes. While several actions show clear impact, particularly in safety enhancements and attendance systems, other areas—such as multi-tiered social-emotional and mental health interventions—are still developing. Continued refinement of these systems, along with consistent data monitoring and targeted supports for student groups, will be essential to deepen impact and ensure equitable outcomes for all students.

Contributing Actions

Action 3.1 (Enhance Physical Safety and Well-Being) has been effective in strengthening campus safety and positively influencing student experience. The expansion of campus safety personnel, surveillance systems, vape detectors, and visitor management protocols has improved incident monitoring and supported more proactive responses to student behavior and safety concerns. These efforts are reflected in California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS) data on school connectedness. For 5th grade students, connectedness rates (Metric #14) over the past three years were relatively strong at 70%, 72%, and 66%. Among 7th grade students, connectedness (Metric #15) showed improvement overall, increasing from 48% to 51% to 60% for all students; English Learners reported 51%, 55%, and 57%, while Low Income students increased from 46% and 38% to 57% (with insufficient data for Foster Youth). For 9th grade students, connectedness (Metric #16) remained relatively stable with slight growth, at 53%, 52%, and 55% for all students; English Learners reported 55%, 47%, and 56%, and Low Income students 49%, 51%, and 54% (with insufficient data for Foster Youth). Overall, these trends suggest that strengthened safety measures are contributing to stable or improving perceptions of school connectedness, particularly at the secondary level, though some variability indicates continued opportunity for targeted support.

Action 3.2 (Promote Social-Emotional Development) is somewhat effective. Foundational systems—such as the development of a comprehensive counseling framework and the implementation of universal SEL lessons—have established greater consistency and access to supports at the Tier I level, contributing to more structured delivery of social-emotional learning across sites. Trends in the California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS) related to Caring Adults in School reflect this foundational progress while also highlighting areas for continued growth. For 5th grade students, reported access to caring adults was relatively strong but showed variation over time at 72%, 74%, and 64%. Among 7th grade students, perceptions improved overall, increasing from 50% to 55% to 58% for all students; English Learners reported 57%, 64%, and 51%, while Low Income students remained stable before increasing from 50%, 50%, to 57% (with insufficient data for Foster Youth). For 9th grade students, results were relatively stable with modest gains for all students (53%, 51%, and 54%); however, English

Learner responses fluctuated at 53%, 56%, and 46%, and Low Income students remained consistent at 49%, 50%, and 50% (with insufficient data for Foster Youth).

While these data points suggest some improvement in students' perceptions of supportive adult relationships—particularly at the middle school level—Tier II and Tier III supports remain under development, limiting the system's ability to fully meet the needs of students requiring targeted and intensive intervention. As a result, although a strong universal foundation has been established, the overall impact on student outcomes is still emerging and will depend on continued expansion, alignment, and refinement of multi-tiered supports.

Action 3.3 (Implement Comprehensive Mental Health Support) is somewhat effective. While this action has been fully implemented with appropriate staffing and aligned MTSS structures, the absence of clearly defined outcome measures continues to limit the ability to determine its overall impact on student mental health, behavior, and well-being. Available data points provide some insight into system influence but also indicate the need for more comprehensive monitoring.

Chronic absence rates have declined over the past three years across student groups, suggesting improved student engagement and access to supports. For all students, rates decreased from 32.5% to 23.3% to 22.5%; for English Learners, from 29.7% to 20.2% to 19.7%; for Foster Youth, from 26.8% to 28.3% to 19.7%; and for Low Income students, from 33.2% to 23.8% to 22.8%.

California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS) data related to school safety further reflects mixed but generally improving perceptions. Among 5th grade students, the percentage reporting feeling safe at school was 72%, 76%, and 69% over the past three years. For 7th grade students, perceptions of school as safe increased overall from 49% to 47% to 62% for all students; English Learners reported 58%, 50%, and 66%, while Low Income students showed variability at 49%, 33%, and 53% (with insufficient data for Foster Youth). For 9th grade students, perceptions remained relatively stable with modest improvement, at 57%, 55%, and 61% for all students; English Learners reported 59%, 65%, and 65%, and Low Income students 54%, 52%, and 54% (with insufficient data for Foster Youth).

While reductions in chronic absence and generally positive trends in perceived safety suggest that mental health supports and systems may be contributing to improved student engagement and school climate, the lack of direct outcome data tied specifically to mental health interventions limits the ability to attribute these improvements to Action 3 alone. Continued development of targeted metrics, along with consistent data collection and progress monitoring, is necessary to more accurately evaluate effectiveness and guide ongoing refinement of mental health services.

Action 3.4 (Improve Attendance and Reduce Chronic Absenteeism) has been effective. The implementation of a districtwide Attendance Task Force, structured intervention systems across all tiers, regular data monitoring, and coordinated site-based efforts have strengthened attendance practices and improved systemwide collaboration. These efforts are reflected in declining chronic absence rates over the past three years across all student groups. For all students, chronic absence decreased from 32.5% to 23.3% to 22.5%. English Learner rates improved from 29.7% to 20.2% to 19.7%. Foster Youth rates, while initially increasing from 26.8% to 28.3%, showed a notable decline to 19.7%. Similarly, Low Income students demonstrated improvement, decreasing from 33.2% to 23.8% to 22.8%.

Overall, the consistent reduction in chronic absence rates indicates that districtwide systems and targeted interventions are having a positive impact on student attendance. Continued focus on early identification, targeted supports, and cross-departmental collaboration will be essential to sustain progress and address remaining disparities among student groups.

Metrics 3.6, 3.7, 3.17, and 3.18 have been added to Goal 3, Action 1 to fully measure student perception of safety and well-being. Metrics 3.17 and 3.18 have also been added to Goal 3, Action 2 since suspensions and expulsions are often connected to student social-emotional needs. Additionally, Goal 3, Action 2 has been updated to reflect the continued support through the Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds to ensure there is necessary staff to support the social-emotional wellbeing of students. Metrics 3.11 and 3.12 have been added to Goal 3, Action 3 to measure the perception of a safe workplace and school environment which is necessary to student learning.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Analysis of state and local measures by educational partners has produced evidence that many of Paramount Unified School District families lack sufficient resources to enhance the success of their children in school, are reluctant to fully engage in the schooling process, and desire more robust communication with the district. To address this, community resources, family engagement and empowerment programs, and a robust communications plan will be implemented to best support the needs of low-income, foster youth, and English learner students and foster a team commitment throughout the district among all educational partners (Priority 3).

We acknowledge that engaging and empowering families is imperative for student success. Parent engagement in schooling has many positive outcomes, including better performance on academic measures, better attendance, higher self-esteem for children, better social skills, and higher high school graduation rates. Parent education programs that promote parent school partnerships will be offered to all parents.

Our district is committed to improving communication with our families. Utilizing communications staff and tools, we will increase attendance at our advisory committees and parent involvement opportunities, and indicators on our parent surveys will demonstrate parent satisfaction in connecting and engaging with their child(ren)'s teachers and school.

During the current year, the district made substantial progress in implementing Goal 4 actions, with all major initiatives fully or largely operational. Efforts focused on expanding communication systems, strengthening partnerships, and increasing parent engagement opportunities through both districtwide structures and site-based practices. While implementation was broadly successful, variation in consistency across sites and student groups highlights areas for continued refinement and support.

Successes

Across Goal 4, the district demonstrated strong implementation of systems, structures, and opportunities that increased access, communication, and family participation.

Action 1: Communication and Marketing Strategy

- Fully implemented multi-platform communication system including ParentSquare, Instagram, district website, text, email, video, and resource links.
- Expanded outreach allowed families to receive information in multiple formats, increasing accessibility and frequency of communication.

Action 2: Community Partnerships and Resources

- Full implementation of targeted supports for English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low-Income families.
- Staffing supports (Counselor on Special Assignment, Foster Youth mentoring/tutoring) strengthened connections between families and services.

Action 3: Home-School Communication

- Districtwide rollout and consistent use of ParentSquare as a 24/7 two-way communication platform.
- Removal of barriers through mobile/web access, multilingual translation, and coaching support for families.
- Regular use of messaging tools (text, posts, direct messaging) increased responsiveness and engagement.

Action 4: Parent Engagement and Education Program

- Expansion of structured parent learning opportunities through Grupo Crecer, with significant growth in participation (89 ? 269 ? 385 completions).
- Schools implemented diverse engagement strategies including workshops, parent conferences, family events (Math Night, Arts Night), and ongoing communications.
- Several schools demonstrated strong, consistent programming aligned to family needs.

Challenges

While implementation was strong overall, consistency and sustainability varied across sites and student groups.

Action 4: Parent Engagement Consistency

- Some sites experienced reduced frequency of parent workshops due to staffing limitations (social worker leave), impacting consistency of offerings.
- Uneven implementation across schools suggests variability in site capacity and reliance on specific personnel.

Action 1 & 4: Engagement Gaps Across Student Groups

- Despite increased communication efforts, survey trends show uneven improvement, particularly among 9th grade students and certain subgroups (English Learners, Low-Income), indicating that access to communication does not always translate to perceived engagement.

Action 2 & 3: Sustaining Deep Engagement

- While systems for communication and partnerships are fully in place, continued focus is needed to move from access and communication toward deeper, sustained family participation and influence in decision-making.

Paramount USD will continue leveraging data-informed practices, community partner collaboration, and strategic resource allocation to ensure that all students are prepared for success in college, career, and life.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

During the 2025–2026 school year, Paramount Unified School District fully implemented all Action Items under Goal 4, which focuses on Enhancing Family and Community Engagement. The district has established a 10% threshold to expend the funds for each Action. While many expenditures were consistent with initial budget projections, some material differences emerged due to the strategic leveraging of one-time state and federal grant funding. Funding sources such as the A-G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant, MTSS Grant, Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant, and Proposition 28 enabled the District to supplement or expand services originally funded through the LCAP. These shifts allowed the District to broaden program reach, enhance service quality, and preserve core LCFF funds for future use. As a result of these adjustments, the estimated actual percentage of improved services for unduplicated students may differ slightly from initial projections. However, the overall level of service was maintained or enhanced, and the District continues to analyze variances to inform future planning and ensure sustainable service delivery.

Contributing Actions:

The following actions demonstrated strong outcomes supported by both data trends and narrative evidence:

Action 2: Community Partnerships and Welcoming Environment

- DELAC ratings indicate strong effectiveness in fostering welcoming environments and engaging families on a 5-point scale (Metric #4.6):
- Two-way communication: 4.7
- Advisory committees: 4.2
- Seeking input: 4.5
- Targeted supports for English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low-Income families increased access to resources and strengthened school-family connections.

Action 3: Home-School Communication (ParentSquare)

- High effectiveness due to removal of access barriers (technology, language, availability).
- DELAC ratings demonstrate strong performance in creating welcoming, communicative environments on a 5-point scale (Metric #4.6):
- Two-way communication: 4.7
- Seeking input: 4.5
- There has been consistent use, multilingual access, and real-time communication, resulting in increased responsiveness and engagement.

Action 4: Parent Education

- Strong participation growth (89 to 269 to 385 completions) reflects increased family engagement and sustained interest in District sponsored Parent Engagement through Grupo Crecer.
- Positive parent feedback and strong attendance at school events demonstrate meaningful participation.
- CHKS data shows notable improvement in perceived parent involvement (Metric #4.8):
- 7th grade: from 54% to 65%
- 7th grade English Learners: from 59% to 67%
- Several school-level narratives provide evidence of consistent, high-quality engagement opportunities aligned to family needs.

The following actions showed positive progress but inconsistent impact across grade levels or student groups:

Action 1: Communication and Marketing Strategy

While fully implemented, impact on parent engagement perceptions was mixed (Metric #4.8):

- 7th grade improved significantly (54% to 65%)
- 9th grade showed only slight improvement (54% to 56%)
- 9th grade English Learners declined (63% to 54%)

Indicates that expanded communication systems did not consistently translate into increased engagement, particularly at the secondary level.

Action 4: Site-Based Parent Engagement

- Narrative evidence shows strong participation and meaningful engagement at events when offered.
- However, inconsistent implementation at some school sites was reported due to staffing challenges, which limited overall effectiveness.
- CHKS trends (Metric #4.8) suggest uneven impact across grade levels and student groups, reinforcing the need for consistent delivery.

Action 3: Communication Impact Across Student Groups

- Despite strong system implementation, subgroup data shows uneven outcomes (Metric #4.8):
- 7th grade Low-Income improved (56% to 64%)
- 9th grade Low-Income declined slightly (55% to 52%)
- Suggests that while access to communication improved, additional targeted strategies are needed to increase engagement among older students and specific populations.

Goal 4 demonstrates strong system-level implementation and growing family engagement, particularly through expanded communication tools and structured parent education opportunities. Actions tied to two-way communication and parent capacity-building were most effective, supported by both participation growth and improved survey outcomes.

However, effectiveness was uneven across grade spans and sites, with secondary students and some student groups showing more limited gains. Moving forward, prioritizing consistency of site-level implementation and deeper engagement strategies beyond communication will be critical to increasing impact across all student groups.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low-Income students often report feeling marginalized, a concern that was reflected in recent student survey results indicating that many in these groups do not consistently feel a sense of belonging on campus. This is further supported by the 2024 CAASPP results, which show that performance outcomes for these student groups continue to lag behind the overall student population in Paramount Unified School District. Specifically, the data highlights persistent achievement gaps in both English Language Arts and Mathematics, with English Learners performing significantly below standard, Foster Youth demonstrating limited growth from year to year, and Low-Income students showing lower proficiency rates compared to their peers.

California Dashboard indicators confirm that these disparities are longstanding, underscoring the systemic challenges faced by these populations. These outcomes, when coupled with the survey feedback, point to the need for intentional supports that address both academic achievement and social-emotional well-being.

PUSD is committed to closing these opportunity and achievement gaps by fostering an inclusive and equitable learning environment where all students feel safe, valued, and supported. By prioritizing the needs of English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low-Income students through LCAP Goal 5, the district affirms its dedication to ensuring that every student—especially those historically underserved—has the conditions necessary to thrive academically and socially. This commitment is rooted in the belief that equity-driven strategies, such as targeted academic interventions, culturally responsive practices, and expanded access to resources, will lead to both improved student outcomes and a more positive, welcoming school culture. During the current year, the district made progress in advancing Goal 5 actions by expanding enrichment opportunities, strengthening culturally responsive practices, and laying the foundation for systemwide equity through MTSS and the Equity Action Plan. While several initiatives were implemented successfully, others remain in early stages, particularly those requiring long-term capacity building and systemic alignment.

Successes

Action 2: Extra-Curricular Programs to Promote School Connectedness

- TK–8 students had broad access to enrichment opportunities through ELOP, including music, performing arts, academic support, and intramural sports.
- These programs expanded access beyond the instructional day and supported student engagement and belonging.

Action 3: Cultural Proficiency and Professional Learning

- Districtwide professional development was delivered to certificated and classified staff focused on culturally responsive and trauma-informed practices.
- Trainings strengthened staff capacity to support diverse student populations and promote inclusive learning environments.

Action 4: Equity Action Plan (Foundational Work)

- Development of a comprehensive rollout plan for MTSS training aligned with the Equity Action Plan.
- Established a clear structure for future implementation of Tier II and Tier III supports across schools.

Challenges

Action 1: Recruitment and Retention Systems

- Implementation of a comprehensive recruitment and retention strategy remains limited, with few clearly defined structures or measurable outcomes documented.
- While the intent is to increase staff diversity and capacity to support targeted student groups, current data suggest that the initiative has not yet reached full implementation or produced consistent systemwide impact.

Action 2: Sustaining Connectedness Across Grade Levels

- Although enrichment offerings are strong at TK–8, maintaining and increasing connectedness at higher grade levels remains an area for growth.

Action 3: Impact on Student Achievement Gaps

- While professional learning was implemented, student outcome data indicates persistent achievement gaps among English Learners, Foster Youth, and Long-Term English Learners.

Action 4: MTSS and Equity Plan Implementation

- Implementation is still in the planning phase, with full rollout scheduled for 2026–27.
- Current impact is limited due to lack of full execution across school sites.

The district remains steadfast in its commitment to equity and continuous improvement. PUSD will continue to refine systems, strengthen cross-departmental collaboration, and strategically allocate resources to meet the needs of all students. Through ongoing stakeholder engagement and the use of data-driven practices, the district will work to ensure every student is prepared for success in college, career, and life.

In 2025-2026, Paramount Unified School District fully implemented all Action Items under Goal 5: Building an Inclusive and Equitable School District. The district has established a 10% threshold to expend the funds for each Action. While many expenditures were consistent with original budgeted amounts, minimal material differences occurred due to the strategic deployment of time-limited state and federal grant funding. Resources such as the A-G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant, MTSS Grant, Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant, and Proposition 28 were utilized to supplement and expand services originally funded through LCAP. These funding shifts allowed the District to extend program reach, enhance quality, and conserve core LCAP funds for long-term sustainability. As a result, while the estimated actual percentage of improved services for unduplicated students may slightly differ from initial plans, the overall level of services was either maintained or strengthened. The District continues to monitor these variances to refine future planning and ensure the continuity of equitable and inclusive programming.

Somewhat Effective Actions

Action 1: Recruitment and Retention Systems

- While overall student performance has improved, subgroup data indicates persistent disparities, suggesting that the impact of recruitment and retention efforts on equitable outcomes is still emerging (Metrics #5.5, #5.6, #5.18–#5.23).
- All Students ELA increased (39.19% to 43.38%) and Math increased (21.58% to 25.02%) (Metrics #5.5, #5.6)
- English Learners showed minimal growth in ELA (11.56% to 12.03%) and inconsistent Math performance (8.17% to 8.71%) (Metrics #5.5, #5.6)
- Foster Youth outcomes declined in ELA (25.0% to 22.22%) and fluctuated in Math (2.78% to 14.81%) (Metrics #5.18, #5.19)
- Low-Income students demonstrated steady improvement in both ELA (38.38% to 42.91%) and Math (20.47% to 24.69%) (Metrics #5.20, #5.21)
- Long-Term English Learners remained significantly below overall performance levels, with slight gains in ELA (4.77% ? 5.92%) and inconsistent Math outcomes (1.87% ? 0.94%) (Metrics 5.22, 5.23)

Action 2: High School Connectedness

- 9th grade connectedness shows only modest improvement (Metric #5.28):
- All Students: 53% to 55%
- Low-Income: 55% to 54%
- Indicates that while enrichment supports are in place, their impact on older students' sense of belonging is less pronounced.

Action 3: Cultural Proficiency Impact on Student Groups

- Despite overall improvement, subgroup performance remains low (Metrics #5.5, #5.6, #5.22, #5.23):
- English Learners ELA: 11.56% to 12.03% (minimal growth)
- English Learners Math: 8.17% to 8.71%
- Long-Term English Learners Math: 1.87% to 0.94%
- Indicates that while professional development is implemented, its impact on closing equity gaps is still limited.

Action 4: Equity Action Plan and MTSS (Early Stage Effectiveness)

- Academic data for targeted groups remains mixed (Metrics #5.18–#5.21):
- Foster Youth ELA declined (25.0% to 22.22%)
- Foster Youth Math fluctuated (2.78% to 14.81%)
- Low-Income students improved in ELA (38.38% to 42.91%) and Math (20.47% to 24.69%)
- While some progress is evident, inconsistent trends reflect the need for full implementation of MTSS systems to ensure equitable outcomes.

Goal 5 reflects strong foundational work in building inclusive practices and expanding student engagement opportunities, particularly through enrichment programs and professional learning. Actions tied to school connectedness at the middle grades and overall student performance improvements demonstrate effectiveness.

However, key equity-focused outcomes remain uneven, with persistent achievement gaps among student groups and limited impact from actions still in early implementation (e.g., MTSS and recruitment systems). Moving forward, full implementation and consistent execution of equity systems will be critical to ensuring that improvements in access translate into equitable outcomes for all students.

In order to ensure all student groups are thriving in school academically and are connected, Metrics 5.1, 5.2, 5.3, 5.4, 5.26, 5.27, and 5.28 have been added to Goal 5, Actions 3 and 4.

At Paramount Community Day School, the goal is to reduce the percentage of students identified as chronically absent from 66.7% in the 2023 school year. For both schools, chronic absenteeism has been one of the most significant barriers to academic achievement and graduation, and addressing this issue requires a comprehensive and collaborative approach. Each school community—including students, parents, staff, district support teams, and local partners—will work together to strengthen attendance and create a culture of belonging. To achieve these goals, both campuses have implemented a Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) that includes weekly attendance and mobility tracking, tiered interventions tailored to student needs, and consistent communication with families. Parents will also be provided resources and supports to support consistent attendance, while students will benefit from expanded access to social-emotional supports, counseling, and wellness programs. Positive reinforcement will be used to celebrate improvements and foster motivation and connection to school. Additionally, staff will receive professional development and training focused on reducing absenteeism and implementing effective support strategies, while community partnerships will extend additional resources to students and families. Beginning with the 2025 school year, Paramount Community Day School will close to consolidate resources, with students transitioning to Buena Vista High School where stronger supports will be provided. Through these coordinated actions, Buena Vista High School is expected to increase overall attendance rates, significantly reduce chronic absenteeism, and ensure that all students are motivated, supported, and prepared to graduate ready for college, career, and life success. Three PUSD schools qualified for the Equity Multiplier: Buena Vista High School, Paramount Virtual High School, and Paramount Community Day School. Paramount Virtual High School had no students in attendance for the 2024-2025 school year. Based on the 2024 California Dashboard and community partner collaboration, improving student attendance and engagement is an ongoing need. Engaging and empowering students and families supports attendance and is essential for student success. Good attendance combined with meaningful engagement leads to many positive outcomes, including better performance on academic measures, higher self-esteem, improved social skills, and higher high school graduation rates.

Overall, the implementation of actions under Goal 6 has proceeded as planned. Strategic initiatives—ranging from increasing family engagement to expanding enrichment and social-emotional learning opportunities—have been initiated and are either fully operational or in active progress. Paramount Unified remains committed to regularly reviewing student engagement and achievement data to refine and enhance these efforts in order to meet the diverse needs of its student population.

Challenges

- Persistent attendance concerns for a subset of students. Action 6.1 and 6.2.
- Need for a more proactive and streamlined process to identify and recruit credit-deficient students who would benefit from Buena Vista. Action 6.2.
- Further clarification and communication needed regarding the referral and placement process for students. Action 6.1 and 6.2.
- Need to broaden parental involvement beyond individual student concerns by offering new avenues for engagement. Action 6.1 and 6.2.
- Limited access to community resources; opportunity to expand partnerships and bring services directly onto campus. Action 6.1 and 6.2.
- Continued need for enhanced support for homeless students, including access to life skills training, hygiene facilities, clothing, and other basic needs. Action 6.1 and 6.2.

The District is committed to addressing these challenges through system refinement, targeted supports, and strong collaboration with educational partners. The district will continue using data-driven decision-making and purposeful investment of resources to ensure that all students—particularly the most vulnerable—are equipped with the tools they need to thrive in school, career, and life.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

In 2024–25, Paramount Unified School District fully implemented all Action Items under Goal 6, the Equity Multiplier. While the majority of expenditures aligned with initial budget projections, several material differences were observed due to the strategic use of time-limited state and federal funding sources. The District effectively leveraged external grants, including the A–G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant, Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) Grant, Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant, and Proposition 28, to supplement and enhance services that were originally intended to be funded through LCAP. The use of one-time supplemental grants in place of LCAP funds resulted in lower-than-anticipated expenditures for Goal 6 under the LCAP. However, this strategic decision enabled Paramount USD to broaden access to critical services and ensure continuous improvement in outcomes for unduplicated students. The District will continue to closely monitor expenditure patterns and service impacts to inform future Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) development and ensure alignment with long-term equity goals.

Action 6.1: Increase Family Engagement

While this action was carried out in full, a significant portion of the budgeted Equity Multiplier funds remained unspent. The District intentionally redirected funding responsibilities to the A–G Completion Grant, Learning Recovery Block Grant, and MTSS Grant. These external sources supported parent outreach efforts, workshops, and engagement events, ensuring that service delivery goals were met or surpassed.

Action 6.2: Provide Enrichment and Social Emotional Learning Opportunities

This action was fully implemented; however, a substantial portion of the Equity Multiplier allocation was not expended because enrichment programs, professional development in Social-Emotional Learning (SEL), and extended learning activities were supported through the Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant, A–G Completion Grant, and MTSS Grant. This shift allowed the District to enhance service offerings and maintain a high level of support for student wellness and engagement.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Contributing Actions:

Paramount Community Day School

Action 6.1 was not effective as demonstrated by Metric #6.1 in which students who become Chronically absent increase from 65% to 90%. Beginning in the 2025–26 school year, students in this program will be moved to Buena Vista High School to address the chronic absenteeism challenges.

Action 6.2 Provide Enrichment and Social Emotional Learning Opportunities was mostly effective. Social emotional supports, including the integration of restorative practices, increased counselor presence, and the establishment of strong relational practices such as daily check-ins and staff-student connections, positively influenced school climate and student well-being. Initiatives such as “Coffee/Tea with Classified Staff” and collaborations with community partners fostered stronger relationships among families and staff. Metric #6.2 shows that chronic absenteeism for Buena Vista High School declined from 53% to 46%. Although the actual percentage of improved services for unduplicated students may vary slightly from original projections due to shifts in funding sources, the intended impact and equity-focused outcomes are starting to be realized for Foster Youth, English Learners, and Low-Income students at this school.

While notable progress has been made at Buena Vista High School in reducing chronic absenteeism, challenges remain. Paramount Virtual Academy, the third Equity Multiplier school, did not have any students enrolled during the 2024–25 school year. In addition, to consolidate resources and better serve Tier II and Tier III Low-Income, English Learner, and Foster Youth students in the Educational Options programs, Paramount Community Day School students will attend Buena Vista High School beginning in the 2025–26 school year. Efforts to clarify and streamline the identification and placement process for credit-deficient students within the Educational Option program are ongoing to ensure Tier II and III supports are appropriate. Paramount USD acknowledges these areas for growth and remains committed to refining strategies and partnerships to ensure sustained progress toward the goal of increased engagement and support for all students.

Next year, Buena Vista will be the only Equity Multiplier-qualified school. Paramount Virtual Academy will continue not to have students, and the Community Day school services will be moved to Buena Vista, as the "Metric" will no longer apply due to these changes.
